DE ZUID-AFRIKAAN. Kaapstad, den 4 September 1856.

HET Amerikaanse vraagstuk, in al deszelfs trekkingen besoud, neemt een gedaante aan welke een voortdoring van vrede tusschen Engeland en Amerika, eenigzins onzeker maakt. In de staatkundige, gelyk in de natuurlyke wereld, brengt wrywing warmte te weeg, en wanneer warmte een zekere graad van spanning bereikt, zyn hevige losbaringen geene ongewone verschyngsels. Nu heestaer er tusschen Engeland en Amerika een aanmerkelijke wrywing op meer dan een punt, of om niet figuurlyk te spreken, bestaan er verschiedene oorzaken voor onangenaam gevoel tusschen de twee verzyvende Mogendheden.

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ONVERWACHTE AANKOMST UIT ENGBLAND.—Gisterd worden verdu de ingezetenen van deze stad op een aangename wyse verlast door de aankomst van een steenboot, de Imperator, uit Engeland, van waar zy op den 25 July vertrokken is. Zy heeft 150 man van het 80 regt aan boord, en een ommekeerd nog drie andere steenbootten, allen met troepen voor de Kolonie, worden gevuld, hebbende het meeste van de ongewerdenden staat onder geresangeldheden, het Gouvernement geroopt, om de militair magt sibil met de regementen te versterken.

Het staatkundig nieuws by deze geleghenheid ontangen is van weinig belang, en bypalt sich hoofdelyk tot de byzonderheden van eenen te Madrid uitgebroken opstand, welke echter weder was gesluit. In h t Amerikaanse vraagstuk hadden geene rieve verwikkeling aan plaats gevonden. Het voorstel van den heer Moore i h t Engelsche Parlement, om het Gouvernement te berispen voor deszelfs gedrag in de Amerikaanse onderhandelingen, werd verworpen door eenes meerderheid van 274 tegen 80. Hetzelve had uitsluitelyk betrekking op de handelingen van den heer Crampton en men trachtte aantoonende dat de wetten der Vereenigde Staten, geschonden waren, en dat de Engelsche minister die schending niet alleen onachtzaam had toegelaten, maar kwade trouw gepleegd had ten opzichte van het Amerikaansche en zyn eigen Gouvernement. Men gevoelde echter dat ofschoen de zaak was afgedaan en een b. handeling van hetzelve geene nut kon doen, er wel grond was voor ongerustheide zoolang Engeland niet de Washington verdrag geworuld was. Berigten uit Amerika melden, dat het niet vergeten van den Amerikaanse minister, door het Engelsche Gouvernement, groote voldoening had verschaft, en dat het gevoelen om vrede te bewaren, des mogelyk, sterker en meer algemeen geworden was.

HET DUTSCHE LEGION.—De Morning Chronicle van den 23 July zegt, dat het land met genoegzame aankondiging zal ontvange door Lord Palmerston in het Parlement te gaaten, dat het Duitse legioen, met den meest mogelyken spoed zal worden afgedankt.

De Naval en Military Gazette, betooft in een lang artikel de gepastheid om aan de Kaap de Hoop een militair depot op te richten, ter bereiding van de troepen, zoo hier als elders vereisd. Het bidt segt, dat er gedurende eenige jaren, alschiedende van de militie, minstens 10,000 man op de grenzen der kolonie zullen worden vereisd.

BRAND AAN ROEDBOECH.—Enige toekloozte pronsen op 11 Zondas een vuur sangstoken hebbende op den top van Duivelsberg, blf hetzelve voortbranden tot den volgenden avond, waoner het schielyk langs den berg afkwam, en spoedig de nabylende bereikte van Rondebosch, Claremont en Wnburg. Het arm in de stad gegeven zynde, b. gaven zich de municipale en militaire brandspuiten dadelyk derwaarts, maar het spyt ons te zeggen dat verschiedene buitengebouwen van den heer De Suidt en Mevr. Logie, intusschen in de asch verbrand, werden.—Men segt dat deze gebouwen verasuurerd waren.

WAAKEN.—Het wrak van de Star of Empire, werd onlangs te Port Elizabeth verkocht, aan de heer Deane & Johnson van de Kaapstad, voor £1425. De wrakken van de Thames en Sarah Lydia, zullen mede binnen kort worden verkocht. Al deze schepen zyn afgekeurd ten gevolge van schade, bekomen gedurende 'het jonste eestumige weder op de hoogte van Algoa Bay.

