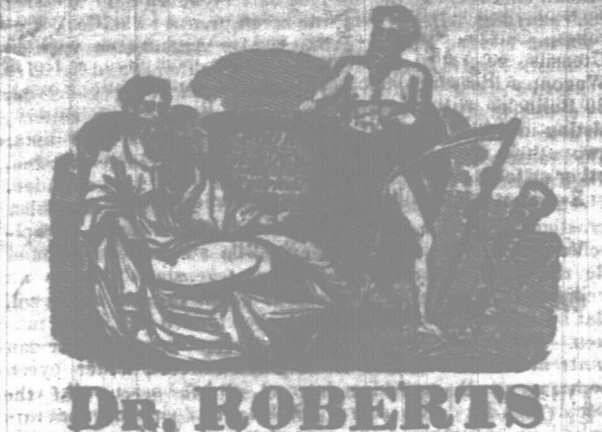

THE ZUID-AFRIKAAN.

CAPE TOWN, FEBRUARY 8, 1846.

On Saturday last, an express from the Lieut-Governor of the Eastern Province arrived in town, in consequence whereof the Governor deemed it expedient to despatch 200 troops thither in the Thunderbolt. It is evident that this movement was occasioned by a threatened Kaffir irruption, these people having displayed a high degree of irritation in consequence of the contemplated removal of Post Victoria, SANDILLA declaring that Government had no right to establish a military post in his territory, and that he would prevent it by force of arms.

Taking an abstract view of the matter, SANDILLA appears to be right, at least in as far as his objection goes, and we think particular care ought to be taken that these children of nature have no just cause to complain of our civilized Government; and this they would undoubtedly have, if, notwithstanding it might have appeared that the disputed ground was Kaffir territory, that had still persisted in removing the post thither.

Fortunately however extremities have not yet been resorted to, and the rage of the Kaffirs seems to have been calmed down a little by the timely intercession of the Lieut-Governor; and Sandilla is said to have expressed his regret at his violent demeanor, having moreover consented to the establishment of the said post—but under certain restrictions.

Though the rage of the Kaffirs, as already stated, has somewhat abated, it is impossible to predict in what all this demonstration may yet end; and we are therefore of opinion that Government is bound to be on its guard, lest it be carried away by mere outward appearance; especially as it is but too apparent that in spite of their seeming pacification, they only seek a fit opportunity to give full scope to their long slumbered blood-thirstiness and rapacity. Let vigilance and determination therefore be the motto of our Rulers and these barbarians convinced that indulgence is not weakness—fornearance not fear! No open rupture has yet taken place—but who doubts their well matured schemes? A timely check should be put to these as well as their intentions.

The following extracts give the particulars of everything that appears to have taken place:—

THE KAFFIRS.

In consequence of a despatch received on Sunday by the Lieut. Governor from the Frontier, a detachment of 80 men of the 91st Regt. were marched from Graham's Town on Monday morning at 4 o'clock, to Post Victoria; while Mr. W. Shepstone, the Kaffir Interpreter at Fort Peddie, who happened to be in town, received orders at midnight on Sunday to proceed immediately to his post. The exact cause of this at present veiled in obscurity—but is said to consist in some threatening demonstration on the part of the Gaike Kaffir, and an express determination not to suffer the establishment of a military post on a site which has been selected for that purpose near Block Drift. There is some doubt it appears as to whether this spot is not within the Kaffir boundary, and rumour says that the Chief Sandilla, has declared he will resist by force of arms any attempt on the part of Government to occupy it—thus making the question a sort of New Zealand affair, and it will be for our Government to take care that it does not lead to the same disgraceful and disastrous results as in that Settlement.

In the mean time this refractory and unprincipled Kaffir has not scrupled to show his contempt of British authority, by an open breach of the 11th clause of the treaty recently made by him with the Executive Government of this colony, and by which he engages that all British subjects residing in Kaffirland for the purpose of trade shall be protected in their persons and properties. It appears, however, that on Saturday last Sandilla forcibly carried the stores of Messrs Bloke, articles and severely maltreated, by beating with a kearrie or knobbed stick, the trader in charge, an Englishman named Murray, who endeavored to resist this act of open audacious spoliation. It remains now to be seen whether this contemptuous act of aggression will, as in other instances, be tamely submitted to, and whether the honor of the British name and the safety of this Settlement, are to be compromised by succumbing to the menaces and submitting to the outrages of savages, who have been made formidable by our forbearance, and by whom our kindness has been interpreted as fear—our humanity as weakness, and our demonstrations as absurd, impotent braggadocio.—G. T. Journal, Jan. 31.

