Getuige keek om, naar den wagen, en zag de Kaffers en Hottentotten, enigens in den hoochte van synne meester optellen; hy liep toen naar huis, en gaaf den Heer Honey kennis van het gebeurde. On approaching the high banks of the Keiskamma, a large body of Kaffirs were observed on the opposite ridge, apparently as though disposed to dispute the passage of the River. Col. Somerset having made his reconnaissance, directed two or three shells to be thrown in the direction of the enemy, on which they moved off to the right towards the Dube River. He then immediately moved his division forward, leaving Lieut.-Col. Richardson, with his Dragoons on the heights, to watch the movements of the enemy, while he forced the stream, and examined the bushy ravines which spread upwards in that neighbourhood. No Kaffirs were fallen in with, and Col. Richardson moved forward and joined Col. Somerset at a position which he had taken up near Fort White, on the left bank of the Keiskamma. The Kaffirs appear to have fallen back upon the country occupied by Sonto, a son of Euso, and next in power to Stock; and it is also understood, that the larger portion of their cattle has been sent for security into Umhlanga's territory.

Instructions have been dispatched immediately to the British Resident at Port Pedi, Capt. Maclean, by His Excellency the Governor, the orders being written in pencil on Dundass' Bridge, as the suggestion of the Lieut.-Governor, to demand of Umbala not to afford any succour of refuge to the offending tribes, and to make it known, that should they, or any other chief professing neutrality be found thus to act, they will be deemed enemies and treated accordingly. . . . Received a communication from Port Pedi, dated yesterday, stating that Stock's Kaffirs had captured eleven of the oxen cut from the wagon at the time of the murder of your Pike. Two Kaffirs were seen driving these oxen; these escaped, but are not to be known, and a confident assurance is given that they, and all concerned in that deed of blood, will be ultimately taken and delivered up to justice. The chief Stock has hitherto behaved well; he has been alike serious and honest; several horses and many cattle have been interred, and in one or two instances the marauders have been shot. It is said that many of the Kaffirs in the vicinity of Port Pedi are known to indulge in engage in the war. Two of Stock's sons, it is affirmed, are among these, but at present no hostile manifestation has been given by them. The communication before us states: "Saw a person who was at Colonel Somerset's camp near Fort White, on the 14th inst., and from whom he intended to move this morning (10th.)

Our present space does not allow us to offer the public anything but the main particulars of the frontier news received by yesterday's post, extending from the 14th to the 18th instant, the former being the date of the accounts contained in our last, and the latter the day on which the post-left Graham's Town, up to which period nothing of any great importance had occurred, except the capture of some cattle, and of the murderers of the unfortunate Englishman, the late Mr. Pike.

The account respecting the supplicating message of SANDILLI is not confirmed, but on the contrary ascribed to a misconception; and it will be seen from the underfollowing that his conduct, up to the present moment, so far from being supplicatory, is decidedly arrogant, audacious and crafty:

TUESDAY, April 14.—Seven Kaffirs, two yesterday, and five this day, have been sent as prisoners, from Lower Albany, having been intercepted by patrols endeavouring to make their escape into Kaffirland. It says much for the forbearance of the Albany Settlers that these fugitives have been captured, and may shew that they know how to bend with the vigour of their duty in the field.

WEDNESDAY, April 15.—This morning His Excellency the Governor took his departure from Graham's Town for the immediate frontier. In addition to his suite His Excellency was attended by the Chief Justice, Sir John Wyld, the Civil Commissioner of the District, and a few of the inhabitants. He proceeds to Post Victoria, in the centre of the "caged territory."—The Lieut.-Governor, it is said, has not yet quitted Fort Beaufort, though the troops are actually in the field. On the arrival of His Excellency on Dundass' Bridge, &c., the entrance to the town, he was met by a mounted soldier of the Cape Rifles, with despatches, and which were opened on the spot and perused. The tenor of this communication, as we understand, was to the effect that Col. Somerset, with his division, had crossed the Keiskamma, without oppo-

sition, into Kaffirland, and had fallen in with, or rather overtaken, a number of Kaffirs, under Tula. These, however, took care to keep at a very respectful distance, and on the discharge of a shell or two speedily disappeared. An entire body of men in the rear, and which might readily be gained from the K. River, would, it is thought, speedily bring these people to a stand still, and thus bring the affair to decided issue. It is said that the sound of cannon in the direction of Kaffirland, was heard yesterday on the high land S. of Graham's Town.

Information came in this morning that a party of Kaffirs had, during the preceding night, attacked the cattle kraal of Mr. W. Simpson, in Grobbelaar's Kloof, 7 miles E. of town, and had swept off the whole of his cattle, 150 in number. It appears that these cattle were guarded by five Hottentots, armed with guns, and who were on the spot, when a large party of Kaffirs, also with fire arms, suddenly made their appearance. These Kaffirs fled into the bush occupied by the five men, and then proceeded to the kraal, turned out the whole of the cattle, divided them into two lots, and drove them in the direction of the Fish River Bush. The Hottentots finding themselves so over-matched, escaped by flight, only one of them attempting to fire on the marauders, but without effect. Several shots were fired at them. After the cattle had been driven off, some of the Kaffirs remained beating the bush with their knobbed kerries, evidently in search of the Hottentots. A dog on the premises was shot dead by the marauders. From these recent robberies it appears probable that the vast thickets of the Fish River are at this moment infested by Kaffirs, bent on plunder and murder; and it behoves therefore all in the vicinity—and Graham's Town is but a bare four miles from the margin of the bush—to exercise the most unslumbering vigilance, both by day and by night, so as to prevent being taken by surprise these savage banditti. It is desirable that measures should be adopted for clearing the country of these marauders. Intelligence brought that two Kaffirs had been shot by the Fish River Burghers, under the command of the Field-lieutenant. It seems that a number of cattle, belonging to the Dutch Farmers, who are assembled for mutual defence at that point, had been carried off by the marauding Kaffirs. They were promptly pursued and overtaken, the result being that the two Kaffirs in question were shot, and the whole of the cattle retaken. Further reports came in this afternoon of Kaffirs in the vicinity of Grobbelaar's Kloof, and that some of them had vauntingly called out that they would have Mr. Ogilvie's cattle the ensuing night.

