**THE ZUID-AFRIKAAN.**

Cape Town, April 19, 1855.

THERE is in European society a comparatively greater number of professional men than in most colonies, and that is unquestionably a benefit to the community. Men of fortune, who do not intend their sons for the counting-house, send them to a university to study the Roman Law and the laws of the country, by way of preparing them for public life.

Perhaps not one out of ten ever practices as a lawyer, but young people thus prepared take a standing in society, and have a better chance of entering the government service and of being returned Members of Legislative Assemblies than others that have not had the same advantages. If they are not all profound lawyers, they have at least acquired a general knowledge of men and books, and that is no contemptible qualification.

They can meet members of the other professions on a footing of equality, and the aristocracy to which they belong is not merely the aristocracy of wealth. In short they form a class, who by their education are qualified to be a counterpoise to men in office—a class that is but meagerly represented in this colony.

It is not an idle question, but a point well worth considering, whether the formation of such a class of men among us ought not to be encouraged. An extension of our judicial establishment is in contemplation, men of legal knowledge are in requisition for both branches of our legislature and there can be no doubt that our magistrates could be more efficiently recruited from such a body of men, than from the civil or military service.

Even municipal boards and divisional Councils, if we are to have any, would be greatly benefited by a sprinkling of men, who, besides being learned in the law, have had a wider range of education than is attainable here, not to mention the incalculable advantage of having been abroad at a period of life, when the mind imbibes knowledge at every pore.

The Municipal Board of Cape Town would not willingly forego the valuable services of their present Secretary, and we feel confident that some other municipalities would be happy to secure the advice and assistance of a professional gentleman. There is then an opening for well educated young men, and it is not only the interest but the duty of parents, who can afford to send their children abroad for a course of study, to see that the supply shall be at all times equal to the demand.

Mr. Wehmeyer was therefore proclaimed as the successful candidate, which announcement was succeeded by three cheers; after which the Court was dissolved and the meeting separated.

**LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.**  
FRIDAY, APRIL 10.—Mr. Breda presented a petition from the Dutch Church at Breda's dorp, and Dr. de Wet presented two from the inhabitants of Hopefield and Stockenstrom against the voluntary principle.

Mr. Metelerkamp presented a petition from the inhabitants of Alexander for the appointment of a magistrate at Human's dorp, and another from the English congregational Church, Cape Town, in favor of the voluntary principle.

**HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.**

TUESDAY, APRIL 10.—The House met pursuant to adjournment.  
Mr. Meintjes presented a petition from Mr. C. T. Ackerman, for an increase of salary, which was rejected.

Mr. Paterson presented a petition from the inhabitants of Alexander, praying for the establishment of a magistracy at Human's dorp.  
Mr. Wiggins presented a petition from 59 inhabitants of Touhag, against the burgher-law.

Mr. Richard presented a petition from the consistory and members of the Dutch Church at Stockenstrom, against the Voluntary Principle.  
Mr. Watson presented a petition from the committee of the Commercial Exchange, praying for the appointment of a Board of Commissioners of Customs for the decision of disputes between the officers of customs and importers and exporters.

Mr. Shepperson presented a petition from 77 and another from 180 inhabitants of the Cradock division, praying that certain other laws may be passed, previous to the passing of a burgher-law.  
Dr. Tancred presented a petition from 55 inhabitants of Picketberg and another from 62 inhabitants of Berg River, against the burgher-law.

The committee on weights and measures presented a letter from Mr. Maclean, which was laid upon the Table.  
Dr. Tancred asked the Col. Secretary on whose recommendation, and for what purpose, certain persons have been lately appointed as Justices of the Peace in the district of Clanwilliam. The Col. Secretary replied that it was to meet the requirements of the public, and particularly to protect the rest of merchants and others interested in the Namaqualand mines.

Dr. Tancred begged leave to withdraw his motion relative to the unripeness of the Colony for free institutions, to which the House acceded, but Mr. Fairbairn, as a question of privilege, moved that the notice be expunged from the journals of the House, which motion was carried.  
Dr. Tancred having previously explained that he did not intend any insult to the House.

On the motion of Mr. Ardenne a committee was appointed to examine into the allegations contained in a petition from certain inhabitants of Rondebosch and Mowbray.  
The Col. Secretary laid upon the table a statement of the amount of customs revenue from the 1st January to the 15th March, 1854, and for the same period in 1855; also a memorandum showing the position of the Central Board at the present time.

