DE ZUID-AFRIKAAN.

Kaapstad, den 18 December 1856.

Er was een tyd toer weerstand tegen wanbestuur en misbruik van magt als onverantwoordelyk werd beschouwd. Het was natuurlyk voor de geestelykheid dat leerstelsel te handhaven, want geen ligchaam menschen had meer magt of oefende het willekeuriger uit.

Vryheid van geweten was de eerste stap tot staatkundige vryheid, en hietoe behoort het recht om niet alleen onwettig gezag weerstand te bieden, maar elke daad van het Bewind, welke duidelek aandruischt tegen de belangen van het volk. Over dit onderwerp drukt de heer SMITH O'BRIEN zich aldus uit: "LOCKE zegt: — In alle staten en toestanden is het waar het middel van geweld zonder gezag om er geweld tegen te stellen. Het gebruik van geweld zonder gezag stelt hem die hetzelve gebruikt altyd in eenen staat van oorlog als den aanvaller, en stelt hem bloot dienovereenkomstig te worden behandeld. Maar niet alleen is de burger geregtvaardig daden weerstand te bieden, die duidelek in tweestryd zyn met de Wet en de Constitutie van het land waarin hy woont, hy kan ook geregtvaardig zyn wanbestuur het hoofd te bieden, zelfs al ware het niet strydig met de wet. Ware zulk een weerstand niet veroorloofd, zouden misbruiken en tirannie eenmaal gevestigd, ver- oordelid worden. Ik zal niet terug gaan tot de dagen der Siciliaansche tirannen, of van de Keizerlyke Censuur, maar myn vergoengen, het jongste geval aanhalen dat ter myner kennis is ge- komen, waarin weerstand aan wanbestuur geregtvaardig zoude geweest zyn; zelfs al ware dat wanbestuur niet strydig met de wet. Slechts eenige maanden zyn verlooplen sedert de Austr- alische Kolonies van Groot Brittanje zich onledig hielden met eene twist met het Moederland, op grond der aanhoudende transportatie van misdadigers naar die Kolonies. Eene aansoeschaling van bedriegers waren verzonnen, en zelfs ge- bruikt tot ze uitgeput waren, door opvolgende Koloniale Secretarissen, ter verdediging van dez- volhardende schending van de begereten en belan- gen van de Inzeten van Australie. Indien die volwassene maatschappijen door geweld den in- voer van de vereenigde misdaden van het Ryk in hun- nen boezem weerstand hadden geboden, zou het gansche menschedom hebben verklaard dat een toe- vlugt tot de wapenen in zulk een twist tot eer zo gestrekt hebben aan diegenen die dezelve droegen, zelfs al hadde dit aanleiding gegeven tot open opstand tegen het gezag van het moederland. Die uitslag werd verniyd door een trage inwilliging aan het gevoelen van Australie, maar de inwilli- ging geeschiede eerder uit aanmerking van de belangen van Engeland en dit vrees voor den uitslag van eenen stryd, dan uit eene juiste schatting van de eischen en begoerten van de ingezetenen van Australie."

De schryver zou een koetbaar lid zyn van het Comitee, ter verbetering van de Insolvente Wet. Lat-er wy hem hooren over de verschil- lende gra de van misdadigheid van Insolventen: — "Gevangenisshap voor schulden is een inbreuk op personeele vryheid welke zeer twyfelachtig is in beginsel, ooschoon het het gebruik geweest is van bykans alle beschafte volken.

"De niet-betaling eener schuld is in eenige gevallen eene crimineele daad en behoort als zoodanig te worden gestraft. In andere gevallen ontstaat het uit onvoorzien en onovermydelek omstandigheden, en behoort de straf niet te ont- vangen, allen op middaaf gesteld.

"Hy die schuld maakt onder belofte dezelve afte- dragen, terwyl hy geen regmatige hoop bezit in staat te zyn dezelve te betalen, is een zwende- laar. Hy die schuld maakt, met het vaste voornem- en dezelve niet te betalen, is een dief. Hy die de middelen hebbende een wettige schuld te betalen, dezelve terug houdt, is schuldig aan bedrog. In zulke gevallen, is gevangenisshap voor schuld, slechts eene blylike verdediging, en behoort den misdadiger te worden opgelegd, gelijk een straf wordt gegeven voor enige andere misdad tegen de zamenleving.

