THE ZUID-AFRIKAAN.

Cape Town, March 2, 1854.

THOUGH the public mind was a good deal preoccupied with one thing and another, no small degree of interest has been evinced in the case **WEBER** vs **VAN DER SPUY**, first tried by the Resident Magistrate of Beaufort and afterwards brought under review in the Supreme Court. The importance of the case was readily acknowledged by all, because its decision would go to establish a precedent in a very delicate matter, that of assigning proper limits to the privileges of members of Church Courts.

What are those privileges? is in itself a very important question, but it becomes doubly so, when we consider that it can hardly be answered without touching on a more general question: what is, or ought to be the relation between Church and State? This we all know is very debatable ground, and the inquiry is of such magnitude, that the Supreme Court of this Colony can hardly be expected to settle the point, and (to its credit be spoken) has too much good sense to attempt it.

Courts of Justice deal with individual cases, not with abstract principles; and yet no case can be decided without some reference, either expressed or implied, to a principle; and it is not uncommon for lawyers to dwell at some length on such principles, especially when great authorities differ as to their real nature. On such occasions, though much may have been advanced on both sides of the question, the matter in dispute may ultimately be left where it was before; and yet it would not be right to say, that such disquisitions amount to a mere waste of words and a loss of time. Many people, much less informed on these subjects than either the bench or the bar, may thence derive the materials of forming an opinion of their own, and it can never be uninteresting to hear men of distinguished abilities, such as some of our legal gentlemen undoubtedly are, express their views on subjects of primary importance, on which, in the exercise of their profession, they have bestowed more attention, than the bulk of mankind can afford. Sixteen columns of a newspaper are rather too much for a common reader, and yet that is the space occupied by the report of the abstruse trial. Perhaps a few extracts tending to define the privileges of church courts will be acceptable in a condensed form.

The Attorney General showed from Ordinance No. 7 of 1843, that the members of church courts were allowed, and in the discharge of their duty bound to report scandals and immoralities that came to their knowledge, and were not actionable for anything written or spoken in a church court bona fide and without malice—which is tantamount to saying that for words spoken mala fide an action would lie. The civil courts must judge of this as well as of the legal privileges of ecclesiastical courts.

From these words of the Attorney General it appears that Church Courts are in the exercise of their privileges to a certain extent under the control of Civil Courts. By Ordinance No. 7 it is provided that Church laws shall not affect secular interests, and laying that down as a principle, it would be a glaring incongruity to allow a Church Court or a member of such a Court, in the course of its proceedings, to do that, which the Church laws are prohibited from doing.

As regards the relation of the church and state Mr. Advocate C. J. BRAND showed that the Dutch Reformed Church was subject to the state, inasmuch as the States General could call a Synod and send Commissioners to such Synod, who took an active part in the proceedings, and that the rules of the church were submitted to Government for its sanction. And on this head the Attorney General was very explicit, using, if the report is correct, the following words: "Now, I am for all the fair privileges of the church, but I am not for letting the Church herself be the judge of what her privileges are, and I therefore object both to the Roman Catholic theory and to the kindred theory of the Free-Church. The state is and should be the supreme power, and the civil courts must try all claims of churches and church courts to special privileges, and not merely fix the proper limits of those privileges, but determine when those limits are observed and when they are transgressed." And Mr. Justice MURRAY makes the following statement: "If the Church Courts shall, on any occasion, transgress the limits which have been assigned to their jurisdiction, or be guilty of any palpable abuse of their legitimate powers, in derogation of the rights of the members of the respective congregations, they will, under the terms of the Royal Charter of Justice, and the common law of Holland, be clearly amenable to the control of the Judges of the Supreme Court."

We shall send these extracts with the words of Mr. Justice BELL bearing on this point. "It is proper, however, as the applicant and his Rev. adviser in the court below seem to have thought that the respondent was not in any respect amenable to the Civil Courts for acts done in a Church Court, that I should say expressly, that that is a complete misapprehension, and that every man, whether clerical or lay, is answerable before the Civil Courts for whatever he may say or do in a Church Court to the prejudice of any of Her Majesty's subjects, unless he can not only allege, but prove also to the satisfaction of these courts, that he comes within the purview, and is entitled to the benefit of the 9th Section of the Church Ordinance."

We shall not comment on the above extracts. Suffice it to say that they are the highest authority that the Colony can afford on one of the most important questions, and while we do not dissimulate that we acquiesce in the opinion thus unanimously expressed by men of no mean abilities, that Church Courts are and ought to be under the control of Civil Courts, we most willingly confess, that this our declaration does not add any appreciable weight to that opinion. On the other hand we allow, that to define exactly the relation of Church and State is a problem so beset with difficulties, that we almost despair of ever seeing it solved in a satisfactory manner.
