Lord JOHN RUSSELL'S opinion respecting Colonial Assemblies, has acted like an electric fire, in the minds of all, and has brought them unanimously to agree on the subject. The Commissioners of the Cape Town Municipality very properly considered, that the time had now arrived to renew the application made by the Public several years ago to the Home Government, for the establishment of a Representative Assembly in this Colony, and consequently convened a Meeting of Commissioners and Wardmasters, in Common Council assembled, for the purpose of taking the subject into consideration.
