THE ZUID-AFRIKAAN.

Cape Town, January 20, 1859.

One of the Candidates for Cape Town, in his speech from the hustings, declared his intention to promote to the utmost of his power a thorough reform of our Municipality. It is not the only reform that is needed, but it is certainly one of the necessity of which the inhabitants of Cape Town are made painfully aware every hour of the day. We would not be understood to make personal reflections. We believe our Commissioners and Wardmasters, taken individually, are as good, well-meaning and sensible men as any other equal number of our fellow-citizens taken from the same class of people. The fault, as we have argued before, is in their constitution, in an injudicious distribution of labour, and in a want of that, without which you cannot expect a man to serve the public, pecuniary remuneration. We grant that there are employments which confer distinction and which are very properly left unremunerated, because anything in the shape of a salary would degrade them. But when we inquire what are the legitimate duties of a municipal board, we shall be loth to admit that it can be a distinction for a merchant, or even a respectable tradesman to be connected with such a body. The occupations of these self-denying individuals cannot afford satisfaction either to themselves or to others. From a total error in their mutual relation the Commissioners and Wardmasters, instead of assisting, thwart and impede each other's motions, and are blamed indiscriminately for what they do and for what they leave undone. Now a man will reconcile himself to some unpleasantness connected with the performance of official duties, when it confers either distinction or profit; but to be patiently found fault with and rated every day of your life a pure pite, supposes a degree of self-denial that few people can be expected to possess. Having premised this, we shall not scruple to say that the streets of Cape Town,—we are not speaking of back lanes, but of principal streets,—are yet in a state that leaves much to wish for, and the idea suggests itself to an observing pedestrian as he passes through some of our thoroughfares, that in spite of the recent visitation, the effects of which are but too visible in the prevalence of mourning in all places of public resort, the sanitary state of the town is not visibly improved. Let any one who doubts this walk any day after five p.m. right through Long-street, beginning at Overbeek Square, and if his sense of smell is not obtuse in the extreme he must notice the disgusting state of the open gutter to the left the whole length of the street. There can be seen the sewage of every house to the left of the street collecting by open drains into an open gutter, in which it stagnates for want of a sufficient aërial and for want of sufficient moisture to carry it along; and as if this were not enough, it is scraped in its semi-fluid state into heaps, at intervals of eight or ten paces, which gradually subsides into the most offensive quagmires. If this description be applied to Long-street alone that street might be avoided by taking one of those that run parallel to it; but we know not who that choose. We therefore say good success to Mr. Thomson. If he succeeds in sweeping away the Municipality and substituting something better, he will deserve well of his constituency.

We beg to call the attention of the Government, the Railway Company and the corn farmers to Mr. Letterstedt's letter, appearing in our present number. One and all are equally interested in the success of the proposed railway. If therefore it is clearly pointed out that unless the proposed line is amended the scheme will prove at least partially abortive, it needs no demonstration that it is both wise and expedient to make that amendment. To our mind Mr. Letterstedt has proved his case, and if the company are wise they will carry out his suggestion. We are aware that whether successful or not the company has a guarantee for 50 years, but it should not be forgotten, that the parties to that guarantee have also a right to be consulted, and care should be taken that there be no clashing of interests. We do not now allude to the impolicy, nay the absurdity of commencing the road at Fort Knokke—that of itself would be the first step to ensure a loss of revenue; we wish to point out that it would be sheer madness to cut off the whole of the grain producing districts—the produce of which was made out such a large figure in the tables from which the data were culled upon which the railway scheme was based.—Undoubtedly the landed proprietors in those districts on learning how nicely they are to be floored of their money without receiving any value whatever, will at once adopt Mr. Letterstedt's suggestion and petition the government, who has got them into this scrape, to come to their rescue even at the eleventh hour, and thereby also confer, though unolicited, a material benefit upon the shareholders in the railway company, here as well as in the British metropolis.

DIVISIONAL COUNCIL OF WORCESTER.—"OOMPIE." AGAIN.—The usual meeting of the above Council for the month of December, was held on the 6th of that month, when many important matters were brought forward for its consideration. One of which was the discontent publicly shown by the inhabitants of the feldbortney of Klein Roggeveld, to the inspection of Crown lands, as effected by one of the members of the Council, Mr. N. J. Vlok, (alias "Oompie"), for which purpose a memorial was put in, reporting the irregularity of the inspection of said Mr. Vlok, setting forth:—"that many of the places stated by Mr. Vlok to have been inspected by him, had never been properly done, thereby rendering it impossible to furnish a true and faithful report, as required by section 17th of the rules and regulations for the disposal of Crown lands in this colony." Mr. Johannes Meiring who appeared on behalf of one of the applicants for Crown lands, Mr. J. A. Tromp of Midden Roggeveld, reported, that the place "Kruidfontein," had never been inspected by Mr. Vlok, and after consideration by the Council of the several complaints made by the applicants, they resolved:—"that the inspection of the different places objected to, be cancelled, and reappointed by Mr. Vlok." With this the Council flattered themselves, that they had appeased the several discontented applicants for Crown lands, but behold, the proceedings of the subsequent meeting.

Originele Correspondentie.

DE SPOORWEG.

