### HET DUELLEREN IN FRANKRYK.

De Reforme publiceert het volgende over dat onderwerp:

“Er word veel gesproken in Algiers betrekelyk een tweede gevecht d' l'outrance (tot dan doet toe), dat binne kort in die stad plaats hebbe sal; met verlof van den Minister van oorlog, mogen Generals Bourgu en Bourjolly; de secundants syn, Generals Klorte voor General Bourjolly, en General Yusuf (de Arabier) voor General Bourgu. Het gevecht sal te paard geschieden. De strijdren sullen eerst pistolen gebruiken, en wanneer dies is vergeeft, zwaarden. Zeft de grond waarop dit gevecht plaats hebbe sal, wordt publiek genoemd. Hos zullen wy die ministerieel verlof overeen brengt met de wet welke het Government heeft gegeven traditieelik te huishouden? Reeds de uitspraak van den Rouslik Hof van Parys, welke inhield dat er geen wetgeving misdaad gepleegd was door den Heer Beaumanoir en den Heer Dujairet in een tweewekelijk gebed had, verneigd hebbende, deed het Hof van Cassie niet later dan gisteren weder eens soorgelyke uitspraak in de zaak van een tweewekelijk welke het Koninklyk Hof van Kenys verhaard had volgens de wet niet te kunnen worden gestraft.”

With reference to the letter signed “A Farmer” we are credibly informed that the Civil Commissioner and the Clerk of the Peace of Stellenbosch, started on Monday last, about 4 o'clock p.m., with two armed Police, for the “Houtwinkel”, to inquire into certain disturbances, occasioned by some free laborers working at the new lime kiln.

**CRIMINAL SESSIONS.**

**THE KAFIRS.**

Last Thursday a very cruel murder was committed near Post Victoria. The victim was an elderly Hottentot man in the employ of Mr. Price,

a trader at that Post. The circumstances of the case, as far as we are informed, are briefly as follows: The deceased was sent to fetch up his master's horses: not returning, as expected, search was made for him, when his body was found

bearing the marks of having been strangled and dragged for some distance to the spot where it lay.

On careful examination of the ground, the spoor, or naked footmarks of a man was discovered and traced from the spot to a kraal of Kaffirs under the Chief Tola. A Report of this being made to him, he at once identified the impression of the foot as being that of a certain Kafir whom he caused to be quickly apprehended. This culprit, it is said, has since confessed to the commission of the crime, and was about to be sent to Graham's Town, for examination by the Resident Magistrate; but whether the jurisdiction of that officer extends to the Ceded Territory, in which the deed was perpetrated, is a point of questionable character.

**ADDITIONAL PARTICULARS.**

“The victim was an old Hottentot man, employed as cook and house servant by Mr. Price. It appears that some short time ago, the old man had put the Kafir out of his hut, and who threatened that if he ever caught him by himself he would kill him. On the day of the murder Mr. Price sent the poor man to look for his horse, when the Kafir, but too true to his word, seized him and executed his threat. It seems that he knocked him on the head with his klerie (bludgeon), and then left the body until dark, when he drew it to within 200 yards of the post, placing the saddle upon it, but carrying away with him the bridle and stirrup irons. The murderer is in the guard house here, and has confessed to the commission of the atrocious deed.”

(Extract of a letter from Colesberg.)

“The country to the N. E. is said to be in a

of rain has fallen about the Colesberg District,

### TWO KAFIRS SHOT.

The same communication which contains the above, states that two Kafirs had stolen some cattle from the Fieldcornet De Lange, and were pursued, being overtaken near the Winterberg, were both shot by the pursuing party. It is added that 26 head of cattle, the property of De Lange, have been carried off since this fatal affray.

SIR!—It is said and much talked about, that a marriage was lately solemnized between a widower and his deceased wife's sister, three children having been procreated by his first wife, and it was asked, whether it was legal, and if so now, whether the last marriage Ordinance made it legal, it being well known that formerly such marriages were not to be allowed; consequently illegal, unless with consent of Government. In the year 1798 consent having been obtained from Government by Mr. John Elmslie to marry his wife's sister, a similar application was made in December, 1841, in behalf of Miss E. Perkins to marry James Morrison, who had been married to his sister, when Lord Charles Somerset's answer was, “Upon a reference to the cases you have quoted as precedents, which might be followed with the view of setting aside the Colonial Law in your peculiar case, I find that the cases of John Elmslie and J. C. Astell” both occurred during the Dutch Government era, and during the period that Holland was under the influence of the Revolutionary Government, when all restriction in the matrimonial laws were abolished. Under these circumstances I regret to say, it is quite out of my power to decide in your request.”

Now, I may ask, will the present Government, not being under the influence of a Revolutionary Government, pass this act unnoticed? I may also add, that if the Magistrate's order to the bridegroom, “whether he was related to his spouse and to what degree?” and whether a Deed of Acknowledgment was effected, had been properly answered, he would have passed before he had passed the license.

I hope that you, Sir, will not pass by this circumstance without noticing it for the benefit of the public, and thereby prevent a recurrence of such acts.

**ANOTHER FARMER SHOT BY KAFIRS.**

The following distressing intelligence is contained in a letter before us of the 13th instant:—

“The Kafirs having stolen four horses in the ‘Dry Spruit’ of the Konap, belonging to Hendrik van Vuuren, five farmers went off in pursuit. The marauders being closely pursued, finding that one horse was missing, shot the animal dead, and then concealed themselves in a deep gully. On the farmers coming up to the spot, they fired on them, and unfortunately struck Van Vuuren. The firing was returned, and kept up by the farmers until they heard no more. They then brought away their wounded companion, and captured two horses, the Kafirs, however, getting off with the other three. All these Kafirs are stated to have been armed with guns. The wound of Van Vuuren is very dangerous. The ball entered just below the elbow, took a direction upwards, passed through the large muscle, and came out just below the socket of the shoulder, shattering and carrying away the arm bone.”