A party of mounted men, volunteers from among those associated under Mr. Stubb's, started off to the Fish River Bush in pursuit of the cattle carried off from Mr. Simpson's farm. This party consisted of only eleven men, far too few in number to penetrate, the rugged jungles and kloofs of the Fish River, where ten thousand Kaffirs might be concealed, perfectly out of observation from the surrounding country. It may be observed, however, that the military posts of Committee-aan-en-Trotsperter's Drifts are both situated in that part of the Fish River to which this party was proceeding, and from which, in case of need, they may obtain assistance.

A party of mounted civilians, belonging to Mr. O'Brien's company, also started to-day, so as to relieve the detachment of 7th Dragoon Guards now stationed at that post, and who are required for more active duties in the field. Received information, after writing the foregoing, that Mr. Stubb's party had been reinforced yesterday by a detachment of the 7th Dragoon Guards, under Cornet Bunbury. This detachment was met on Manley's Flat by a second party of civilians, under Mr. O'Brien, and who had been furnished with an order to the officer in command to unite in scouring the bush, and in pursuing the Kaffir marauders with their booty. In pursuance of this united detachment, at once struck off to the eastward by Pigot Park, and from thence across the mountain into the forests of the Kooms... It is satisfactory to learn that an order has been issued by His Excellency, that all the civilians actually doing duty in the field shall receive provisions, and all their horses employed on parole a full ration of forage. Others actually in the field, but not so actively employed, to be allowed half a one. This is a very judicious regulation, and without which no really effective service could be expected from the parties concerned, in the common defence of the country.

THURSDAY.—Received this morning further information from Creli's territory, a trader in the employ of Mr. Hoole

having come down from thence. He states that the disposition of the chief towards the colony is not so favourable as stated—that he has declined to protect or be responsible for the property of the traders—he reply to an application on this subject by the effect, "that it is all grass land now," meaning that private rights were at an end, and that the property of the traders was at the mercy of those who chose to possess themselves of it. On approaching the Colony the Kaffirs were very daring and menacing. Ultimately they were permitted to escape without actual violence. Two wagons of Mr. Ford's have also come in from Kaffirland, but nearly emptied of their contents, the Kaffirs taking from them whatever they pleased on the way through their territories.

Received this morning further particulars respecting the movements of the troops in front. Col. Somerset in a despatch to the Lieut.-Governor, dated from the camp on the 14th, states, that on the previous day he made the passage of the Keiskamma, a little above where the Dube falls into it. On approaching the high banks of the Keiskamma, a large body of Kaffirs were observed on the opposite ridge, apparently as though disposed to dispute the passage of the River. Col. Somerset having made his reconnaissance, directed two or three shells to be thrown in the direction of the enemy, on which they moved off to the right towards the Dube River. He then immediately moved his division forward, leaving Lieut.-Col. Richardson, with his Dragoons on the heights, to watch the movements of the enemy, while he forced the stream, and examined the bushy ravines which spread upwards in that neighbourhood. No Kaffirs were fallen in with, and Col. Richardson moved forward and joined Col. Somerset at a position which he had taken up near Fort White, on the left bank of the Keiskamma. The Kaffirs appear to have fallen back upon the country occupied by Sonto, a son of Euso, and next in power to Stock; and it is also understood, that the larger portion of their cattle has been sent for security into Umhlanga's territory.

Instructions have been dispatched immediately to the British Resident at Port Pedi, Capt. Maclean, by His Excellency the Governor, the orders being written in pencil on Dundass' Bridge, as the suggestion of the Lieut.-Governor, to demand of Umbala not to afford any succour of refuge to the offending tribes, and to make it known, that should they, or any other chief professing neutrality be found thus to act, they will be deemed enemies and treated accordingly. . . . Received a communication from Port Pedi, dated yesterday, stating that Stock's Kaffirs had captured eleven of the oxen cut from the wagon at the time of the murder of your Pike. Two Kaffirs were seen driving these oxen; these escaped, but are not to be known, and a confident assurance is given that they, and all concerned in that deed of blood, will be ultimately taken and delivered up to justice. The chief Stock has hitherto behaved well; he has been alike serious and honest; several horses and many cattle have been interred, and in one or two instances the marauders have been shot. It is said that many of the Kaffirs in the vicinity of Port Pedi are known to indulge in engage in the war. Two of Stock's sons, it is affirmed, are among these, but at present no hostile manifestation has been given by them. The communication before us states: "Saw a person who was at Colonel Somerset's camp near Fort White, on the 14th inst., and from whom he intended to move this morning (10th.)