STAAFT DER GENZIE.—Eene buitengewone Gazette, op last van den Gouverneur, te Grahamstown gepubliceerd op den 26 ultimo, herat braven van de onderzette Kaffer commissarissen aan den Hoof-Commissaris, Kol. Madras, alle welke aantoonende dat de opgewektheid onder de inlander bedraaf was, en dat alles nu een vreedzaam en rustig uitzigt had. De Gouverneur had de commissarissen bevolen zoo veel koren optekopen als zy konden, en eenige der opperhoofden, die zulks verkozen, vorschotten in geld te geven ten einde het vee opte oopen van die stammen die hetzelve verkochten, ten einde zoo doende gelyk voorgekomen. Van dit laatste aantal had de Staat slechts bevestigd. Andere Kaffers die geld hadden, waken niet in gebreke gebleven hun voordeel te doen. Het schynt echter dat het slagten en verkoopen van vee, enz. naguoeg geendlyk was: daarenboven zyn de Kaffers eenigzins zoo dwaas niet geweest om hun koren van de hand te zetten; inteedel, zool commissaris Brownlee als de heer Vigne vonden bykans overal dat eenige geoegeenae hoeveelhede sandkoren was bewaard geworden, en ook dat de Kaffers hunne landerijen in gereedheid hadden gebracht en slechts wachtende waren op het zaai in den grond te brengen. Een ander bevestigd dat de Kaffers in gereedheid waren, dat zy op vele plaatsen druk bezig waren met het repareren der oude en het aanbooven van nieuwe huizen. Van den profect of toover-doctor wordt er geen woord gezegd. Dit, in vereeniging met het staken van hunne dolandige bedryven, zou tot de gevolytregking leiden dat zyn ryk slechts van korten duur is geweest.

the burgher law in the commencement to several persons known, and himself one of them, and the people in the country not having had the means of obtaining proper information of subsequent proceedings, had remained under the impression, and that he of course had voted for it. Had Mr. L. said, only that he had voted against the burgher law when they waited upon him on the 11th August, they should have understood the matter, and he would have given him leave instead of the matter, and he would have been most happy to convey a vote of thanks from the meeting to Mr. Loedel for his faithful manner he had discharged his duties to his constituents in Parliament, particularly for his opposition to the burgher law, if any one would move the same, not that he Dr. G. agreed with Mr. Loedel's proceedings, for instance in the emigration question, but even in that, his only fault was being too cautious, a fault on the right side.

The plan of the Governor, as submitted to Parliament in a bill for that purpose, viewed in the light of a commercial resolution, would have given the colony more than one hundred per cent profit on the outlay, by increasing the revenue, and consumers alone of articles paying customs duties, without taking into consideration the benefit of the emigrants' labour.

It was not to be expected, the Dr. said, that every member of Parliament from the country should be versed in political science, but with the experience and information which Mr. L. had gained he would not be able to see his way clearly, and a more useful member they could not desire.

Mr. J. Hamman then moved the vote of thanks in the words suggested.

Mr. A. Siebritz seconded it, and it was carried by acclamation.

It was also moved by Mr. J. Hamman and seconded by Mr. H. van der Merwe, and carried unanimously. That a report of the proceedings with a copy of the resolution submitted for consideration be forwarded to the *Zuid-Afrikaansche*, that the inhabitants of this division may have time to read and consider the same before the meeting on the 25th inst., and that the meeting be held on the 25th inst., and that the resolution be embodied into a petition to both Houses of Parliament as reasons for repeal of the burgher law, and to support a committee for the purpose of getting it signed, as numerous as possible.

The next subject discussed was the Road from Agter Paarlburg to Cape Town.

Mr. Hamman as well as Mr. Siebritz and others were of opinion that they could not do without the old line of road to Lichtenburg, on account of the water at Almans Henk, and that the new line of road, which Dr. Gird proposed to attend to in the divisional council when that line was again brought forward, and the state of the road also between Mouters place and Hamman's, which being extremely impassable in some places, the public are indebted to that gentleman for the means of getting to and from their over his private property.

Dr. Gird mentioned the present state of the council's affairs with regard to road matters, and the conditions he had made upon agreeing to the assessment of a rate, viz: that when district should be in its own power to put any branch or market road in order, or the same as he had advocated at a public meeting at Malmesbury, before the divisional council were established, and which was generally understood that these were to be the conditions, which were highly approved of by the meeting as the fairest and only proper way that justice can be done to the rate payers.