Mynheer!—Gij zult my verplichten dezen brief te plaatsen, omgevee aanmerkingen behelzende over den voorgestelden spoorweg van Kaapstad naar Wellington, te wege gebracht door eenige van het plan nu voor de eerste maal, en bykans ter eilidre ure, verwoordt in het Stadshuis. Dit plan heeft, geloof ik, de meeste menschen verbaasd die door de Acte van het laatste Parlemaent verbonden zijn als achter-borgen aan de Spoorweg-Maatschappij voor den tyd van 50 jaren, tegen £15000 per jaar. Ik denk dat allen die belang hebben in de zaak het plan ernstig moesten overwegen, en onderzoeken hoe de spoorweg van Fort Knokke naar Wellington loopen zal.

Het is alles wel dat de wyboeren het voordeel hebben van eenen spoorweg, maar het is niet billyk van dezelfde voordeelen de koornboeren uitsluitelen, die even verantwoordelyk zijn voor den achter-waerborg. Ewenwel zijn de koorn-districten, door de voorgestelde lyn, geheel uitgesloten van het gebruik van den spoorweg. Toen de spoorweg voor het eerst in het Parlement werd voorgesteld, deed myn de koornboeren gelooven dat de lyn ten minste langs hun district zoude loopen, waardoor de trafiek zou vermeerderd zoude worden dat geen achter-waerborg van eenig aaneelbaar mischien zou vereischt worden; maar zoo als de lyn nu afgeperkt is zullen de koornboeren even als voorheen hun graan ter markt moeten brengen over den wagen weg, met het bykomend ongerief van over den spoorweg te moeten gaan kort voordat zy de Kaapstad bereiken. Laat my dit ophelderen door, tot nader dergene die de gelegenheid niet moge hebben het plan te zien, de voornaamste plaatsen langs de lyn aantewyzen.

Beginnende te Fort Knokke, omtrent een myl van de Kaapstad markt, loopt de spoorweg over Zoutrivier en door de Kaaspeche vlakke naar de Kuisrivier station. Deze station zal 4 mylen van Hardekraal, het punt waar de Paarl en D'Urban wezen zich verenigen met den tegenwoordigen weg naar de stad. Hardekraal, over den tegenwoordigen weg is 10 mylen van de stad. Ik vraag of het waarschynlyk is dat een koornboer 4 mylen zal ryden om den spoorweg te ontmoeten, en daarbenevens nog al de kosten te betalen van spoorweg vracht, agentschap in de stad, enz. ? Zal hy niet liever de 10 mylen van den tegenwoordigen weg naar de stad, slechts 6 mylen verder, afleggen en zich dus in staat stellen zyne zaken in de stad zelf te verrigten ? Ik ben verzeerd dat de boeren aan het oude plan de voorkeur zullen geven; en het gevolg voor den spoorweg, mozt men zich aan de tegenwoordige lyn houden, zal het verlies zyn van al de koorn trafiek.

Ik wilde nu aan de hand geven dat de spoorweg loope langs den tegenwoordigen weg, zoo na als omstandigheden dedogen, tot aan Hardekraal, en van daar naar Stellenbosch langs de naaste uitvoerbare route. Ik geloof niet dat dese afwyking de lyn langer zoude maken als de gekontracteerde 54 mylen, en het kan zyn dat dezelve minder moeite zal geven. Zeker zou het een groot gedeelte der koornboeren bevreeden, zonder de voorregten van den wyboer te verminderen.

Van Kuisrivier loopt de voorgestelde lyn naar Eerterivier, Stellenbosch, Mullersvlei, de Paarl en Wellington. Zoodanig is de schets van het voorgestelde plan. Laten de menschen die er belang by hebben oordeelen. Ik zou de landeigenaren in de graan districten, die daarin betrokken zyn, raden dadelijk eene memorie aan het gouvernement in te zenden om de door my voorgestelde verandering te maken; ik kan weldra te laat zyn.

Mogt dese verandering gemaakt worden, dan zou men hierna een tak-lyn kunnen maken van Hardekraal naar Malmesbury, welke door het hart van het koorn district zou loopen. Op deze wyze zou en het belang der wyn- en het belang der koornboeren bevorderd worden, en zouden de wynters der spoorweg maatschappij zou vernemgelyklyk worden als om den achter-waerborg nooddeelen te maken, waaromtrent ik meen dat de betrokken landeigenaren geengredene reden hebben zich te beklagen, als zynde eens ter onconstititionele handelyze.

HET OVERRYDEN VAN DEN JEUGDIGEN HOLLANDER.

Graaf-Keinet, den 11 January 1859. Mynheer de Editeur!—In het "Volksblad" van den 4den dezer, las ik het bericht, hetwelk uit de "Monitor" overgenomen was, dat een der jeugdige Hollanders welke hier lastet met my aangekomen zyn, borengenoemd ongeluk overgekomen is. Gedeelelyk is dit berigt overgenomen uit de waarheid; doch daar de ouders en verlere betrekkingen in Holland zich by het lezen daarvan zeer ongerust zullen gevoelen, daar men natuurlyk veronderstellen zal dat het een van hunne kinderen of bloedverwanten geweest is, zoo acht ik my verplicht om den waren toestand bekend te maken.