Our present space does not allow us to offer the public anything but the main particulars of the frontier news received by yesterday's post, extending from the 14th to the 18th instant, the former being the date of the accounts contained in our last, and the latter the day on which the post-left Graham's Town, up to which period nothing of any great importance had occurred, except the capture of some cattle, and of the murderers of the unfortunate Englishman, the late Mr. Pike.

DINGSDAG AVOND, 21 April.—Narigt werd ontvangen dat de ossen toe behoorende tot 5 wagens door de Kaffers van den weg naby Drivers hooge gedreven waren. Eene party Dragonders naar de plaats afgezonden, keerde terug, zeggende dat de wagens daar waren, maar geene ossen noch menschen. De patrouille van de Jagt Club keerde terug van Bothas Heuvel, zulke groote getalen Kaffers gezien hebbende, dat het niet raadzaam werd geoordeeld hen in de boschachtige kloven der Vischrvier te achtervolgen. Eenige van den vyand riepen hen toe voorwaarts te komen, en trachten klarblykelyk, door zich in kleine partijen te vertoonen om hen in het bosch te lokken. Het klein gehucht van Collingwood is verlaten. De lucht is op twee plaatsen verlicht, verondersteld te zyn door huizen door de Kaffers in den brand gestoken. Extra piketten uitgezet, en buitengewone waakzaamheid in acht genomen om verrassing voort te komen.

Ontvingen de volgende byzonderheden van een der dapperste gevechten waarvan wy in den tegenwoordigen stryd gehoord hebben:—Het blykt, dat W. Barnett, Commissariaats uitgever aan Doppel Drift, Vischrvier, zich alleen op weg naar de stad bevond,—maar te paard en goed gewapend met een dubbele loop geweer. De steile afhelling der heuvel aan Graskop bereikende, zag hy twee Kaffers langs den weg naar hem komen, met een kleine party vee. Een deser Kaffers was te paard. Hen bemerkende, hield Barnett stil, en ziende dat de Kaffers met hasagaien gewapend waren, schoot hy dadelijk op hen mit beide loopen. De Kaffers sprongen dadelijk in het bosch; de een die te paard was sprong af, het paard en vee in den weg latende. De Heer B. laadde weder en reed voort, trachtende het paard te vangen en het vee voor zich uit te dryven, maar laatstgem. liep in het bosch, en hy slaagde alleen het paard naa Fort Brown te brengen. Voor dat hy den post bereikte, ontdekte hy aan een steile hoogte drie Kaffers met geweren gewapend, die hem achtervolgden, het verschrikkelijk geschreeuw aanheffende. Zy vuurden allen op hem; maar hoewel de kogels om zyne ooren vlogen, werd hy niet getroffen; een hunner kwam zoo na als 50 of 60 schreden naar hem; en daar hy vond, dat hy het los paard in steek lateen of zich overgeven moest, hield hy stand, draaide zyn paard om, en vuurde op den voorsten Kaffer die dadelijk viel, maar of hy gedood werd kan hy niet zeggen. Hy zag slechts dat toen zyne makkers by hem kwamen, zy stil stonden, den Heer B. tyd gevende zich weg te maken met het paard en karos des Kaffers.

Ontvingen het volgend narigt van de westelyke syde der Kowie:—“Eenigen onzer party, pas uit de stad terug keerende zeggen dat zy Kaffers nabij Manley's plaats (Lombards post) gezien hebben. Wy hooren op dit ogenblik te Theophilus schieten; en omtrent 40 schoten zyn gesteld.

Woensdag.—Geen rapport van de troepen in front, hetgeen eenige ongerustheid veroorzaakt.

Narigt ontvangen dat de positis geoccupeerd door de inwoners van Howard's Party, 8 mylen ten Zuiden Stad, den vorigen avond door Kaffers aangevallen is, en dat een Engelschman gemaaid Towall door het hoofd gesloten is. Het schijnt dat omtrent 300 stukken beesten op dit punt geplunderd waren, welke door wachten, waarvan de overledene een was, bewaakt werden; dat de Kaffers des avonds op de plaats strooorden, omtrent 100 stukken wegdroven en den bedoelde persoon doodgeschoten. Verschiedene schoten werden op de rovers gedraaid en een Kaffer gedood. De troopers tartedien hen om uittekenen en te vochten. Eene kleine party der Jagt Club had op eenen korten afstand post gevat, en een grote troep vee te beschermen hebbende, kon geene hulp bieden, hoewel zy het geschiet en geschreeuw der Kaffers hoorde. Rapporterde mede dat het vee van den heer Robey uit Manly's vlakte verdwenen is, en dat het huis van den Hr. Norden gedektelyk afbrandt is. De Grahamstad Yeomanry werd dusdelyk gelast uit te trekken, en in den avond keerde zy terug, rapporterende dat zy, met behulp van enige Europeanen en Fingoest instaat waren geweest al het vee te hernemen, twee Kaffers gedood, en enigen gewond hadden. Een onzer Fingoest word gewond. Ontvingen narigt dat elke woning tot aan Blaauskraans verlaegen was, hebbende de inwoners zich met hetgeen zy konden naer de stad begeven... Ontvingen narigt dat de vry wagens, waaruit de ossen op Driver's Ho gaa genomen waren, door de Kaffers in den brand gestoken waren. Deze wagens behoorden aan den Heer Tamlett, en, hiervan onderrigt wordende, zond hy andere ossen om de wagens te halen; maar, daar komende, vond men dezelve brandende, terwyl de gehele heuvel van die plaats tot aan den weg van Fort Beaufort vol Kaffers was... Half 11 ure.—Eend poging door de Kaffers gedaan om Fingoest piketten te verrassen, maar de vyand werd afgeslagen met verlies van twee dooden. Het blykt dat het piket omstreeks half 10 ure kennis kregen van sy nadering der Kaffers, en alle voorzorg gebruikte om bekend te worden met hun getal en voornemen. Een der Kaffers tot digt by een der Fingoest gekropen zynde, sprong laastigmelde op hem voor dat hy tyd had zyn geweer te gebruiken; en hem toeroepende, “wien's man zyt gy!” stak hy hem zyne hasagai en gebeveerd hofje af. Hierop gaf de Kaffers een schot op hem, waardoor twee Burgers gedood en drie zwaar gewond werden. De overige Burgers moesten hunnen weg uit vechten, en dooden zes Kaffers en wonden velen, zy kwamen gelukkig met hunne gewonde makkers weder aan het leger terug.