The central road was thoroughly condemned for the neglect of the Malmesbury Division, and continuance of the Wellington line of main road in its present out of the way crookedness so much to the south, after the Paarl line had been completed, and it ought to have been brought to the north about the old line of Road which, with a short branch from the corner of Paarlburg, would have served both Wellington and Tubbach as well as the back country people who travel on that line.

The Cape Agricultural Society was another interesting topic of discussion. Dr. Gird pointed out to the meeting the present state of affairs in this Colony, which he said showed the necessity for united efforts on the part of the colonists generally, for all were concerned—but particularly the farmers to make their lands more productive, with improved manure, to economise labour, and to put a stop to all boasting about the prosperity of the Colony, which pointed to the *Government Gazette* of the 31st inst., which showed from returns which could not be doubted, that the difference between the value of articles produced and exported from this colony, and articles entered for consumption imported was £131,207 balance against the Colony in one quarter alone ending 30th June of this year!

And that although there was an increase in favour of the Colony on wool alone, during the same period in 1855 and the present year, as a result of the same, would sweep away the brightening prospect.

On dried fruits and wines there was a gratifying increase of production, and every encouragement for the farmers to extend their cultivation as well as to improve the qualities of articles produced.

Mr. Hamman said he had extended his plantations of fruit trees considerably, and Mr. Siebritz also.

Dr. G. then explained the advantages of combined action in one society for general improvement of productive industry and that of the colony, and that it would put any man to inconvenience 5 Rix. per annum, he was sure, they would all subscribe, and those who choose to give £1 per annum might be eligible to serve on the committee, and they could have their farms and shops in the rural districts to which their wives and families could all come and make their social and pleasant meetings.

To this all agreed, and it only remains now to show by means of a comprehensive prospect how this to be carried out, and as a very man, woman and child in the colony is concerned in the abundance of good and cheap food for consumption, as well as export, there ought to be a general contribution towards this desirable end from all classes, or a grant from Parliament and a board of agriculture established, with some sort of agency in each division, for general improvement of agriculture and rural economy, nursery gardens for the supply of trees in each division, and the whole face of the country would soon change its appearance, the resources of it increased—and the grant repaid a hundred fold in the improvement it would be the means of producing, if the right men were placed in the right places, and the agricultural interests of the colony were to become the primary consideration of government, as they ought to be, from whence it derives its support.

The following are the Resolutions proposed to be submitted to the meeting at Malmesbury in October next:

1st Resolution.—That the establishment of an organized force under Act No. 1853, capable of being brought into an efficient state, and sufficient number to supply the place of regular troops for the defence of this colony against unprovoked aggression on the sea or land side of it, is as impracticable, as it would be impolitic to attempt it, because the population in the aggregate is so small in number in proportion to the extent of it and scattered so widely apart in the rural districts, that it will be a matter of difficulty at all times for the inhabitants to combine for mutual defence, even against any outbreak that might occur in their respective divisions.

2nd Resolution.—That any conditions with the British Government that may have been entered into in the name of the colonists, to undertake the defence of the colony for the purpose of obtaining the new constitution, have been unauthorized by them, who will know that in the event of a war with England and any powerful European or American nation, the colonists cannot sustain themselves against the attacks of large bodies of disciplined forces, but must remain dependent upon the protection of British troops as heretofore.

3rd Resolution.—That while this meeting acknowledges the necessity for some provision for internal defence, and are willing to enrol themselves in volunteer companies to support the lawful authorities in preserving peace and good order within the limits of this division; their circumstances will not admit of any portion of their small community being withdrawn from their industrial occupations for doing garrison duty, or to form a standing army for defence of the coast in time of war.

4th Resolution.—That it is the opinion of this meeting, and consequently, unlawful, that the sentence pronounced by the Circuit Court of Landdrosts thereupon, cannot be confirmed.

5th Resolution.—That the Court is consequently of opinion that the irregularities which have arisen in and through the verdicts of the jury, the whole trial was rendered irregular, and declares the trial of the said Charles Leo Cox to have been consequently irregular; and that therefore orders that the

5th Resolution.—That it is the opinion of this meeting that a petition should be drawn up and addressed to both Houses of Parliament embodying the foregoing resolutions, and praying for immediate repeal of the Act No. 18, 1855.

6th Resolution.—That a committee of four or six gentlemen, inhabitants of this division, be nominated and appointed for the purpose of carrying out the above resolution, and that H. Loedel, Esq. be requested to present the petition to the House of Assembly, and the Hon. J. H. Wicht, Esq., to the Legislative Council.