"Aan den anderen kant zyn er talloze gevallen, waarin de non-betaling van een schuld ontstaat uit onvoorzienne uvalen en ongelukken, en waarin de schuldenaar gewillig maar niet in staat is, de verbintenissen door hem aangegaan, te voldoen.

"Het is niet gemakkelek een onderscheid te maken tussehen de gevallen waarin een schulde- naar in gebreke blijft eene schuld af te dragen, door een bedriegelyk voornemen en die waarin de niet-betaling van een schuld ontstaat uit onschul- dig ongeluk. By alle gewone gelegenheden, behoort het eigendom, niet de persoon van den schuldenaar, ter beschikking te worden gesteld; en gevangenisshap voor schulden behoort alleen be- waard te blyven voor zulke gevallen, waarin het voornemen tot bedriegen, duidelek kan worden bewez- en; — De wet voorziet reeds voor de straf van diegenen die schuldig staan aan verryemding en zwende- len; zoodat het de moeelykheid erkent om bedriegelyk voornemen te ontdekken. De eenigste twyfel in ons oemped was, waarom Kapitein Juita niet meer dan 12 vademmen kabel heeft gegeven aan zyn stuurboord anker toen by hetzelve vallen liet; maar daar Kapitein Juita en zyn stuurman zeggen dat er geen tyd was, en er geen getuigenis ten het tegendeel voor ont- was, zyn wy verpligt te besluiten dat alles gedaan is wat het mogelyk streken konde om het vartuyg te redden.

THE ZUID-AFRIKAAN.

Cape Town, December 18, 1856.

THERE was a time when resistance to misgovernment and abuse of power was held unjustifiable. It was natural for the Clergy to maintain that doctrine, for no body of men had more power, or exercised it more arbitrarily. Freedom of conscience was the first step to political freedom, and to this belongs the right of resisting not only illegal power, but every act of government that is clearly opposed to the interests of the people. On this subject Mr. SMITH O'BRIEN expresses himself in these terms: "LOCKE says: In all states and conditions the true remedy of force without authority is to oppose force to it. The use of force without authority always puts him that uses it into a state of war as the aggressor, and renders him liable to be treated accordingly. But not only is the citizen justified in resisting acts which are clearly at variance with the law and the constitution of the country in which he lives, he may also be warranted in resisting misgovernment, even though it be not contrary to law. Were not such resistance justifiable, abuses and tyranny, once established, would be for ever perpetuated. I will not go back to the days of the Sicilian tyrants, or of the Imperial Caesars, but will content myself with adducing the most recent instance that has fallen under my observation, in which resistance to misgovernment would have been justifiable; even though that misgovernment were not at variance with law. Only a few months have elapsed since the Australian colonies of Great Britain were engaged in a controversy with the mother country on account of the continued transportation of criminals to these colonies. A tissue of fallacies had been woven, and used even till they became threadbare, by successive Colonial Secretaries, in defence of this persevering violation of the wishes and interests of the inhabitants of Australia. Now, if those adolescent communities had resisted by force the importation of the concentrated crime of the empire into their bosom, all mankind would have pronounced that a resort to arms upon such a quarrel would have done honor to those who bore them, even though it should have led to an open revolt from the dominion of the mother country. This contingency was averted by a tardy concession to the opinion of Australia, but the concession was made rather through consideration for the interests of England, and through apprehension of the result of a struggle, than from a just appreciation of the claims and wishes of the inhabitants of Australia."

The author would be a valuable man on the Committee for amending our insolvent law. Let us hear him on the different degrees of criminality in insolvents: "Imprisonment for debt is an infringement of personal liberty which is very questionable in its principles, although it has been the practice of almost all civilized nations. "The non-payment of a debt is, in some cases, a criminal act, and ought to be punished as such. In other cases it results, from unforeseen and unavoidable circumstances, and ought not to receive the punishment due only to crime. "He who incurs a debt, under promise to discharge it, whilst he has no reasonable hope of being able to pay it, is a swindler. He who incurs a debt, with a deliberate intention not to pay it, is a thief. He who, having means to pay a just debt, withholds payment, is guilty of fraud. In these cases, imprisonment for debt is but an equitable retribution, and ought to be inflicted upon the offender, as a punishment is inflicted for any other offence against society. "On the other hand there are numberless cases, in which the non-payment of a debt arises from unforeseen accidents or misfortune, and in which the debtor is willing, but unable, to discharge obligations which he has incurred. "It is not easy to discriminate between the cases, in which a debtor fails to discharge a debt through fraudulent intention, and those in which non-payment of debt arises from innocent misfortune. On all ordinary occasions, the property, not the person, of the debtor should be placed at the disposal of the creditor; and imprisonment for debt should be reserved only for those cases in which the intention to defraud can be clearly proved. The law already provides for the punishment of those who are guilty of embezzlement and of swindling; so that it recognises the possibility of covering fraudulent intention. The non-payment of debt, under circumstances in which the intention to defraud is manifest, should be placed under this class of crimes, and punished accordingly."

