WY ontwaren dikwyl den splinter in het oog onze naasten zonder den balk in ons eizen te bemerken. Dit is volkomen opgehelderd door den Monitor in zyne laatste uitgave. T'rwyl by de halstarrigheid waarmede de Municipale Commissarissen aan het eene dinz, de Constitutie, vastkleven, vergelykt by eene soort van waanzinnigheid, vergeet by dat zyne eigene party dien halstarrig het andere ding, tegenstand tegen dien maatregel, heeft aangekleefd. Het onderscheid tuschen beide, is echter zeer groot, want, terwyl de een de onderstanting heeft van de groote meerderheid der Kolonisten, is de andere blootelyk het orgaan van eene kleine facie.

Mit de gepasheid van het gedrag door beiden gevolgd, willen wy ons thans niet bezig houden. Wat wy nu wenschen aan te toonen, is, dat de Monitor zyn toon zeer schynst verlaagd te hebben; alhoewel het nog zyn pligt b schouwen, om zich tegen de invoer der Constitutie op het tegenwoordig tydstip te verzetten, is hy evenwel niet tegen ver-genoordigende instellingen, "waar het volk bevoegd is om op zich te nemen, en ten uitvoere te brengen deszelfs aandeel in het stelsel van zelf-bestuur." En hy verklaart verder zyn bereidwilligheid om zich te onderwerpen aan de uit-spraak van het Britsch Gouvernement, wanneer deselve zal zyn bekend gemaakt.

Indien de Monitor van den beginne opletweg geweest in zyne gevoelens, zoud' er geene reden van klage bestaan; maar het blad werd daargesteld tot het uitsluitelyk ommerk om de heegert-der Kolonisten tegen te werken, die zich behoortlyk tegen beschouwen, om datgeen te verrigten, hetwelk by hen vordert. In oever instemming met den gematigden toon welke de Monitor nu aangenomen heeft, is deselfs aanbelyding dat in de nederende kiezingen, mannen van gematigde inzichten zich behoort-vordelyk nakomendaten voor zitplaatsen in het aanstaande Parlement, om de overhellende magt der democraten tegenstand te bieden. De indruk welke men zegt te bestaan dat de gematigde party ter zyd zal staan en weigeren deel te nemen in publieke handelingen onder het nieuwe bestuur, steunt alleen op verbeelding. Wy houden ons overtuigd dat geen Heer, die de vereischte bevoegdheid heeft en tyd heeft, het ootereend met zyn karakter zal beschouwen om de belangen van zyne mede-Kolonisten in het Parlement voortestaan, noch vreesde, wy aan den anderen kant, dat behoef-tige gelukkighers en staatkundige beunhazen in uomatise getal zullen worden door het volk, welks belangen noodwendiglyk benadeeld moeten worden, indiingongelukkiglyk aan zulke handen toevertrouwd.

De vringing dat het Gouvernement te huis nu zoo begrig is om de Constitutie te geven, enkel om ontslagen te worden van de kosten voor de verleding van de Kolonie, kan waar zyn, en indi u zoo, is het dan niet noodig dat het zoo spoedig moelyk uit den droom wordt geholpen door datzelfde Parlement, in t.w.lk door die Consti-tutie in aanwezen zal worden geroepen? Maar wy vreezen niet dat de verguuning afhankelijk zal worden gemaakt van eene voorwaarde. Dat de Kolonie enig aandeel in de kost-n zal moeten dragen, is zeer onmogelyk, maar voorzeker kan het Britsch Gouvernement zoo dwaas niet zyn, als om te verachten dat zy in staat zal zyn het geheel daarvan te d'agen; noch kon streven wy enige vrees dat het zulk eene voorwaarde zal opperen. Het gevoelen van den heer COUDEN is dat van het Gouvernement niet.

Het is echter nuttelos by deze dingen stil te staan. Wy verachten nu dagelyks de Constitutie, zoudanig als dezelve by de Opene Brieven is ver-leend. Over enige afwyking van den geest van dat Instrument, of bykomende voorwaarde, kunnen wy veilig onze aanmerkingen tot eene nadere gelegenheid uitstellen.

Het "Journal" gewaagt met lof van het dank-beeld om deze menschen als volkplanters aldaar te vestigen.

