As it seems to be the object of a certain party, from motives best known to themselves, to represent to the world that the inhabitants of this colony are dissatisfied and unwilling to turn out to Kofriand...

The following documents are in course of signature at Swellendam. - MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY, - We, the undersigned faithful and loyal inhabitants of the district of Swellendam, have read with grief and disgust a statement put forth by the Editor of the Graham's Town Journal in his paper of the 23rd January 1851...

Reader, those ignorant and infuriated savages, dancing wildly on this scene of blood are but puppets. Look closely in the remote distance, and you will discover the wires that move them.

Having observed with deep regret, that an opinion prevails in certain quarters, that the Burghers or white inhabitants of this colony manifest in general an indifference about the unhappy condition in which the Frontier Districts have again, through the perfidy of some of the Kafir tribes, been unfortunately plunged...

At this meeting, after a full discussion of the matter, the Burghers present declared by a show of hands, which seemed to be universal, their readiness when called upon, notwithstanding the existing difficulties, to proceed to the scene of war, and the Acting Civil Commissioner who was also present requested to communicate to your Excellency that declaration...
