De pers, als gewoonlijk om rent dezer tyd des jaars, vestigt de aandacht des publieks op het belangryke vraagstuk van opvoeding; en hoort vurig dat het Parlement, van anders het ook onafgelaan moge laten, niet nalaten zal de openbare scholen te verbeteren en binnen het bereik van i-d-r, door de gehele kolonie, te stellen den dubbelen zegen van eene opvoeding, zoodat god als god-koop. Onze verwachtingen zyn ten opzichte van dit onderwerp volstrekt niet hoog gespannen. De eerste stap ter verbetering der school behoort te zyn een navoorschend, onpartijdig onderzoek, ter goedertrouw, naar dezelver tegenwoordige toestand. Wy vreegen, dat er weinig kans is di te bekomen. Het Opvoedings Committee van vroedren jaar, heeft het niet bekomen, noch schenb dit, oordeelende volgens de wyze waarop deszelfs onderzoek w r i v o o r z e t, in het geheel verlanget hetzelve te bekomen. En echter, hoe kunnen wy zooder zoodlang onderzoek als een grondslag om op te reueleren, beschikken over de algemeene bwingingen dat het tegenwoordige Gouvernement stelsel van opvoeding mislykt is; dat het niet langer voldoet aan de behoeften des lands en dat de eerste klas scholen private inrigtingen het leven beemmen?

Intien; zy die z pgen dat het Gouvernement's stelsel mislykt is, meenen te bewo-n, dat het Ondergeteekende ter wege gebracht heeft, zyn wy stellig van oordeel, dat zy schuldig staan aan grove ver-rooting. Indien zy aan den anderen kant bewo-n, dat het goed door de Gouvernements Scholen gesticht niet in billyke evenredigheid is tot de gemakke kosten, zouden wy toestaan dat iot een op-n vraagstuk is. Wat de tweede bewering betreft, dat het stelsel niet lang-r voldoet aan de behoeften des lands, zouden wy, indien dezelve in de gedaante van eene resolutie op eene publieke by-nkomst werd voorgesteld, als een amendement voorstellen, dat de woorden "niet langer" er uit genomen moesten worden; omdat wy gelooven, dat het stelsel op genen tyd aan de behoeften des lands voldeed. De derde bewering, dat de eerste klas scholen private inrigting-n het leven beemmen, zeeuoven wy genoudelyk eene drogrede te zyn.

De oogten d s publieks zyn nu vry goed geopen-d voor de waarde van eene gezonde opvoeding, en private inrigtingen welke dit tegen e-nen redelyken pris aanbieden zullen altyd in staat zyn te wlyk vermen tegen de krachtadigheid van de eert te klas Gouvernements scholen, in den ble-ejnden staat van eenige private scholen in dez- lide plaatselykeden. Bespiegelande reuelen-ingen over zulke vraagstukken kunten tot geens gevolg n-leiden even kostbaar als die welke ver-ke-re, en konden worden door zul een onderzoek als wy hebben voorgestaan; maar by afwezigheid van dit vereichte, waarom zou het ons niet veroorloofd zyn te z pgen, dat Gouvernements scho-len in het algemeen minder zullen zyn dan private scholen door den betrekkeljken toestand der onder-zyzers. De onderwyzer van de Gouvernements school is oiat hankelyk van de ouders zynet leer-lingen. Zoo lang by den schyn bewaart, is zyn salaris villyg genoeg. Indien by go-d indt de hoogere takken te onderwyzen en de goede opinie verwerft van ouders die voor extra lessen kunnen betalen, kan by enige leerlingen bekomen, wier schoolgeld zyn inkomden zal vermeerderen; maar indien by eene genueghheid tot den landbouw, het bouwen of tuin maken heeft, zal by deze dingen veel winst eeuvender vinden dan Latyn en Mathesis met Sterrekunde en Physika op den koop toe; en hierin bestaat zyn voorrecht boven den privaten onderwyzer, dat het Gouvernement hem huisvest en voedt, en buitendien nog een weinig goids in zyne handen laat, om de eene of andere wi-stige-vende bezigheid te beginnen. Aan den anderen kant moet de private onderwyzer haishuur betalen en met zyn gezin, indien by er mede gezeend is, afhangen van de opbrengst van zyne school. Hy kan het niet bybren-en gratis te ond rywen of voor minderen pris, want deed by dit, wie zou de slagters en bukkers rekening hebben, om niet te spreken van den huishier, doctoor, apotheker en kruidenier? Wy erkenen dat by een str-ke stroom tegen zich heeft; maar laat hy niet aanho-p u. Indien zyn onderwey's beter is dan dat van de Gouvernements school in detzelde plaatselykheid?