Het laatste nummer van de "Graaff-Reinet Herald" behelst het staatsiek van het Distrikt, als een tamelyk dankbeeld opleverende van deszelfs tegenwoordige uitbronnen als een land voor schapen en rundervee. De bevolking, welke 10,736 zielen bedraagt, toont een meerder bedragen van kleurlingen boven blaken aan van 1330. Er zyn 1077 huizen en 680 hutten. De uitgestrektheid land, woest en bouwbaar, b'slaat 1,615,317 acres. De geheele waarde van paerden in het Distrikt wordt geschat op £36,238, van vee £53,361, en van schapen, zoo Metino als Kaaspsch, op niet minder dan £327,572. De waarde van Bokkep is £22,986 en varkens slechts £339. D'waarde van al de levende hase van Graaff-Reinet kan berekend worden op £444,816 en de geheele op-brengst van het Distrikt wordt jaarlyks op £50,000 geschat.

Van de enorme hoeveelheid van bykans zes miljoen ponden wyl in het jaar 1852 uit Algoabaai geroepert, berekend men dat Graaff-Reinet ten volle een-zevende heeft bygedragen.

Het wordt algemeen gezegd dat de heeren Gie en Bayley hun onslag hebben genomen van de Centrale Weg Kolonie. De v.c. ure door de resignatie van de heer Wentzel ontstaan, is aangevuld door den heer D. G. van Breda.

De Morning Advertiser, meent, dat indien de Kaffer-oorlog spoedig gunstig afloopt, Gen-raal Cathcart tot het bevel in Indie zal worden benoemd.

De Sarah Sands, met de maal voor Engeland, zal op morgen de Tafelbaai verlaten.

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THE ZUID-AFRIKAAN.

Cape Town, April 7, 1853.

We often perceive "the mote in another's eye, without seeing the beam in our own." This has been satisfactorily illustrated by the Monitor in his last issue.

With the correctness of the course adopted by either, we do not now meddle. What we wish to show at present is, that the Monitor appears to have lowered its tone very much.

If from the outset the Monitor had been honest in his opinions, there would have been no cause to complain; but the paper was got up for the very purpose of obstructing the wishes of the Colonists, who consider themselves duly qualified to perform that which it alleges to require from them.

In keeping with the moderate tone which the Monitor has now assumed, is its recommendation that in the approaching elections men of moderate views should offer themselves as candidates for seats in the future Parliament.

The allegation that the Home Government is now so anxious to give the Constitution merely to get rid of the expenses for the defence of the Colony, may be true; and if so, it is not necessary then that it should be disbanded as soon as possible by the very Parliament which that Constitution will call into existence?

It is useless, however, to dwell on these things. We are now in daily expectation of the Constitution, such as it has been granted by Letters Patent.

According to the Extra to the Graham's Town Journal of the 29th ult. no intelligence of importance had been received from British Kaffraria.

The Governor, it was said, would leave Graham's Town for Port Beaufort on the 30th, to open the Kat River Commission of Inquiry into the causes of the Hottentot rebellion.

The last number of the Graaff Reinet Herald contains the statistics of the District, affording a tolerable idea of its present capabilities as a sheep and cattle country.

It is currently reported that Messrs. Gie and Bayley have resigned their seats as members of the Central Board of Roads.

The Morning Advertiser says that it is thought that if the Kaffr war be soon brought to a favorable termination, General Cathcart will proceed to take command in India, probably on the borders of the Bombay Presidency.

The Sarah Bonds, with the mail for England, will leave Table Bay to-morrow.

The Lieut. Governor, says the Mercantile Advertiser, has stated to Mr. Adley, J.P., who had been deputed by the inhabitants of Wellington to wait upon his Honor to represent the injury they would suffer if his intention was persisted in, of declaring no line of road from Wellington to Cape Town as a main road which does not pass through the village of the Paarl.

Original Correspondence.

Klein Drakenstein, April 4, 1853. Sir, - In the Cape Town Mail of the 24th inst. (Saturday), appears the report of Mr. Bain to the Central Board of Roads relative to his inspection of the Paarl branch road, which is about to be proclaimed a main road, also relative to the line from Bain's Kloof to the Paarl.

I perceived that Mr. Bain was in error with regard to the water on the outspan place Kraaigfontein, which he describes to be a weak water; he is, in fact, a strong water, and the outspan place is a fine farinsh ample road much more than along the line first proposed round the Paarl.

The main road was first proposed round and not through the Paarl, I can only attribute to a selfishness or prejudice against the Paarl, as by placing the bridge higher up the Berg River, it might have been only 155 feet, and not 2300 feet, the cost would not have exceeded £500.

