





THE ZUID-APRIKAAN. CAPE TOWN, FEBRUARY 9, 1848.

It is a glaring fact that none of the Governors who have been charged with the administration of the government of this colony, since the Kafr war, have left untouched the subject of claims for compensation for losses sustained by the enemy, or for articles supplied for the use of the forces. The last Government Notice issued on that head, is dated at Graham's Town, 27th Dec. 1847, and therein all persons who have not already filed such claims either with the Civil Commissioner of Albany, or the Commissioner of Claims, are requested to do so, and forward the same forthwith to the office of said Civil Commissioner, in order to enable him to comply with the instructions of Government.

It appears to me that this notice confines itself exclusively to the claimants in the Eastern Province, as those of the Western were required, pursuant to notification, to forward their claims to the Civil Commissioner of their respective districts. There is, however, little doubt, that all claimants in the Eastern, as well as the Western Province, have already filed their claims, and in neither, perhaps, a single individual will be found chargeable with a dereliction of duty in this respect. They have indeed had many reasons to urge them on, and unless the Government have a desire to subject the long-tried patience of these lawful claimants to a vexatious test, we cannot at all conceive the utility of these repeated calls. The Secretary of State, in his dispatch on this subject, has made a vast distinction between the nature of both descriptions of claims, and in approving the steps taken for the classification of those for impressed articles for the use of the burgher forces, his Lordship stated that they would be duly considered. This distinction in the nature of the claims, is apparent enough, and though we have invariably maintained that both parties have an indisputable title to compensation, it cannot be denied that the latter are of a more simple character—for value received in goods demanded and furnished—in most instances coupled with a promise that they would be paid for, on demand, by the Government. Under such circumstances nothing would have been more opposed to common honesty than the expression of even the least doubt respecting the legality of claims of such a description. This point, we think, can therefore be considered as settled; but another one is left of equal, if not of greater importance, to the parties concerned, and that is, the mode and the time of payment.

It is indeed of little avail to any claimant that his debtor admits the legality of his claim, if he does not at the same time furnish the means to satisfy it. The claimants in the case in question are placed in this very position, and it is of little consolation to them to know that the Government is their lawful debtor, if it neglects to satisfy the amount due.

We should not be surprised to find Sir HARRY SMITH charged with special instructions respecting this question, which has already given rise to much discontent, and embraces instances of insufferable hardship. In such an event we would call His Excellency's attention to the propriety of immediately publishing those instructions for the information of the parties concerned. They can, in our opinion, contain nothing but an encouraging announcement. The legality of the claims is admitted, and their immediate payment in hard cash is the only resolution we can expect from the illustrious debtor.

If the reverse, however, should unfortunately be the case, and this renewed call have no other result than to divert the claimants, they have no other course left, but the usual constitutional one, to draw up, and forward without delay, petitions to the Home Government, setting forth their grievances. They have been kept in suspense long enough, and must set to work to help themselves. The course to be adopted by them is very simple. Let public meetings be called in every district in which there are any claimants—and there is not one exception we believe, in this respect—and petitions be drawn up, setting forth in humble, but at the same time, powerful language, the nature of their grievances arising from this detestable system of impressment, and insisting on the justice of an immediate settlement of the claims the legality of which has been already admitted. But, above all, let them not forget also to mention the aggravated fact that a great portion of this impressed, or rather extorted property, was, after the discharge of the burgher force, sold by public auction, and that the money realized by those sales was very conveniently deposited in the military chest!

We sincerely hope that Sir HARRY SMITH may be able to allay this cause of anxious excitement; but we repeat that unless this be done, the wronged parties should not allow themselves to be any longer tossed about, but ought to adopt that course which, as British subjects, is open to them. This is our well meant advice.

THE POST.

The Frontier Post arrived yesterday afternoon, but has brought no news of importance.

We regret to observe that Sir HARRY SMITH's stay at Natal will not be so long as we had expected. H.M. Steamer Geyser, who brought the 27th Regt. to this place, being about to proceed to Natal in order to receive His Excellency on board. It is said that Sir HARRY will land at Buffalo Mouth, or, as it is now called, East London. The Geyser, will call at Waterloo Bay for the 6th Regt. The 7th Dragoons will return to this place in H.M. Steamer Rosamond.