Frontier Affairs.
His Excellency the Governor reached this on Saturday last, and proceeds to-morrow morning to King William's Town. The Gazette Extraordinary which we noticed in the Post-script to our last issue, and which was published in Cape Town, has been followed by another published here. This plan cannot be too highly approved of, for the documents published in this form will enable the farmer to judge for himself, from something definite, as to the probabilities of a disturbance, there is less cause now, in proportion as official notifications are circulated, for giving heed to "rumours" originating no one knows where. The Gazette before us contains a report to the Chief Commissioner from Mr. Vigne, dated at Pat's Great Place, Aug. 29th, which contains nothing calculated in the remotest degree, as far as we can see, to cause uneasiness. "Everywhere," says Mr. Vigne, "I remarked the crops had been lately repaired and thinned, and that there were bundles of Kafir corn kept ready for planting at the Kierakama Mouth."—Again, "a man named Van Vinty, said that all the Kafirs had seed corn, but not fit for planting; and Mr. Lamont pointed out a garden of large extent which had been enlarged and cleared ready to dig up at the first rain." "At one place on the banks of the Kierakama, I saw white building, and Mr. Lamont pointed out a kraal of 6 or 8 huts all newly made."—and ends which the following paragraph.

"I must say that the greatest of civility was shown everywhere. Milk for us, and food of all kinds for policemen and Mr. Warner's servant, was given without any demur whatever. Our horses I left out loose every night, and Mr. Lamont said his horses were never tied up at night. One of Pat's principal men, Jan, came to meet me, in order to lay before me some complaint."

Then are given letters from Mr. C. Brownlee, Gaika Commissioner, dated 18th and 22nd inst. These state that "the sale of cattle is now suspended," that "the reckless killing and destruction of horned cattle have happily subsided in this neighbourhood," and that "the favourable indications continue" and in a subsequently written dispatch gives the following:—

"I saw the Chief Oba, the day before yesterday at his kraal on the Kei. I had a satisfactory meeting with the Chief and his councillors,—all the principal councillors and about three hundred of the people having assembled to meet me.

"I observed nothing worthy of remark at the numerous kraals by which I passed. I was everywhere cordially received, and no hostility was shown in the most remote degree."

"This was quite what I expected to find, all my information regarding the tribe having been of the most favorable nature."

"Since my return home yesterday, I have had no direct information regarding Sandi Is or the Gaiikas in their neighbourhood, but what I have heard is satisfactory."

"I have heard nothing new regarding Krel and the Gaiikas."

Lastly is given a letter from Major Gawler, Magistrate with Umhlati, dated 22nd inst., who also says that "for the last ten days neither cattle, goats, or any other commodity have been brought to or past my place,"—and adds that "whenever such things were brought for sale it was invariably Gaiikas who brought them."

So far then as may be concluded from official documents, everything appears favorable amongst these tribes, and all we can do is to hope that they will continue so. It is undoubtedly a very difficult matter, which may fairly puzzle a wise head, how to deal with an evil which has threatened and yet may do so, to end in a general blaze. His Excellency is however, in the opinion of his experience in dealing with natives will probably enable him to do so, some measures whereby the dreaded evil may be averted or at least postponed, till the probability of assistance from the expected Germans would enable us to deal with the evil in a decisive and probably final manner.—*Am. Afr. Review*

ORANGE RIVER FREE STATE.—The last number of the *Bloemfontein Gazette* contains a report of the proceedings of the Executive Council, to which body the case of the prisoner Cox had been referred in appeal. After due examination of the minutes of proceedings and evidence taken during the trial, the Council with regard to the verdict of the jury and the sentence pronounced upon it by the Court of Landdrost, decided as follows:—

1.—This Court cannot concede that, because trial by "Jury" has by the Constitution been introduced into this State, it thence necessarily follows, that all laws and customs relating thereto, whether in Great Britain, or elsewhere, must of consequence be regarded as having been adopted, or of effect, in this State.

2.—This Court considers, that none other than such enactments for the regulation of jury trials, as have already been, or may hereafter be framed or adopted here,—ought to be strictly kept in view; and that in so far as in this respect no express provisions may have been made, the Courts are at liberty to proceed, or decide, according to their discretion; provided always, that such proceeding, or decision, exclusively regard the form, and do not extend to evident injustice, or unfairness, as well with regard to the prosecutor as to the accused; and likewise with reference to the jury.