Denzelfden avoad attaqueerde de Kaffers het leger van den Heer Lombard in een grote magt, en hielden drie uren aan mit schieten. De Africane Boeren weerdens zich als dappere mannen, en sloegen de Kaffers eindelyk met groot verlies aan den kant der burgers. De Heer Lombard schryft ons dat hy omringd is van twees groot kommando Kaffers, en in groot gevaar verkeert. De handelaar, genaamd Thompson, rapporteerde ook dat hy in De Bruins Poort aangevalen werd door een groot aantal Kaffers, die van hem 171 stuks vee afnamen. Zy schoten gedurend op hem en syne vry Hottentotten, die op de Kaffers ook schoten, en hen verireven, maar een weinig verder op den berg was de geheele weg be-dekt mit Kaffers, gekleed in de Roode Rokken van het 7de Dragoner Garde, die zy uit de wagenen genomen hadden, welke in hunne handen vielen aan de Deba, als gezien zal worden in die officiële depeches! Hier namen zy den Heer Thompson al zyn vee af, en hy en zyne Hottentotten namen de vlugt naa Graham's-stad.

Dese nacht was de skeligste welken wy nog immer beleefd hebben. Rapporten kwamen gedagdig dat de stad omringd was van de Kaffers, en dat Bothas Berg, volgens het spreekwoord rood was van Kaffers. Van alle kanten hoorde men gedurig salvos, maar men kon geene mannen mit de stad missen om de buitenlieden ter hulp te gaan, daar men elk ogenblik een attack te wachten was. Hevige en aanhoudende geweer schoten werden den ganschen nacht door de patrouilles en wachten gehoord in de rigting van de plaats van den Heer W. Ogilvie, in Groblers Kloof, eindelyk gaven de Fingoest wachten de alarm, en de tweede alarm kanon-schoten werden van den Drosdy grond en Selwyn Battery gevoerd. Alles was toen in beweging in de stad; vrouwen en kinderen werden in de kerken, kapellen, en plathuizen gebracht, en de mannen kwamen uit om den verwachten vyand het hoofd te bieden. Er vond geen geraas plaats, gelyk men verwacht had, geen schot werd gedaan, en binnen weinige oogenblikken waren er 600 of 700 man in de straten, in differente directien, in het gelid. Alles was koel en bedaard, en strekt de ingezeten van Graham's-stad tot eer. Na omtrent twee uren den vyand afgerukt te hebben bleek het dat de Kaffers omtrent 150 stuks vee digt aan Somersets Kloof genomen hadden, en dat de Fingoest buiten-wacht gezien en aangevallen werden, die op de Kaffers schoten en eindelyk het vee afnamen.

DONDERDAG.—De volken betrekken, en de gebeurtenissen volgen elkaander soe snel op dat het onmogelyk is ze allen aantekenen. Alles toont echter aan dat de Kaffers, zo wel in hunne defensie als offensive maatregelen, zoe ver met groot beleid gehandeld hebben, en hunne hulppronnen op eenen navolgenswaardige wyze hebben aangewend. Een trein van 50 wagens, met het detachement van het 9de, mereerde bedien morgen uit de stad, vergezeld door een kleine party Dragonders, onder bevel van Cornelius Barnaby. Dit volk kan slecht gespaard worden..

Op Maandag attaqueerde de Kaffers een extra post welke van Graham's-stad naar Fort Beaufort gesonden werd, en het doet ons leed te vernemen, dat de postryder, een soldaat van het Kaapsche Corps, door hen doodgeschoten werd digt aan Vygekraal. Het huis van den Hr. Jay, aan Vygekraal, hebben zy verbrand, en al zyne goederen uit het huis genomen en vernield; In een der vertrijken welke de Heer Jay als een kantien gebruikte, kregen zy enige vaten brandewyn, die zy tapten, en den geheelen nacht by blijven te drinken, gedurig aanhoudende met het schieten van salvos.

Op II. Dingdag nacht attaqueerde de Kaffers het leger der burgers aan Hermanus kral, omstreeks ten 10 ure, en hielden voor omtrent 4 ure, gedurig aan mit schieten.

Onze dappere landgenooten de Africane boeren, weerdens zich, echter, als helden, 17 man sloegen, houdenden van Kaffers mit groot verlies terug; daer zy door de boeren gesien werden hunne gewonden en geneuveleden gedurig naar de boschen weg te slepen.

