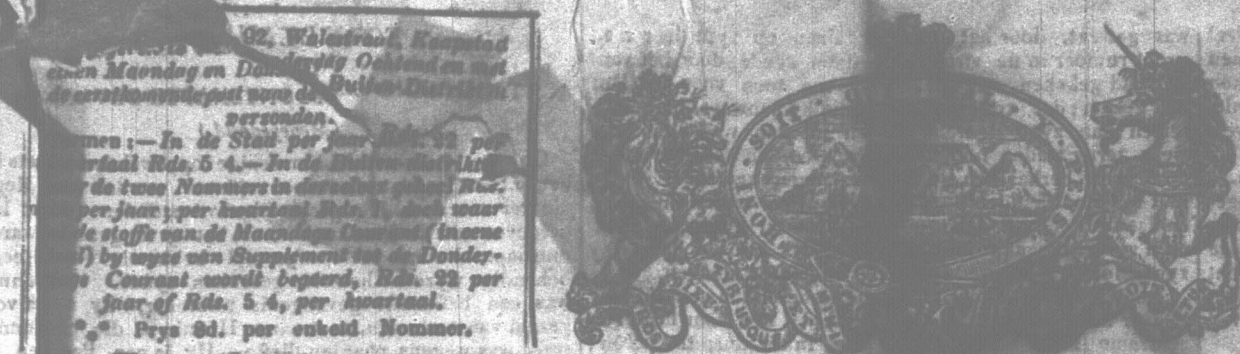

Cape Town, December 29, 1853.

This year that is now hastening to a close, affords a retrospect calculated to inspire us with gratitude for the past and with hope for the future.

I located on frontier farms, will form, like the Spartan youth of old, a wall of living stones, always ready to repel aggression and prevent injury.

The event by which the year 1853 forms a new era in our history, is the grant of a representative Government. By the side of that, all other improvements dwindle into nothing.

It is from this conviction that we have all along advocated leaving everything else in abeyance until our new Government shall be in full operation.

We do not deny that copper is valuable, and we say if you can dig gold instead of copper, still better; but we maintain that an intelligent merchant, who is something more than a pithoric shopkeeper, will not fail to see, that a share in the Government is worth scores of shares in the copper mines.

Improve your harbours, increase the productive powers of the Colony by leading water to spots that are sterile, not from any defect of the soil, but from want of moisture.

Encourage immigration, but such immigration as we expect to increase the number of industrious and skillful men in the Colony, who are producers as well as consumers.