On the motion of Mr. Fairbairn, a committee was appointed to inquire into and report upon the professional qualification required from persons before obtaining a licence to practice physic in this colony.  
The second reading of the Customs Bill was negatived, an amendment by Mr. Molteno, that it be read this day six months, having been carried without a division.

On the motion of Dr. Abernethy, it was resolved to request the Governor, by address, to appoint a commission to investigate the case of Lutzopp on the spot.  
Adjourned till Wednesday.

**VIctoria.**—We extract the following passage from the leading article of the Melbourne Herald, of 29th January—  
It is not easy in any great change, and frequently it is impossible, for the closest observer, to fix the commencement of any Commercial Improvement, at any particular point of time; but on this occasion, we think we may say with safety, that a decisive, and marked reaction towards the old buoyancy and soundness in Mercantile Affairs, set in immediately after Christmas. Purchasers for country consumption, who had been delaying their purchases in the hope that merchants would submit to still more "alarm sacrifices" than heretofore, began to see that prices had got to the lowest point. Instances were even occurring, of purchases, for re-shipment to England. As, therefore, our interior, as well as our towns, must be supplied, and as, contrary to the usual experience, and to the Spanish proverb,—"there is more money than appears,"—a much more effective demand for manufactured goods has arisen in the six months preceding. This change for the better, here, co-operating with the continuously large immigration, with our large receipts from the gold fields, and with the diminished, and still diminishing, consignments from England, will, doubtless, much more speedily than in the old unprosperous times, put us in an exultant state again.

"Again to be overcome, again to dash on," to the end of commerce itself, as in every mercantile community in every part of the world.  
Meanwhile, and whilst some men go on breakfasting and dining, and talking "rain," and "tightness of money," and whilst others exult over the overdue paper in the Banks having been reduced £390,000 within the last month, the great interests of the colony still wait on, not wholly unjoining. Sheep and cattle still preserve their appetites for grass, become in the fulness of time, and if fat, fit for man, man, always carnivorous, though temporarily commercially depressed; and to farmers and others steadily increasing in number. The fertile earth still yields her fruits in due season. Wages of all kinds are of course greatly reduced, and so also is the cost of living. Rents are now one half what they were twelve or even six months back. The necessities of life, are now (excepting bread and one or two other articles of common consumption) almost as cheap as in England. And therefore, however much the over speculative among old residents may complain of depression, it is certain that a new arrival may on first landing, find himself in a much more encouraging condition now, than he would have found to be his case, had he joined us in our fortune-making days, ages ago, i. e. twelve months back.

**DE ZUID-AFRIKAAN.**  
Kaapstad, den 19 April 1855.

En is in de Europeesche samenleving een by verlyk groter getal professioneele mannen dan in de meeste kolonien, en dat is ontwyfbaar een voordeel voor de maatschappy. Liederen van fortuin, die hunsen zonen niet bestemmen voor een koopmans-kantoor, zenden hen naar een Hoogeschool, om het Romeinsch regt en de wetten van hun land te beoefenen, ten einde hen voor het openbaar leven voor te bereiden. Mitsdien praktizeert niet een uit de tien, aldus opegeleid, als regtegeleerde, maar jongelieden aldus voorbereid, verwerpen zeker aanzien in de maatschappy en hebben beter kans om in de Gouvernements dienst te getaken en om als leden der Wetgeving te worden gekozen dan anderen die d'zelve voorrengen niet hebben gehad.

Indien zy niet allen uitstekende regtegeleerden zyn, hebben zy ten minsten eene algemeene kennis opgedaan van menschen en boeken en dat is geene verachtelyke bevoegdheid. Zy kunnen leden van de andere professi op gelyken voet ontmoeten en de aristocratie waartoe zy behooren is niet slechts de aristocratie van vermogen. Zy stellen, om kort te gaan, eene klasse daar welke door hare opvoeding bevoegd is om een tegenwigt te zyn voor mannen in bediening—eene klasse welke in deze kolonie maar schaarsch vertegenwoordigd wordt. Het is geen ydele vraag, maar een punt hetwelk wel verdient overwogen te worden, of het vormen van zulk eene klasse van menschen onder ons niet behoerde te worden aangemoedig?