DREADFUL OCCURRENCE.

On the 31st ultimo, whilst engaged in baking, the thatch of a small dwelling on the farm of Mr. JAN VAN NIEKERK, called Bartholomew Klip, situate in the Fieldcornery of Groenberg, caught fire. Mr. NIEKERK, after fruitless endeavours to save the thatch, entered the building—for reasons unknown—followed by a colored servant. Immediately after the thatch fell, but in such a manner as to entirely prevent their egress, so that both persons were killed in the building by the intense heat and smoke. Their bodies were afterwards

taken out in a totally baked, but little mutilated state, their clothes being without damage. We have this statement from the lips of one of Mr. VAN NIEKERK's neighbours, who declares the loss of a good man and affectionate friend. Mr. NIEKERK was a widower, but has left no issue.

The reader will find in another column some interesting extracts from the Singapore Free Press received by us up to the 21 December last. The news from China, appearing in a number of the 4th November, gives the particulars of an attack by some Chinese pirates on three British subjects, near Canton, and which, apparently, is the same occurrence respecting which a loose report was received here about a fortnight ago.

We are gratified to find that the encounter now communicated no lives have been lost.

The following is the Cape Town Address to Sir HENRY POTTINGER, on his retirement from the government of this Colony, with His Excellency's reply.

TO HIS EXCELLENCY THE RIGHT HONORABLE SIR HENRY POTTINGER, BART.

SIR,—We, whose names are subscribed to this Address, desire to convey to you, before you quit our shores, the mark of our respect for Your Excellency, as the former Governor of the Cape, and High Commissioner for His Majesty's Affairs.

When Her Majesty was advised to nominate you to this Government, we, in common with numbers in all parts of the British dominions, regarded the appointment of so eminent a person in a significant token of the respect taken in this Colony; and although the duration of your administration has been suddenly, if not unexpectedly terminated by your appointment to another of greater distinction and importance, and one which, as belonging to the service in which you first laid the foundation of your fame, may prove so far as history with your own wisdom, we yet thankfully acknowledge that you have improved the limited portion of time which had been allotted to you here by an anxious attention to the public interests, and a laborious devotion to the adjustment of those complicated questions, which, for some years past, have involved our frontier in embarrassment and perplexity.

In departing for your government at Madras, you will carry with you, Sir, our sincere wishes that you may long enjoy, under Divine Providence, those blessings which may best promote your personal happiness and public usefulness. We have the honor, &c.

REPLY. Cape Town, 21st January, 1848.

Gentlemen,—I am much indebted to you for this Address, on the eve of my bidding you farewell; and I beg you will accept my best thanks for the tone in which you have alluded to my official measures, as well as for your kind and friendly wishes towards myself personally.

During the ten months which I was at the head of the Government of this Colony, it was my earnest endeavour to acquit myself—without favor or affection—of the high trust graciously reposed in me by Her Majesty, in the manner which she has so graciously considered to be meritorious to the general public good; and I can now, after the twelfth hour, assure you that I remained amongst you longer, than that feeling alone would have continued to be the strict rule of my conduct.

In the discharge of my complicated and onerous functions, I have had difficulties and obstacles to contend with, and remove, which I believe are as yet very imperfectly understood, and both in respect to my proceedings in those matters, and likewise in regard to other steps, which I have deemed it expedient to introduce, I do not, by any means, shut my eyes to the fact, that my duties have necessarily been of an intricate and, in some instances, of a painful nature; but I have done nothing for which I have not received my motives and all I can desire is, to have my actions judged of by those motives, when they shall be made known to you.

I offer you my sincere good wishes for your present and future success, and request you to believe, that the welfare and prosperity of the Colony of the Cape of Good Hope will ever be regarded by me with the warmest and most anxious interest.

CRIMINAL.

