THE ZUID-AFRIKAAN.

CAPETOWN, DECEMBER 12 1850.

The inhabitants of the frontier districts are undoubtedly the best judges of the present state of things in their immediate neighbourhood. They may not apprehend an immediate rapture, but unquestionably the wholesale depredations which are now carried on by the Kafirs are fully calculated to induce the belief that a rapture is fast approaching.

His Excellency the Governor, during his late visit to British Kaffraria, strove very hard to convince the frontier people that no hostile intentions were entertained by the Kafirs—their fears were unfounded—but his assurances were not the result of rigid inquiry—they rested merely upon outward appearances and the declaration of the chiefs.

Subsequent events however, have shown what reliance can be placed upon such testimony: and, probably aware of the deceitful game which has been played by the Chiefs, His Excellency has been necessitated once more to make his appearance at the seat of treachery. What will he do? The people on the Frontier desire to live in peace & quiet, but instead thereof they have to move about in some, and to barricade themselves in other places, because life and property are both deemed insecure. Will they obtain the requisite security? But how? Sir HARRY SMITH, it is said, assured the Home Government that he would be able to rule the Kafirs with the aid of a few troops and sent the greater part of those stationed here home. He relied on the intended establishment of a Militia, but the people refused to serve;—the traders, notwithstanding the heavy taxes imposed by the Government, notwithstanding the fact that the Kafirs had continually exploited large sums for materials &c., and he obtained little support from other corn farmers, in an undertaking, which both for them and the whole country, must be considered a blessing, and by which the price of labor, which rises from year to year during the harvest, must necessarily decrease. With this machine the greatest expense of a corn farmer is reduced, and Mr. Naude declares that he can now rest satisfied with R.R. 100 per load of wheat, whereas, on account of the ruinous price of labor, he was scarcely remunerated by £10 per load, and that he actually intended to apply himself to cattle breeding only. Mr. N. intends, during the next harvest season, to set up a machine, double the size of the present model machine, and drawn by two horses, and to bring it to the Agricultural Exhibition in Cape Town. I trust therefore that the more opulent farmers of this district will support him, in order to enable him to complete it, and it is to be hoped that not only the Agricultural Societies, but also the Government will deem it their duty to reward the enterprising genius of a persevering Colonist.

A NEW REAPING MACHINE.

Mr. Jacob Stephanus Naude, Esq., an entreprenuring young farmer, in the district of Worcester, has at last succeeded to complete a Reaping Machine, which completely answers the purpose. It was lately tried, and with one horse and two men it cuts in one hour a *skepel* (about a bushel) seed, consequently at least two loads apiece a half per day. To do this with a sickle in one day, fifteen reapers are required. The machine cuts a space of three feet, and where it went over the land, it appeared as if the stubbles had been cut in a row. It collects everything in the box fixed to the machine, which continually empties itself in bags. The ears which are lost, are not worth mentioning, and the waste is half less than by cutting with the sickle. Mr. Naude has been busy with this undertaking for the last three years, and although ridiculed and disengaged him persevered. He has altered the machine or commenced it anew at least twelve times and has made three experiments during this season, the last of which completely answered his expectation. Mr. Naude, although not a tradesman, constructed the best part of the machine himself, notwithstanding he had continually expended large sums for materials &c., and he

obtained little support from other corn farmers, in an undertaking, which both for them and the whole country, must be considered a blessing, and by which the price of labor, which rises from year to year during the harvest, must necessarily decrease. With this machine the greatest expense of a corn farmer is reduced, and Mr. Naude declares that he can now rest satisfied with R.R. 100 per load of wheat, whereas, on account of the ruinous price of labor, he was scarcely remunerated by £10 per load, and that he actually intended to apply himself to cattle breeding only. That such a combination, or coalition, to which we have just adverted, has taken place, will allow of no doubt. The history of Sandilli's recent deposition establishes this fact most completely. All the Chiefs concurred in the justice of the step,—his own mother (Suto) declared him unworthy to be any longer a Chief; but no sooner has His Excellency left the Frontier than we find him, instead of being treated as an outcast by the other Chiefs, holding a conference with Krili, the paramount Chief of Kaffraria; nay more, we find Mac and Anata openly joining him and declaring their determination to maintain his authority by force.

The hostile intention of the Kafirs, then, is no longer matter of doubt. It is not merely confined to the kraal of SANDILLI, but may be considered general. PATO's declaration of fidelity to the Queen's Government is of worth a straw. It is merely a kind of neutrality, such as will enable him to receive the plunder of the Colony. Nor will KRELLI "sit still"; in fact, his own marriage as well as that of his chief councillors with the daughters of FAKU, the Amaponda Chief, may be looked upon, in the present state of things, as indicating a desire to form a somewhat closer alliance.
