THE ZUID-AFRIKAAN. Cape Town, March 22, 1855.

The reader will find below a letter from a correspondent, signing himself a Friend to the Dutch Reformed Church, commenting on a passage in the Governor's opening speech, in which His Excellency advocated the endowment of one or more chairs of theology at the South African College, by way of preparing young people for the Ministry with less expense to their parents.

There is another part of the Governor's speech, which cannot fail to interest every colonist, that connected with the proposed location of pensioners in British Kaffraria. The scheme is calculated to gratify the good wishes of all parties. It will satisfy the philanthropist, because it tends to raise the savage from his degraded state, by the double agency of christianity and permanent contact with Europeans.

Such prospects are no doubt very cheering, but the best feature in the scheme is, that it is to be carried out mainly by the resources of the British Empire, though at the same time it is insinuated, that it will be the interest of this Colony to contribute to the expense to be incurred.

Mr. Advocate Brand has, we regret to say, sustained another severe affliction, by the death of his second son. He has thus lost three of his sons within the short space of about two years.

OF BOTS. The stomach of the horse, from being partly insensible, is therefore incapable of sympathizing with the other parts of the frame, as in the human subject; and for the same reason, it is seldom liable to disease. It is, however, sometimes diseased by an accumulation of worms, termed bots, which fasten on the insensible membrane lining the stomach, by two dense, sharp hooks, and which cannot be destroyed by the operation of medicines, although at times they detach themselves spontaneously.

These worms are hatched by the warms of the stomach, from eggs deposited by the horse in the summer season, and which the horse, in biting his hair, or which these eggs are laid, licks up and swallows. They are to be found in most horses, and particularly at a certain time of the year, and in general are not hurtful; but they sometimes increase greatly in number, and, insinuating themselves between the coats of the stomach, greatly irritate this organ, and prevent the horse from thriving. In this case, little can be effected by medicines; but the following astringent purge will succeed in detaching such of these insects as are already nearly loosened from the stomach.

Take of Aloes (Barbadoes) 6 drachms. Powdered Ginger 1 drachm. Syrup sufficient to form one ball. (Barke's Anatomy, Physiology and Pathology of the Horse.)

It is not the stomach, and are distinguished from the two other species of worms by their length, being scarcely an inch, and of an oval form and of a reddish colour, having two hooks at their smaller extremity, by which they adhere strongly to the coats of the stomach, and also very short feet along the sides of their bodies; they are composed of ten or twelve circular rings or joints; their mouth is supposed by La Fosse to be situated between the two small hooks. There are two varieties of bots, the one being of a paler colour, and smaller. Bots, in general, appear in the summer, and occasionally produce much constitutional irritation, and sometimes, by ulcerating the coats of the stomach, destroy the animal. The symptoms indicating bots in horses are few; they are first discovered in the dung, and are frequently seen sticking to the straight gut, near the fundament, from whence they are often forced off with the dung. The animal generally looks lean, and his hair stares like that of a scorched horse. He frequently strikes his hind feet against his belly, and, in many respects, appears like one that is griped. I have known horses at the latter end of a dry summer (when the ponds, or springs, have been very low, and the water become muddy, by reason of cattle standing in them, and filled with swarms of insects), to be much infested with bots in the stomach; which is the chief cause why so many hundreds of them die in the low, fever, and malarial countries.

THE GOVERNOR'S SPEECH AND THE THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY. STATE.—The Governor's speech at the opening of Parliament, there is one passage, which cannot fail to have struck those that read or heard it. It is that about the expediency of providing local means for the education of the clergy of the Dutch Reformed Church. It says, indeed, rather vaguely, that His Excellency has expressed so soon his views, and that too such decided views, on a question, concerning a matter of such a church, to which he is as yet a stranger—a question which in the bosom of that church and nation has given rise to opinions so widely different from one another. It appears, however, that the "Kerkboedel" contains the opinion of His Excellency as a matter of some importance. Why should then those who hold different views of this subject, abstain from bringing them before the eyes of the public?—I shall direct the attention of the public to one single point. If the whole duty of the clergy consisted in delivering a sermon twice a week, then an education at a colonial seminary, would perhaps be sufficient. He would not know, it is true, so much of Theology, as when he had studied at a European University. For an institution like these, is not likely to be established in this colony for many long years to come. But in our country communities, even a small modicum of Theological knowledge, will enable a preacher to discharge his duties in the pulpit. Preaching, however, is but a small part of the basis of an efficient pastor. To be worthy of that name, a minister ought not to be inferior, either in scientific attainments, polite manners, or the knowledge of men, to the best educated part of his congregation. There is in every village a knot of people, better educated than the rest. They manufacture, or at any rate modify, the opinions of two thirds of the village, the remaining third consisting of people, that contrive to get through the world without opinions. Now, if a clergyman is inferior to these in any of the points which I mentioned, how will he be able to inspire his congregation with the reverence, which alone will enable him to perform his duty? And is there anything more conducive to the attainment of these requisites, than an education at a European University, where men are even more easily studied than books?

Now, if a clergyman of the Dutch Reformed Church were the only one in his parish, his congregation would certainly suffer from this want of enlarged views, which would be the consequence of an education exclusively colonial. But the evil would perhaps be temporary. The Theological Seminary providing us for the education of clergymen, would have the fate of so many institutions in this colony, which have fallen never to rise again. But we may not forget that in most of our villages, the clergy of the Dutch Reformed Church are in just position with the clergy of a rival church, whose ministers have in their favour, not only the superior education which they enjoy from their very childhood, but also the partiality for everything that is English, which is daily gaining ground among the better educated portion of society. What will be the fate of the Dutch Reformed Church, if the attainments of their clergy are generally below those of a rival clergy, whose maxims are certainly not such as to make them envious of the present power of their church.

It would be worse than unjust, it would be base, to attribute to Sir George Grey any but the best intentions. It is during the short time which he has passed in this colony, he had a great number of problems to solve, and why should we not suppose that he has not seen everything with his own eyes? If any member of the Dutch Reformed Church has had an influence on his opinions, we may be sure that that member has had nothing in view but the welfare of his church. If we have to do with the agency of others, both the late Secretary of Government, and one of the most eminent English clergymen of this colony may teach us, what to think of it. "If I wished," said the latter, "to crush entirely the Dutch Reformed Church, I would contribute largely to the 'Theological Seminary.' As to Mr. Montagu, it is generally known, that after having dispatched a letter to the home-government, to ask for a subsidy for the Seminary, he declared to have signed the sentence of death of the Dutch Reformed Church. May those, that now, in their eagerness to promote the institution of the Seminary, rejoice in the dispositions, expressed by the Governor's speech, take heed lest they contribute to the ruin of that church, in the welfare of which they feel so much interested.
