HOWEVER great may be the victory just achieved, not so is the duty resting upon the Colonists to profit by it, and to exert themselves at once for the attainment of those higher immunities of which, as the subjects of a free and enlightened Government, they have been too long deprived.

It would indeed be of little avail were they to view the asserting of the moral stain as the consummation of all their wishes, and now to evince any indifference with respect to the momentous subjects, the want of which—especially during the late excitement—was so seriously felt, as solely calculated to protect them against the abuse of power, and to secure them the full enjoyment of that real liberty, without which life possesses no real value, and which every Briton therefore justly considers his birthright.

England's extensive Colonial Empire is just beginning to insist on this right, and the general cry of the Colonists is that they are no slaves, and that the Colonies, as integral portions of the parent state, claim the same noble institutions of which the mother country so justly boasts.

More than once, nay, constantly, the Cape Colonists have joined in the cry, although without avail; and this would have been unavailing, had not the Colonial Minister lately afforded them just reason to become indifferent of those really great privileges. Morally degraded and threatened to become the associates of convicted criminals, they for a moment lost sight of all other subjects, and left nothing undone to avenge the insult received at his hands, and by the most efficient, although peaceful and constitutional means, to obtain redress. In this they have succeeded. They are again in the same state as they were in before the pernicious project—now merely known as a matter of history—entered the brain of Mylord GREY. But is even this state so honorable—so dignified—that the Colonists should feel no uneasiness at it? In comparison with the degradation just named, certainly, but not in comparison with that which they ought to occupy, for which they are fully qualified, without which they can no longer be left. They lack everything. They are nominally a free people,—compelled to kiss the rod by which they are occasionally unmercifully chastised. Hitherto they have had no voice in the government;—their hard earned money,—contributed in the shape of severe taxes,—have been wasted, and the treasury exhausted. Confidence in their Courts of Justice has been shaken, whilst at many places there is an absolute want of the same. Who will deny that such is their actual position at present, and would it not—with these facts before us—be the greatest folly—no highly commendable indifference, to sit down with folded arms, imagining that they lack nothing, whilst, strictly speaking, they are poor and naked, literally deprived of everything calculated to make them happy as a people, and to secure them against such calamities as they lately had to contend against? Tyrants and fools, and the friends and supporters of such, may assert the contrary, but we maintain, that their present position is really an enviable one, and that if they do not extricate themselves from it, they will ere long perceive to their injury and shame that however great and glorious may have been the late victory, they would act very imprudently in laying down their arms as soon, instead of availing themselves of the advantages obtained, and remaining in the field until they have obtained their complete liberation.

We do not censure their present relaxation. Their thanksgivings and festivities are very appropriate. They have ample reason for both. But we feel constrained even at this early moment to raise the voice of exhortation. Ere long we may again be on the move. As yet we do not enjoy real liberty. This treasure is still in prospect. Once more they must arm for battle. By prudence, firmness and courage—by their high moral tone and bearing, they have lately commanded respect, and it will be their own fault if, by lukewarmness or apathy, they give rise to the presumption that they require nothing more, and that the present particular concession has for ever set at rest all their former complaints and grievances. We repeat it, that at such dangerous conclusions the Colonists should be thoughtful, and we desire to remind them how much it behooves them by their future conduct strenuously and scrupulously to guard against the same.

The Vestry of the Dutch Reformed Church in Cape Town have appointed Friday, the 8th March next, as a day of public thanksgiving. It appears to us that they have appointed this late date with the view of enabling all the Country Churches to join in this solemn work, and we have no doubt but their object will be realized.

Anti-Convict Association.

A Meeting of the Anti-Convict Association, held in the Town Hall, this day, Tuesday, J. J. L. SMUTS, Esq., in the Chair.

Letters were read from W. BLOM, Esq., Treasurer of the Worcester Anti-Convict Association, enclosing £20, and from S. V. K. du Toit, Esq., of Uitenhage, enclosing £30, being the amount subscribed towards the Indemnity Fund at Worcester and Stellenbosch for the present time.

Letters relating to the Indemnity Fund, from the Rev. Mr. Ham of French Hoek, from W. Smith, Esq., Chairman of the Anti-Convict Association at Port Elizabeth, and from G. W. Bosh, Esq., of Stellenbosch, were also read.

A letter was read from C. J. Kemper, Esq., Chairman of the Anti-Convict Association at Oudorp, announcing its formation and enclosing copies of Resolutions.

Moved by Rev. G. Morgan, seconded by J. Fairbairn, Esq., and carried unanimously.