Being accustomed to write in newspapers, I could not avoid myself of expressing language; I am satisfied that the truth requires no embellishment. Yours, &c.

A ROAD RATE PAYER. Berg Valley, District of Clanwilliam, March 28, 1853.

Be therefore on your guard against these, and do not admit them into your hospitable dwellings, without a letter of recommendation from one of your friends or from an inhabitant whom you know.

A certain hawker (togtanger) to whom, in the last three years, you gave full confidence; to whom you even gave power to receive monies for you, and to transact all sort of matters in your name, has, a few months ago (which seems incredible to some of you), left for Australia, to dig gold in that country, leaving a considerable debt to several of you, who have entrusted him with your hard earned money and money. What do you think of receiving back that money, with the interest accruing thereon?

The above objections are caused by reading in your paper of a despatch from Mr. Montagu to the under Secretary of State, with a letter to Mr. Montagu signed by G. W. Dutton, giving a report of a public meeting held in the Town Hall, George Town, 7th January, 1852, where it is stated "that Mr. Dutton proposed a resolution, &c."

But the most barefaced attempt at slander is when he says, "we, i. e., the respectable portion." Respectable! God save the mark! Did Mr. Dutton not occupy the situation of gaoler in George Town during the years 1847-8-9? Or has he forgotten that during that time he memorialized the municipal commissioners, praying to be appointed Town Street Keeper of Water?

CENTRAL ROAD BOARD. THURSDAY, MARCH 29, 1853. THE BERG RIVER BRIDGE. Capt. Pilkington said, - The next matter is, the Berg River bridge. May I ask, have you any report of the state of the work?

The Secretary, - Only a note from Mr. Bain, the other day, who tells me that it is two thirds done. Capt. Pilkington, - Is that the only report you have had since it began? If you persist in making such remarks I must leave the chair. I object to this kind of thing with only two members present. Capt. Pilkington, - Well, sir, then I must send in a protest.

There is no doubt of his being a deserter from the 45th Regiment, as several of his former comrades, now stationed here, recognized him.

AUSTRALIA. NEWS FROM THE DIGGINGS.

BRADWOOD, January 1, 1853. - The New Year opens upon us with bright, I may say brilliant, prospects, with reference to the colony at large, it will I suppose be allowed by all that we were never in a condition of so solid and substantial prosperity as this New Year finds us. We were afraid that the wonderful discoveries of 1851 would cause our industrial pursuits to be neglected. The fears here proved groundless, sheep have been shorn, and harvests have been gathered. The strange acquisition of wealth that has been made has not blighted us to the necessity (now indeed all the more pressing) of attending our flocks and our fields. We have not neglected the substantial and the solid in our search of the gold digging itself in becoming more of a settled and steady pursuit. The bewildering excitement that was caused by the first discovery has now in part calmed down, and we are becoming increasingly convinced that "all is not gold that glitters." It is proved to be a work that affords little encouragement for the indolent and the dissipated. And while some interests have temporarily suffered by this strange alteration in our circumstances, and prospects of other interests have been in no little degree advanced, the injury that has accrued in some cases has been but slight, and more than met by countervailing benefits, and it has stopped far short of that ruin which some declared would be all but inevitable. Among the many benefited by the gold discoveries, certainly not the least are the large increase to our population, and the facilities of communication with the mother country. We are now in a position where we are connected with the very idea of gold and the acquisition of wealth, especially when obtained so suddenly and in such bewildering profusion; but we are hardly anticipated that we were so soon to feel its power.