Mr. O'BRIEN is not less outspoken on the subject of oaths as a moral restraint. Perhaps our judges and Magistrates might take a hint from him: "It is very questionable whether oaths of any kind ought to be imposed upon any occasion, either upon private citizens or upon public functionaries. "Swear not at all," is an explicit command, obedience to which can scarcely be otherwise than acceptable to the Divine Lawgiver, as well as useful to the State. Oaths make hypocrites, but afford no protection to society against the misdoings of dishonest men. The penalty attached to the infraction of an oath, not the oath itself, restrains unscrupulous men, and those who are conscientious do not require, or ought not to be harassed by, the imposition of such a test. A French functionary, who has held office during the last forty years, has been compelled to swear allegiance to not less than five different dynasties, whose rights are incompatible with each other, viz. —to the Emperor Napoleon I.—to Louis XVIII. and Charles X.—to Louis Philippe.—to the Republic of 1848.—to Napoleon III. What security has this oath afforded to any of these dynasties in their hour of danger?"

But it is time we should take leave of a book, which as yet has come to us only in extracts, from which we have selected such passages as appeared most likely to recommend it to the reading public of this Colony. We shall finish the selection with a passage on elections and their concomitants: "There is an inconvenience incidental to a system of election, from which it is impossible to escape. This is the frequent recurrence of the ferment and agitation which attend a contest; and the frequent changes of policy which are occasioned by a change of executive officers may also be regarded as a disadvantage. That some inconveniences arise from these distractions cannot be

denied, but, perhaps, they are productive of more good than evil. That climate is not the most healthy in which the air is most tranquil. The storm that sweeps the sky carries away all noxious vapours, and gives new freshness to the animal and vegetable creation. So the spirit of liberty is fanned and kept alive by the movements which disturb the political atmosphere. The preliminaries and incidents of an election—the selection of a candidate—the canvass—the newspaper controversies respecting his opinions and his qualifications—the speeches at the hustings, and the celebration of his triumph, tend to direct the thoughts of the community to a consideration of their political interests, and to generate that vigilance and that discrimination with regard to public men and public measures, which are essential to the maintenance of popular freedom.

"In answer to the objection, that frequent elections involve frequent changes of policy, we may observe, that changes of policy can take place in republican and in constitutional governments, only when a change takes place in the current of public opinion; because these governments are supposed to embody and give effect to public opinion. Now, if we have to choose between permanency of policy, maintained in antagonism to public opinion, and mutability of policy, varying according to the changes of public opinion, we shall not hesitate to prefer the latter evil, if it be an evil, to the former."

It is with great pleasure that we lay before our readers the Report of the Court of Inquiry into the causes of the wreck of the bark Zalt Bonnel. The Master of that ill-fated vessel, Captain Jutta, stands officially acquitted of any neglect or remissness, that might have led to a disaster so sincerely deplorable by all. We have reason to believe that our editorial remarks on that wreck hurt the feelings of some of Captain Jutta's friends. If so, we sincerely regret that general statements, which had not the slightest personal tendency, should have been received in a hostile spirit. Our statement amounted simply to this, that the wreck of the Zalt Bonnel was "one of a series of occurrences, which with common prudence might have been avoided," leaving it to those who were better informed to lay the saddle on the right horse.

