CAPE TOWN, JANUARY 29, 1846.

The first batch of Emigrants, destined to provide in the want of labourers in this Colony, and for which laudable object the Legislative Council voted a sum of £10,000 from the Colonial Revenue, arrived in Table Bay on Tuesday last in the ship Susan, having sailed from Plymouth on the 23d November last.

The number of Emigrants on board amounts to 198 men and women, 70 children, and 4 infants; the first consisting of field labourers, domestic servants, shepherds, carpenters, masons, sawyers, &c., who, with the advice of their official adviser, the Collector of Customs, will enter into the service of such applicants, as shall in his opinion have made the most advantageous offers, in pursuance of his invitation to that effect.

It is said that these Emigrants have been selected from a proper class of labourers and recommended themselves by their good appearance; but however this may be, we desire to direct the attention of all those having any interference in the matter, to the necessity of impressing on their minds that they will not be relieved here from the salutary check, in case they leave the service of those into whose service they may now enter, of being provided with a certificate of good conduct, as an indispensable requisite to be again employed by others. The introduction of this desirable system will be the best means for securing a proper fulfilment of their duties on the part of these people, it will constantly secure them the best and most advantageous employment, and prevent their being carried away by the bad example of a large number of our colored servants, whose vicious habits are a constant source of vexation, inconvenience and loss. The Colonists now have it in their power to put a stop to it for the future, at least in as far as these Emigrants are concerned; and it will therefore be their own fault, if by disregarding this well-meaning advice, they are in future also annoyed by these people.

We regret to observe that the Measles broke out on board the Susan during her voyage, from the effects of which a number of children died; and though the subjoined certificate from the Ship's Surgeon, seems to remove all fear of contagion, we nevertheless trust that the necessary precautionary measures will be taken to prevent these people from mixing themselves among the population, until it shall have been experimentally proved, at least in as far as human calculation and discernment will allow, that all chance of contagion is utterly impossible. On a former occasion the colony felt the full weight of this calamity, and we can see no reason why, through an unwarrantable recklessness, it should again be introduced here.

SHIP "SUSAN"

The Ship "Susan" left Plymouth, November 21st, for Cape of Good Hope, with Emigrants. On December 1st, at 3h 51, North, long 15 West, the first case of Measles occurred, and this disease continued till the 18th January, when the last case was put out of the sick-list, and in my opinion, the ship is now free from infection.

Nineteen deaths have taken place on the voyage among the children, chiefly from Gairds Enteritis, the result probably of Measles. All the adults are in excellent health.

The ship is in the same condition for cleanliness it has been in during the voyage, and all clothes and lines of every description have been washed and thoroughly purified.

NEW SCHOOL ROOM OF THE DUTCH REFORMED CHURCH AT WYNBERG.

The above named Building will be solemnly opened on Sunday next, the 1st February. In the morning of that day, at 10 o'clock, the Rev. P. F. FAURE will deliver an appropriate Sermon in the Church Building, at the conclusion of which the Congregation will be invited to contribute towards the defraying of the expense of the erection of the School Room, and to follow the Reverend Gentleman thither, for the purpose of consecrating it to Almighty God by prayer and hymns.

In the afternoon, at half-past 3 o'clock, a Sermon will be preached in the School Room, in the English language, by the Rev. W. ELLIOTT; and in the evening, at half-past six, the Rev. G. MORGAN will deliver a Sermon in the Dutch language. On both occasions, collections will be made in aid of the funds of the School.

The Mail from the Frontier arrived in Town yesterday about one o'clock. The papers from thence contain no news.

FATAL ACCIDENT.

On Tuesday evening last about sunset a Hottentot named Abraham Jantjes, who resides a little beyond Port England, returning from a hunt gave his gun to his son, a boy about 10 years of age, and told him to put it in the house, while he went to the house of one Zedras, a short distance off. It appears that the boy took the gun into the house, where other children were playing—his sister and two cousins. Instead, however, of putting the gun away as ordered, he sat down with it between his legs and was playing with it, when his sister told him to put it away; but he refused. He then took out the ramrod and tried the gun, which he found loaded, and he again sat down with it between his legs. At this time the other children were sitting in a row in front of him, and his sister again told him to put the gun away—but at that instant the gun, being too heavy for him, tipped over, and in trying to save it from falling he caught hold of the cock, which, however, soon slipped out of his hand, and the gun (which had been loaded with a bullet) went off. One child, a little girl of about six years of age, was killed on the spot; its head and face being shattered by the ball—another girl the eldest, was severely wounded in the chin—and the youngest, a child of about 2 years of age, was shot through the arm.—C. F. Times, Jan. 20.

