DE ZUID-AFRIKAAN

KAAPSTAD, DEN 12 DECEMBER 1850

De Grensbewoners zyn ongetwyfeld de beste be-
oordelaars van den tegenwoordigen toestand van
saken in hunne onmiddelyke nabijheid.—Zy mogen
geene onmiddelyke vredebreuk vreesen; maar de
uitebreide strooperyen thans door de Kaffers ge-
pleegd, zyn voorzeker ten vollen bereik om in te
vermoeden te doen ontstaan dat zulk e ne vrede-
breuk aan het naderen is.

Gedurende zyn jongste bezoek in Britsch Kaffra-
ria heeft Zyne Excellentie zyn uiterste best gedaan
om de grensbewoners te overtuigen dat de Kaffers
geene vyandelyke voornemens koestren,—hunne
vrees het gevolg niet van een gestreng onderzoek.
Zy stunden slechts op uiterlyke teekenen en de
verklaring der Opperhoofden.

Volgende gebeurtenissen hebben evenwel getoond,
dat er op zulk g. tuisgenis geen vertruwen kan
worden gesteld; en, waarschynlyk bywast van de
bedriegelyke rol door de Opperhoofden gespeeld, is
Zyne Excellentie verpligt geweest het tooneel van
verraad andermaal te bezoeken. Wat zal hy nu
doen?—Het volk op de grenzen verlangt in vrede
en rust te leven; maar in plaats hiervan moeten zy
op e. nige plaatsen rondzweren en zich op andere
verschanen, omdat leven en eigendom beide onveilig
worden beschouwd.—Zullen zy de vereischte
zekerheid bekomen? Maar hoe?—Sir HARRY
SMITH, zegt men, heeft het Gouvernement te huis
de verzekering gegeven dat hy instaat was de Kaffers
met een hand-ol troepen te regeren, en zond
het grootste gedeelte van hen die alhier gestation-
neerd waren, naar huis.—Hy verliet zich op de
voorgenomen oprigting eener militie—maar het volk
weigerde te dienen; de militaire dorpen van welke
krachtigheid hy zo veel vernamen, mistakten,
en hier zy wy, op het einde van 1850, met een
Kaffer-zamenrotting welke staat los te barsten, ter-
wyl talryke rooverijen plaats vinden, en z. n. d. r. e.
genoezame magt om eerstgem. te bedwingen of
laattgem. tegen te gaan.

Dat zulk eene zamenrotting of vereeniging, waar-
op wy juist gedoeld hebben, plaats gevonden heeft,
lydt geen twyfel. De geschiedenis der jongste
afzetting van SANDILLI bewyst de daarsaak vol-
komen. Al de opperhoofden erkennen de regtva-
rdigheid van dien staet,—zyne eigen moeder, SUTU,
verklaarde hem onwaardig om langer opperhoofd te
zyn; maar nauwlyks heeft Zyne Excellentie de
grenzen verlaten, of wy zien, dat, in stede van al-
den verwoording door de andere hoofden te worden
behandeld—hy eene conferentie houdt met
KREILIE, het grootste of voornaamste opperhoofd
van Kafferland, neen meer, wy zien dat MACOMO
en ANTA zich openlyk by hem voegen, verklarende
vast besloten te hebben om zyn gezag met geweld
te handhaven.

Het vyandelyk voornemen der Kaffers kan ge-
volglyk niet langer in twyfel worden getrokken. Het
bepaalt zich niet slechts tot de kraal van SANDILLI,
maar kan algemeen worden beschouwd. Pato's
verklaring van trouw aan het Gouvernement is
niet waard. Het is slechts eene soort van onzijdig-
heid, zoodanig eene als welke hem instaat zal stellen
de roof uit de kolonie te ontvangen. Noch zal
KREILIE stil zitten; inderdaad, kan zyn huwelyk
en dat van twee zynere voornaamste Heemraden
met dochters van FAKU, het Amapoda opperhoofd,
in den tegenwoordigen staat van zaken beschouwd
worden als een verlangen aan den dag leggende
om een eenigzins nauwer bondgenootschap aan-
tegaan.

Wat dan, vraen wy andermaal, zal de Gou-
verneur doen? Is hy instaat enen slag toete-
hengen, of zal de oude manier van lappen weder
te baat genomen worden? Het zal thans eenig-
zins moeilyk zyn om de kolonisten te overtuigen,
dat hunne beduchtheden ongegrond zyn; want,
zy weten beter, noch zullen halve maatregelen hen
tevreden stellen, daar deselve hen geene veiligheid
verschaffen zal.

Wy kunnen ons de vrelgenheid goed verbeel-
den waarin Zyne Excellentie thans den tegenwoor-
digen toestand van zaken geplaatst is, maar wy
hopen dat, welke maatregelen hy ook ter hand
moge nemen, om zich uit zynen tegenwoordigen
neteligen toestand te redden, de uitslag moge
byken voordelig te zyn voor de voortdurende
vrijheid der grenzen.

Onze Correspondent J. L., zal merken dat
wy gedeelyk aan zyn verzoek hebben voldaan.

What then, we ask again, will the Governor do? Is he prepared to strike a blow, or will the old mode of patching be again resorted to? It will be somewhat difficult now to persuade the colonists that their fears are unfounded.