In uw nummer van den 27den December 11 staat het ware bericht, dat het jongste kind van den heer Huygen tydens ons verblyf te Akendorp den 10 December overleden is; deze heer ontving na het ongeluk uit onze ballingschap de uitnooiting om te Fauresmith schoolouderwyzer te worden, hetgeen hy aangenomen heeft. Den 23 December's namiddags ten 2 uwe gyn hy in een ossenwagen, met vrouw en 3 kinderen op reis naar de plaats van zyne bestemming; de heer Huygen en zyn zoonzje reed kind van zes jaren zaten voor in den wagen, doch naauwelyks waren zy twee uren van deze stad of de wagen reed door een knikspoor; de heer Huygen denkende dat hy vallen zoude sprong uit den wagen, doch zyn kind de vaderlyke steun missende viel uit den wagen; de twee wielen van den wagen gingen over hem heen, en terzelft oogen hy den goest; de ouders welke nu binnen den tyd van 14 dagen ontroostbaar over dit verlies; terstond werd er een berigt van dit treurig sterfgeval naar deze stad gezonden en een doodkryd gemaakt waarin de lieve jongen den volgenden dag in de nabylid van den wagen werd ter aarde besteld; door ongesteldheid was ik verhinderd er zelve by tegenwoordig te zyn, doch andere stadbewoners hebben het de laatste eer bezeten.

Verder kan ik u melden dat hier 11. Zondag het avondmaalsoef gevierd is, er dat wy gedurende deze feestdagen het genoegen gehad hebben om de Wel-Erwe. heeren F. Burger en J. Hofmeyr, A.z., te hooren prediken, welke heeren binnen kort uit Holland in deze volkplanting zyn aangekomen.—Ofschoon de heer Burger met zyn reis naar hier eene verhouding gekregen had, zoo heeft Z. W. E. toch aan het verlaten van velen willen voldoen, om den 8sten dezer de voorbereidings predicaate naar te nemen. ZErwe. had tot bestid gekozen 1 Cor. 1 vers 30. Zondag namiddag, zoo ook Maandag morgen, predikte de Wel-Erwe. heer Hofmeyr. Deze twee predicaaten zyn zoo uitnemend voorgedragen, dat het niet te wenschen overliet; niemand heb ik na dien tyd gesproken of alle waren met my van hetzelfde gevoelen. Zuivere Evangelische waarheden werden door dezen jeugdigen leeraar, met ernst, goeds voordragt en grondige kennis van de Hollandse taal voorgedragen; hy stond daar voor ons als een Paulus, met de kruisbanier in de eene, en het waard des goestes, hetwelk is Gods Woord, in de andere hand, omgord zynde met de geheele wapenrusting Gods, strydende voor de regten van zynen Heer;—aangenaam, ja byzonder aangenaam is het my geweest om zulks te hooren. Een ieder weet het, hoe in de laatste dagen, de vaderlandse kerk, de hoogerleeraars, predikanten, enz. in de dagbladen en tydchriften zyn beklad geworden, even als of de kaars in Holland reeds van den kandelaar afgenomen was en men weldra tot de middelouwsche duisternis zoude wederkeren. Met reden kon men dus vragen, kan er uit Nazareth nog iets goeds voortkomen ? En van daar is iets goeds gekomen. Wordt het als Evangelische waarheid verkondigd dat geen kwade boom goede vruchten voortbrengen kan, hoe

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in uw Courant van den 9 December 11. "op een mogelyk leugentelyk rapport" volkomen gegruvatlyd zoude hebben. Hittende men ik de reden aangevoerd te hebben, wat of myn amsliding gaf, zyn rapport voor zoodanig te houden; maar dat door hem verondersteld wyl, niet onder de christelyke deugden te behooren, om zyn naas-ten voor een publieke leugenaar te houden,—welke uitdrukking was zachter konde zyn—had by maar op het woord "mogelyk" geleet.

Maar nu vraag ik op myn beurt, of dat ook onder de christelyke deugden kan geteld worden, toen by het verlaten van den gedeputeerde van Frasersburg by hem een hartelyk handdruk en een vaarwel toewenichte en hem kort daarop in de publieke dagbladen aanvalt,—iets dat myns inziens alle behalve christelyk was. Maar stel eens dat de waardige Leeraar van Stellenbosch in zyn yver voor de zaak zyn enige woorden liet ontruffen die naar zyne meening konden gezeen zyn. Ziet gy dus dat zy den splinter in zyn broeder oogen ziet, en verpeet den balk in uw eigen, en dat ik als waard geen reden heb, u als galk te vertrouwen ? Ik zal eindigen, omdat het beter is te weinig dan te veel te zeggen, met deze aanmaning dat u en alle anderen die in gelyke betrekking staan, dat het verre weg het best voor u allen is te loopen als den schoenmaker: Houd u by uwe leest. EEN VIAND VAN LEUGEN EN PARTYSCHAP. De heer H. de Villiers verzoekt toen vyheid zyne mede-afzeggende enige woorden te spreken. Het was niet overig dat een derde kandidaat voorgesteld werd, zonder dat hy eene requisite bekomen, of zyn antwoord er op gegeven had. Maar dit was toch gebruikelijk, en werd ook vereischt; want hoe zou men anders weten of de kandidaten geveelen koesterden in overeenstemming met die der kiezers, over de belangryke zaken die in het Parlement zouden worden voorgedragt ? Als men nu naging wat of vereischt werd om lid van zulk een Collegie te zyn, of om Parlements lid te zesen, moest men zich wezelyk verzoeken over de te uithel van zyne voorstelling. De heer Willem Haapt had ook zyne gevoelen openlyk in de dagbladen verkondigd en dies de blyzen gezegen dat hy bekwam was dreeve in de Engelse taal voor een ghoort te kunnen uitbreiden. Men had gezind dat by j t geheel niet versaan was, maar intergedeel met buitengewone ymo d, held gesproken had (gelich en toejuiching). Hy spoorde zyne hoorders aan, om in het belang van eenheidheid, en tot wering van twist en tweedracht, alleen te stemmen voor d t twee heeren met wier gevoelen zy volkomen bekend waren (luud gejuich).