Original Correspondence

Paris, Jan. 25, 1846. Sir,—It was with extreme gratification that I perused the speech of the honorable Mr. Field, H. M. Collector of Customs, delivered in the Legislative Council on the 7th January last. I cannot refrain from publicly expressing my sincere thanks to him for the unadorned and manly language with which he advocated the truth; and as one of those wine farmers whose interests he so ably defended, I feel myself constrained to contradict some assertions in the memoir of Mr. Edden and of the iron and punjums store gentlemen; as also of those

traders whose exclusive interest demand that they advocate the truth in French brandy; and to confirm the statement of Mr. Edden in the Legislative Council about twenty-two months ago. I allude to the following:—"If any alteration is made, I think it would be preferable to place French brandy on the same footing as all others, in order to afford encouragement to Cape-made spirits, which can already be made superior to those produced in Spain or Italy."

I am enabled to prove by spirits in my possession, bought from the Paris Distillery, that Mr. Edden, when he applied himself to the whole truth, and that the spirits distilled here, if not superior to French brandy, are at least equal to the best used in this colony for the preparation of wines for the English market. This day, four years ago, I purchased an extensive wine farm at the Paris and determined to achieve all expense and to endeavour to improve the bad spirits in which Cape wines stood, and of which the wine merchants are exclusively the cause. I immediately bought a league of spirits, and made several trials; amongst others I endeavoured to imitate pure sherry, and completely succeeded according to the opinion of several respectable Europeans, for they all unanimously declared that it had both the taste, color, &c. of sherry. I have at this moment still some half-hams of it in my possession, and am willing to produce some dozens thereof either in the Exchange, at the office of your paper, or any other public place, where it may be tested by all those really interested in the wine trade; at the same time I will also produce a few bottles of cognac, which I subsequently purchased from the Paris spirit company, and I trust that every impartial person taking an interest in our wine trade, will come and taste it, in order to convince some wine merchants, with Messrs. Edden and Jarvis at their head, and also the iron and punjums store gentlemen—as they have been styled by Mr. Field. I also feel myself constrained to contradict another part of their monstrous statement, that about eighty thousand gallons of spirits are required for the preparation of wines annually exported to the home market, and that all our wine is distilled in spirits (which in the opinion of Mr. Edden, must be the case) where the wine would be found for exportation? The latter would be readily answered by a school boy, though Mr. Edden, a member of our Legislative Council, seems unable to do so. He would simply answer, only distill to such wine into spirits, as may be required for the preparation of wines for exportation; the wine growers of the Paris and its environs have already looked into the matter, and bound themselves annually to deliver to the Paris distillery one tenth part of their vintage for distillation, in order to provide the necessary quantity of spirits for the preparation of wines for exportation; and I will further prove that it is a sufficient quantity, for though Mr. Jarvis (who I have had a great interest in the importation of French brandy) had provided Mr. Edden with a document which would establish any one taking a superficial view of it; I must however remark, that neither Mr. Edden nor Mr. Jarvis is able to prove that the whole number of 80,000 gallons annually imported, are used exclusively for the preparation of wines, for I am convinced that several thousand gallons of that quantity are used for domestic consumption, especially of the frontiers of this colony; and that, if 60,000 gallons of French brandy of 18 degrees are required, (which I doubt), 30,000 gallons of spirits of 30 & 32 degrees will be sufficient. Even the most simple person in this colony must conceive that spirits of wine are a better substitute with wine than brandy, generally used in this colony, and distilled from pears and other fruit.

I have also said that the wine merchants, at least some of them, are exclusively the cause that our Cape wines have obtained such a bad name; and I will therefore proceed to prove it. If the wine merchants would attend to the quality rather than the quantity of wine, and were to give those making bad wine a low price, and those making good wine a fair price, every farmer would be obliged to take care that all his wines were properly made; but as the best wines now fetch a price equal to that of the most inferior, it would be foolish on the part of a farmer to give up his vines, for it is not only a great deal of trouble, but also a great outlay to make good wine. If my neighbour commences pressing eight or ten days before me, he will sometimes get six or eight leagues per 100 imperial gallons, because I commence later. His wine cannot then be as good as mine, but nevertheless the wine merchant makes no difference in the price.

Again, instead of the wine merchants consulting the distiller, they consult rather to operate with them, for by the distiller the farmer is relieved from his bad wines, and the wine merchants need not put up with a bad article. I might say a great deal more, but I fear that I have already encroached too much on your time and patience by my simple observations; but as I see no objection coming forward to defend the interests of the wine growers, who have been from time to time oppressed by the wine merchants, I will not take it evil, or accuse me of arrogance.

FUTURE RAILWAY LEGISLATION.

