

## THE ZUID-AFRIKAAN.

CAPE TOWN, MARCH 5, 1846.

We feel pleasure in announcing that the last intelligence from Natal, received per the *California*, and communicated in the papers up to the 30th January last, contains the agreeable news that the Government appointed for that place, was already in full operation.

The District Court was opened on the 15th of that month by the Recorder, the Hon. Mr. H. Cloete, with an appropriate address—copied in our present number.—The Hon'ble gentleman took occasion not only to explain the principles upon which that Court had been established, but also to state the reasons which had induced Her Majesty's Government, though granting a separate Government to Natal, to entrust the making of laws however to the Governor in Council of the Cape of Good Hope.

We fully concur in the opinion so boldly expressed by Mr. Cloete, that it was an utter impossibility to form a legislature from the various materials constituting the present population of that colony, fit and competent to extricate it from that chaos of anarchy and confusion in which it had been unfortunately cast.

Nothing is certainly better suited to effect this than a Body, which, although not acting on the spot, has already given the most unequivocal proof that it is really desirous, by proper enactments, and keeping in view the particular circumstances of the people, to gradually elevate that dependency of the Cape Colony and prepare it for the enjoyment of those higher immunities, which will certainly not be withheld in case it shall eventually appear that they have attained the requisite and necessary qualifications for it.

To effect this most desirable position, does not however exclusively depend on the Legislature and the enforcers of the law. That task, no doubt, in a great measure rests on the shoulders of the inhabitants themselves, who, by due obedience to the existing laws, and a sincere co-operation with those in authority, will give the best evidence that they are really intent upon securing the advantages inseparably connected with the observation of those solemn duties.

Circumstances may exist however, when the laws enacted by the Legislature even with the best will and most honorable intentions, may be justly considered improper and oppressive by the inhabitants. This undoubtedly occurs in all civilized societies, and as in such cases it is the constitutional right of the subject to bring his grievances in that behalf before the Supreme Government or its representative, we are gratified to observe that those who consider themselves aggrieved by certain arrangements made with respect to the possession of lands, have adopted that proper course by way of a remonstrance to the Lieut.-Governor of their Province, who will no doubt bestow due consideration on the question, which its importance deserves and may be confidently expected from his well-known impartiality and kind disposition towards the inhabitants of Natal.

We beg to direct particular attention to the proceedings and the report of the Caledon Agricultural Society, and especially to the appendix to the latter, detailing the particulars of a trial made with a certain kind of South American Grain called "Victoria Wheat," and which, on account of its particular qualities, spontaneously offers itself to the notice of our Corn Farmers.

The Negro Fund Committee met, according to announcement on Tuesday last, and, upon information that St. Helena was again to become a Negro Station, resolved to request His Excellency the Governor to enter into correspondence with the authorities at that Island, in order to make arrangements so as to enable the Committee, whenever occasion offers, to apply that fund towards the importation of such Negroes as may be brought there from time to time.

**LATEST NEWS FROM ENGLAND.**  
Though the papers received by us per the *Green-lawn*, are only to the 9th December, some others have been received by private individuals to the 19th, the latest intelligence from which, as appears from the *Commercial Advertiser* of yesterday, is as follows:—

After several days delay, and several interviews between the two Leaders, it is announced, on the 19th, that Sir Robert Peel perseveres in his resignation, and Lord John Russell accepts the task of forming a New Ministry. No formal arrangement of offices had been then made known: At 12 o'clock on the preceding day, the following noblemen and gentlemen assembled at Lord John Russell's house in London:—The Duke of Bedford, the Marquis of Lansdowne, Earl Grey, the Earl of Auckland, the Earl of Clarendon, Viscount Palmerston, Viscount Morpeth, Lord Cottenham, Lord Montague, Sir J. C. Hobhouse, Sir George Grey, the Right Hon. Edward Ellice, the Right Hon. T. Macaulay, the Right Hon. F. T. Baring, and Right Hon. Henry Labouchere. With the exception of the Duke of Bedford, the above gentlemen all held office under the Grey and Melbourne administrations. Out of these the new Cabinet will no doubt be constructed. The Marquis of Lansdowne and Lord John Russell will be the chiefs in the two houses.

### THE FRONTIERS.

The excitement and alarm amongst the Farmers have somewhat abated since last week, but although many of them have returned to their farms they do not reckon upon the continuance of tranquillity. Many are talking of leaving the country or endeavoring to procure farms distant from the Kafir boundary. In the meantime depredations continue to be numerous. Messrs. Hoole have lately had 6 horses stolen by Kafirs from Trompeter's Drift, which have been traced into Kafirland. Mr. Woodward has also been robbed of 12 head. These were taken from the farm adjoining Col. Somerset's place close to Graham's Town, and have been traced into the interior of the colony.