Morrel, voor het vervreemden van gold, pleidende schuldig, maar de Regter gaf geen vonnis omdat Z. E. eerst het gehele hof wilde raadplegen omtrent de deugelykheid der acte van beuschuldiging. 3. Booy Vigeland en Gert Spoelman, voor het stelen van twee schepen, het eigendom van D. J. Booyen, van de Paarlsehe afdeling. Uitspraak, schuldig.—Vonnis, 12 maanden dwang-arbeid. 4. E. Ferry, J. Brown en G. Beazely, matrozen, beuschuldig van op den 25 December, in de publieke straten te hebben aangerand, de heeren Stemmet, Mathese en Vervey, om de tweede eerstzinn. met geweld enige artikelen te hebben ontvoeren, werden schuldig verklaard aan aanranding en veroordeeld tot 6 maanden dwang-arbeid. 5. Tegen de 21 Kaffers, beuschuldig een schep te hebben gestolen van den heer Mel van der Spuy Dreyer, werd een uitspraak van schuldig ingebrengt. FRASERSBURG.—DE KWEKSCHOOLO.

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Fransche en Spaansche expeditie naar Cochin China. alhoewel het duideelyk is, dat eerstzinnig mogendheid hoogerde beoeliening heeft verze bovent de bloote voorwendeel om wraak te nemen wegens het vermoeden van de Roomsche Katholieke sendelingen. Het is iets zondelings om de verontwaardiging der Spanjaarden opte merken over de onbeschaemde wyze, waarop de Franschen hun aandeel in de expeditie ontkenmen. Wy hebben genooigzame ondervinding gehad van dezen byzondere Fransche trek in de Krim.

De Atlantische telegraaf blyft als voorheen, en het schynt, dat men alle hoop heeft opgegeven, om dezelve van nut te doet zyn. Men zegt, echter, dat het Gouvernement de maatschappij een waerborg heeft gegeven voor een ander kabel, welke aanstaande jaar geleg zal worden. De telegraaf communicatie tussehen Constan-tinopel en Candia is voltooid, maar de poging om de kabel te leggen tussehen dat eiland en Alexandria is voor het tegenwoordige mislukt. Men zegt, dat het Gouvernement zeer verlangend is om een kabel te leggen van Engeland naar Gibraltar en van daar naar Malta, ten einde onze Indiësche communicatie onafhankelyk te maken van de Mogendheden op het vaste land.

Het Suez kanaal plan, waarover men zoo veel genoeft heeft, schynt geheel in duigen te zyn, alhoewel eene poging formeel gedaan werd, om hetzelfde in beweging te brengen. De Engelse kapitalisten wilden er niets mede te doen hebben, ook niet de Duitschers of Russen, en de Franschen, niettegenstaande al hun snoeven, houven er zich van af. Men zegt nu, dat de plannemakers onder elkander getwist hebben, en dit is waarschynlyk, want in zoo verre zy er in betrokken waren was het maar een actie handels plan, door het Fransch (gouvernement aangemoedig, hetwelk niet ongenegen was een kans te hebben, om zich te bemoeijen met de Engelse communicatie met het Oosten. Alle Engelse ingenieurs beweren, dat het ondoenlyk is, behalve tegen een ruimeuse uitleg vooral daar de Rooze Zee alle jaren meer moeyelyk te bevaren wordt voor zeeschepen.

De nieuwe maatschappij om de Great Eastern te voltoojien is zeer gunstig begooenen en er bestaat thans alle vooruitzicht, dat het vaartuig in den loop van dezen zomer zal voltooid worden.

Maatschappelyk nieuws is volstrekt van geen aaneelaag. De Prins van Wales is de Vorstelyke Prinses gaan bezoeken, die men zegt, dat in de volgende maand bevallen moet. Het is niet mogelyk de geestdrift te beschryven van de Pruisen die gebeurtenis. De Prins van Wales zal wettyglyk in het aanstaande jaar moedig worden, en er worden toebereidselen gemaakt voor zyn afzonderlyk etablissement. Zyne Koninklyke Hoogheid is aangekondigd geworden als kolonel in het leger.

Admiral Lyons is voorleden week overleden, en wordt algemeen betrouwd, als byna de laatste van de schitterende zeheden van den laatsten oorlog. De dapper Admiral heeft echter de eer gehad zulk een fraai stel kappijns te vorren als de Engelsen ooit bezeten hebben.

De heer Bruce, Lord Elgin's broeder en secretaris van zyne zending naar China, is aangesteld als eerste Britsche Resident Ambassadeur te Peking.

