CAPE TOWN, SEPTEMBER 27, 1849.

At the meeting of the people, at 9 o'clock on Monday last, the Governor's reply, elsewhere inserted, was read by the Chairman of the Anti-Convict Association. Occasional outbursts of laughter and indignation sufficiently indicated that it was deemed by no means satisfactory, and notwithstanding the able speeches of Messrs. ANSELL, MANNING and WIGHT in support of a resolution to "adjourn the meeting till 2 o'clock on Saturday next," it required all the eloquence of the Chairman to convince the assemblage that such a course was desirable, inasmuch as time was required to consult legal authorities and generally to rebut the special pleadings comprised in the Governor's elaborate "Notice."

There was an evident determination on the part of the people—to apply the Pledge at once; but no resolution to that effect was moved. This, it should be borne in mind, is not to be attributed to any fear on the part of the association for the frowns or threats of the Governor, or the bullets and bayonets of the soldiery, a number of whom are said to have been kept under arms during the day. It was only because the time for such a proceeding, or rather of formally recommending it, had not yet arrived. And when it is recollected that the naval department at Simon's Town and the Neptune are already placed under the ban, and that the people there are doing their duty to each other, all parties will agree that the present mode of proceeding is a sound one.

The sum total of the Governor's reply, our readers will perceive, is, that he cannot comply with the demand of the colonists to send away the Neptune, because it would be illegal. "From England to Bermuda, from Bermuda to the Cape, and whilst at anchor in Simon's Bay," the convicts are legally confined, "so say his legal advisers,"—and if the officers in charge of them were to carry them out of the waters of this Colony without authority, to some unknown destination, they would be liable to resist, and in their endeavor to gain liberty, be justified in taking life; "and any soldier, sailor, or other person whomsoever, who, in representing a rising of the convicts, should take life, would in law be guilty of murder."

Mr. HARRY SMITH has apparently lost sight of the fact, now most clearly established, that he has been grossly deceived by Earl Grey. His insinuations have reference to "tickets-of-leave men" and men "with conditional pardons"—not to Convicts having no claim to be set at liberty. Whilst it would have been impossible for him to detain the first, he is quite at liberty to reject what was never contemplated. But these men, such as they are, are directed to him. Upon him, therefore, devolves the power to issue such instructions, as he shall deem fit, to the surgeon in charge, relative to their destination. The Convicts are in the hands of the Executive, by whom their destination can be changed at any time; and as the representative of that Executive, or of Majesty itself, he would be justified in issuing such instructions;—hence the fallacy of his position that they would be sent adrift on the high seas without authority. He should moreover bear in mind that these men are not sentenced to transportation to any particular place, in consequence of which they might resist any attempt to send them to any other, and that should they therefore revolt, if sent back to Bermuda or elsewhere, by his direction, such revolt would be illegal, and that any one of them taking life, would in law be guilty of murder, consequently, that any soldier, sailor or other person is at liberty, as in the case of matiny on the high seas, to repress violence, if need be, by force of arms; and that any person taking life, under such circumstances, commits what in law is termed justifiable homicide!

We have on a former occasion already alluded to this topic, and we had indeed hoped to find that no attempt would again be made by the Governor's legal advisers to make the public swallow such nonsense. It is indeed most impolitic to lay down such principles of law, and whether the party who thus defines the law of liberty, relative to convicts,—men who have lost all title to freedom—be Mr. Justice MENZIES, Mr. Attorney General PORTER, or any other gentlemen of the long robe, we would warn them seriously to reflect upon the consequences that might result from such injudicious definitions. The Colonists are at present engaged in a struggle for the preservation of moral liberty, and if the aforesaid dogma holds true, the question necessarily arises, whether they also have not the right to oppose by force any attempt to violate or crush that liberty, and whether any soldier or other person whomsoever, who shall take life in the repression of such a struggle, would not be guilty of murder? These gentlemen might endeavor to draw a line of distinction between the two cases, but we can assure them that, with this explanation of the law before them, they would find themselves in a serious difficulty.