From a letter from Canton, with the perusal of which we have been favored, we learn the following particulars of a daring outrage perpetrated on three British subjects near Canton by a band of Chinese robbers:—On the 2nd ult. Captain Evans, of the Charles Grant, Captain Dumayne, of the Shaw Allan, and the first officer of the Cowajoo Family, were proceeding from Canton to their vessels in a ship's boat with a crew of 15 men, and having a box of grasscloth worth 500 dollars, two bundles of copper cash, and about 2,000 dollars specie, when they were attacked near the Dutch Ferry about two miles from Canton, by a piratical boat containing more than thirty persons. As soon as the pirates saw the Cutter they hoisted the signal representing the Cunningham letter boat, and held up a pretended letter. The Cutter went alongside to receive the letter, and on getting close the pirates rushed on deck armed with long spears and commenced an attack. The crew of the cutter being unarm'd threw themselves overboard. Capt. Evans was severely wounded on the face by sword cuts, and Capt. Dumayne received a spear wound on the head. The pirates took the box of cloth and the copper cash, but the dollars fortunately escaped their notice. The wounded persons have since recovered. —Singapore Free Press.

H. N. M. Steam-ship Batavia, arrived here on the evening of Tuesday, 2d Nov., having left Batavia on the 30th ultimo. By her we have Java Courants from the 2d to the 27th October, from which we make the following extracts:— Early in the morning of the 29th Sept. last, a light earthquake was felt at Batavia, which however was so very slight that in general it was only discovered from the clocks and time pieces standing still. An astronomical clock in the boat house at the tower of Batavia, amongst others, stopped, indi-

cating about 30 minutes past 5 o'clock; which time may therefore be taken as that at which the earthquake occurred. The American ship Centre has brought 150 tons of tea to Batavia.

In the month of August last the universally celebrated mountain tea, from the island of Sumatra, after having on the 9th of that month arrived at the foot of that mountain, on the 11th after a very fatiguing journey, he reached the top, about 2 to the afternoon, and there planted a Netherlands flag.

On this journey he was accompanied, besides his own attendants, by the British assistants of Sumatra and a dozen Singaporeans, together with Mr. Betha resident at Binn; all however had not the luck to reach the top, some of them, who were less proof against the fatigues of the journey, having found themselves compelled to desist from the attempt.

Last night the Chinese woman Kan Inwie, was delivered here of three children; all of them are of the male sex, —one is since dead.

In the middle part of the 3rd Oct., a number of Japanese dwellings and buildings, in the district Singen Kulan, were blown down by a heavy gust of wind.

Two private prahus belonging to Batt Tunko (one of the Solo Islands) which had been absent from thence for more than 6 months, were captured near Sampit (South Coast of Borneo) by the cruise-boat No. 7, and a number of captives released thereon, in July last.

A letter is received from Banjarmasin, the haque Durga, Captain Pottenger, belonging to Ampanas (Lombok), and the property of Mr. King, was lost near Pak Tien in the month of August last, during a voyage from Kotte to Surabaya; the crew only were saved, both the ship and cargo were lost.

In the night between the 19th and 20th Oct. a small boat, which had been sent to the coast of the island of the 19th, and was on the coast of the island of the 19th, was blown down by a heavy gust of wind.

On the 21st ult. the Dutch frigate Frederic, Lemmy, on her passage from Batavia to this, saw a vessel ashore, and shortly afterwards picked up a boat with a number of men in it, who reported that the Dutch ship Medora, to which they belonged, had got aground on a shoal near the island of Lepoear and had filled with water. Captain Lemmy immediately proceeded to render assistance, and having at considerable risk got this vessel near to the wreck, he was engaged from the 25th to the 1st instant, in saving the cargo, great part of which was the most valuable description, consisting of treasure, birds' nests, tortoise-shell, tripping, &c. Most of these articles were saved, but a considerable quantity of cotton &c, still remained in the vessel, which they were obliged to abandon on the 1st inst., the water and provisions of the frigate running short in consequence of the number of additional hands received from the wreck, and who had to be supplied with food by Captain Lemmy. They accordingly proceeded to Muruk where they replenished their stores, and then continued the course to Singapore, where the frigate arrived on the 10th instant. —Singapore Free Press, Sept. 16.