P. S. MALINDAG, 6 DEC. 1858.—De Keizer der Franschen, ziende dat publiek gevoelen te sterk was zelfs voor een Autooraat, heeft Graaf Montalembert een vry pardon geschonken, maar deze tegen het vonnis g'uppelyk leerd hebbende, weigert inmiddels het pardon. Dese vervolging was een groote mislag, maar niet minder verkeerd was het te wankelen toen men de zaak eenmaal begonnen had. Het zal het publiek gevoelen in Frankryk te veel elders bevreeden, want men heeft hetzelve reeds te veel geweld aangedaan, en het gevoel dat die gunst afgeperst wordt en niet vrylyk verleend. Het is nu de derde maal in dit jaar, dat de Keizer heeft moeten uitroepen pccuari, en zyne bewonderaars alhier beginnen te denken, dat hy niet het wonderbaar genie is, waarover zy eenmaal zoo veel gezeurd hebben. Vooreerst in de Walewsky depeche intrekking, vervolgens in den brief van opheldering omtrent de Charles en George, en eindelyk dit pardon van Graaf Montalembert.

Met leedwezen moet ik melden, dat de zaken een ernstig aanzien in Ierland krygen. Juist toen een ieder veronderstelde dat dezelve wedergeboorte voltooid was, en dezelve weiraar verzeerd, zyn wy onteid geworden door een paar grove gevallen van sluikmoord, en het is blykbaar, dat de vloek van Ribbionisme zich weder uitbreidt, zoodat het gouvernement eene proclamatie heeft uitgevaardigd, eene belooning aanbiedende voor het ontdekken van geheime genootschappen van deze orde.

De algemeene kenmerken van den geldhandel blyven onveranderd. Geld is even overvloedig als ooit. De bank discontoeert voor 3 pct. maar in de open markt is geld gemakelyk te krygen tegen 2 1/2 en 2 1/2 pct.

De laatste reeks van Koloniale wolk verkoopingen voor dit jaar, welke op den 11den 11 begon, is op den 1 de e geueken met zeer voldoende resultaten, zoo als men zien zal uit het volgende verslag van de heeren Hazard en Zoon:— De opkomst van koopers, welke in den beginne buitengewoon talryk was, is over het geheel goed geweest, en de mededinging wakkerder dan by enige vroeger verkoopingen. Vóór den aanvang dezer verkoopingen had eene blykbare verbetering in onze markt plaats gevonden, maar welke meer verzeerlyk werd by deze verkoopingen. De voortdurende overvloed van geld, de lage pryzen van levensmiddelen, en de gestadige en algemeene verbetering in handel, hebben grotere aanvraag veroorzaakt en welke vermeerderd is geworden door de jongste opening van verschillende buitenlandse havens voor onze fabriekwaren: terwyl aan den anderen kant de voortraad zeer gematigd blyft, met naauwelyks enig oude voortraad om op terug te vallen in de handen van fabriekanten of handelaars: dit ziet ook op Engelse en fyne buitenlandse wolk. De pryzen zyn nu even hoog; als in July en Augustus 1857 en schynen wellyk eenigen tyd aldus te zullen blyven.

De ryzing by deze verkoopingen, vergeleken met de vroeger, eindigende 24 Augustus, is als volgt:—Op Australische en Port Philip rachten 2d. tot 3dd. per lb. vettige haalde 1 1/2 tot 2d. per lb. Kaap de Goede Hoop wolk van de betere soort was 2d. tot 3d. per lb. daurder, mindere 1 1/2 tot 2d. per lb. De hoeveelheid voor uitvoer genomen was minder dan gewoonlyk by deze verkoopingen. De kwaliteit en conditie van de wolk was even als gewoonlyk op dezen tyd van het jaar; enige van de Nieuw Zeeland kwaliteet toonden aanmerkelyke verbetering, niet alleen in kwaliteit maar ook in de zorg en regelmatigheid waarmee zy waren gepakt: dese haalden zeer hooge pryzen, andere blyven even ongeregd als altyd. De hoeveelheid van de Kaap was zeer groot: van de mede hand gewasschen en geritvilde waren eenige koopjes zeer goed opgemaakt, maar andere waren zeer verslecht door sand en vuilnis. De Port Natal wolk toont nog veel onregelmatigheid en gebrek aan zorg in het opmaken en sorteren.

KLAUSCHER WYK.—Volgens de laatste circulaire van de heeren Molineux Clark en Zonen, dd. 3 December, had er een kleine ryzing plaats gehad in goe goedkoopere kwaliteiten van meest alle soorten, maar slechts in kleine hoeveelheden welke handelaars uit noodzakelykheid verpigt waren te kooplen. Voor Kaaspeche wylten stonden de pryzen als volgt: goede wylt, £16 tot £17; gemene en gemiddelde, £15; ordinaire en goede pontak, £21 tot £22. Er waren geen Kaaspeche wytte woenen, eenste haaden.

