Wij hebben in dit nummer weder een aanzienlyke plaats ingeroemd voor brief No. 8, van den Wel-Bewaarden Dr. TANCRED, den getrouwden aantekenaar, niet alleen van de droevige voorvalen weder onder zyne oogen plats vonden, maar, wat oneindig meer segt, den onverachrochten bediller van dat verfoeydelyke stolsel, dat tot al de ellenden door hem vervaardig heeft gegeven.—

Met het tegenwoordig nommer eindigt het verhal van het jaar 1845, het geheel dus een tydvak insluitende van vier jaren, en, indien dit by ver-gelykende korte tydstat, zult een zwart Register heeft opgeleverd, welk een tooneel zou zijn dan der wereld niet vertoonden indien de kwellingen der zeven vorige jaren, by hetzelfde werden gevougd?

Het geheel der maatregelen van Instigatoren is niets anders geweest dan eenne aaneenschakeling van de stoutste proefnemingen, gekocht tegen gemen minderen prys, dan honderde kostbare menschenlyke levens, en de berooving, of liever de volkslagende verarming van een groot aantal ondernemende, duyverige en getrouwe onderdanen en de algeliede hooftoewerking van een der bloeiendste afdeelingen.

CAPETOWN, OCTOBER 8, 1846.

We have devoted considerable space in our present number to Letter No. 8 of Dr. TANCRE—
the faithful recorder not only of the mournful occurrences which have passed under his own observation, but what is of far greater moment,—the undaunted criticiser of that detestable system which has given rise to all the calamities narrated by him. The present number carries the narrative up to the end of the year 1845—a period of four years;—and if this comparatively short space produced such a dark catalogue, what picture would not present itself to the world if the miseries of the previous seven years were added to it? The few years immediately preceding the late invasion exhibit symptoms, it is true, of the highest pitch of barbarian wickedness and civilized indifference; but among the long series of ten full years there is not one in which the unfortunate frontier colonists were not exposed to the most merciless treatment both on the part of their savage neighbours and their would-be protectors, the excellent colonial authorities both here and at home. The whole of the measures of the latter, has been nothing else but a series of the most desperate experiments, purchased at no less a price than of some hundreds of valuable human lives, and the impoverishment, or rather absolute ruin, of a great number of enterprising, industrious and loyal subjects, and the total devastation of one of the most flourishing divisions of the colony.

We need hardly remark that the task undertaken by Dr. TANCRE, to snatch from oblivion the most material part of that eventful period, entitles him to general gratitude. This is admitted on all hands, and for the sake of this hitherto neglected Colony it is to be hoped that his communications may receive equal wide circulation in the mother country, and attract similar interest as they have met with here.

In order to attain this desirable object, at least as regards the first—for of the latter we hold ourselves convinced as a natural consequence—we have come to the resolution of publishing, in a pamphlet the first series of these stubborn productions, concluding with No. 8, now inserted. The English part—more particularly destined for circulation in England—will appear first, and the Dutch soon after, for which purpose subscription lists will be opened at this office and at those of the several country agents for this paper.

The Deputy Commissary General, CHARLES PALMER, Esq., is on the eve of embarking for the Frontier, in order to direct the affairs of that department in person; and from the Commissariat advertisements inserted elsewhere, calling for a supply of wagons and mules to be employed, we hear, in the transport of provisions from Port Elizabeth to the seat of war, it will appear that a kind of activity is now about to succeed the supineness which has unfortunately prevailed at the other end of the colony since the commencement of hostilities. If a similar arrangement had been previously made, the forces in the field might have been amply supplied with rations, and the war prosecuted with greater vigour and with far better success than at present. However, as wisdom and prudence are not always the attributes of even the aged and the gallant, we hope the present measure may yet prove of some advantage.

With reference to the burgher levies, or provisional companies, as they are termed, we also observe some improvement in the notions entertained at head quarters. But lately when the Stellenbosch burghers applied to His Excellency for the same pay allowed to provisional levies, their request was rejected. The difficulty to obtain fresh levies, appears now to have induced His Excellency to offer payment to such burgher levies as might now be raised. Whether the services to be performed by them, will differ from those rendered by the Stellenbosch burghers, remains however to be seen.

The letter of Mr. VAN NIEKERK in our opinion contains an actual grievance, which should be immediately redressed. In fact, the whole code of laws with respect to our roads, appear to require

Sir.—I feel disposed to proceed with the mournful narrative of calamities to the end of the year 1845, in order to show your Excellency the awful insecurity of the colony at the time that ever to be lamented speech of the Hon'ble John Montagu was delivered. I also wish to show, how perfectly unacquainted, or how unwilling to become acquainted with the true state of our Frontier affairs that Hon'ble Gentleman must have been, when he thundered forth his efforts at Democratic eloquence before the venerable senate of Cape Town. But really, Sir, when I heard of the general orders for the dismissal of the entire of the Burgher force, I was strongly tempted to discontinue my narrative, and to ask in the name of common sense, what next? I certainly do not wish to be a prophet of evils, but I cannot shut my eyes to the most alarming insecurity in which we are placed. I wish that I was with the good folk of Cape Town, even if I were to be in the neighbourhood of the Secretary himself, as I think I would fare better than here. As I am here, unfortunately, I cannot be an idle spectator of passing events. I cannot forget the dreadful suspense every one was in, and our unprotected state, when the alarm guns were fired from

our battery, when we were all awaiting in the darkness of night the rush of savage hordes bent on deeds of Spanish massacre. I recollect the fear and terror of feeble old age, and helpless youth, and I can only imperfectly describe the agony of the delicate matron with the garments of modesty flung carelessly about her in hurried confusion, trying to shut up her helpless babe within the fountain of its support, whilst she sought for shelter in some supposed place of security. I think, Sir, if the Hon'ble Secretary could have seen us then, with his monocular telescope, he would not pronounce this description overhaughed or hyperbolical.

the very serious injury at that season of drought, to the prisoners. The Kafirs displayed the most unfeigned audacity, and nothing but the greatest forbearance on the part of the military saved the Colony from a serious commotion. 30 head of cattle taken from Mr. Bertram, of Mill River, and the pursuit unsuccessful. The government horses of the Commissioner Clerc Johns and daughter cattle belonging to the Contractor of Capon's Post, were taken from Post Victoria. October, horses were stolen from a man named Falcolot at Fort Beaufort. I suppose that the son of the village Chief Macombe was obliged to border down for guns during this month. The trader Newth was severely wounded by Kafirs on the drift of the Kleinkama, called Bush kraal, a few miles from Fort Pedi. The man lay in a dangerous state at the said place attended by the Military Surgeon. All the traders generally expressed great apprehensions of insolvency upon all our proceedings. I have behind the Dutch Farmer, called from their homes to act as our friends and the safeguards of the frontier, untrained; and its treacherous enemies, such as the savage chief Umkye, with his retinue, and others fondaed and caressed, glorified and encouraged. (The Commandant Lins) will be able to explain in Cape Town the treatment that he and his men received from the Quartermaster General; & I have just witnessed with grief and alarm the deplorable incapacity of our Frontiers by our lines of defence now forsaken and abandoned. Have we men to deal with or have we friends? We want many action, and we want it now; we want men of common sense to devise their plans, and firmness to carry them into execution; we must have it! It must come sooner or later. Now would be the acceptable time. No more threats, Sir, can be held forth, never to be carried into execution. Such conduct instils into the savage breast courage which he otherwise never would have possessed. It leads him to suppose that every influence but actions, that we court his forbearance and tread his power. Almost all that has hitherto been done seems to resemble King of France-like movements.