The information from the immediate Frontier, received within the last few days, is of a more pacific character than that given in our previous reports. On that day His Honor the Lieut-Governor proceeded to Fort Beaufort, and he has been since actively engaged in making such arrangements as may, if possible, preserve the peace of the country. It seems very certain that the Kaffirs have been in a state of considerable excitement, and at the date of former accounts were ripe for mischief. The cattle of the kraals near the colonial border were driven to places of security, and the men have been assembled in large bodies, but, as far as we can learn, they are not agreed among themselves as to the expediency, at this season, of an open rupture. It is also stated to us that there is no doubt of the spot on which it is proposed to establish a new military post at Block Drift, being within the Kaffirland boundary. It lies, we are informed, in the fork of the Kalkamma and Chumie Rivers, and there appears to be little doubt but that the Kaffirs are warranted in making objection to its occupation for the purpose in question. It is said, however, that the matter of dispute has been satisfactorily arranged; that Sandilla has apologized for his insolent demeanor; has consented to the establishment of the post, on the condition that no trader or other civilian be allowed to reside there without his permission, and payment to him for an annual license.

At present recourse is had to "the soothing system." The Kaffir must not be irritated; when they do wrong, punishment is not to be thought of; they are to be coaxed to confess their faults, and the most broad and liberal interpretation is to be given to the slightest concession or admission which may be made by them. Who does not perceive that all this absurd trifling tends to produce the very crisis which it is intended to avert? It is in fact merely starving off the evil day, but only that it may come upon the colony with tenfold effect. The Kaffirs are every day acquiring additional power to do mischief, and unless this be counteracted by some decisive measures on our part, we now know the government that the consequences will be fatal to the repose, if not to the very existence of the Eastern Districts.

A correspondent writes from the immediate boundary, under date 29th inst.— "Macomo was at Fort Beaufort when the Lieut-Governor arrived. He stated that he was quite aware of the hostile in-

tentions of the Kaffirs; but that for his part he would not join them, but remain true to the Lieut-Governor. At 6 o'clock this morning three troops of the 7th Dragoon Guards, and a strong party of the 91st Regt., left Fort Beaufort for Block Drift, leaving in the garrison only 60 men of the 7th Dragoon Guards, and 100 men of the 91st Regt. The Lieut-Governor followed shortly after with an escort of about 200 mounted men and a strong party of the 91st Regt. (C. M. R.) on his way to the same place. It is said that the Kaffirs have mustered in that neighborhood in considerable force, a large number of them being armed with guns and well supplied with ammunition. Both parties seem equally determined to carry their point—our troops to take possession of the disputed ground, and the Kaffirs to oppose and prevent this doing so. It is difficult to know how the matter will be terminated, but I think the chances are in favor of a compromise. The Lieut-Governor's policy is to keep the Kaffirs the shortest time he can, and then to leave them only on the condition that they will make any and every sacrifice rather than adopt aggressive measures. Major Smith, on the other hand, must act as he may wish, while controlled and commanded by His Honor, and thus the probabilities are that some mischievous concessions will be made to the Kaffirs, to be followed hereafter by more stubborn opposition, and more daring aggressions upon the property of the frontier colonists.

The Lieut-Governor returned yesterday (Friday) to town, and his new understandings that matters have been settled up, and there will not be, in the opinion of His Honor, any serious disturbances—that is, unless we provoke it by our own obstinacy in resisting aggression, or by venturing to punish those forays upon the property of the border inhabitants, which have of late been so frequent.

From another source we learn that the meeting between the Lieut-Governor and Sandilla was of a very warlike character. His Honor had assembled a rather imposing force, consisting of a squadron of the 7th Dragoon Guards, and detachments of the Cape Artillery, the 91st Regt., and the 9th Light Infantry, who he said to have mustered little short of 4000 horse-men, chiefly armed with guns, and in admiring tribute. The wily Kaffir appeared to be carefully on his guard; and thus when our troops were ordered to extend their line, the movement was immediately followed by the Kaffirs, and who by their superior numbers soon outflanked the British troops. The conference was brief, but to the Lieut-Governor it is said to have been satisfactory. Sandilla admitted that he had used intemperate language, and that he regretted having done so, but that he claimed the ground on which it was proposed to erect the military post, and felt aggrieved that it should be taken possession of without his consent. The Lieut-Governor promised that this matter should be carefully considered, and everything done in strict accordance with the principles of equity.

We understand that the intemperate language in question, was not only defiance of the British forces, but personal abuse of the Lieut-Governor, and a threat that any messenger who might be sent to him should be put to death. The ground in dispute we understand lies between two ranges of mountains which stretch from east to west a little above the junction of the Chumie and Keeskamma. Block Drift is situated between these heights, and the dispute is as to whether the Northern or Southern ridge is the Kaffirland boundary. We hear that the idea of establishing a post there has been abandoned.

It is almost unnecessary to remark that the Frontier farmers have been and are in a state of great excitement and alarm, and that several of their families have been removed to situations of safety.

Since writing the foregoing, we have received a communication from Uitenhage, from which we gather that much excitement prevails in that district, arising from the probability of a Kaffir outbreak. The writer states—

"A Kaffir has been going through these parts, warning the people to be on their guard, being the intention of the Kaffirs to break out in April. He states that the most of the Kaffirs who were in service in Oliphant's Hoek, have quitted their employ, some having even left their wages behind them.—Ibid.
