DE ZUID-AFRIKAAN.

KAAPSTAD DEN 30 AUGUSTUS 1847.

TORN wy in ons voorlaatste het onderwerp behandelde, van dat volgelingen gebrek aan eenig godsdienstig onderwerp onder de ongelukkige Emigranten over de grenzen, nuwens wy die gelegenheid te baat, om die Synode der Hervormde Kerk, in deze Volkplanting, de gebiedende verplichting wy die mededeeling zeive niet bevestigden:

"Het wordt in private brieven mededeeld, dat de Kaffers grotendeels Graham's-stad, den 17, kan misschien enig verder licht werpen op de hierboven vermelde beweging der Kaapche Jagers, of schoon wy die mededeeling zeive niet bevestigden:

"Het wordt in private brieven mededeeld, dat de Kaffers grotendeels makten om Fort Beaufort en Somerset aantrekken. De Kaapche Jagers, vertrokken op Donderdag, is worden aangevoerd door die andere troepen, en men denkt dat sy hard werk hebben zullen."

De post op II. Zaturdag aangekomen, heeft het volgende gebracht:

(Uit de Cape Frontier Times.)

Er is geen nieuw van enige aanslag van het front—De geslotenheid van de Kaapche Jagers, onlangs in de stad gesloten, syn vertroekken om die onderscheidende posities te veroveren. En syn wonderlijke geruchten in omloop; een derde, aan hetwelk veel geloof schijnt te worden gehecht, is ten effecte, dat de Hoog-adel, de Gouverneur, stellende vaders van hun uitvaarten heeft, om den oorlog te beginnen, of de Kaffers verlagen syn of niet. Het is echter bekend, dat Zyne Excellencies oolanga een grote hoop deelgenoten ontbraken heeft, in antwoord daarvan, dat die enige syn eigen mededeelingen, maar op deperioris die tot de Britse Gouvernement, en ongeveer verhuisd waren, tot de Britse Gouvernement door synen opvolger gegeven. De inhoud der oolanga ontbraken, zonde daaronder waarschijnlijk, of natuurlijk, van eenen voordeeligen doel.

Het is in de vormen en leertsel der Hervormde Kerk, en het is daa niet meer dan billy, dat sy luide opgeroepen worden om deze, hars te lang verwaarloosde zones, met hare bedeelingen te volgen, en niets onbeperkt te laten, om het Gouvernement de gebiedende noodlakelykheid voorbehouden, om in deze zoo dringende behoeft, zonder verder verwyl te voorzien. Wy hebben reeds ons gemoedelijk vertrouwen uitgedrukt, dat een sterke veroening, uit die bron voortspruitende, met den besten uitslag zal worden bekoord, en wy juichen deze voorgenomen, prysverwaardende poging derhalve toe, als eens eerste schrede tot de berichting van dat hoogt wenschelyk doel.

Wy hebben mede met genoegen bemerkt dat een voorstel aan die Synode zal worden gedaan, ter oprichting van een Theologische Kweekschool in deze Kolonie. Dit is een vereischte dat reeds lang bestaan heeft en hetwelk dagelyks onmisbaar wordt. Jongelingen van den verhevenen aanleg voor het leeraars-ambt zyn dikwerf verplicht om denselven te onderdrucken en te smooren, uit gebeek aan de noodge middelen om eenne Europeesche studie te bekostigen. De oprichting van zulk eenne Instelling zal die groote zwierigheid, zul al niet gehad, ten minsten voor een groot gedeelte, uit den weg ruinen, en het gewenste hulpmiddel zyn om, met enigen vergelyking geringen uit, onzen koloniale jongelingen de gelegenheid te verschaffen, sich op eigen bodem tot die verhevene bediening bekwaam te maken.

Het onderwerp van opvoeding in de Buiten-Districten, en byzonder onder de landbouwende bevolking, zal mede andermaal onder behandeling komen; en wy vertrouwen dat hetzelve de ernstigste aandacht tot zich trekken zal, als synde in de tegenwoordige tijden in het hyzonder, een onderwerp van het aller-grootste aanslag. Men stelt mede voor een of zelin twe Parochien daartestellen tuschen George en Uitenhage; en wy zyn van oordeel dat de ingezetenen van de Langekloof en Gantoorrivier, wel zouden doen om met hunne onmiddelyke bevering en aanzoeken, de voorstellen der Kerk te ondersteunen, om hen in eenne ruimere mate de middelen van godsdienstig onderwys te verschaffen. En zyn ook nog vele andere deelen waar onzen dunktens nieuwe Parochien ver-eisch worden, en welke wy vertrouwen dat de Synode by die gelegenheid aan de ingezetenen en het Gouvernement sal voorstellen.

