that my gratitude is unbounded. My prayers for the prosperity of our country shall be more fervent; as to my affection for the French, it would become stronger (he added with a smile) if it were possible. I should be happy Colonel, to give you personally a proof of my especial esteem. The Colonel answered, that he would be happy if his Holiness would deign to give him and his wife a token of affection. Here, said the Holy Father, immediately giving him a magnificent chapter with exquisite grace, "here is for your pious wife; and here is something for the brave soldier." The Pope saying these words, gave him the insignia of the order of St. Gregory.

SURRENDER OF ROME.

The entrance of the French troops into Rome was officially announced to the French Legislative Assembly, by M. Dufaure, the Minister of the Interior, on Thursday, when he read the following despatch from General Oudinot:

"The General-in-Chief to the Minister of War. Head-quarters of Santocci, July 2, ten in the evening.—The assault delivered in the sight of the 30th of June has produced the result which I expected. Overtures of submission were made to us last evening by the Roman municipality. Our troops occupy the horizon, No. 9. The gates of St. Paolo, Portes, and St. Pancras have just been opened to us. Arrangements have been made for the occupation of Rome, to be effected in the greatest order. The discipline of our soldiers is equal to their value."

Local chears from the right and centre greeted this announcement. A second despatch, confirmatory of the surrender of Rome, from Admiral Trouvart, was published; in which he adds, "Everything causes it to be believed that the army will be received at Rome on conditions in conformity with the intentions and interests of France." The harvest accounts continue to be most cheering. The cholera declines more and more every day. On Thursday the Assemblée voted the authorisation demanded to prosecute M. Beyer, M. Kopp, M. Hoffer, M. Anstall, and M. Lourion. The elections for Paris take place on Sunday next, and it is most probable that the whole of the Moderates will be returned.

The Hungarians have published a protest against the invasion of Russia, addressed to all free governments. There is a report of a great battle having taken place on the 23rd and 24th ult., above Epuries, between the Russians, under General Czudow, and the Hungarians, under Dembinski.

According to the Czow report, after two days of terrible bloody fighting, the Russians were completely beaten.

The 2nd Polish Legion distinguished themselves greatly. The Vienna "Lithographic Correspondence" on the other hand, while reporting equally a singular struggle on the same day, makes it finish in favour of the Russians. The headquarters of Paskiewitch were, on the 25th ult., at Kaschau. Here there appeared from him a truly Russian proclamation, promulgated by the imperial commissioner, Count Franz Zichy, in which all the inhabitants are called upon to give up all arms of every sort within twenty-four hours, or, on pain of being thrust out by the spears of the Cossacks, or hanged, according to circumstances. A second ordinance of Paskiewitch's at Kaschau, commands the delivering up of all Kossoff bank notes within four times twenty-four hours, under pain of corporal punishment. From the south we learn that Pansel has crossed the Theiss and united his corps with the division of Ben's corps before Temeswar. Ben himself is in Transylvania.—*The Examiner*, July 7.

ANTI-CONVICT ASSOCIATION.

A T THE Public Meeting of the Inhabitants of Cape Town, held at the Town Hall this day, Saturday, the 29th of September, 1849.

J. B. EDEN, Esq., in the Chair,

The following Resolutions were passed:—

1. That the Inhabitants feel compelled, by a sense of duty to themselves, their children, their friends, and their country, and fully justified in the sight of God and man, in the exercise of their undoubted rights and privileges as British subjects, to put into immediate operation all those means of self-protection which are expressed in the Pledge.

2. That the words, "any person who may assist in supporting convicted felons," include all departments, by or through, or under the authority of which supplies of any kind are conveyed to the Neptune, until the vessel's destination be changed, and until supplies are required to enable her to prosecute her voyage.

3. That the chief departments responsible for, or directly instrumental in the detention of the Neptune are,—the Head of all the departments, including the Executive Council.

2. The Commissariat and Naval Departments.

4. That this Colony, being formally degraded into a Penal Settlement, a party of Convicts living actually within its limits, is the opinion of the inhabitants that all colonists, who may be called upon to act in the management of such convicts, if landed, such as Field Cornets and Justices of the Peace, may lawfully resign their commission.
