THE ZUID-AFRIKAAN.

CAPE TOWN, NOVEMBER 8, 1846.

THE present position of the Kafir War is most important. Within a few days the momentous question will be decided respecting the passive submission of the savage hordes, or a prosecution or rather resumption of the struggle with renewed vigour.

This, in our opinion, is a true view of the war question. Passive submission, by means of negotiation, or severe contest, to bring about complete subjugation, with all the details inseparably connected with both these positions.

It will have been observed from our last number that we are among those who are of opinion, that however desirable an opposite result may be, little or nothing will be effected by negotiating with a people whose craftiness and cunning have become proverbial, especially when the advantages are taken into account which they have unfortunately obtained in the present war with the Colony.

Those who are no strangers to such matters, will no doubt recollect how highly difficult it was, in the former war, notwithstanding the defeat sustained by them at almost every point, and amidst the intricate condition in which they then found themselves placed, to bring them to a voluntary submission.

How they constantly, during the most wealend endeavours for the attainment thereof, dictated by mere humanity, harassed the most audacious attempts to retrieve their losses, to recover the booty captured from them, and by retaliating incursions, however desperate often, to lead their pursuers into the belief, that their courage had not forsaken them, and they knew of no other subjugation except that brought about by the sword.

It is certainly a most easy task, as far as words and vague promises are concerned, to induce these innocent children of nature to concede any terms demanded from them. The sad experience of the past ten years, which have been so prolific in similar political jobbing, has fortunately placed this assertion beyond the chance of doubt or dispute.

The system of dog killing is still vigorously carried on by the police, pursuant to section 44 of the Municipal regulations; and however much we concur in the expediency of clearing the town of such dogs as may be found at large without owners, still we cannot brook the idea, that this system should be carried on almost at noon-day, without regard to the feelings and to the disgust of the inhabitants.

Original Correspondence.

THE NAUTILUS AND THE STELLENBOSCH BURGHERS.

From the Cape Frontier Times, Oct. 27.

Sir,—Allow us through the medium of your useful paper to acquaint the public how we (Stellenbosch Burgers) have been treated on board of the brig Nautilus, by Capt. Ellis.

At Fort Elizabeth sixteen of us entered into an agreement with him to carry us from thence to Table Bay for the sum of £20, on condition that he would provide us daily with sufficient bread, meat, rice, soup, coffee and tea, and we confided in his promises, believing that we were dealing with a man who would keep his word.

On the 9th instant, in the forenoon, we went on board of that miserable craft. We received nothing on that day, but were on the contrary robbed, as we got sick and could pay no particular attention to our goods.

In this manner we were treated thirteen days; and this conduct was really sufficient to make a healthy person sick. More than 100 of us were in that nasty stinking hold, and compelled to go down into it at night, because we got no light, and were in danger of breaking our limbs by climbing over bags and chests, which we had to pass in order to reach our berth.

THE NAUTILUS AND THE WORCESTER BURGHERS.

Worcester, 2nd November 1846.

To THE EDITOR: Sir,—In your leading article of the 25th October last, you remark that the blame, as to the bad treatment of the burgurers on their return from Algoa Bay in the brig Nautilus, cannot be exclusively laid on Capt. Ellis, the master of that vessel.

It is not likely that Capt. Ellis has enlarged the size of his vessel between the 4th and 9th October. On the 4th he had hardly room for 4 persons, and on the 9th he found sufficient space for 60 or more.

As regards the affirmation of J. F. Kirsten to the statement of the Captain, we must say that it is inaccurate as regards himself (not us) he had a great deal more that is stated therein.

With respect to the tea, Mr. Kirsten stated to me, P. J. de Wet, that if we got no tea, we would receive more water; upon which I told him, after having conversed with some of my friends, that we would rather have pure water than such bad tea, and served out in such a manner.

In conclusion we request you and the public not to attach the least credit to the declaration of Mr. Kirsten, as to the accuracy of Capt. Ellis's statement. We declare the above and

the certificate which appeared in a previous number to be more conformable to the truth than that signed by the Captain.