Wy hopen, wanneer dat eerwaardig Ligehaan deszelfs Zitting houdt, instaat te worden gesteld om aan onze lezers en de ledien onzer Kerk, de voornaamste onderwerpen onder overweging en de besluiten omtrent desezen genomen, mededeelden; en wy vertrouwen dat wy den algemeenen wensch uitdrukken, wanneer wy zeggen dat vrede en eendrag en een innig verlangen—all gering geschillen ter zyde stellen—om het belang der Kerk en dozer Volkplanting te bevoeren, de byeenkomst moge kenschetsen van de Leeraars en de Ouderlingen, welke eerlang plaats vinden zal.

Er is een zanderling verhaal in omloop, betrekelyk den bevelvoerenden officier ons Aanvallende Moid, Kolonel Van der Meulen, 73ste Rgt. Het loopt aldus: De Kaffers staan eenige oosen, waaronde een den Iles Sarman, die in die nabijheid aan het plange was. De eigenaar, een kleine parke, verantwoordelik, volgde het spoor, en achterhaalde eenne party Kaffra, die heilig waren van eenen oosten, die tot den oosten dreef, 15 km. verderop, en synen oosten op Vrydag gestolen van Mastram, en voor waard, Sir A. Stokkerton, £10 per stuk gehouden. Het spoor werd gevuld in de richting van het land van Moeshie. Heleman meldt word dat Sir Andries Stoekerton onlangs een bootje heeft ontbraken door middel van enige landers, die vóór in zyn dienst waren, maar die zich thans in het land van Moeshie bevinden, dat per hars gedurende den oorlog ontbraken, in het groot gebied van dat Stokkerton is. Den opperhoofd hoopt goed bewezen te woren, dat men op goede gronden verontrekest dat senne grote heiligeheid kruid, door syn laad in Kafferland gegeven wordt.

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THE ZUID-AFRIKAAN.

CAPETOWN, AUGUST 20, 1847.

We remarked in a late number on the total absence of any religious instruction among the unfortunate Emigrants beyond the boundary, we availed ourselves of that opportunity to remind the Synod of the Dutch Reformed Church in this Settlement of its bounden duty to take their hapless situation into its most serious consideration. We have since been favored with a list of the principal subjects to be submitted to that Body in its next Session, and have now the inexpressible satisfaction to announce that the spiritual interests of the Emigrants occupy a prominent place among them. Though they have left the colony, these men—our brethren in faith—have ever remained warmly attached to the forms and Doctrines of the Reformed Church, and it is therefore but fair that she be loudly called upon to follow with her administrations these, her long-neglected sons, and to leave nothing untried to convince the government of the imperative necessity without any further delay to provide in this most urgent want.

We have already expressed our confident hope that strong remonstrance, emanating from that quarter, would be crowned with the best results, and we therefore call the meditated laudable effort as a first step towards the attainment of that highly desirable object.

We also observe with satisfaction that a motion will be submitted to the Synod for the establishment of a Theological Seminary in this colony. This has long been a desideratum and is daily becoming more so. Young men of the greatest abilities for the clerical office, are often compelled to suppress their inclination on account of the want of the necessary means to defray the expenses attending an European study. The establishment of such an institution would, if not wholly, at least partially remove that difficulty, and enable our colonial youth to qualify themselves for that sacred office, in their own country, at a comparatively small outlay.

The subject of education in the Country Districts, and especially among the agricultural population, will also again come under discussion; and we trust that it will receive the most serious attention, as being, in the present times especially, one of the utmost moment. It is also proposed to form one, or even two new parishes between George and Uitenhage; and we think the inhabitants of Langekloof and Gamtoos' River would do well to second, with their own immediate exertions and applications, the proposals of the Church to supply them more abundantly with the ordinances of religion. There are also many other parts where, we think, new parishes are much wanted, and which we trust the Synod will embrace the opportunity of laying before the inhabitants and the Government.

We hope, when the Synod assembles, to be able to communicate to our readers and the fellow members of our Church, the leading topics of deliberation and the resolutions come to respecting them, and we trust that we utter the feelings of every friend of our Church when we express the hope that peace and harmony, and an earnest desire—forgetting all minor differences—to promote the best interests of the Church and the Settlement, may characterize the meeting of the Ministers and Elders, which is soon to take place.