That we should have been prejudiced against Captain Jutta, with whom we are not personally acquainted, or against Dutch people in general—this, we are free to say, is an imputation which it is impossible to reconcile with the general tone of our paper. We are willing, however, to make all due allowance for first impressions, knowing that nothing perverts the judgment like a sudden disaster combined with the consciousness that it may entail loss of professional character. If our remarks, which, we repeat it, were not intended to wound any one, have contributed to bring on an Inquiry, which has terminated in the most satisfactory manner for Captain Jutta, we shall easily reconcile ourselves to any amount of obloquy that we may have incurred from the extreme sensitiveness of the Captain's zealous friends:—

REPORT.—His E. the Governor having been pleased to nominate a Court for the purpose of inquiring into the circumstances attending the stranding of the Dutch Bark Zalt Bonnel, commanded by Capt. C. J. Jutta, on the morning of the 3rd December, 1856,—we the undersigned, having been the members of the said Court, and appointed as aforesaid, on the 8th of December, 1856, do now give our opinion, after a very careful and patient inquiry of all the evidence we can obtain;—

That from the evidence we have heard, the loss of the Zalt Bonnel, Capt. Jutta, was accidental, and owing to the light baffling winds and a strong current setting in shore; and that no blame is attached to the Captain, Officers, and Crew, who appear to have used every exertion to keep her off shore.

The only doubt on our mind was, why Captain Jutta did not ever cable on his starboard anchor to more than 12 fathoms when he let it go; but as Captain Jutta and his Mate state that there was no time, and there being no evidence before us to the contrary, we are bound to conclude that everything was done which could possibly tend to save her.

We also consider that Capt. Jutta was perfectly justified in weighing anchor when he did, as it appears from the evidence that there was then blowing a strong and moderate S.E. breeze.

The following letter from Capt. Jamison to the Government, on the subject of the wreck, was also laid before the Court by that officer:—

"The Hon'ble the Secretary to Government. "Sir,—I have the honour to report to you, for the information of His Excellency the Governor, that the Dutch bark Zalt Bonnel, of Rotterdam, C. J. Jutta, master, in getting under weigh yesterday morning at about 7 o'clock, with a light baffling breeze, first from the S.E., then from the N.W. (and when under weigh), was taken aback, and in attempting to wear round, took the ground between the Chronometre Battery and the Mouille Lighthouse, and, in a few hours afterwards, bilged.

Immediately the accident was reported to me, I at once proceeded to the spot with two of the port boats, the Assistant Port-Captain, the port boat's crew, and four extra hands. Two anchors with coil cables were immediately run out, broad upon the starboard or off-shore bow of the vessel, and hove well tight, and which succeeded in turning her head about three points seaward. At this time it was about 11 a.m., and nearly dead low water, and with every prospect of getting her off when the tide rose; but unfortunately a rolling swell just at this moment set in, causing the vessel to strike the ground heavily, when it was observed that she had bilged; and the water flowing fast into the hold, all further attempts to save the vessel were at once abandoned. (Signed) W. P. JAMISON, Port-Captain."

NUT VAN T'ALBEMEN.—The examination of the pupils of this old and esteemed Institution commenced on Tuesday last, and was resumed yesterday and will be continued to-day. The proceedings were opened by the singing of an appropriate hymn by the children and prayer by the Rev. De Heys, who occupied the chair. The examination on the first day was confined to the girls' English and Dutch classes, and on the second day to the boys' Dutch class. On the first day the infant school classes, and on the second day the boys' German class were also examined. The prizes will be distributed to-morrow at 10 o'clock.

THE BAZAAR.—The Bazaar for the benefit of Martins Church is postponed, in consequence of the unfavorable state of the weather, until to-morrow the 19th, at 11 o'clock.

ORANGE FREE STATE.—There is very little news from this quarter. It was not known whether Modiah had already, according to engagement, delivered up the stolen cattle and horses to Fieldcornet Olivier, of the Caldon district. In consequence of the late burning of the commissariat stores, the government had organised a Hottentot guard for the protection of the town. Copious rains had lately fallen, and the rivers had been so full, that the communication with the Cape Colony and Natal had been somewhat impeded.

Commandant General Pretorius passed through Bloemfontein on the 5th instant, on his return from Pauresmith to the Transvaal. It is said that the Transvaal government and people are now at peace with Sechell and all other native Chiefs.

Mr. J. M. Howell, late of Natal, had been appointed Landdrost of Winburg, vice Orpen.

Original Correspondence.

MALAGA'S RIVER BRIDGE.