held on the 3rd January last, which was attended by J. Le Seur, Esq., G. G. and R. M., the chairman, and the members Messrs. Kuy, Rabe, Naudé and Vlok (alias "Oompie"), the same objections were reiterated by Messrs. F. D. Conradie, P. J. Theron and Wouter de Vos, by letter, strongly objecting to the reappointment of Mr. Vlok, as inspecting officer, setting forth that they have no confidence whatever in his proceedings in this matter.—Mr. Johannes Meiring then again appeared before the Council, on behalf of some of the applicants, and requested to be informed, whether the Council intended to uphold the inspection of Mr. Vlok, if so, that he may be supplied with a copy of the report required under the 17th section of the Rules and Regulations for the disposal of Crown lands in this colony, in order to call the attention of higher authority to the illegal proceedings of said Mr. Vlok, as it appeared that the report required to be furnished by an inspecting officer had not been supplied by Mr. Vlok. No other resource was then left to the Council, but to resolve:—"that the inspection as conducted by Mr. Vlok be cancelled," on the grounds asserted by the applicants for Crown lands, and "that a new Commission be appointed to effect the necessary inspection, and that Mr. Rabe, one of the members of the Council, be appointed as inspecting officer in lieu of Mr. Vlok," (alias Oompie).

The Secretary then submitted an account of Mr. Vlok, for expenses in carrying out the above inspection, amounting to £48, being personal allowance, 32 days, at £1 per diem, and horse hire 10 shillings per diem; upon this it was resolved, "that as the inspection as performed by Mr. Vlok has been cancelled, the Council cannot entertain the account, and therefore declines payment of the same." Thus far we cannot help applauding the independence of the members of our Divisional Council, and especially that of its Chairman, the strict sense of which has so long actuated him, and which we are glad to find has not been abandoned by him, when having to perform his duty, and especially so painful a one as in the above matter, having thrown aside the doings of one of those who are expected to assist and not mislead him in the arduous duties conferred by Government on Divisional Councils. But there is one matter still urgent, and one we cannot fail to bring before the notice of the Council, by means of the press, namely the payment of wagon hire amounting to the important sum of about £75, for conveying Mr. Vlok and suit, to "Klein Roggeveld." Surely, this cannot be exacted from the applicants, who are justly required by the government regulations to deposit certain amounts, for a faithful and legal inspection, but not to see their money appropriated for the purpose of an illegal, while the only funds available are for road purposes, and not to meet the expenses of the illegal inspection, performed by Mr. Vlok. The Council must therefore find their position rather awkward, but we are convinced that it will do its duty.—Correspondent.

ARRIVAL OF THE MAIL.—The mail steamer *Dane* arrived in Table Bay at noon on Sunday last. Mr. Tucker, the new Civil Engineer, arrived by her. There is little news of importance by this opportunity. What is worth knowing is detailed in the subjoined letter from our London correspondent:—

London, Saturday, Dec. 4, 1858.

"Another month has rolled on, but its events have not been of a very startling interest, or indeed at all above the dead level of tranquillity, if not of dullness, which has so long prevailed in all matters political, commercial or social. Notwithstanding this, however, the general state of things is highly satisfactory and presents a remarkable contrast indeed to the despondency and want of confidence which at this time last year not only paralyzed the whole trade of the country, but threatened to involve it in what was little short of national bankruptcy. Although severely felt for the time in every branch of national industry, the recovery, if only partial, was far more rapid than could have been hoped for, and affords a satisfactory proof that the great bulk of trade was sound. The effects, however, of the crash have been most wholesome, even if they had only been confined to sweeping away that gigantic fabric of fictitious credit which had by its inflation inspired such presumptuous efforts in the art of quickly growing rich without means and without work. Even now caution is the order of the day and shows that the salutary lesson has left its mark much more effectively than we have had any right to expect, judging from previous experience.

To return, however, to passing events, politics are not exciting so much interest as might have been expected on the eve of a Parliamentary Session, which is likely to be pregnant with important results. Even on the great point of reform the great body of the public is most decidedly very apathetic, and if anything, very envious of any tampering with the constitution, which more than half suspects proceeds more from the political feelings of the different political factions, than from any hearty affection for the question. Although such is the feeling of the public at large, desperate efforts are being made by the ultra Radical party to get up a decisive agitation; but at present it is a decided failure and only results in a parish politico and pothouse cry in which the stump organs of oratory is much more noisy than effective. If you were to take up a Radical paper you would conclude at first sight, but very erroneously, that England was on the eve of a new revolution, from the almost frantic efforts which are made to elevate this mere party agitation into the dignity of a national movement. The fact is, if the Whigs or the Tories were either of them certain of their tenure of office even for a few years, you would hear but little of reform, and all the efforts of the Radicals to obtain it would be utterly ineffectual. To amuse them the Whigs have for a long time made it a decided stalking horse and even gone so far as to introduce one or two bills, but something invariably turned up to upset them. They naturally felt unwilling to play their last trump card, so that at length the Tories have in their desperation been obliged to take it up. It is amusing to see the perplexity of the Times, which cannot yet discern how the wind is likely to set in if the public should be roused from their present apathy and does not like to commit itself too far either one way or the other. Accordingly we have one day a leading article on the necessity of Reform and of an efficient measure, followed the next by speculations as to the origin of the universal feeling for it and warnings of the result of the ballot and universal suffrage in the jerry and corruption of the American elections and Congress.