Het gelukte hen, echter, de kral open te houden en omtrent 1000 beesten mit te jagen. De boeren schoten op het vee, en keerden omtrent de helft op zyde, maar de Kaffers gingen met de andere helft weg. Do plaats was rondom met bloedspruiten bedekt, en het verheugt ons te kunnen melden, dat geen der boeren bezeerd zyn, ofschoon eenigen hunner naauwe ontkommingen hadden. Het leger is met wagens verschansd, en de Kaffers kwamen in geleider tot binnen 5 schreden van deszelfs.

Den vorigen Zondag attaqueerde een grote commando 5 burgers aan hetzelfde leger behorende

in het veld, van wie zy enige beesten namen, maar het gelukte de boeren de anderen naer het leger te dryven.

Op heden, Woensdag, kwamen er een rapport dat de Kaffers de kralen van den Heer Roby attackeerd hadden en al zyn vee, omtrent 150 stukken, afgenoem. Eene party burgers, onder den Veldkornet Bradshaw, hervan achter het vee schoot een Kaffer. Eene andere kralen was ook door de Kaffers geattaqueerd, het vee genomen, en een Engelschman gemaaid Howies by de kralen

Het spyts ons te zeggen, dat er grote bezorgdheid bestaat voor de veiligheid van Kapt. Sande, K. J. Deze officier werd afgezonden met een expressie, vergezeld door een syn jagera. Hy vertrok kort na de 6 met zyn ryknecht, maar men heeft sedert niets van hem vernomen. Vier der escorte werden door den vyand gedood, terwyl slechts twee ontkwamen om het gebeurde aan hunne makkers mede te delen.

Heden Donderdag mormiddag, werden al de ingezetenen van Grahamstad, op order van Kol. Johnstone, in den Drosdy grond geroepen, en door den dappreren Kolonel benigd, en door hem hangendbeden sengparig te zyn in den tegenwoerigen huichelyken toestand van zaken. Er waren ten minste 800 man in de wapenen insluitende omtrent 150 ruitery.

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ZUID-AFRIKAAN,
8 o'Clock Thursday Evening.

The Frontier Post expected on Wednesday last, did not arrive here before 2 o'clock this day, and we hasten ourselves to lay the main particulars received from the seat of war before our readers. No offensive operations had taken place since the 18th by the troops in Kafir-land, whilst on the other hand the Kaffirs attacked nearly every post and camp with the greatest audacity. They were however repulsed in every instance, and in some cases with serious loss though not without advantage on their side, they having in several instances carried off all the cattle.

Martial Law throughout the whole Colony had been proclaimed on the 22d by His Excellency the Governor, and orders have been issued to march the Burgher Forces of the several divisions with the least possible delay to the Frontier.

In consequence of this information the Legislative Council held an extraordinary sitting this afternoon, and passed a law fixing the penalty upon those refusing to obey that call.

The Civil Commissioner of the Cape Division has also forthwith dispatched circulars to the several Fieldcornets ordering them to call upon the burghers in their several Fieldcornices to prepare themselves and move on to the Frontier immediately.

TUESDAY, APRIL 21.

Information came in that the oxen belonging to 5 wagons had been carried off by the Kaffirs from the road near Driver's Hill. A party of the Dragoon Guards, despatched to the spot, who returned stating that the wagons were there but nothing to be seen of oxen or people.... The patrol of the Sporting Club returned from Botha's Hill, having seen such large numbers of Kaffirs that it was not deemed prudent to follow them into the rugged defiles of the Fish River. Some of the enemy called to them to come forward, and evidently endeavored, by showing themselves in small parties, and giving them a spur, to inveigle them into the dense bush.... The little hamlet of Collingham abandoned by all its inhabitants. The horizon in one or two places gleaming, supposed to be from buildings fired by the ruthless Kaffirs. Extra picquets thrown out, and unusual vigilance exercised against surprise.

Received the following particulars of one of the most gallant actions we have heard mentioned during the present contest:—It appears that W. Barnett, Commissariat Issuer at Double Drift, on the Fish River, was on his way to town alone,—but well mounted and armed with an excellent double-barrelled gun. On reaching the steep descent of the hill at Grass Kop he observed two Kaffirs on the road approaching him, with a small lot of cattle. One of these Kaffirs was on horseback. On perceiving them Barnett instantly drew up his horse, and seeing that the Kaffirs were armed with assegais, he instantly cocked his piece and fired both barrels. The Kaffirs on this sprang into the bush, the one on horseback dismounting, leaving the horse and cattle in the road. Mr. B. then reloaded and rode forwards; endeavouring to catch the horse, and also to drive the cattle before him, but the latter ran aside into the bush, and he only succeeded in securing the former and which he drove to Fort Brown, where it now is. Before reaching that post on descending a steep and bushy hill, he discovered three Kaffirs armed with guns in hot pursuit of him, uttering the most furious yells. These all fired at him, the balls whistling past his ears, but without hitting him—one of them who had outstripped his fellows succeeded in approaching to within 50 or 60 yards—when finding, from the difficulty of the road, that he must either abandon the loose horse or be overtaken, he drew up his horse, wheeled him round, and fired at his foremost foe, who instantly fell, but whether struck or not he did not wait to ascertain. He only saw that the other two on coming up to their apparently wounded companion stopped, leaving (Mr. B.) to pursue his way, but without his hat, which was dropped in the rencontre, carrying off, however, the horse and the kaross of the Kaffir from whom he was captured.