We have, however, obtained a world wide fame, and are attracting all nations to our shores, and it may be ventured on one word more of congratulation, may we not be justly proud that we are, amidst all our wealth, a colony orderly, so thoroughly possessed by British feelings, and paying so much respect to British laws, that we can fairly challenge as many as please to visit us, nor fear that they will perity due to our riches, but to our industry and enterprise. The laws are respected, vice receives no open encouragement; all that is noble and virtuous is developed and cherished among us. Let those who will taunt us for the past, none at least can accuse us now. We are not indulging in too high flow descriptions of our present position, nor in too sanguine expectations of the glowing prospects that are sketched out before us. We feel we are not, and have therefore good cause to congratulate ourselves on the state of New South Wales at the beginning of 1853. We wish to allow my pen to run on in this strain, I shall still transport on your space, and encourage, I need on an office which hardly belongs to me. Let me therefore come now to my real business, and tell you how we are getting on in this particular locality. Our prospects are lighter and yet improving. We hope to have about 800 licenses this month, and to go on steadily increasing. Our little town is always busy, money is always plentiful. Best of all, the character of our district is no exception to the general good order that prevails throughout the colony. Some indeed are still debauched by the vice of drunkenness, but open outbreaks there are none. During last week I did not write, as at this season there is generally a stop put to labour for a time. I am, however, happy to report that all has been quiet and orderly. Gold digging has not been altogether neglected, though it has been a little interrupted. The great attractions is still at Bell's Faddell, where a large number of licenses will be taken out this month. One party of four, who have been steadily working there for some little time, have during the last month taken out about 40 oz. a week. The new party of this fit, which is to be opened this month, promises exceedingly well. Captain Stewart's good fortune at Bell's Creek has not yet run out. From 90 to 95 oz. were obtained last week. Others are also doing exceedingly well on this Creek. It is evident that something but labour, systematic labour, is necessary to bring its riches to light. Not many are working either on the Little River or at Arden; some are working in both places are doing very well. Major Craddock bids fair to regain all its former popularity. Some washing was lately obtained by Mr. Wallis' party, equal to any that has been found here. At Spring Creek a tributary of the main creek, Mr. Manning has been finding gold. The parties are still doing very well; the former are sometimes turning out from 12 to 20 ounces a day. In fact, all who labour are making down still some large consignments. About 8500 ounces have been sent down by escorts and mails during the last three months. This will give an average of about 1 ounce a week to each licensed digger, and then it must be remembered that some of the best buyers still continue to send down privately. I have lately had an opportunity of travelling on the roads generally considered to be in good condition, but to use a familiar phrase, "bad is the best." The wool is now going down, and our sheep farmers are obliged to pay high prices for carriage. High prices for them to pay, but really not high prices for those to receive, who have to endure the toils of the privation, and the casualties of the road. It is always to be so. I remember that some who are complaining that the remedy is in their own hands. Establish water communication, and the evil ceases. It will be a crying shame if the clip of 1853 is conveyed to Sydney by bullock drays. When some effort is made in reference to the Bateman's Bay road? This is the third time of asking: I will not promise it shall be the last. Am I, whom it really least concerns, to be the only one who is interested in the matter? I think I had better begin most violently to oppose the project, and then, by exciting opposition, I may perhaps stimulate to enterprise. At present all are agreed as to the perfect eligibility of the road, and when they so agree, their unanimity is wonderful. Yes, and, pro pro pulor! so is their apathy too. - Sydney Morning Herald, Jan. 6.

Our readers in the Cape Colony will remember, that about four or five years ago, a celebrated character, who then went by the name of Noble, and who had been convicted of breaking into the house of Mr. John White of Cradock, and robbing him of a large sum of money, made his escape from the Cradock goal, and was seen on board of a galleon. This galleon made his appearance in Bloem Fontein about a month since, as a great traveller and trader who had just returned from the Great Lake; and informed some of the storekeepers, that he required a load or two of goods for his next trip. Mr. Alfred Buckley, a former resident of Cradock, happened to pass

NEWS FROM BALLARAT.

Geelong Advertiser Office, February 6. Napoleon, pointing to the Pyramids of Egypt, exclaimed to his troops "five thousand years look down upon you." The people of Geelong may point to what her people has done, and boast that the eyes of the world are upon her - not for what an ancient had done, but for what she had done for herself. We boast, and we are justified by the act. A few days have produced from our community discoveries before unheard of, and which probably will never be surpassed.

A second edition of the Geelong Advertiser announced that a nugget of one hundred and thirty-four ounces weight had been discovered at Canadian Gulley, Ballarat. Another second edition of the Geelong Advertiser notifies to the public another discovery, equal in importance, from the same place. This day Messrs. William Gough, John Sulley, and John Bletlow, have been taken into Geelong two masses of gold weighing ONE HUNDRED AND SIXTY-THREE POUNDS TROY, or two thousand three hundred and fifty-two ounces avoirdupois.

These masses of gold were found contiguous to the Geelong object, at a depth of fifty feet, in a quartz rock, penetrating a slate formation resting on white quartz sand. The first mass weighing about EIGHTY-FIVE POUNDS TROY, was found on the 20th January, and the second mass weigh-