On the 14th instant six oxen were taken by Kafirs from the neighborhood of Fort Brown, one of which they slaughtered.

Thirteen head of cattle were stolen a few days ago from Post Victoria. These cattle belonged to the military, and have not been recovered.—C. F. Times, Feb. 24.

From the Winterberg we learn that on the 3d of February a young man named Adrian de Lange was knocked off his horse by Kafirs who stole the animal with saddle and bridle.—Ibid.

### TRANSFER AND AUCTION DUES.

Worcester, Feb. 23, 1846.

SIR.—I beg to request that you will insert the following in your journal.

I gratified myself occasionally to observe from the papers that our respected Secretary the hon'ble Mr. Montagu, assisted by His Excellency the Governor and the co-operation of the Legislative Council, had brought about several alterations and improvements in this colony, during the short period of his residence in it, for the comfort, advantage, and convenience of the people; and it was desirable (and this appears to have escaped his observation), if the following statutory alterations could be made, which press heavily on the inhabitants, viz., to reduce the 4 p.c. on the sale of moveable property to 2; the 2 p.c. on immovable property to 1; the 4 p.c. transfer dues to 2; and the 2½ p.c. on lease places to 1½ p.c.; which would occasion a great saving in their disbursements.

Considering that at the time when these taxes were imposed there were very few houses in town and less inhabitable places in the country, and that subsequently leases were held now and then with the increase of population, I take the liberty to say, that a reduction can easily be made.

And that this observation may meet the eye of our respected and praiseworthy Sec'tary, the hon'ble Mr. Montagu, I request you to insert it in your valuable paper.

Report of the Committee of the Caledon Agricultural Society, read and adopted, 24th February.

The Hon'ble T. B. Bayley, Esq., in the Chair.

The Committee, before entering into their report for the last year, consider it their special duty to place on record, the grateful sense entertained by the Society of the honor which has lately been conferred on it, by the Patronage, and subscription of His Excellency the Governor.

With regard to the Agricultural Show on the 10th instant, the Committee consider that they may honestly congratulate the Society, on the marked improvement exhibited in all sorts of live stock, both as regards quantity and quality.

The sheep of all ages were both more numerous, and better selected than those of any previous Show, and in the estimation of the judges, many of the animals unsuccessful in competition, were deserving of the highest commendation.

There was a marked improvement also in the young horses and foaled cattle.

The Committee regret that only one shilling appeared for each of the Wool prizes; and they recommend that some arrangement should be made to enhance the value of these prizes, so as to afford adequate inducement to the Wool Growers to keep samples of their Wool expressly for the Annual Show.

The vegetables and samples of garden produce were remarkably fine and excited the highest admiration. Some samples of Virginia and Savannah Tobacco were shown, and were stated to be as easy of cultivation as the Common Tobacco of the Colony; also a small shawl of Victoria Wheat, a new variety, likely to be of the highest utility;—a descriptive notice of this Wheat has been placed in the hands of the Secretary, and will be published as an appendix to this report.

The future prospects of the Society are very cheering a distinct fund, amounting already to £30, has been raised for distribution in Ploughing Matches, and to promote the introduction of such new Agricultural Implements as, after a public trial, may appear best suited to the wants and circumstances of the Colony.

The funds of the Society, with reference to the annual subscriptions, are in a highly satisfactory state. The Society has no debts, and has no cash in hand!—all that the Committee

mities had to give for the promotion of Agricultural enterprise, they have given, and in doing so they consider that they have only performed their duty to the Society and the Public.

### VICTORIA WHEAT.

A sample of Victoria Wheat, grown and exhibited by the Hon. T. B. Bayley, Esq., of the Oaks.

This wheat comes from the district of Victoria, in the Province of Capetown, (Columbia, South America,) and is described by himself in his personal narrative, page 104—7, as being very productive, and as ripening in seven days from the sowing.

In London's Agriculturist's Manual it is stated:—"A sample of this wheat in store was shown, which was sown at Anne's Garden (in the month of Scotland) on the 10th June, and cut 16th Sept., when nearly ripe, being a period of 88 days, straw shorter than that of common wheats, ears also short, but pretty compact, whitish colored, awns fully as long as the ears, spreading, grain long, reddish colored, slightly coned and flat, rather small in size."
