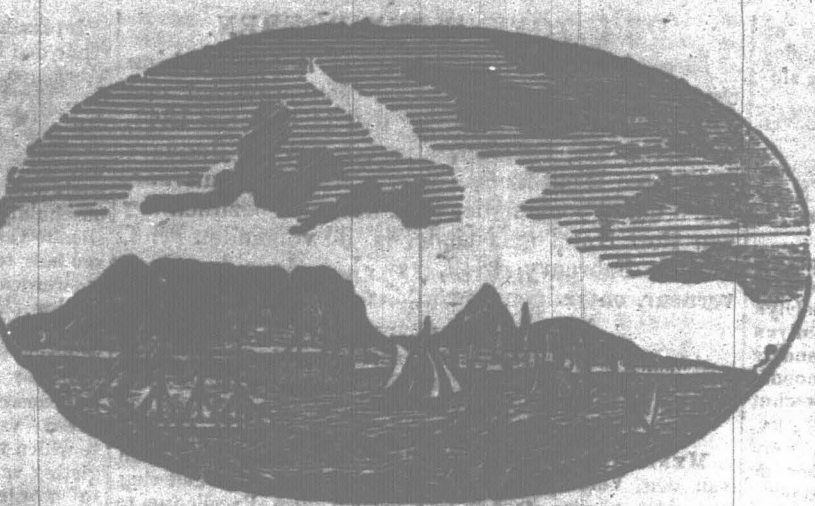

Under the present emergency of the country, if they had only sufficient confidence in Ministers to be satisfied on their representation, that such a sacrifice was necessary for the public good. But for this confidence there must be some reason; and, certainly, no reason for it can be found in the mere circumstances that an income tax is proposed. Such a measure, when viewed by itself, is calculated to provoke a feeling of opposition from every quarter. Many taxes are already unpopular; and the tax from the industrial nature of the machinery by which it must be collected, is probably the most onerous in all the various interests which depend upon manufactures, commerce, and professional occupations, and has the additional defect of taxing incomes of limited or precarious duration at an equal rate with those which are founded upon real property—a clear injustice, almost sufficient to insure the hostility of those influential classes. The Minister who introduces such a measure must have very strong claims upon their good-will, or else must be prepared to find their influence falling more and more into the scale of opposition.

NORTH AMERICA.

The packet-ship Garrick, Captain Skiddy, which sailed from New York on the 23rd ult., arrived at Liverpool yesterday, after a passage of 23 days. We have received by her papers from the 23rd to the 25th ult. inclusive.

In the Senate, on the 21st ult., a message was received from the President, transmitting a communication from the Secretary of State, in reply to Mr. Walker's resolution, calling for information relative to the action of the Government in the case of the Cruise. The documents were read. They were stated by Mr. Webster's instructions to Mr. Bancroft, the United States Minister at the Court of St. James, in regard to the case of that vessel, and the argument on which the United States Government rests for a demand for redress from the Government of Great Britain. The argument was considered, and it seemed to be perfectly satisfactory to the Senate from the south. Mr. Walker expressed his gratitude at the fact and principle of the instructions. They were entirely satisfactory to him, and would be so, he believed, to the country. Mr. Calhoun had heard the documents read with great pleasure. The argument occupied the whole ground, and coming from the source it did, it would put, he hoped, an end to this dangerous and unpleasant controversy. The documents were referred to the Committee on Foreign Relations.

In the House of Representatives, on the 21st ult., Mr. Allen, of Maine, offered a resolution, which was adopted, calling on the President of the United States (if not incompatible with the public interests) to communicate to the House the state of the negotiations between the United States and Great Britain, in relation to the North Eastern Boundary, to the state of Maine, and also all correspondence on the subject between the two Governments and heretofore communicated. The President, on the 26th, in answer to a message from the House, informed the House that, in his judgment, no communication could be made by him at this time on the subject of the resolution, without detriment and danger to the public interests.

The Governor of Massachusetts had sent a message to the Legislature also relative to the North Eastern Boundary. Deeming it probable that Great Britain might shortly propose a conventional boundary, he had thought it his duty to bring the subject under their consideration, that provisions might be made for making known the sentiments of the Commonwealth, in case terms of compromise should be designed with a view to a settlement.

"The sentiments of Maine and the United States are unknown to me," said his Excellency, "except as disclosed to the public; but I do not view it as an impossibility that terms may be proposed which will meet the approbation of both, and it is for this reason I would have the Commonwealth prepared—that she may assert and vindicate her just rights, and at the same time do whatever is consistent with them to promote an amicable adjustment of the controversy."—Times, March 21.

ALARMING FIRE IN LIVERPOOL.

LIVERPOOL, SATURDAY. Last night a very alarming and destructive fire broke out in the extensive cotton warehouse of Messrs. Robinson and Latham, situated near St. George's Dock, and a few yards from the parish church of St. Nicholas. From the peculiar position of the warehouses, which from a dense quadrangle filled with combustible materials, being in the immediate neighbourhood of some of the principal mercantile buildings in the town, great apprehensions were entertained for the result, particularly as there was a strong gale of wind blowing from the north-west at the time, which if efficient means had not been employed, might have extended the ravages of the fire to an uncontrollable and fearful extent, the premises being upwards of 50 feet in depth, extending a considerable distance. The warehouse in which the fire broke out was five stories in height, and was filled with cotton in bags. The warehouses adjoining were two stories higher than the one on fire, which was a fortunate circumstance, as it prevented the flames being carried by the wind to other large stacks of buildings containing valuable property. By the extraordinary exertions of the fire-police, headed by Mr. Whitty, the high combustible, the fire was fortunately confined to the warehouse in which it broke out, damage being sustained to the amount of 3,000*l.*; had the range of buildings been burnt down, the loss would have been immense, the value of the warehouses, to say nothing of their valuable stocks, being upwards of 50,000*l.* The fire broke out about half past 6 in the evening, and was extinguished by 10. One fireman was severely injured by a fall from a ladder, but hopes are entertained of his recovery. A more alarming fire has not occurred in Liverpool for many years. The congregation of persons to witness its ravages was immense, and the rigging of the ships in the dock was filled by persons anxious to obtain a good view of the awfully grand scene. A captain of a vessel in St. George's Dock, seeing the rigging of his vessel crowded by strangers, desired his crew to fetch them down. Most of them obeyed, but others refusing to stir, the captain desired one of his men to fetch them down with a cutlass. One of the sailors mounted the rigging, cutlass in hand, and on a lad refusing to get down, he struck him several times with the weapon, and cut him severely. This morning the savage crew and his captain were brought before the magistrate for offences, and were committed to the quarter gaol to answer for it. The quantity of cotton destroyed has been very considerable, but the owners are insured in various offices.—Times, March 21.

POSTSCRIPT.

PORT NATAL.

At 4 o'clock yesterday, a third Extra Paper was published by the Cape Town Mail of the conflict between the Troops and the Farmers at Port Natal; containing some additional particulars, from which it appears that Capt. SMITH, having with 100 men and 2 field pieces marched towards the camp of the Emigrants at Congella, in the evening, was attacked at midnight while in the bush.

Up to a late hour last evening no further Express had arrived. There is therefore no truth in the report of an Express conveying intelligence that Capt. SMITH had been dangerously wounded.
