TURKEY AND RUSSIA.

Intelligence from St. Petersburg of the 3rd inst., acquaints us that the Emperor of Russia has given his adhesion to the note transmitted to him from Vienna.

By the advice brought by the Levant mail, which has just arrived, we learn that the hopes entertained at Constantinople of a Russian withdrawal, however, very slender to repel force by force.

The Emperor has ordered the Baltic fleet to be equipped and to go to sea immediately. This fleet consists of about 20 ships of the line and 15 frigates.

TREMENDOUS CONFLAGRATION.—One of the most extensive fires that has occurred in the metropolis for a considerable time broke out yesterday morning shortly before 1 o'clock, and, at 10 o'clock, it was far from being entirely extinguished.

FURTHER DESIGNS OF RUSSIA.

Intelligence received from St. Petersburg, dated the 5th inst., is important. The Monitor, which is the only journal for it, states that "Russia has accepted the proposition to them without any modification."

Neither do the Emperor's other movements inspire us with confidence; they are all calculated to further the aggrandisement of his empire. As a threat to Russia he has ordered the Baltic fleet to be equipped, and to cruise on the coast of the Mediterranean.

Italy.—The Milan Gazette publishes an edict dated the 31st ult., summoning 43 persons to appear before the court-martial of Milan within ninety days, to answer the charge of high treason, and warning them that they shall be tried as defaulters in case of non-appearance.

SWITZERLAND.—Letters from Switzerland state that the National Council is determined not to make any further concessions to Austria, but is willing to remain in negotiations. The regular army of Switzerland 100,000 strong; besides, the Confederation has 10,000 troops in the Neapolitan service, a reserve corps of 50,000, a numerous landwehr, and 261 pieces of artillery.

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THE SOVEREIGNTY.

DEPUTATION TO ENGLAND. (From the Friend of the Sovereignty, Sept. 17)

PORT ELIZABETH.—DARING ROBBERIES WITH ATTEMPT TO MURDER.—On Monday night the house of Mr. Hippert, situated outside the town, was forcibly entered. The thief mangling to take away several articles of clothing, and sum of money, without ever having been heard by any of the inmates.

GREAT NAVAL REVIEW AT SPITHEAD.

This great event, which has caused such intense excitement, came off on Thursday morning, and was witnessed by thousands of persons who flocked from all quarters to the scene. As early as six o'clock steamers from Southampton, Gosport, and the western coast, and indeed from all parts of the coast, up to the western headland, were waiting in the bay.

On the arrival at the fleet, Her Majesty was received by Vice-Admiral Sir T. Cochrane, K.C.B., who takes the command of the fleet on this occasion. Lord Admiral Faubus, K.C.B., Major-General Simpson, Rear-Admiral Fitzpatrick, and Captain Superintendent Courtney, met us on board the Duke of Wellington, and paid their respects to Her Majesty.

The members of the Government, on their alighting from the railway carriages, proceeded in the Liver, which was also placed at the disposal of other peers.—The members of the House of Commons, on their arrival, ran with terrific eagerness towards the Bulwark, but that vessel not being sufficient for their accommodation, another ship, the Conflict, was burthened with the remainder.

A few miles below the Nab the signal was given to form line about, and the ships did at cable length from each other, and with magnificent effect. Some idea of their appearance in this position may be formed from the fact that the line extended about three miles from end to end. To the advance of the steam fleet in this order the looming forms of three line of battle ships, that gradually grew more distinct and formidable in the offing added a fine effect.
