THE ZUID-AFRIKAN.

Cape Town, February 8, 1855.

The name of JAS. STUART has been for some time (at least two years, if not more) associated with a scheme of colonization in the Transvaal Republic.

The work is divided into five parts of unequal length. The first hundred pages are a translation of the Hon'ble Mr. H. Cloete's lectures on the emigration of the Dutch farmers, a most interesting pamphlet published in 1852 at Petermaritzburg, by J. ARCHBELL & SON.

Mr. STUART is clearly a well informed man, and one who possesses considerable ability as a writer. The disinterestedness of his motives we must leave in the hands of those who can claim a better acquaintance with him than we pretend to.

Mr. STUART, having been empowered by the popular Assembly of the Transvaal Republic to dispose by sale of a vast extent of fertile country, contiguous to the Drakenberg, had conceived the plan of starting a company of monied men, who should become the joint purchasers.

Queen's-Town District, 25th Jan., 1855. Everything is quite serene, at least as quiet as can be expected. The Kaffirs are now more circumspect, and I firmly believe that we need not entertain the slightest fear of their breaking out as yet.

Business in Queen's Town, to use the old phrase, is most "mortally dull," very little doing in the shopkeeping line. I verily believe the farmers do more business between themselves than all the shopkeepers put together.

The locusts have played the very mischief. The beautiful standing crops of wheat in some parts have been swept off. The locust birds have made their appearance, and I believe that in a few days this devouring insect will himself be devoured.—Did.
