"That the Lord may abundantly bless with his grace the labours of the Synodal Deputation to our emigrant fellow countrymen and brethren in Christ,—that our beloved Pastor may be spared and once be crowned with the reward of a good and faithful servant, is the hearty prayer of your correspondent."

CAPE TOWN, January 24, 1849. SIR,—Having been appointed by the Cape Town Presbytery who held their session in October last, to form a committee for the purpose of making a representation to his Excellency the Governor with reference to a communication addressed to the Rev. G. W. A. van der Lingen as Chairman of the said Presbytery, by you under date 30th August last, in which it is stated in regard to the appointment of the Rev. Dr. Reitz, as Minister of the Church at Somerset (West.) that the Secretary of State has under consideration at present the matter relative to the amount of stipend payable to the ministers, receiving allowances from the Government, and that if his Lordship shall direct that the aid from the parishes shall be equal to that given by the Government in all appointments subsequent to a stated period, Dr. Reitz, if the date of his appointment fall within that time, will of course be made liable to the regulation.— We have accordingly respectfully to submit to his Excellency for his favourable consideration. That ever since the establishment of this colony, the Ministers of the Dutch Reformed Church, have without interruption, continued to form a part of the fixed establishment of the Government of this Colony, and have been paid their several stipends from the general treasury. That in conformity with the capitulation signed at the surrender of the colony, under date 10th January 1806 and confirmed by that concluded on the 10th following by Sir David Baird, it was stipulated that the burghers and inhabitants should continue to enjoy all the rights and privileges they had previously enjoyed, and that public Worship, as in use, should also be maintained without alteration. That although it might be advanced, that by the Church Ordinance of Commissary General De Mist of the year 1804, as well as by the Ordinance of the Governor in Council of this Colony of the 8th November 1843, it was declared, that the salaries of the clergy could never be claimed as a matter of right, yet every thing in regard to the same, has remained, hitherto on the old footing, and the government, evidently considering the equity and sound policy thereof, has done nothing yet, towards diminishing any of the existing stipends to ministers of the Dutch Reformed Church. That in the event of the proposed measure being carried into effect, no other result can be expected than that the whole remuneration of the ministers would consist of what they would be allowed from the public treasury, it being evident to every one acquainted with the public in general, that many of the congregations of the Dutch Reformed Church in this Colony, are unable to give beyond what they contribute to the general public revenues out of which, as we have heretofore stated, the stipends of the Ministers of the Dutch Reformed Church have hitherto invariably and wholly been defrayed. That Ministers of the Dutch R-reformed Church, before they are admitted as such, or allowed to exercise any church functions, are bound to follow a regular course of theological study at some one of the European Universities, and that for the purpose of such a study, a regular stipend is required to be made on the part of their parents, friends or themselves. That if the moiety of the amount now granted for the support of the ministers be taken from them, the remainder would not be a compensation much less than an adequate remuneration for the expense and study of those, who have devoted themselves to the pastoral and ministerial office, and would not even be sufficient for their mere support, much less enable them to keep up the respectability of their office, as they would then receive less than almost any school master or government clerk. That a considerable amount is annually raised from each congregation of the Dutch Reformed Church to the payment of the expenses of the Presbyteries, which are held annually, as also of the Synods, which assemble every fifth year, that payment amounting to a sum of £205 per annum. That the general satisfaction of the inhabitants of this Colony,—the greater part of whom are members of the Dutch Reformed Church, may be anticipated at the proposed measure if it becomes known and is carried into effect, whilst on the contrary the system hitherto followed has given general satisfaction. Humbly trusting that the above mentioned reasons will receive his Excellency's favourable consideration, and may have the effect, to induce his Excellency, not only to press the adoption of the proposed measure, but to recommend its abandonment, we have the honor to be, Sir, your most obedient servants, (Signed) A. THE following is from Camp Ramnugger, the 8th instant:—"I have no news to give you. Since Sir J. Thackerall's affair is now going on, and he has made no move higher than the 3rd instant, I have written some letters to him, but he has not sent me any answer since he left the river to join him. It is said that the Sikhs are entrenching themselves strongly on the left bank of the Jelum near Jelapora and it is not improbable that we may drive them out of their position in a few days."—Englishman, 19 Dec.

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A correspondent of the Mysulianite, writing from Ramnugger on the 10th instant, mentions that, with the exception of Penny's infantry brigade and a part of Pope's cavalry, all the forces there had moved or were about to move forward to the advanced position at Hillah. The Commander-in-Chief had crossed and the heavy artillery was then in process of transit. The same writer says that news had been received that the British force had crossed the river and was not on any account to cross the Jelum. If such a prohibition has been issued, we cannot anticipate a decisive engagement as likely to occur so soon; for we are not disposed to believe that Sher Singh will show fight with the Jelum at his back, and if our troops are not allowed to cross the river to get at him, he will be able to laugh at them from the other bank. It is possible, however, that orders may be given to the British force to cross the Jelum, and to the Mooltan division of the army is available for co-operation with that under Lord Gough. Lord Dalhousie, with a sufficient force, having an opinion on military matters, for with propriety may have voted against another victory, like that of the Churnab.