Mr. Editor.—You will doubtless concur with me when I shall sum up to you the needless waste of money for the construction of the bridge in question. The necessity for bridging the Malaga river, no one will deny, but then it ought to have been made at the right place. Blanco is situated about 5 or 6 miles from George; Malaga River lies on the East side of Blanco, and runs from North to South,—therefore between Blanco and George. The main road from Capetown to Port Elizabeth passes through Blanco; now from Blanco to George two lines have already been made—the one passes through Blanco on the North side, the other through Blanco on the South side. Both these roads have been gravelled, and will cost about £1500. On the East side of Malaga river those two lines unite as far as George; therefore there were two drifts, which are now used, between Blanco and George, and one of these two drifts of the Malaga river ought therefore to have been bridged; but now perhaps we shall come (across) between the two drifts of Malaga river, not perhaps half a mile distant from each other. Mr. Melville, sub-inspector of roads, lately built a fine Mill; he is now engaged in constructing a third road from Blanco to George, and that road runs with a great bend straight to his water mill, and the bridge now stands half completed immediately opposite his mill, and upon which bridge and road, though not yet half completed, from 4 to 4500 have certainly already been expended.

When at the outset the construction of the road was commenced, I could not but think that Mr. Melville made it for his own use, but some time afterwards I heard that Mr. Frans Koeke had to supply rations to the laborers on Melville's bridge and road. I then spoke about it to one of the members of our Divisional Council, who told me that the plan of the new bridge and road had been recommended by Mr. Melville and approved by our Divisional Council, but that he (said member) and another had not been present when the plan to the mill was approved, and that when he came home the expense incurred upon said bridge and road was already too great to object against it.

But Sir, could not the bridge have been made over the upper or lower drift? Now two good roads are abandoned to benefit the mill; and the opinion of the public is that the Government makes that road for Mr. Melville and not for the public. Here the Government is charged with Melville's bridge, and of which the Government is not guilty, and I say blame the Government when it deserves it, but do not lay burdens upon it when it is guiltless. It is not the Government which is the cause of that plan, but Mr. Melville, and approved by the Divisional Council. The expense of those two roads across the Malaga river are now to be placed to the debit of the third road, being about £1100. But the third road, when completed, will cost £750. This mill will cost the Central Board about £2200. You will doubtless now agree with me that it would still be better to abandon the mill road and bridge, and to make the bridge where it ought to have been made, namely at the upper or lower drift of Malaga river, and not at the balance to be applied to the dilapidated bridges on the North side of Montagu Pass, which are lying useless since the last 4 years, and which I am surprised did not attract the attention of the sub-inspector like the mill.

Now, Sir, will not the Government forthwith stop that bridge and new or needless road, and cause the wood collected for said bridge to be removed to the upper or lower drift of Malaga river, and there make the bridge, and thus save the public money? Confident that you, Sir, agree with me about the waste of money on the mill, bridge, I beg to request that you will insert this in your impartial paper. I am, &c., PETRA.

WOOL! WOOL! WOOL!!!

Uitenhage, Dec. 10, 1856. Sir,—It is with great pleasure, I notice two notices in your issue of the 4th instant. I allude to the notice of "wool growing and agricultural improvement," to have its operations at the Cape and of wool sales held in the village of Riversdale. To the latter I would draw your present attention. At the sale in question, I note, that well washed wool fetched as high as 1s. 6d. per lb., and that bad washed wool was refused. I shall feel obliged by you, or any of your numerous correspondents to answer the following query:— Why should wool in Port Elizabeth not fetch more than an average price of 1s. 1½d. at a sea port, when at Riversdale, as in a distant town, 1s. 6d. can be got? It cannot be imputed generally to the bad getting up of the wool for it is a known fact, that the generation of wool grown here, is well washed, packed and delivered, sound and dry in Port Elizabeth. You are told there that free lins are high to England, (a trivial excuse) for the land carriage from Riversdale to a sea port must be nearly as much. In the long run it would be more profitable, though a greater distance, to bring our wool into the Riversdale market. We may learn a lesson from the Riversdale buyers, not to bring foul wool into market, for they (and very properly) refused having anything to do with it. The wool buyers of any market should be careful not to buy wool twice shorn yearly. There are some who do it, to their immediate profit, but to the loss of the honest wool grower. I think those who have made purchases of expensive imported rams, ought to get more than the average price, but in Port Elizabeth, yearly, half-yearly, good or bad blood clips, are all as one.