From an advertisement inserted in this day's paper, it would appear that the wine growers of the Division of Stellenbosch have been alive to their interests. They have subscribed their mite towards the re-establishment of Mr. DE VILLIERS' Spirit Distillery, lately destroyed by fire, and are now called upon by that gentleman to attend a meeting on the 7th September for the purpose of appointing a committee to apply the means contributed by them in the manner proposed. Need we tell the subscribers that it is their duty to attend the appointed meeting, to see that their views are carried out, and their money properly applied? Need we tell those who have not yet subscribed anything towards so laudable an object, that it is also their duty to open their purse strings, and second the endeavours of their friends? But why should we, when we are confident that they all know their interests and will not be found to hang back in anything tending to advance those interests.

FRONTIER AFFAIRS.

The post of Wednesday last, having arrived about 9 o'clock on the evening of that day, and consequently after the post office had been closed, we were unable to give our readers any Frontier intelligence.

The following is an extract from the *Graham's Town Journal*, which came to hand on that occasion, and appears to indicate that the monotony and inactivity, which have existed for such a length of time, are about to terminate:

Yours obedient Servt.
CORRESPONDENT.
DIVISIONAL BOARDS.
District of Stellenbosch, Aug. 20, 1847.

SIR.—I hope you will not deem it impudent when I request once more to encroach on your columns, in order to communicate my views to the public with respect to the election of Commissioners, and some suggestions for the improvement of the Divisional Board of Roads for the District of Stellenbosch, under present circumstances; and I trust that the worthy men now at the head of our Government will pay special attention to my feeble endeavours, for it behoves them to judge how far the spirit and letter of Ordinance No. 8, 1845, has been hitherto carried out by the Stellenbosch Divisional Board.

In the editorial part of your paper of the 2d August last, you stated, "that the announcement by the Civil Commissioners to the landholders of their districts, to meet for the purpose of electing four persons, to form, with the Civil Commissioner, the Board of Public Roads." This would indeed have been the case, if the object of that liberal institution had been carried out; but the bad experience of the last three years has had an opposite effect upon the minds of the interested in the District of Stellenbosch. This liberal, and by the inhabitants of this district of much applause institution, has failed; all disposable funds are exhausted; and our roads are, also, in a worse state than they were for the last 30 years. And now, Sir, may I (and I trust not inappropriately) ask, to what purpose shall we elect Commissioners? Of what use is a Divisional Board of Roads in the district of Stellenbosch? Shall we elect Commissioners to deal with our disposable funds like the fox and the wolf with their prey—namely, that who can swallow the best has the best title to the booty? Or shall we again repair to the office

The Post of Saturday last, has brought the following intelligence.—
(From the "Cape Frontier Times," Aug. 24.)

TUESDAY MORNING.

There is no intelligence of any moment from the front. Kafirland as well as the colony has been deluged with rain. The detachments of the C.M.R., lately stationed in town, have proceeded to reinforce the forces at the various posts. There are strong rumours abroad; one of these, which seems to have gained much belief, is to the effect, that the Right Hon. the Governor has received peremptory orders from home to finish the war, whether the Kafirs be beaten or not. It is, however, certain that His Excellency has lately received a large heap of dispatches in reply, we believe, not to any of his own communications, but to dispatches sent home by his professor, who, it is known, has given the British Government a rather different notion of the state of things here than that subsequently conveyed by his successor. The contents of the dispatches lately received would, therefore, probably and naturally be of a peaceful character, and this may account for the circulation of the rumour that a peace had been ordered to be made.

It is also certain that a demand has lately been made upon Sandilla by the Governor to comply with certain conditions (we believe with those entered into by him with Sir P. Maitland), that is to restore horses, guns and cattle. There is a report, that this chief has either declared to fulfil these conditions, or is endeavoring to evade them by promises which, of course, he never purposed to fulfil; but on this subject we have no positive information. A few days will probably dispel the uncertainty that is now felt regarding the intended measures of the Government.

The Kafirs say a letter last received from Port Beaufort are "very restless"—about due to 50, have lost their chief there, and have been for two nights in Port Beaufort.

From Philip (Kat River) the Kafirs lately stole 20 head of cattle, which were recaptured by the people of the settlement and one of the mafusas (chiefs) and his wife; valuable fowls were also stolen early on Friday morning from Messrs. from whom the mafusa was wasted all improvements most cease. If there were still disposable means, however (for which provision was naturally made for the maintenance of the roads), I would propose to abolish the Divisional Board of Roads, and instead thereof, to place all rates, whether tolls or assessments, all funds, and whatever is to be done with reference to the opening of any new line of road, in the hands of the Central Board of Roads, who but lately so honorably defended themselves; and it would indeed much gratify me if our Divisional Board of Roads would do so, particularly as they are answerable to their constituents.
