THE ZUID-AFRIKAAN.

Cape Town, March 24, 1853.

The important news relative to the Constitution, which we communicated to our readers in our last, appears to be further confirmed by private information.

It is not, however, the first time that the hearts of the Colonists were for a short time gladdened by such a prospect; and repeated disappointment has made them so incredulous that they are ill prepared to listen to further promises, however plausible they may be.

But the present Colonial Minister is not responsible for the acts of his predecessors, and this circumstance, coupled with the favorable report as to his disposition, may, we think, justify the Colonists in looking forward to the arrival of the next mail with a certain degree of confidence.

Wellington, March 17, 1853.

Allow me, through the medium of your paper, our belated protest against an error which is about to be committed in the line of road through the Paarl, and which, by good management, might be rectified.

What I mean to say is, that if the road is to pass through the Paarl, to the bridge now building, and from thence to Bain's Kloof, it will be led back from Wellington and the kloof by a crooked elbow, whereas from Wellington in a right line through Klein Drakenstein (which Fieldcornet Nel understands, has also been considered by the determination of his Honor), to the Paarl, the said triangular circuit is cut off.

My strength of Samson, I would take that part of the bridge to be made on my shoulders, and remove it to a more suitable place, only 23 feet wide, and its right line alluded to. MULLER'S TOWN.

(From the Graaff Reinet Herald, March 16.)

Whelbedak, a farm lying in the vicinity of Port Elizabeth, is proposed as the site of a new town. Its recommendations are, that it is about two miles from the Bay, has abundance of the finest garden ground, with a copious stream of pure water, and the situation is described as extremely healthy.

Mr. Muller's Town, when his gardens are in full cultivation, will form a beautiful suburb to Port Elizabeth, and as it lies high, and commands a fine view of the Bay, it will, no doubt, be a place of much resort for those inhabitants of Port Elizabeth who have any taste for scenery, or who feel tired of the staid sterility of their own neighbourhood.

The Chief Sechelli, accompanied by Messrs. Green & Edwards, arrived here on Saturday afternoon last. We understood that 219 letters were collected in Bloemfontein, and 219 in Colesberg, towards the expense of the Chief's journey to England. This object does not seem to us to be much favored in Graaff Reinet, and his account of the fight with the Boers, and assertions of their having made slaves of his people, are evaded with much coolness and sarcasm.

The British Resident left Bloemfontein on Monday last with a small escort of C.M.R. for the purpose of visiting the Chief Meehale and the other native Chiefs in that neighbourhood.—Friend of the Sovereignty, March 19.