The marked feature of the present, as of former periods of speculative activity, is its almost exclusive direction to one point. In 1835 the working of the gold mines in the south of South America formed the darling light of the public eye, in which public credulity was swallowed up. In 1835-6 the object was still one, and the site still America, but it was to improve the interior communications of Ohio and other of the less reclaimed states of the American Union. In 1845 the predominant rage maintains its singleness of purpose, but it is for *chemine de fer*—for covering with rails the length and breadth of the land—what the Legislature discovered for compassing the entire globe with marian and parallel bands of iron. We rejoice in this manifestation; but should be more satisfied if it could be kept within reasonable bounds. Railways are an admirable contrivance for transport, but they are not commerce, nor manufactures, nor agriculture, only a co-operative agency by which these staple industrial pursuits may be made more efficiently productive. Added by the locomotive engine, they are a prodigious improvement on the common road with animal power; but, granting all this there are obvious limits to the remunerative extent of their application. In thinly-peopled districts, poor in natural resources, they cannot possibly pay their working, and are altogether ineligible as schemes of speculative investment. Even in more favoured districts there is an obvious limit to their profitable uses. If one line divides 10 per cent. two or nearly the same route would only divide the profit, for the same would have still smaller dividend, and were the number of competing lines further multiplied, the divisional profit might dwindle to nil for all. Unlimited competition may thus convert a gainful into a losing undertaking, or, if recklessly pursued, into one absolutely ruinous. What course, then, is the Legislature likely to adopt with the mass of railway projects recently fabricated? Supposing the preliminary got through of deposit paying, and the enormous expenditure of engineering, advertising, and law-agency mastered, and that only one tithe of the cloud of schemes that now darken the air reach the threshold of Parliament—in what way, we repeat, is Parliament likely to deal with them? Will it accept or reject them *in toto*? It will do neither: it will propose on one or two common sense principles, which will speedily dispose of the avalanche of folly that threatens next February to block up the passages of Westminster. Upon every one point, however, the first simple inquiry by an impartial tribunal will naturally be—Have we not already legislatively sanctioned the passing over the same or nearly the same district of country? Shall we immediately after undo our own work, and ruin the interest created under our auspices? What need or pretext is there for a new line? Is the old one ill-constructed, ill-managed, inadequate to the wants of the locality, or does it appear from its returns of traffic, that it yields more than a fair return for the risk of policy? Answer some of these inquiries satisfactorily, and we will listen to you; otherwise your application is unreasonable and indefensible. We cannot sanction it. Acting disinterestedly for the public, we cannot allow that private property shall be invaded, and labour and capital diverted from their accustomed and wholesome channels of employment, to be risked in a speculative scheme not generally needed, that would certainly be injurious to others, and likely to be beneficial to yourselves by the same means. Under the application of these very reasonable interrogatories, what can possibly be the fate of a very large proportion of the host of bubbles now afloat? They must vanish into thin air, along with the throng of knaves and dupes by whom they have been concocted and supported up to the time, if not before, of the dissolving touch of next session of Parliament.—Railway Register.

AFFAIRS OF INDIA.

We understand that new and stringent terms of treaty have been or shortly will be offered to the Lahore Government for their acceptance, and that a refusal to comply with them on the infraction of any one article of them, will be the immediate signal for the advance of British troops into the Country. Negotiations are now pending between the government of India and Lahore, and the re-

sult of them will either postpone or hasten the conquest of the Panjab. The probability is that no war will take place this year, but it is impossible to speculate with any degree of certainty as to what will, or what will not take place.

The Queen Mother's men awkward position and would gladly retire into domestic life, if she were allowed. It is said that with the young Maharajah she has proceeded to Umritsur, but the object of her visit to that city is not clearly defined.

Raja Golsub Singh is perfectly aware that the only reason why the troops so anxiously desire his return from Jummoo, is that they may receive the benefits of increased pay and ornament. It is his wealth alone which induces the rapacious Sikh Soldiers to wish him at their head, and Golsub Singh has sense enough to perceive the motive. Let him return and his part is a difficult one to play. If he comply with the avaricious requisitions of the Sikhs, his treasury will soon be exhausted, and his destruction as a natural consequence in the Panjab will follow; but if he possesses sufficient power, influence and daring to rule them with a rod of iron as Runjeet Singh did, then it is not impossible for a time, he would ward off the conquest of the country by British arms. Now although we admit Golsub Singh to be one of the cleverest and most valiant chiefs that ever held power in the Panjab, we do not think that his bravery and ability would be of much avail unless backed by the strong support of gold. Let this support fail, and the blood-thirsty soldiers of Lahore will no more scruple to destroy one from whom they can no longer draw money, than they did to assassinate Heera Singh, Pandit Julla, Jawahir Singh and others. The man of riches will be the favorite of the Sikhs; and he who possesses the greatest amount of cash, will be their God so long as it lasts; and he distributes it with a liberal hand. We do not for one moment believe that any individual will be found in the Panjab, who is able to undertake the government of the country or who is competent to check the excesses and curb the spirits of the turbulent soldiery. An English Governor with an English army is the only panacea for the ill of the Panjab.—*Agri Urbary*, November 8.