Tuesday evening.—Received the following information from the west side of the Kowie:—“Some of our party, returning from town just now, state that they saw Kaffirs near Manley's place (Lombard's post); so we must be up and after them by day-light to-morrow morning. We hear that Mr. Grant's house has been broken open, &c. &c.” We have here only ten white men. Should Pato's and the Slambie tribes enter the colony, we shall have enough to do to defend our lives, and but little chance of saving the cattle. We at this moment hear firing at Theopolis; about 40 shots have been counted.

Wednesday.—No report from the troops in front, and which causes uneasiness.

Information received that the position occupied by the inhabitants of Howard's Party, 8 miles S. of the town, had been attacked by Kaffirs the previous night, and that an Englishman named Towell had been shot through the head. It seems that at this point a herd of about 300 head of cattle had been placed, and which were guarded by sentries that the unfortunate man killed being one of those on duty, and that towards midnight a strong body of Kaffirs poured down upon the place, and were so far successful as to carry off a large number of cattle, estimated at one hundred and sixty three head, and to shoot the man mentioned. Several shots were fired at the marauders, and is supposed with the loss of one Kaffir, whose blood was seen on the spot, a powder horn also being stained with blood. The marauders taunted them to come out and fight. A small party of the Sporting Club were at a position a mile distant, but having charge at that point of a large drove of cattle, could render no assistance, although they heard the firing and the yells of the savages.... Reported also that Mr. Robey's cattle had been driven off from Manley's flat, and that Mr. Norden's farmhouse at Blue Krans had been partially fired. The Graham's

Town Yeomanry immediately ordered out to the assistance of Mr. Robey, and who were speedily in their saddle, moving in force in good spirits to the threatened point.—The Yeomanry returned in the evening, reporting that Mr. Robey, with the assistance of a few Europeans, and some Fingoes had retaken the whole of his cattle, and in the encounter had shot two Kaffirs dead and wounded two others. One Fingoe on our side was shot through the fleshly part of the arm, and whose wound was carefully dressed by Mr. Taylor, Surgeon of the Yeomanry. A boy, a son of Mr. J. Phillips, a brave and active little fellow, and who was with the party with his gun, and which he was able to use right well, had the peak of his cap shot away by a musket ball.

Informed that every habitation had been deserted as far as Blue Krans, and that the inhabitants, with what little necessities they could convey, were on their way to town. Received intelligence that the five wagons, the oxen from which had been carried off from Driver's hill, had been set on fire by the Kaffirs. Four of these wagons were laden with 600 hides, the fifth contained a large quantity of gum. This property belonged to Mr. Temlett, and who on receiving information of the loss of the oxen, succeeded in obtaining other spans which he sent out for the purpose, if possible, of saving the property and bringing on the wagons. On reaching the spot, the wagons were found burning, while, as the parties reported, the whole of the hill side, from that spot to the Fort Beaufort road (about 3 miles) was full of Kaffirs. These men, many of whom were Fingoes, give it as their opinion that an attack is meditated on the town this night.... Half-past 10 o'clock—an endeavor made by the Kaffirs to surprise the out-pickets of Fingoes, but in which the enemy was defeated with the loss of two men, one of whom was killed on the spot, but the other succeeded in reaching the farm of Mr. Cawood—about two miles distance, where his corpse was found the next day. It seems that—

At about half-past 9 o'clock the picket above Oatlands kloof became aware of the approach of Kaffirs, and it accordingly took every precaution to discover their numbers and designs. One of the Kaffirs having crept close to one of the Fingoes, the latter sprang upon him before he could use his gun, and calling out “whose man are you?” struck him through the body with an assegai the instant he exclaimed “Macomos.” A considerable number of Kaffirs then moved off to another picket, and were fired upon, and they then moved in another direction towards Cawood's.

The Kaffir shot was a remarkably fine, tall athletic man, apparently about 23 years of age. He was armed with two assegais, and a capital boer's gun of large calibre. He wore a pouch, containing 40 bullets, with gunpowder in proportion, and was in every respect equipped for and bent upon mischief. Another picket was fired upon by the Kaffirs, but without effect, though a ball slightly grazed the shoulder of one man. On receiving information of this attack, the Town Commandant, Col. Johnstone, immediately ordered the military under arms, the guns were shotted, the picquets strengthened, and every preparation was made to give the enemy a suitable reception, should he make his appearance.... Report came in that the Kaffirs during the night had made an attack on the kraals of Messrs. Cawoods, contractors for the supply of the troops, situated about two miles N.E. of town, and had swept off about 700 sheep.

Mr. J. Cawood and six or seven other persons immediately galloped to the farm, but did not succeed in recovering more than some 16 or 18 of the captured animals. Several Kaffirs were seen near the brow of the opposite hill apparently scouts, but as the party was so weak it was not deemed prudent to follow them. It accordingly returned to town for assistance which unfortunately the Town Commandant was not able to afford.... Received a report that two men of the C.M.R., a return express from Fort Pedi, on getting a short distance beyond Trompeters Drift were obliged to turn back, the communication being cut off by Kaffirs, who were posted across the road.... Reported that the Farmers on the Fish River had been attacked, but had repulsed the enemy with the loss of six men. Two of the farmers are said to have been slain in this rencontre. These last particulars, however, want authenticating.