We do not argue thus because we anticipate any act which would call for the application of such law; on the contrary, we would warn the people, whilst exercising the pledge, to look on with folded arms; and let, whatever aggression there may be, be committed by the Government; their motto should remain "faith, unity and peace." The Governor's repeated insults of doubling guards and parading armed soldiery, we repeat, should be as little calculated to give occasion for the display of "Boonplaats valor," as the ridiculous definition of the law just exposed. We tell the Governor, that if any such notions be entertained, they will never be realized. Whilst the Cape Colonists are united as one man in resisting wrong and in upholding their rights as British Subjects,—they are determined to do so constitutionally. They know that violence would lead to no good purpose;—and hence, whilst firmly and passively continuing their struggle, they proceed step by step to the sure attainment of the great end in view—the removal of the Neptune and her vile cargo!

Since the above was in type, we observed the following in the Advertiser of yesterday, which we cannot without remark, convinced that the Anti-Convict Association will deem it their duty to ascertain the particulars therein stated officially, and to lay the same before the adjourned meeting on Saturday next in that form, together with their

opinion thereon. The resolutions to be then adopted will direct the future proceedings, not only of this town but of the whole colony, and are therefore anxiously awaited. If ever, throughout the whole of the agitation of the subject, there was a time when vigilance, but at the same time calmness of mind, was requisite on the part of the public, that time is certainly the present. The matter has reached a crisis. The responsibility to land and to disperse the Convicts here,—fully substantiated by the Colonists—is candidly admitted by the Governor,—the simple question now arises, whether further means are to be adopted to convince his Excellency of the impossibility likewise to detain the Neptune and her cargo in the waters of this colony longer than may be absolutely necessary.

"In the meantime it is proper to inform the public that the Executive Council has granted permission to the members of the Executive Council to state, and the Honorable Mr. Field has had the goodness to do so, that his Excellency finds himself justified by the circumstances of the colony, not to land or permit to be landed, any of the Convicts on board the Neptune,—but he has in a series of despatches recommended to Her Majesty's Government, that in carrying out Earl Grey's instructions with respect to them, to be impossible, and that, consequently, their destination must be changed; that he has, in the most urgent terms endeavored to impress upon Her Majesty's Government, the necessity of revoking the Order in Council of the 4th September, 1849; and that should be, contrary to all national expectations, creative from Her Majesty, any order, or letter of authority, instructing him to land any of the Convicts, he would consider that such order or orders were issued by Her Majesty in ignorance of the circumstances of the case, and would not put them in force. All this may be relied on.

It has been further affirmed, and from the manner in which it has gone abroad, it is believed to be correct, "that once what will, Mr. Henry Smith, has resolved, never to become the instrument of landing a convict in this Colony as in a Penal Settlement."

Since the arrival of the Convict Ship, and the announcement of the Governor's determination to keep her at anchor in Simon's Bay, Mr. H. E. LORDOLFF has seen fit to add his resignation to the many others which have already resulted from this iniquitous measure. From all we hear, the people in the country districts are determined upon carrying out the Pledge. More than this it is not necessary to say. But we venture to add one word. We have ascertained that the Magistrate of Malmesbury has thought proper to order the post boy not to ride across the farm of Mr. ALBERTIN, who lately resigned his office of Fieldcornet. In how far he does we know not; but we say that this arbitrary act of withholding from Mr. ALBERTIN the only means of obtaining his newspapers and letters is most unjustifiable, and earnestly calls for the interference of superior authority:—

Sir,—As the Neptune with her pestiferous cargo of Convicts has arrived in Simon's Bay, and his Excellency the Governor persists in his pernicious measure of keeping them here,—I, however willing to serve this my dear beloved Native Land to the utmost of my abilities, feel myself in duty bound to my family and fellow countrymen to resign my situation as member of the Malmesbury Divisional Road Board, of which you will be pleased to give the necessary intimation to his Excellency.