Men heeft eene uitbreiding van ons juridieel stelsel in zin, mannen van regtegeleerde kennis worden vereischt voor beide takken onzer Wetgeving, en er kan geen twyfel bestaan dat onze magistraturen meer krachtadig zouden worden aangevuld uit zulk een lichzaam menschen dan uit de civile of burgerlyke dienst. Zelfs Municipale Raden en Afdelings Raden, indien wy ze krygen zullen, zouden grootelyks bevoordeeld worden door de toelating van mannen, die behalve dat zy in het regt geoevend zyn, een uitgebreider opvoeding hebben bekomen dan alhier verkrygbaar is, om niet te spreken van het onberekenbaar voorrecht van uitlandig te zyn geweest op zenen leeftijd, op welken het verstand meest vatbaar is voor de opzamelng van kennis.

De Municipale Raad van de Kaapstad zoude niet gaarne de kostbare diensten willen missen van hunnen tegenwoordigen Secretaris, en wy houden ons overtuigd dat e-nige andere Municipaaitetten zich gelukkig zouden rekenen om de diensten en den raad van een heer van professie te verzeeken. Er is dus eene opening voor wel opgevoede jongelieden, en het is niet alleen het belang maar de plicht van ouders, die hunne kinderen buitenlands op studie kunnen zenden, te zorgen dat het getal altyd geveerredig blyve met de aanvraag. De kosten van buitenlandsch studie is de gewone tegenwerping tegen zulke aanbevelingen. Die tegenwerping is meer dan eens beantwoord, maar wanneer men moeilyk te overtuigen is, laten wy niet medelooze veel minder oordeelkundig worden. Laten dezelfde argumenten telken reize herhaald worden. Indien zy swak zyn, zullen zy wederlegt worden, indien gezond, kan het gebeur-e dat zy eindelyk invloed zullen uitoefenen.

Welke zyn dan de enorme kosten welke zelfs vermogende ouders afschrikken om hunne zonen buitenlands te zenden? Wy zullen die vraag trachten te beantwoorden, voornamelyk voor diegenen die er het meeste belang by hebben, dat is voor lieden in de buiten distrikten die hunne kinderen als kostgangers zenden naar de Opr edings Iringingen in de Kaapstad. Indien zy dit kunnen doen, zyn zy niet behoefstig; want het is gemaklyk te toonen dat de kosten jaarlyks gemaakt voor een jongeling, aldus geplaatst, weinig minder dan £100 is. By-paal zyn kost en inwoning, tezamen met onderwys op £50, welke de gewone pry is op alle resp. etabele kostscholen. Dit sluit geen muzyk, teekenen, enz., in. Dan is er nog een zware post voor kleeduren, welke voor een jongen van geest, die zch natuurlyk respectabel wyl kleeden, gewoonlyk van £25 tot £30 bedraagt. Wasschen en andere kleinere posten maken het restant uit. Hoe veel meer zal zulk een jongeling aan eene Europeesche Hooge School kosten? Het verschiil behoef geen £20 per jaar, te boven te gaan. Is dit een bedrag hetwelk een vermogend man behoort afschrikken een blyvend voordeel aan zynen zoon te schenken en door hem aan de kolonie? Wy ontkennen niet dat £120 eene groote som gelds is om jaarlyks te bekostigen aan een enkel lid van een talryk gezin, noch widden wy iemand aanzetten boven zyne middelen te gaan in een geval waar de te maken kosten zeker zyn, en de uitslag onzeker is. Het is omdat de last om datgeen te verkrygen hetwelk een voordeel voor de kolonie zou zyn als een geheel, uitsluitelyk op den ouder rust, dat het raadzaam zou zyn middelen te bramen om ouders aantemoedigen en te onderstatenen. Twee dingen kun den daartoe hydragen. Indien het Gouvernement zich wilde verbinden om in toekomstige aanstellingen zich zeker posten, de voorkeur te geven aan professioneele mannen, zou dit eene groote aanmoediging zyn; en indien, aan den anderen kant, een fonds kon worden daargesteld, waaruit een zekere jaarlyksche toelag, zeg £50, kon worden gegeven ter goedmaking van de kosten van eenen student buitenlands, zou dit een groote hulp zyn.