FRONTIER INTELLIGENCE.

(From the Cape Frontier Times, Oct. 27.)

The following correspondence is published, for general information. The sufferers "in consequence of the Kafir war" are recommended to make out their losses on two heads—

1st.—In reference to your Circular on the 18th inst., calling for Returns of all losses sustained by the colonists in consequence of the Kafir War, but in which returns you state, "losses from other causes, whether from droughts, thefts, &c., and unconnected with the war must not appear."

We, the undersigned, all serious sufferers "in consequence of the Kafir War," conceiving the above passage indefinite and ambiguous, and that there are few, if any of the losses enumerated in your circular, which cannot, either directly or indirectly, be traced to, and fairly taken to have been occasioned by the Kafir war, have requested that you will favour us, at your earliest convenience, with an explanation of what is meant by the passage referred to.

We would be glad to be informed, for instance, whether sheep, cattle, or horses, not actually taken by the Kafirs, but which have died from poverty and starvation in consequence of their owners having been compelled, by order of the Government, to abandon their farms and congregated together in "leaguers" or camps, with immense herds of cattle or thousands of sheep,—whether the thousands of lambs that were destroyed to save the mothers, and the sheep and young stock cattle that were abandoned on the route to the camps,—whether the rents which were paid, or for which the tenants are still liable, for farms which they were compelled to abandon, "in consequence of the Kafir war,"—and whether the large sums which many farmers have had to pay for additional herds and for the grazing of their stock in less exposed districts,—are to be comprised in the returns as "losses sustained by the colonists in consequence of the Kafir war?"

FORT BEAUFORT.

A correspondent writes:—"All that you have said about the scarcity of provisions in Beaufort is under the mark. We are really in a very sad state."

We are credibly informed that the equipment of the fifty men of the new Uitenhage levy that has been raised has cost the Government £2,000, yet £40 per head, so that the cost of the new levy from one district supposing one hundred and fifty men more are raised in Uitenhage at the same rate of expense, will be £3,000.

TUESDAY.—The information from Fort Beaufort, relative to the negotiations of Lieut. Col. Johnston and the Gakka chiefs, is very meagre and unsatisfactory. We are informed that Col. Johnston was preparing to march upon Sandilla, having received information where a number of his cattle were, but in consequence of a message from that chief that he would not fight, that the English might come and kill him (&c.), and that he would give up all the cattle he had by a certain day, the intention to attack him has been abandoned, and a suspension of hostilities agreed to for a few days.

It is the wisest policy which the chief could pursue under their present circumstances. After plundering the colony of all the stock that was within convenient reach, and pillaging and destroying all the property they could, they wish to be left alone; they want breathing time; they wish to be allowed to raise food from the ground; they say they will not fight any more; and are willing, in return for a cessation of hostilities, to surrender a few of the cattle they have stolen, and a few frelocks, as a proof of the sincerity of their professions of amity and good will.

As to the cattle that have been taken by his people during the war, this new scheme of passive resistance on the part of the Kafirs seems to have puzzled amazingly the simplicity of some of our gallant commanders, and were it not that the safety of the suffering frontier community was at stake, the whole thing would be laughable enough.

As to the expense of landing, each of us and several others paid it out of their own pockets; and if there had been any favorable disposition in our behalf, why were we not shown a place where restitution might have been obtained? As to the notions which we might have obtained to turn, we had no knowledge of, and only learnt it from your paper. It is very fortunate that we did not know it, otherwise our poor Government would have had to pay that also.

With regard to the travelling allowance of 10s., we asked Mr. Borchers whether it was expected that that would suffice, and that poor gentleman replied, that it was certainly not enough, but that so much only was allowed, and he could give no more. We had a mind to make a present of that also to the river, but as we had just taken a seat in the Post-post-wagon at 10s. each, we paid it therewith.—We had even nothing over to pay our lodgings in town.