collare, with vast quantities of warlike stores and small arms fell into our hands. Unless at Rushdie, not a single muid of any kind occurred in capturing the maritime capital and securing the whole sea-board of Persia. The fight shews was by a warlike tribe of Arabs. Active operations having thus for a time been brought to a close, the army prepared to encamp and throw up strong field works and entrenchments just under the walls of the town. The prisoners after being disarmed were conveyed some way into the interior, and liberated. The Governor and other men of distinction have been brought to Bombay by the Admiral who returned in the Assaye. The transports meanwhile are being recalled to prepare for the embarkation of a second army of about five-tenth of a million of men already in the field. The Shah appearing deaf to reason, and apparently under the guidance of the council of St. Petersburg, it was resolved that an army of 25,000 men should be got in readiness from the three Presidencies—of these, 5,000 is about the amount Bombay can afford and the 7th Highlanders, the 14th Dragoons, and Jacob's Scinde Horse amounting on close to 3,000 in all, are already under orders, leaving Scinde in a great measure denuded of protection against the mountain tribes which infest her frontiers. General Sir James Outram, Resident at Lucknow, who had for eight months been in England on sick leave, was appointed by the Ministry to the supreme political charge of our affairs in the Persian Gulf, while the local rank of Lieutenant General was assigned him to enable him to be appointed to military command. The question as to what is proposed to be done next remains a mystery. The principal Persian towns are from two hundred to four hundred miles from the sea coast with a summer of intense heat and winter cold and excessive snow covering the high grounds for a couple of months at least, and the mercury occasionally falling to near zero. Provisions are scarce, cattle for transport still more so; already we are beginning to require to send ship loads of stores weekly for the use of the force now in the field, and the Commissariat has been ordered to forward rations for one month immediately, and to get those for another two in readiness. Our only hope of assistance is from Turkish Arabia, by the way of Basorrah, Persia being able to yield us nothing; how we shall contrive, in absence of baggage cattle to send stores for 20,000 men, 200 miles into the interior, surpasses our comprehension. Sir John Keane with his 10,000 lost 40,000 camels in his march through Afghanistan, in 1839-40, besides horses and baggage cattle. How anything like this number is to be provided, does not appear. So far as fighting is concerned, the Shah has not a strong hold in his dominions, which would shew stouter fight than Bushire against a force similar to that which without a casualty captured it in four hours' time. But if Herat, Shiraz, Isphahan, Teheran or for that matter Teheran itself were in our hands what are we to do with them? The garrisons placed in them would be come isolated, and might be starved out in a month. The country itself is not worth keeping if we had it. The Persians have no honour to sustain, and no character to lose, and will be perfectly content to accept the chastisement we are inflicting on them in consideration of the millions on millions sterling worth of good silver money we are expending in their dominions.

DARING SCALLOTTING.—The WASCARANG.—Accounts by private hand have just been received from this portion of the division, to the effect that the shierish propensities of the natives are hourly showing itself, and notwithstanding the utmost vigilance being adopted by the farmers in that part to stop a step to this daring spoliation of private property, the carrying off of stock by Kibel Hottentots and Bushmen is greatly on the increase. We regret that we have this week to notice the following losses in stock, taken too from farmers who can but ill-afford to lose:—Jan van Plecken, 14 horses, Jacobus Rheider 20 do.,—Sarel Pretorius, 27 do.,—Jan Groenewald, 4 do.,—Jan Pretorius, 3 do.,—Wm. Linstrom, 2 do, and 2 do. of cattle. Total, 97 head of horses and cattle.