There have as before been numerous political meetings, but none of any great importance, for the news of individual seasons are not likely to be of much interest to your readers. Allowing for party differences there is a wonderful unanimity in their tone. The Tories are loud in their praise of Lord Derby, and assert that he will do great things. The Radicals go in for universal suffrage, the ballot and equally apportioned electoral districts. The Whigs and several members connected with the late government who have appeared in public, are cautiously feeling their way for the support of the middle classes, and putting them on their guard as to the risk they will run, if these resolutions were obtained, of being swamped by the mass on the one hand and the landed aristocracy on the other. Mr. Bright's great speech at Birmingham has fallen quite flat; many of the most liberal of his party refuse to go to his extremes. As regards the views of the ministers they are kept religiously secret, so much so that a rumour prevails that they intend to propose a measure of such an extreme character that all the moderate liberals and all real friends of the constitution must reject it and

so show the opinion with the range ground of being able to say: we wish we would have done, if you would have let us. I don't think this is probable, for it is far too rash a venture for any English minister to hazard. Lord John Russell, it is reported, has a bill ready cut and dried, if the ministerial scheme should not be up to the mark. Mr. Bright has been entrusted by the extreme Radicals with the task of drawing up a memorial addressed to their views. Lord Palmerston and his friends do not intend to enter into the lists with a special one of their own, but so much as the prestige of the noble lord and his party fall, that little short of a miracle must take place before they can return to power and then a great modification of the late ministry must be made.

Parliament is not now likely to meet before the usual time in February.

At the time of my last letter the dispute between France and Portugal with respect to the seizure of the "Charles et Georges"—one of the French Negro Free Emigrant ships—off Mozambique, looked serious. I am not sure whether the result was known at the time the mail left. However the question has been temporarily settled, but in a manner which must entail serious consequences some day or other. You are aware that France prematurely rejected all offers of arbitration and threatened to bombard Lisbon if the result was not as once intended. Portugal was therefore obliged to comply, but in doing so stated that she did it only from inability to resist the superior force of France. At first a great burst of indignation arose in England and the government was accused of betraying an ally (we have an offensive and defensive treaty with Portugal), but also one which was carrying out its engagements with ourselves for suppressing the traffic in slaves. This has however greatly cooled down. In the first place, the port of Lisbon is a little known of the treatment of Mr. Leach, the late British Consul there. It is to be hoped that the subject will be thoroughly ventilated, when Parliament meets and that the result may be some decisive policy or action on the part of England with respect to these districts. On this part I am afraid not much more is to be expected from the present government, which seems to have taken up the idea, that the empire of Great Britain is large enough. We however be it when this becomes the prevailing idea, "What would England have been if our forefathers held such views or presumed to say what limits were to be placed on the destiny of a generation? You are aware that Rajah Brooke has recently returned to England to urge upon the government to adopt his state of Sarawak, pointing out its advantages and the manifest policy of securing a firm standing in that part of the world, if we are to hold our own with the Dutch, the Americans and the Russians and the French who will all quickly step in, and once lost the opportunity will be lost for ever. The merchants of Liverpool and Manchester, have strongly adopted Sir James Brooke's view, but the government have stoutly rejected his proposals. The Rajah himself has been struck with partial paralysis, but although recovering, will most probably never be himself again.

I have digressed from the Franco-Portuguese matter. As if sensible that he had gone too far the Emperor of the French has published a letter addressed to the Prince Napoleon, as minister of the Colonies, in explanation of his conduct. He insists, he says, on the right of the Emperor of the French, being determined to preserve inviolate the honor of the French flag, but he directs him to inquire into the so called Free Negro Emigration Scheme, stating that if it is slavery in disguise he will not have it at any price, not being the man to sanction a scheme so opposed to progress, humanity and civilization. This has roused the indignation felt in this country, but still only to a partial extent, for it is felt that all this might have been done before so important an exhibition of might over right was perpetrated on Portugal. This recent complaint with so many other notorious incidents, has not tended to make the relations between France and England, as far as public feeling is concerned, any the more cordial, although ostensibly the alliance between the two countries or rather governments is declared to be as good as ever. The Emperor however is silently but steadily following out the principles of the Imperial regime and liberty only exists in name in France. A gigantic bureaucratic system is being built up, which is progressing in its meshes every interest in the country, which is denied the privilege of thinking for itself even in the smallest matters, and soon will lose the faculty, for the system of education, and the boast of France, is now quite corrupted and with the aid of the Jesuits made a tool for training its youth in the ideas of degradation and has lately been further disabled by the warning given to it by the fate of the Count Montalambert, who has just been condemned to six months imprisonment for a brilliant essay on the late Indian debate in the English Parliament, which only by the most perverted implication can be twisted into reflections on the state of France under Napoleon the third.

A severe earthquake has happened at Lisbon, but although not much damage, as it is, has been done, a little more and the catastrophe of the last century would have been renewed.

Continental news are generally without interest, although there is a decidedly uneasy feeling as regards Italy, but this is its usual chronic. To judge from the press and the preparations made by all the powers it would seem as if none of them had much faith in the existence of peace much longer, but there is nothing fresh to warrant any idea that hostilities or anything like an outbreak was imminent.