TUESDAY.—The plot thickens, and even crowding upon one so fast, as to make it difficult to find time to record them;—all, however, indicating that the Kaffirs, both in their defensive and offensive measures, have so far acted with great judgment, and husbanded their resources in a manner that is worthy of imitation.... A train of 50 wagons, with detachment the 90th Regiment moved from town this morning, accompanied by a small party of the Dragoon Guards under command of Cornet Bunbury. These men can be very badly spared. Nor are the men in a fit state to resume their fatiguing march, from their rear.... Report received that a trader, named Thompson, who with the assistance of three or four armed Hottentots were bringing to town a drove of 120 fine slaughter oxen had been attacked, near De Bruins Poort, by a party of about forty Kaffirs, most of whom were clad in red jackets, and woolen blankets. These succeeded, after a little firing on both sides, in capturing, not only all the cattle, the estimated value of which is £500, but in carrying off two horses which were in possession of the person in charge of them, together with his saddle, &c.

Thursday evening, 7 o'clock.—Report just brought in by the Commissariat Issuer at Trompeters Drift, and who had come into town with an escort on public duty, that on attempting to return, and when he had reached the heads of the kloofs near Governor's Kop, he saw a short distance before him, a large number of Kaffirs moving towards Graham's Town. Among them, in advance, were about sixty mounted men armed with guns. The Kaffirs on foot were estimated at from 200 to 300 men, marching forward with great steadiness. The parties after firing a couple of shots at a distance of 500 or 600 yards retreated with all speed to town, making report of the facts to the military authorities.... 11 o'clock, p.m. the whole town thrown into a state of alarm and commotion by the firing of two cannon from Selwyn's Battery, the signal agreed upon to be given in the event of actual danger and the approach of the Kaffirs.... Women and children hurrying through the streets, and armed men proceeding quickly to their respective places. Half an hour sufficed to hush all this commotion, and to show five hundred resolute men at their posts prepared to defend to the death all

they hold dear from savage violence. These remained under arms the whole night, but no enemy made his appearance, though it was evident that he was engaged with the colonists, heavy and long continued firing being heard at a distance of a few miles to the East.... Received a report at midnight from the Commander of the Fingoes, Mr. James Thackway, of the gallant conduct of the Fingoes out-pickets, and who had fired upon some Kaffirs approaching the town, and had recaptured upwards of 100 head of cattle from the enemy. These men certainly deserve well of the colony. Their service have been most valuable, and their steadiness and bravery alike conspicuous.... Mr. Hoole who speaks the Kaffir language, immediately the commotion in the town was hushed, and the safety of the women and children provided for, very gallantly volunteered to head a party, to patrol the flat on the E. and N.E. of the town. He was joined by eight Europeans, 10 Hottentots, and 12 Fingoes, and with these in skirmishing order he traversed the flats from Burnt Kraal, by Sarsford, to Table Hill, but without falling in with any of the enemy.

Informed that Mr. Robey's house, the Cheshire Cheese Inn, Manley's Flat, had been completely gutted by the enemy, and that everything about the place had been destroyed.

FRIDAY.—After the feverish anxiety of the night, the morning broke upon the scene of disturbance in bright serenity. As suspected the previous evening, the main body of the Kaffir force in the colony, instead of marching direct on Graham's Town, as it was at first supposed they would have done, turned off to the southward into Grobler's Kloof, where a party of 6 men in Mr. Ogilvie's service, with 4 Hottentots, had volunteered that day to return with his cattle, which had been brought to town for safety, and to endeavor to defend them there, to which end great facilities were afforded by a square block-house, pierced with loopholes, around which the cattle were placed for security. Here, between 8 and 9 o'clock, a furious attack was made on the little party, and which was met with a determined spirit that does all concerned the greatest possible credit. The enemy was repulsed three several times, until about 12 o'clock, having received a reinforcement, he at length succeeded in taking the whole of the cattle. The attack and the resistance were alike determined, and affords an admirable example to others, who may be placed in equally trying circumstances. The following note, sent in by one of the little band of brave men before day-light this (Friday) morning gives a very graphic account of the whole affair:—

Grobler's Kloof Friday morning.

I am sorry to state that last night, between the hours of 8 and 9 o'clock, the Kaffirs attacked us in great force, and in my opinion there were three or four hundred of them, who succeeded in carrying off all the cattle—150. We kept them out of the kloof for three hours, after which time a party got lodged close under the lower, and another party kept us in play from the top kloof, where the wagon stands by the land hedge. The Kaffirs fought desperately, and at different times were called to another party over the river to come to their assistance. We peppered them well with the loops out of the two blunderbusses. There are two of us slightly wounded—Mr. Halley through the shoulder, and myself over the right eye with a splinter from a ball. We cannot ascertain how many Kaffirs we have killed till day light comes. Please to send out a patrol as quick as you can.

Since the receipt of the foregoing, the writer of it has arrived in town and says, that one dead Kaffir has been found struck by a ball through his chest, and five loops on his left side; and that he has no doubt many more will be discovered in a similar state, from the caution taken by the little garrison not to fire unless they could make the shot tell.

LATEST INTELLIGENCE.

Saturday Morning, 10 o'clock.

