It was accordingly the duty of the Government to take care that no material advantage should be derived by these marauders. Gunpowder is said to be the principal object, and should they succeed in their enterprise the effect on the Kafirs will be very prejudicial to the Colony.

The Governor was very desirous of recovering the captured cattle, but we understand the endeavours made with this view have been unsuccessful.
