

very satisfactory account of the position of our forces in South Africa. It is evident, both from the nature of the late occurrences and from Earl Grey's avowal last night of the total "unexpectation" of the rebellion, that the extent of the outbreak was not anticipated by the Governor, and that he has suffered the usual evils of a surprise. On the other hand, reinforcements were expected from Natal; we are officially assured by Lord Grey that the military force at the Cape, which will shortly be strengthened by reinforcements from this country, has not, in Sir Harry Smith's judgment, been reduced below the point of efficiency; and the colonists have probably, since they have enrolled themselves in sufficient numbers to ensure the protection of the frontier. Nor can we omit to dwell with hope and satisfaction, both as regards the immediate and the remote issues of the present rebellion, on the natural tendency of a common danger and a common struggle to extinguish those sectional jealousies and animosities which have heretofore impeded the peace of our South African possessions, and to cement a closer union among all classes of our colonial fellow-subjects. We await the result, therefore, with little apprehension beyond that somewhat sordid one which the very name of a Kafir war only too vividly recalls to the national mind. Whether, as our neighbors say, *le feu va bruler la chandelle*, in this case any more than in the last, may possibly be doubted. But it is not clear that the reason for canvassing the policy of holding Kaffaria is not now, while our tenure is assailed, if not jeopardized. The country must be pacified, cost what it may, before the question of retaining it can be re-opened; and we have no doubt that Sir Harry Smith is right in reminding the colonists that the abandonment, at the present juncture, of a single outpost, and the flight to a point of no return, border chief in a trice to the ranks of the enemy.

A similar remark may excuse us from attempting to enter into the merits of a cause which now stands over to be tried by the *ultima ratio*. What offences Sandhill committed between the first Kafir meeting, when Sir Harry offered to protect him as a son, and the second great conference, when his Excellency deemed that it was possible to be safe on his shoulders if the Queen should hear that he had let Sandhill off, we do not pretend to determine. It is certain that the farmers on the frontier had taken the alarm at what they saw going on around them, before the outbreak commenced; and Sandhill's refusal to meet the Governor may have been sufficient proof to his Kaffars of his complicity in the maintenance of his brethren in their idle and unproductive state on the possible causes of a rebellion which is yet unprovoked; and we leave this unwelcome subject with the remark that our Colonial Secretary's avowal of his utter ignorance of the present measures and intentions of Sir Harry Smith appears to be equally applicable to the past policy of that very gallant officer, but most eccentric, unselfish, and unfortunate Governor.

STATEMENT OF THE PRESENT CAPE CASE.

(From Mr. Adderley's pamphlet bearing the above title.)

XIX. *Differences between the two Constitutions.* Mr. Fairbairn is firm in his sixteen articles, as Shylock to his bond; and the articles are more definite and attainable than Antonio's pound of flesh. Their principal difference from the counter proposition of the Crown Commissioners is, that they are the people's own choice; and that, alone, according to the gracious offer of her Majesty, should give them the decisive preference, and deprive the rival scheme of all title to consideration. Her Majesty cannot refuse the rights which she has graciously conceded, even if she wished to do so. What is to be thought of the Minister who has given her Majesty's policy a character so unlike herself? Junius once said that a good Minister should take the odium of the Crown's disagreeable work, and not arrogate the credit of what is gracious; but how have the smiles of royalty in this case been turned into frowns?

The difference in detail between the people's and the Government's constitution are, 1st, in the mode of election to the upper chamber; and 2d, in the governor's power to dissolve; and 3rd, in the control over public expenditure. The elected Quinquennial propose to arrive at the required dignity for an upper house by subjecting each member to the choice of the whole colony, the qualification being little higher than for the lower house, but the area of election differing. They fear the absurd official influence may creep in through the higher qualifications proposed for the purpose by the Government. Certainly the attempt to infuse crown influence through every portion of colonial constitutions is the besetting sin of the Schools of Downing-street, and its school throughout the world. The necessity of making both estates perfectly independent, as well of the Crown as of each other, is a first principle in the full-grown British constitution, now to be granted to the swaddled and big-governed British offspring.