Mr. Gladstone has accepted an extraordinary mission to inquire into the grievances of the Ionian Islanders, who have been in a perpetual state of dissatisfaction to the English rule, although very different from that which has sprung from the alternatives being for them either a Turkish Pacha or an Austrian general. In fact the great evil is the ultra democratic constitution we have given them for which they are utterly unfit. The military position of Corfu is however most important to England. A most extraordinary state paper has been surreptitiously stolen from the Foreign office and published in the *Daily News*, being neither more nor less than a report from the Commissioner recommending that England should withdraw from the Ionian Islands, only retaining Corfu, and it is supposed the present government favours this idea. The person who stole the document has been committed for trial. He was a friend of the librarian, and foolishly left in the library, which gave him an access to the paper, which he was weak enough to purloin.

Great things are expected from the trade which it is hoped Lord Elgin's treaty will open with Japan. Very little importance is attached to the French and Spanish Expedition to Cochin China, although it is clear that the former power has ulterior objects far beyond the mere pretext of revenge, and the murder of the Roman Catholic missionaries. It is not a little curious to notice the indignation of the Spaniards at the barefaced manner in which the French, more so, ignore their share in the expedition. We had a good experience of this peculiar French trait in the Crimea.

The Atlantic Telegraph still remains as mute as ever, and it would seem as if all hopes of its ever being rendered useful have been abandoned. It is stated however that the government had given the company a guarantee for another line, which is to be laid down next year. The Telegraph communication between Constantinople and Candia is completed, but the attempt to lay down the line between Alexandria and Alexandria has failed for the present. It is supposed that the government is very anxious to lay down a line from England to Gibraltar and thence to Malta in order to render our Indian communications independent of the continental powers.

The Suez Canal Scheme about which there has been so much puffery appears to be quite knocked on the head, although an attempt has been formally made to set it in motion. The English capitalists will have nothing to say to it, neither will the Government or the French, notwithstanding all their vanities, it is very silly of it, it is said now that the promoters have fallen out amongst themselves, which is likely, for as far as they were concerned it was a mere stock jobbing scheme fostered by the French Government, who were not unwilling to have a chance of interfering with the English communication with the East. All English capitalists assert that it is impracticable except at an expense perfectly

ruinous, especially as the Red Sea is every year becoming more impracticable to sailing vessels.

The new company for completing the "Great Eastern" has been started most favourably and there is now every prospect of the vessel being completed in the course of the present summer.

The Prince of Wales has just returned to the Princess Royal, who it is said will be crowned next month. It is impossible to describe the enthusiasm of the Princess of Wales at the prospect of the Princess of Wales's coming to the throne, and the preparations are being made for her separate establishment. His Royal Highness has been gazetted as a Colonel in the army.

POSTSCRIPT.—The Emperor of the French finding public opinion too strong even for an autocrat, has patronized Count Montalambert, but the latter having indulged in a speech against the Emperor's policy, has been banished. It was a great mistake to prosecute and hardly less so to falter in the course when once it had been commenced. It will not conciliate public feeling either in France or elsewhere, which has been already too much outraged and feels that it is extorted and not freely granted. This is the third time this year that the Emperor has had to cry *cessis* and his advisers are begin to think that he is not the wonderful genius they once read about in the First in the *Wall-walk* despatch returned to the "Charles et Georges" and lastly this pardon of the Count Montalambert.

I regret to state that matters are looking very serious in Ireland. Just as every body was fondly supposing its regeneration was complete and its prosperity ensured, we have been startled by one or two gross cases of assassination, and it is evident that the course of *Kilgobbin* is again rapidly extending, so much so that the government has issued a Proclamation offering a reward for the discovery of secret societies of this order.

The mail has not yet arrived.

The general features of the money market remain unaltered, all fears of a stringency having been removed. Money is as plentiful as ever, and likely to remain so. The Bank Rate of Discount is still 3 per cent, but in the open market money is easily obtainable at 2½ to 2. Trade generally is steadily and satisfactorily progressing, the reports from most districts being very favourable. Raw materials are rising in value, but the shipping interest is woefully depressed and loudly agitating against the repeal of the Navigation laws. The fact is the stimulus occasioned by the late war caused many vessels to be built, most of which paid their cost the first voyage. Now the demand has subsided and they are lying idle, but the owners will not easily persuade the English public to tax itself for their special benefit.

Consols, 98 for money, 98½ for account.

The last series of colonial wool sales for the present year, which commenced on the 4th ult., closed on the 1st inst. with most satisfactory results, as will be seen from the following report of Messrs. Hazard and Son:—

The attendance of buyers, which at the first was excessively numerous, has been large throughout and competition more animated than for several sales past. Prior to the commencement of these sales a manifest improvement had taken place in our market, but which was more fully realized at these sales. The continued abundance of money, the low price of provisions, and the steady and general improvement in trade, has caused increased demand, and which has been augmented by the late opening of various foreign ports to our manufactured goods; while, on other hands, the supply continues very moderate, with scarcely any of a stock to fall back upon in the hands of manufacturers or dealers; this applies also to English and fine foreign wools. Prices are now fully up to those current in July and August, 1857, and appear likely to be at least fully supported for some time to come. The advance obtained at these sales, as compared with the previous ones ending 24th August, is as follows, viz. on Australian and port Phillip fleeces 2d. to 3s. per lb. the greater rise being on combing wool of a good quality and condition and of which the quantity was small; materials being in value, but with scarcely any of a stock to fall back upon in the hands of manufacturers or dealers; this applies also to English and fine foreign wools. Prices are now fully up to those current in July and August, 1857, and appear likely to be at least fully supported for some time to come. 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
