PORT NATAL. We had occasion to refer to our former numbers... respecting the affairs of Natal...

When Mr. Cloete was appointed as Her Majesty's Commissioner... to proceed to Natal for the purpose of communicating to the Emigrant Farmers the Government Proclamation...

These reports were exported; there was nothing from the other side to contradict or explain them... and the public read with a degree of dread anticipation...

A handful of Boers in open rebellion have grown up into a first-rate military power... with whom Government has not been ashamed to treat...

If this had been a true representation of affairs... it would be as much affected as the Commissioner as the Emigrants. The former, because a feeling of improper and undue disregard of the dignity of the Government...
