DE ZUID-AFRIKAAN. Kaapstad den 23 Maart 1854. Wy kunnen niet nalaten onze lezers en het publiek in betalemen geluk te wenschen met den uitslag der kiezing voor den Wetgevenden Raad. Wy wagen het niet gelykheid van verdienste aan de vyftien geslaagde kandidaten toe te tekenen, noch zyn wy zulke verbinde bewonderaars van vertegenwoordigend bestuur als om te beweron dat de uitslag eenen kiezing de oftebare maatstaf is van verdienste. De mogelykheid bestaat ten minsten, dat een kleine minderheid, zeg twee of drie van de vyftien, zich eerder vernederd dan verhoogd gevoelen wanneer zy zich de middelen te bidden brengen, waardoor zy het verheven standpunt hebben bereikt h-twek zy nu bekleeden, in ver-eeniging met de meest verdienstelyke hanner mede-burgers. Wat ons gevoelen ook moge zyn om n't die gevallen welke uitzondering maken, behooren wy thans op die Heeren te zien, zoo ver als wy daartoe in staat zyn, met een gelyk oordeel, daar de stem des volks hen allen waardig verklaard heeft tot een z'plaats in den hoogerem tak van onze plaatslyke wetgeving. Geef hen ruim baan en laten wy ons oordeel opschorten tot dat wy hen hebben z'n handelen. Zy kunnen niet dan h't gewigt gevoelen der verantwoordelykheid welke zy op zich genomen hebben door de requisities aanteemen welke aan hen gedreseed zyn geworden; zy kunnen niet dan bewust zyn dat de oogen der gansche kolonie op hen gevestigd zyn, dat hun elk wone en daad nauwkeurig overwoogen en door een vrye drukpers behandeld zal worden; om kort te gaan, dat zy verantwoordelyk zyn aan de vierschar van publieke opinie. Wy kunnen het gevoelen dat zulk een soestand, terwyl het werkt als een sterken spoor-slag om uitteblikken, tevens een krachtigede betuiging zyn zal op al hetgeen hetwek zoo kunnen strekken om eenen vertegenwoordiger te doen dalen in de actieng zynen constituenten. De meest verhevene karakters zullen beegerig zyn hune opreghtheid onbezoeeld te bewaren, en mannen die hune principes naar omstandigheden schikken zullen binnen de palen blyven, uit vrees van by verglyk ongunstig af-sterken. Het volk dezer Kolonie heeft een gedeelte van de taak hetzelve opgedrag—die om vertegenwoordigers te kiezen voor beide takken der Wetgeving,—op een lervolde wyze vo'bragt. In alle zaken van belang behoort oerylyg vermyd te worden. Het is daarom een verstandige voorziening in onze Constitutie Orlonnantie dat de kiezing voor de Wetgevende Vergadering geen plaats vinden zal voordat 31 volle dagen, na de Proclamatie van zodanige kiezing, zullen zyn verloopden. De tubebentyd kan tot eenig doel worden aangewend door requisities aan kandidaten te tekenen. Laten alle mannen die eenige aanspraak maken in oogenschouw genomen en hune onderscheiden verdiensten billik behandeld worden; het is de beste voorbereiding voor hune beoeming. Laten zy tot spraken geract worden, opdat wy weten mogen wat in hen is. Eene bloote requisitie legt geen vrplichting op. Een man kan zonder onbestaanbaarheid eene requisitie voor A te tekenen en zyne stem aan B geven. Het doel der requisitie kan enkel geveest zyn den kandidaat te voorschyn te doen komen met het doel om te weten te komen over welk deel van populariteit hy schikken kan. Het doel des volk moet zyn de beste s'nd mannen te bekomen, en het is daarom wenschlyk dat sluiemerkende verdiensten en bekwaamheden uit de minsteris te voorschyn worden gebracht, zoo dat elk man tot het doel van wetgeving geschikt, behoorlyk gewogen en getoetst kan worden voordat wy tot eenze kiezing overgaan.