On the second point, the same fear guides the colonists to ask for a simultaneous dissolution of both Houses. Their argument is, that it is allowed that an upper House cannot be formed of a different class so as to represent a separate estate and interest like the Peers of Great Britain, but is to spring from popular election as well as the lower House, only serving as an instrument of greater deliberation and of second thoughts—checking a too hasty legislation on first impulses—an appeal to the constituency of one House, naturally involves an appeal to the constituency of the other, being one and the same body. The question must be decided by abstract argument, as there is certainly no precedent or exact analogy to be found on either side of the Atlantic; but if I fear the Cape is at present asking for a guarantee of their responsibility in the working of their government, which they have not first secured in its basis. They do not go far enough, but, like Lord Grey himself, they propose a patch of representation here, and a patch there, and the rent is only made worse. They are, however, more likely to succeed than Lord Grey, by the very reason of not touching an inevitable gain ground by what he only retards an inevitable loss. Even if Sir Harry Smith had not attempted to divert his constituent Council from their proper work, it is very doubtful whether the Cape would have gained much by the constitution which such a Council would have elaborated. The officials had the majority, and were avowedly hostile to the amount of reform that they were asked to effect by the imperial authorities, and ready to use their advantage to impede and neutralize its progress. *Fortes nascitur furibus*: an official constituent will produce an official not a representative government. The attempt to neutralize the promised popularity by official overruling in the constitutional assembly, is the most inflexible and uncontrollable existence a popular convention. This is true; but the natural consequence of half and contradictory measures in dealing with popular rights and claims. It strikingly illustrates the *Colonial Reformers'* arguments on the Australian constitution. They were sneered at for attempting to do what the colonies could do better for themselves. We shall now see what they pretend to let the colonies do for themselves. The convention will now become the constituent body with a vengeance—our only remaining safety is in the tried calmness and moderation of the Cape people.

The ninety persons in Cape Town, alluded to above, who met as representatives of the mercantile interest, and petitioned her Majesty to sanction the Constitution drafted by the official Commissioners, also suggested a modification of their own, which might be called a third scheme of Constitution under consideration.

noted that the choice between the two no longer existed in the case of the Cape. Too great advances towards the recognition of British rights had already been made, to make it safe or possible to recede.

But what said the Chief Justice Wylde? His testimony, not to the impossibility of refusing, but to the propriety of conceding British rights to Cape Colonists, is this: "As to the legislative competency of the colony, no doubt has been, or can be raised as to the sufficient extent of its population, its revenue, commerce, or general public interests."

The Attorney General Fox bears witness that the lower orders of this colony see in general an orderly well conducted class of people, and attached to the British constitution and connection.

Martin, even in his first edition, describes Cape Town as the most English looking town, except Sydney, in all our colonies. The population (so long ago) was 20,000; the squares were well laid out, the streets clean, the public edifices handsome; through the week was heard the busy hum of industry, and on Sundays the Church going bell. The education of the people is notoriously better looked after than in England. How many communities less fit for self government have enjoyed and are enjoying it? How few are more fit, if any could be more so!

What is asked for South Africa?—Emancipation from England? Separation? No, but the emancipation of separation—fair treatment—the rule of an English colony on English principles. Thus may it become a thriving outpost of the empire instead of a jobbed location. Thus may we have a real *pied à terre* on our Indian and Australian route, where if we please, we may place our forts, and naval stations, dockyards, or ports, and among friends and fellow-countrymen. And if a future, like that of India's history, opens on our African frontiers, we may find on the spot a self acting power controlling and regulating a destined extension of empire, without adding another chapter of speculation, and waste, and bloodshed to the annals of our own country.

But if representative institutions be withheld, or only partially given, still more if the promise of them be retracted or neutralized, we shall not only have a colony of dogged discontent to deal with, but there will spring up from our frontiers, a new series of disputes, and rival sovereignties of subjects turned into rebel refugees.

POSTSCRIPT. Monday Morning, 8 o'clock.

The substance of the intelligence from headquarters, which is to the 3rd of May, is given below:—"The patrol returned yesterday, Col. Mackinnon's at 11 a.m. Wilmot's at 3 p.m."

The troops in this day's march were not attacked by the Kafirs, though they were hovering in numbers all around, neither did Col. Mackinnon make any vigorous movement to engage them. Two or three shots from a big gun was the total of the amunition spent. The following is an extract from a General Order, dated 3d May, in reference to Major Wilmot's late patrol:—"The patrol under Major Wilmot returned to head quarters on the afternoon of the 2d inst., having most ably carried out his instructions in five successive day's operations through the location of the chiefs Seyolo, Stook, Zizini, Souto, and Tola, inflicting upon them the miseries of war. Twice did he well engage the enemy, drove them into the old Port Willshire, which they held in force, and which he stormed and carried with the Royal Artillery and Royal Sappers and Miners, under Capt. Robertson, R.E., and the detachment 234 Regt. under Lieut. Knox. Major Wilmot with his small force so judiciously posted it in ambush and otherwise, as to cause the enemy a loss of upwards of 30 men, having in his column only three (not severely) wounded."

It is with sincere regret we record the death of the Rev. Mr. Beck, long the zealous and deservedly respected Missionary of the South African Society. His death occurred on the voyage to St. Helena, whither he had proceeded for the recovery of his health.
