THE GREAT "WELLINGTON."

AN Advertisement respecting the Great Horse WELLING-
TON, appeared in the Commercial Advertiser of Oct.
31st, signed by Mr. G. F. MULLER, of Riversdale, but
probably not written by himself as it is in English. This
Advertisement professes to convey a challenge, viz:
Wellington, against any other horse in the Colony; but
is evidently a mere puff for Wellington—a horse never
heard of before, and now only known, as having beaten a
bolting and sulky running Colt of three years old, in bad
time. If Mr. G. F. MULLER intended business, he would
have been more explicit in his challenge; no weights are
mentioned; nor distance! If Mr. MULLER wishes to ex-
hibit WELLINGTON in Cape Town, at the next April Race,
he can be accommodated in a match, for £50, P.P., or
£100 H.P., weight for age, two miles;—and has only to
send his acceptance of this offer to the Hon. Secretary of
the South African Turf Club, and to lodge his money,
which shall be duly covered. The day of running can be
settled at the same time, Mr. MULLER naming a friend to
act on his behalf. In the mean time Mr. MULLER may
meet his match at Swellendam, and if he is very ambitious
he can go to Graham's Town, or Uitenhage, to meet
BLACKBERRY, who also lately challenged the colony.

Many so called challenges have appeared in the Cape
papers at various times; but have always ended in smoke.
And such I fear will be the fate of that of Mr. G. F. MULLER
in its present shape. Mr. MULLER says—"of course my
being at Swellendam or Cape Town depends on the health of
myself and horse." And if WELLINGTON gets beaten at
Swellendam, we must naturally expect, that Mr. G. F.
MULLER or his horse, will not be found in the health to go to
Cape Town.

With regard to Mr. MULLER's allusion to the "un-
fortunate Surveyor" at the Cape Town Races last April,
he has no right whatever to cast any reflection on the
decision of the Stewards, who were three gentlemen without
the slightest interest in the race. Surveyor was distanced,
because he crossed or jostled the horse he was running
against, as ADMITTED BY HIS OWN RIDER, and the rules of
FAIR RACING must be carried out. Surveyor was notorious,
MULLER must have known.

As for the rude treatment Mr. G. F. MULLER asserts
some "gentlemen" received,—Mr. MULLER has been en-
tirely misinformed, "no gentlemen" and no person with
the slightest pretension to that character, met with any
rudeness; but if Mr. MULLER (who appears to be a judge
in such matters,) will come to Cape Town with WEL-
LINGTON, and favor the members of the Turf Club with a
lesson in politeness; he may perhaps find, he can still learn,
where he professes to teach.

THE ZUID-AFRIKAN.

Cape Town, November 27, 1854.

"I think it is matter of regret," said Mr. R. M. Ross in an excellent lecture lately delivered at the Mechanics' Institute, "that the Committee of the Cape of Good Hope Agricultural Society have limited their selections of articles eligible as contributions to the Paris Exhibition to raw products, as in a colony like this, having peculiar wants and requiring peculiar means for supplying those wants, every encouragement should be given to the inventive and mechanical talent of the country." It is certainly matter of regret that we should be forever importing, at an enormous expense, hundreds of articles of daily consumption, and among these not merely luxuries which only a few can afford, but almost every article of wearing apparel and domestic convenience, as well as the commonest tools used by our mechanics. Of the two sources of national wealth, agriculture and manufacturing industry, the latter is by far the more productive. The reasons are obvious; for not only are things of no value, such as old rags, the refuse of the shambles &c., converted into articles that realize handsome sums of money, but profitable employment is found for idle hands, workmen, as a matter of course, flock to places where they can get wages, the most valuable kind of immigration is stimulated, and as every producer of a manufactured article is necessarily a consumer of the produce of the soil, that is the farmers' customer, manufacturing industry becomes the main prop of agriculture.

It is easier to express a regret on the absence of manufactures in the Colony than to call them into existence. Colonies never are and probably never will be centres of manufacturing industry. Is it the interest of the mother country that they should? The prevailing opinion is not in favor of the supposition; but the prevailing opinion may be wrong and probably is wrong. The prevailing opinion was once against free trade, and to this day some people will stand up for protective duties. In judging of such questions the circumstances of time and place ought to enter for something in our estimate. Reasoners on speculative questions of any kind are very apt to run away with an opinion. They choose their side of the question and argue it, not in the spirit of impartial investigation, but with a fixed determination not to undergo the disgrace of being confuted in argument. Free trade has triumphed over protection, but the multitudes that fought on either side, with the exception of the leaders, were probably as ignorant of the real merits of the question, as a common soldier on the field of battle is of the strategic movements on which the result depends. The time for free trade had come, and everything is good in its time. It had come for the nations of Europe and for the United States of America; for agricultural skill, manufacturing industry, and the result of these, commercial enterprise with capital as its concomitant, had been diffused over those countries, and had placed them on a footing of fair competition. But does this prove that protection is intrinsically bad? May there not have been a time—can it not be shown that there was a time, when protection was as much the thing as free trade is now? That time, for all countries, is when manufactures are in their infancy, and cannot compete with those of other countries for want of getting a fair start. But that time, for reasons sufficiently obvious, never comes for Colonies. It does not even come for them as one of the blessings of self-government. Suppose our Parliament were to pass a bill imposing protective duties on articles imported from England, with a view to encourage and stimulate our Colonial industry, our manufactures of hats, of soap, of cigars, &c. Would such a bill obtain the Royal assent? It is clearly out of the question. The truth is that colonial industry is systematically kept down. The old error that one part of an empire always thrives at the expense of another, has not yet been fully eradicated. It is still maintained by some that, to feed the branch, you must rob the root, and therefore it is for the good of the tree, that the branches should be kept closely pruned. It is in vain that naturalists have shown the incredulous answer is: that may be true, but experience teaches that if you lop off the branches the stem grows thicker. Of course it will, and you cannot do better, if you intend your fruit-tree for timber.

SACRIFICE OF HUMAN LIFE.

"The consumption of human life during the reign of the Emperor Nicholas has been enormous. He has carried on war with the Circassians uninterruptedly for twenty eight years at an annual cost of 20,000 lives on the Russian side alone; making a grand total of nearly 600,000 Russians who have perished in an attempt to subdue the independence of Circassia. In the two campaigns against Persia, as in the Hungarian campaign and the two Polish campaigns of 1831-'32, there are not sufficient data to enable me to form a correct estimate of the Russian loss; which was, however, in the Persian and Polish wars enormous. In the two campaigns against Turkey, of 1828-'9, 300,000 fell; of whom, however, 50,000 perished by the plague. The loss of the Russians, in various ways, since the entry of the Danubian Principalities is underrated at 30,000.—Lee's last days of Alexander and first days of Nicholas. In these calculations, it should be borne in mind that no estimate is attempted to be made of the sacrifices of human life on the side of those who fought for their liberties against the aggressions of Russia. If this calculation were attempted it is probable that the result would prove that neither Julius Caesar nor Alexander, nor even Tamerlane, has been a greater scourge to the human race than the present Emperor Nicholas." So much for the pet of the Peace people!—Literary Star.