Tegen het eerste dezer voorwaarden zien wy geen bezwaar, tegen de laatste, alleen de swaerheid om het fonds daartestellen. Wy denken evenwel dat, indien de zaak behoortlyk onderzocht worde, men vinden zou dat er reeds eene beperkte voorziening van dien aard bestaat. De Vrymetz-laren hebben een fonds om studenten te onderstatenen, ook bestaat er een Latynsch School-fonds, de renten waarvan thans aan het Athenem vervalt. Zou dit geld niet beter besteed worden op de wyze boven vermeld?

**De Burger-wet.**—Gisteren werd de Burger-wet, als voor de geheele kolonie voorgesteld door den heer Blaine, voor de tweede maal in den Wetgevenden Raad gelezen, zynde het voorstel gepaseerd door eene meerderheid van 8 tegen 4. Een amendement door den heer De Wet voorgesteld, dat de Bill over zes maanden gelezen worde, werd door dezelfde meerderheid verworpen.

**Wetgevende Raad.**  
DINGSDAG, 10 APRIL.—De heer Breda diende eene petitie in van den Kerkerard van Breda Dorp, en de heer De Wet, diende twee anderen in van inwoners van Hopsfield en Stock nstrom tegen het vrywillig beginfel.

De heer Metelerkamp presenteerde eene petitie van de inwoners van Alexander om de aanstelling van eenen Magistraat te Humans Dorp, en eene andere van de Engelsche Congregational Kerk, Kaapstad, ten voordele van het vrywillig beginfel.

De heer Wicot diende petitien in van de inwoners van Koebreg en verscheidene andere plaatsen tegen de burger-wet, enz. De bill ter invoering van Europeesche arbeiders werd voor de derde maal gelezen en gepaseerd.

De Raad ging in commissie op de bill ter betere administratie van het regt, rapporteerde voortgang en verzocht vryhede om weder te sitten.

De tweede lezing van de burger-wet van den heer Blaine werd uitgesteld tot Woensdag.

**Wetgevende Vergadering.**  
DINGSDAG, 10 APRIL.—Het Huis vergaderde volgens adjournment.

De heer Meintjes diende eene petitie n van den heer C. T. Ackerman, om eene verhooging van salaris, welke van de hand gewezen werd.

De heer Paterson diende eene petitie in van de inwoners van Alexander, verzoekende om de daarstelling van eenen Magistraat te Humans Dorp.

De heer Wiggins diende eene petitie in van 59 inwoners van Tubhagh tegen de burger-wet.

Dr. Biecard diende eene petitie in van de inwoners van Koebreg, ten voordele van de meester en diensbale wet; eene andere over de wegen in de Kaapsche en Malmesbury afdelungen; en eene andere on-recht der burger-wet.

De heer Watson diende eene petitie in van het Comité van de Koopmans Burs om de aanstelling van eenen Douane-Commissie ter beslissing van geschillen tusschen Douane ambtenaren en invoerders en uitvoerders.

De heer Shepperson diende eene petitie in van 77, en eene andere van 108 inwoners van de afdeling Cradock, alsorens eene burger-wet gepaseerde wordt.

Dr. Tancered diende eene petitie in van 55 inwoners van Piketberg, en eene andere van 62 inwoners van Bergvriev, tegen de burger-wet.

Het commissie op gewigten en maten diende eene brief van den heer Maclear, welken ter tafel werd gelegd.

Dr. Tancered vroeg den Kolon. Secretaris, op wienz aanbeveling en tot wat einde zekere personen onlangs a s Verzetters waren benoemd in het distrikt Clauwilliam, de Secretaris antwoorde, dat het was om te voorzien in de behoeften van het publiek, en meer byzonder ter bescherming van kooplieden en anderen betrokken in de Nannquand koper-mynen.

Dr. Tancered verzocht verlyf zyn voorstel in te trekken ontreud de onrpydelde kolonie voor vrye Instellenge, waarin het Huis bewilligde; maar de heer Fairbairn stelde voor dat voorst-l uitteschrappen uit te notulen van het Huis, en dit voorstel werd aangenomen, hebbende Dr. Tancered vooraaf oehelderd dat hy daarmede niet gemeerd had het Huis te bejegeren.

Op voorstel van den heer Arnerde werd een commissie benoemd om onzr zek te doen naar de beweringen verlat in eene zekere petitie van de inwoners van Ruidobach en Molwary.
