THE ZUID-AFRIKAAN.

CAPE TOWN, JULY 15, 1847.

THE Meeting of the Legislative Council has been appointed for to-morrow, and we have learnt on good authority that the long expected Estimates will then be laid on the table. We announce this welcome news with double satisfaction, because we know that the Minute of His Excellency the Governor which will be read on the occasion, will mainly confine itself to a subject which, in point of actual importance, can but be surpassed by few. The want of the necessary Magistracies, and the wretched state of the goals in the Country Districts, are matters which have been repeatedly brought to the notice of the Legislature, and we have invariably considered it a paramount duty forcibly to urge the pernicious consequences arising from that want. The serious inconvenience which the too great distance of several farms from the nearest seats of Magistracy inevitably occasioned to the inhabitants; the public concealment or improper compromise of offences and the alarming State of demoralization originating therefrom, were, in our mind, matters by far too important for the parties concerned in particular, and the Colony at large, to be left unnoticed. Repeatedly, and even lately, we enlarged upon the subject in this journal, and most pleasing, indeed, were the many marks of general approval, which crowned our humble endeavours to promote the public welfare; and it will assuredly occasion no surprise that we announce with sincere satisfaction that the task of that long looked for reform will at length be seriously commenced.

Our present space does not allow us, and we also deem it unnecessary, to anticipate His Excellency's important minute. We entertain the confident hope that it will be calculated to realize our most fervent expectations. In our next we shall be better prepared to judge of its real merits, and to lay the whole of the document before our anxious readers.

The Post arrived at 5 o'clock last evening. The papers received again state some bold depredations, among which one committed as deep into the Colony as Lower Bushman's River. Information had also been received at Graham's Town from the Fish River, above De Bruin's Post, that the spoor of several small parties of Kafirs had been seen in that neighbourhood passing into the Colony.

The following important account of an interview with His Excellency the Governor is copied at length, being calculated to inspire confidence in this intricate state of affairs :

To-day (8th July) the farmer J. D. Nel, accompanied by Mr. L. H. Meurat, as Interpreter, was favored with an interview by the Right Honorable the Governor, Sir Henry Pottinger. Mr. Nel is an old resident on the frontier, is possessed of considerable intelligence, and has great influence amongst his countrymen in the neighbourhood, where he resides—as the representative of whom he sought this interview with His Excellency. His specific objects were, 1st, to ascertain what hopes might be indulged by the farmers of the Kafir and Fish River of future security—and 2ndly, to make known to His Excellency that, in the event of their not receiving some satisfactory assurance upon the subject, the whole were determined to quit the Colony, and to take up their abode across the N. E. boundary. The nature of this interview was, we are informed, all that could be desired.—His Excellency stating in most emphatic terms, his full determination never to relinquish the trust committed to him by Her Majesty's government until he had effectually subjugated the Kafir tribes, and secured the permanent tranquillity of the Colony. His Excellency stated that after the most patient and careful examination of every matter connected with the Kafir tribes, and the relations which had existed between them and the Colony, he was persuaded that Her Majesty's Government still labored under most erroneous impressions with regard to the great questions at issue, and the true character and conduct of the parties immediately concerned. That he had devoted a large portion of his time to the task of disabusing the Home Government of these false impressions, and in endeavoring to show that the task imposed upon him was nothing less than the suppression of numerous hordes of robbers. That he was determined to use all the power entrusted to him to this end, and that, when his plans were matured and the time for action had arrived, the public should not fail to be apprised thereof. In the mean time he (Nel) might assure his countrymen, that their interests were not forgotten, and that nothing should be wanting on the part of His Excellency to obtain for them

indemnification for the past and security for the future. It is unnecessary to add that this interview has afforded the utmost satisfaction to the parties concerned, who will now, it is probable, endure with patience those privations and dangers to which they have been so long exposed.—G. T. Journal.

The subject of obtaining for themselves a separate Government at present appears to engross public attention on the frontier. The circular of the Lt.-Governor, the purport of which was communicated in a former number, and in which it was asserted that according to the calculations therein contained, the Eastern Districts were unable to meet the expenses of such separate Government, has called forth several public meetings, convened for the purpose of considering this important matter.

The attention of the public, and of those concerned in particular, is directed to the annual report of the Directors of the "Equitable Fire Assurance and Trust Company," submitted to the meeting of Shareholders on the 13th instant. The state of the Company's funds is satisfactory, and this will be at once apparent when we state that in the course of three years since the establishment of the Company, the amount of profits has exceeded the amount of its paid up capital.

ACCIDENTAL DEATH.

On the 8th instant the body of a person was found on the farm of Mr. J. Shadler, at Blue Berg. After report had been made, an inquest was held by the police stryong, the clerk of the peace and the fieldcornet P. Wahl. From the appearance of the place, and of the body itself, there can be no doubt that the deceased was burnt to death. It is conjectured that in consequence of the cold, he must have lit a fire, and having, from some cause or other, fallen into it, met with his death. The name of the unfortunate man has not yet been ascertained, but he is supposed to have been one of the emigrants who lately arrived here, and engaged with some farmer or other in the neighbourhood.

THE INSOLVENT LAW.

Cape Town, July 12, 1847.

Sir,—According to the Insolvent Law, an insolvent, who has a deficiency of £500, and no proper books, and one who has made purchases at times when he could not pay, is guilty of culpable insolvency.

This wholesome Law, with so light punishment to deter unscrupulous people from infesting and robbing their neighbours, and enriching themselves unrighteously, is, alas ! but half, if at all executed.

What may be the reason thereof, I know not, and I am therefore induced to ask, whether it is fair and just that some have been punished for contravening that law, whilst others, who are guilty of transgressing the same under more aggravated circumstances, are allowed to escape ? Or are Trustees authorized to overlook said crimes, punishable by a special law—or must they, like all others, report offences which come to their knowledge ?

The only consolation to creditors who suffer so severely, is, that by the insolvent's conduct, account and books, they may be convinced, that he has become insolvent through misfortune, has not defrauded his creditors and unjustly enriched himself.

It should not be allowed that people who have no direct interest in estates, are appointed Trustees. None but a prudent and a principal concurrent creditor ought to be.