3.—This Court cannot therefore admit it as an established rule in this State, that the Circuit Courts,—after receiving a verdict of the Jury, and even after the same has been written down, and so long as the Court has been deliberating on the nature or legality of such verdict, and while the jury are still in their seats, and not discharged, or before the accused, or his attorney, shall have been permitted to speak, or shall have stated his objections against such verdict, or have made any application in reference to such verdict of the jury, and consequently also before the Court shall have pronounced any decision, or sentence, against the accused,—should not be entitled, whether of their own motion, or at the instance of the Public Prosecutor, to decide that such verdict of the jury is irregular, unlawful, or otherwise inadmissible, and to direct the jury to take the matter into further consideration, and to return an other, or an amended verdict.

4.—That when, however, such other, or amended verdict shall have been delivered by the jury, it shall be taken, and regarded, and minuted by itself, in relation to the former verdict, either wholly or in part, but the first one shall in such case be regarded as wholly cancelled and annulled.

5.—That the first verdict of the jury in the case against Charles Leo Cox, now before the Court, and noted in the Minutes of the Circuit Court, was irregular, incomplete, and unlawful, inasmuch as it neither contains any distinct verdict, nor shows the prisoner to be either guilty or not guilty of any crime charged against him in the indictment, under the three counts of said indictment, or of what crime he is guilty.

6.—That the Court was consequently entitled to direct the jury to take their verdict again into consideration, and to return an amended, but distinct and lawful verdict, on each of the several crimes charged against the prisoner in the indictment.

7.—That the jury however, instead of returning such amended or new verdict, gave merely an explanation (upholding) of their meaning, regarding the second count of the indictment, which could not be received as an explanation, being directly at variance with their first verdict; and that the jury likewise in this explanation or second verdict, gave no decision regarding the guilt or innocence of the prisoner under the first and third counts of the indictment.

8.—This Court therefore decides, that the two forementioned verdicts of the jury, whether taken separately or together, are unsatisfactory, irregular, indistinct, doubtful, and consequently, unlawful; and that the sentence pronounced by the Circuit Court of Landdrosts thereupon, cannot be confirmed.

9.—This Court decides further, that in consequence of the irregularities which have arisen in and through the verdicts of the jury, the whole trial was rendered irregular, and declares the trial of the said Charles Leo Cox to have been consequently irregular; and that therefore orders that the

judicial proceedings in this trial, under which are comprised the verdicts of the jury, and the sentence of the Court now in revision before this Court, be annulled and set aside, just as if such trial had never taken place; with leave to the State-Attorney (should he deem fitting) to cause the prisoner to be assigned another trial, for the crime of murder, with the object of doing the same as was done in the case of his children, Susanna Maria and Charlotte (Antoinette).

10.—With reference to the Landdrost of Caledon River quitting the Bench after the whole trial was completed, and nothing more remained to be done than to pronounce sentence,—and the supplying of the vacant seat by a new appointment, this Court declares that, a *de jure* Constitution and Laws of this State, it does not find that such new appointment, and the pronouncing of the sentence by a majority, involve any illegality in the trial of a criminal case.

11.—This Court, at the same time, feels itself constrained to remark here, that the conduct of the Landdrost of Caledon River above-mentioned, in quitting the Bench, the way in which the same was done, and the remarks made by him in public regarding the inexperience of the Court, and more especially on the conduct of the presiding Landdrost, are in the highest degree censurable, and in direct repugnance to the Regulations in Ordinance No. 1, 1856, section "Judicial Authority," articles 9 & 10, and manifestly arose from partiality towards the prisoner, and deliberate seeking the verdict, or to direct the jury to return a second verdict. Mr. Kolbe also dissects from Paragraphs 5, 6, and 8, being of opinion that the aim of the jury may clearly be inferred from the verdict, that it was inconsiderate killing or manslaughter, and that the Court ought to have passed sentence accordingly.

Mr. Kolbe farther dissects from paragraph 9, and contends that no new trial ought to be granted.

It appears from the said report that Mr. Attorney Vels, Counsel for the prisoner Cox, was struck off the roll of the Attorneys of the State, for bringing a memorial against the presiding Landdrost at the late trial, calculated to bring the Courts of the State into disrepute and contempt, and further, for having during the said trial pronounced an appeal to the Executive Council, "an atrocious mockery."

A similar judgment was given in the case of Mr. Attorney Orpen, who also signed the objectionable memorial, unless he should show cause to the contrary before the next sitting of the Council.