An Express just come from Fort Pedi, brings us the following important intelligence:

“All is here excitement; Kaffirs in large bodies around the T'Slambie tribes. For the last few nights we have been under arms, while the women and children have been placed for security in the barracks. Yesterday the Fingoes in the Newton Dale Settlement had sharp fighting with Pato's Kaffirs, and which continued the whole day. Towards afternoon firing was heard from Fort Pedi, and soon the war-cry was heard in all directions. Capt. McLean (Resident Agent) immediately sent Mr. Sheppstone (Kaffir Interpreter) forward to ascertain the true state of affairs. He was accompanied by Mr. Tainton, and Mr. S. Lucas. By the time they had reached the scene of conflict, the Kaffirs had gained the day, and were hurrying off the Fingoe cattle. Mr. Sheppstone, and his two or three gallant associates, instantly rallied the Fingoes, and then made a dash on the Kaffirs to retake the cattle. At this crisis Mr. Sheppstone and his companions displayed equal decision and bravery, for making a dash to the rear of the Kaffirs he threw them into confusion, and after firing a few shots he succeeded in recapturing the whole of the cattle, and in seeing them again in the possession of the Fingoes. At this time a detachment of the 7th D. G. came up and the Artillery, but too late to take part in the affairs. Fani, a Kaffir of Pato's tribe (very strongly suspected of being the murderer of the Rev. E. Scholtz), came to Capt. McLean asked for protection on the Fingo Settlement. Captain McLean remarked, ‘I look on all Kaffirs with suspicion at this moment—prove the sincerity of your intentions.’ To this he made no reply, except that he wished to belong to the Settlement. Capt. McLean rejoined, ‘go and tell Pato that I must see him before noon to-morrow as a friend, and that if he does not come I will consider him an enemy; I want to inform him of his daring attack on the Settlement this day, and moreover I wish him to be informed that I have ordered all spies to be at once shot.’ Two large bodies of Kaffirs within two miles of Fort Pedi last night.”

Another hand write:—“We are in a state of great anxiety, surrounded by Kaffirs. We have not had our clothes off since Monday, and have only had two or three hours sleep each night.... We are afraid that Pato and Umhala will both join the war party, and will probably proceed into the colony.”

Saturday Noon.—A report just brought in that a body of about 200 Kaffirs had made their appearance at the foot of the hills below Mr. Fuller's about 3 miles S. of town. A party of mounted Bonghers hurriedly collecting to move upon that point.

Reported that the country along the whole of the Kowie and Kowie Rivers, was lit up last night by farm houses fired by the ruthless enemy.

Half-past 12 o'clock, p.m.—Despatches from the troops in front have this moment come in, brought by a large party of mounted men and ten of the C.M. Rifles. We are happy to announce that the troops have met with no reverse—not having been engaged with the enemy since the 18th inst. All is reported as quiet in front up to the 21st inst., and no idea seems to be entertained of the rush of the enemy upon the colony.

The mail to Fort Beaufort was seized by the Kaffirs, the bearer of it severely wounded—the mail bags cut to pieces, and their contents scattered to the winds. A Cape Mounted Rifleman, carrying an express, has also been shot by the enemy. Double Drift and Hermanus Kraal (Fort Brown), have been attacked by the enemy in great force, but who was repelled. Everything around these posts have been swept off. The Post at Leeuw Fontein, about 10 miles S. of Fort Beaufort, has also been attacked, and with the loss on our side of three men, one of whom is named Clarke, formerly the manager of Mr. Howe's establishment. Mr. Jay's Inn, on the Fort Beaufort Road, has been fired, and reduced to a heap of ruins. An account before us states that Botha's Post has also been attacked, but that the defence was so vigorous and so effective that the dead bodies of the enemy actually dammed up the river. During Thursday night heavy firing was heard at Fort Beaufort, in the direction of the Blinkwater post, and as the mail was closing a reinforcement of 80 mounted burghers were just starting for that point.

Capt. Size, commanding the burgher force from Uitenhage, came in, the bearer of the government despatch, and proceeds express to Uitenhage, to bring up the whole force of that District. Martial Law is proclaimed by His Excellency the Governor throughout the whole colony, and we trust that every district will now do its duty.

The station at Mr. Pohl's farm was attacked last night, the enemy succeeding in capturing about 40 head of cattle. The marauders were, however, followed into the thick bush by a party headed by Mr. Pohl, and who succeeded in a most gallant manner in retaking the cattle, and in killing two Kaffirs and wounding a third.

The Kaffirs are said to be getting short of gunpowder, and one main object of their rush into the colony is said to be to obtain a supply. A heavy attack, it is conjectured, will be made upon the magazines at Graham's Town.

A detachment of about 60 men of the 90th Regt. arrived in Graham's Town this morning. The arrival of the 45th Regt. at the Cape is, it is said, expected daily.

The latest communication from Block Drift, dated 22d inst., states that His Excellency the Governor was about to start via Fort Beaufort for Graham's Town,

We repeat, succor is required immediately from all the Western Districts, and we trust that every disposable man will move hither without a moment's delay.

According to accounts received in town, His Excellency was still at Fort Beaufort on the 25th.

Saturday Evening, 8 o'clock.—We have at this moment received the painful intelligence of the death of Mr. J. D. Norden, Auctioneer of this town. The particulars are as follows:—This afternoon a report reached town, that the Kaffirs were assembled in great numbers on the farm of Mr. H. Fuller, about 3 miles from town. Capt. Norden and Mr. Stubbs immediately assembled their corps and galloped to the spot. They started down Woestberg and entered the Kowie bush, where they saw the Kaffirs in large numbers, both on foot and on horseback. They were immediately surrounded by the Kaffirs who fired on them. The first ball struck Mr. Norden in the forehead, and he fell dead from his horse. Mr. Taylor instantly shot the Kaffir, while his horse was killed in turn by another Kaffir. They were however compelled to retreat, in doing which the Kaffirs charged them, and captured several of their horses. They also carried off the body of Mr. Norden, and stripped it.