The Rebel Hottentots and Bushmen to whom the thing is brought home to, are well known to be a lazy and indolent set of rascals, and as long as they can pounce upon the farmer's hard earnings, work is out of the question. A band of these rascals are stationed by their leader in the Zuurberg, under pretence of cutting wood, but more with the determination of wresting stock in its immediate locality. In reality their rendezvous is in the Tritsi, a mountainous range beyond the Zuurberg, where, it is said, a force, double in number to the Zuurberg one, are congregated—and where the whole of the stolen stock are taken to. The latter has their quarters in the Gatterg, on the Drakensberg range. Both places, the Tritsi and Gatterg, are represented to be dangerous, and to attempt a dislodgement by a small force would be utterly impolitic. Thus under these disadvantageous circumstances are deprivations carried on. The farmers cry out loudly for help, and there is none—or what is worse, men who have fought and bled for the English Government last war—who have forsaken their homesteads with the avowed determination of marching against the common foe, and hating the toils and privations of a camp life—are now forsaken, and left to shift as they best can.—Ibid.

THE PERSIAN EXPEDITION.—ARRIVAL AT BUSHIRE AND CAPTURE OF BUSHIRE.—POSITION OF BRITISH FORCE. (From the Bombay Times of 24 January)

By the 24th the whole fleet had rendezvoused off Kishm, a volcanic island fifty miles in length, and thirty across, belonging to the Island of Muscat, just within the strait opening from the sea of Oman into the Gulf. On the 26th, the whole fleet got under weigh, proceeding in three divisions towards the place of destination. On the 1st of December a heavy storm arose, which compelled many of the transports to be cast off pushing on under sail, as they could be managed, and it was not till the 6th that a sufficient number of ships made their appearance off Bushire to warrant the commencement of hostilities. The Persians seem never to have dreamt of our being really in earnest in our threats to attack them, and their apprehensions were first excited on the 29th of November, when the Perseus steamer, with a couple of transports in tow, with the Falkland Corvette, hove in sight off Bushire. The Governor the following day applied to the Resident, Captain Jones, to enquire on what errand they had come, but this officer was now on his way on board, and delayed his answer till the 3rd, when he stated that his political connection with Persia had ceased, and that the commanders of the expedition would themselves afford the information desired. The island of Karack, held by us from 1839 to 1841, had on the 4th been taken possession of and converted into a military depot. On the 6th, the fleet moved down from opposite Bushire to Hallia Bay, where a body of three or four hundred of the enemy making their appearance they were dispersed by shells from the gun boats. The troops were now permitted to disembark without any molestation. There being no carriage cattle they were without tents or baggage of any description, three days' rations having been carried with them in haversacks, forty-eight hours were required to attack them, and the whole body on shore and in motion when on the morning of the 9th they commenced their march northwards by the line of the coast, the ships of war led by the Admiral keeping abreast of them, and as near the land as the depth of water permitted. By noon, the old Portuguese Fort of Bushire began to be approached. The position was naturally a strong one, the walls were good, and protected by a dry ditch forty feet deep. In front was a heavy redoubt scarped on the side next the sea, and the other two, were strong and well protected. The Assaye was unable to approach within one thousand seven hundred yards of the place, but at this distance her shells were so effective that the bulk of the enemy fled, leaving eight hundred who had been driven back by our advancing columns within the work, and who seemed determined to fight it out to the last. The garrison on our approach had at first sallied out, and at one time nearly attained possession of a gun. The vanguard which had pushed too much ahead were compelled to make a rapid counter-march. Our troops seemed anxious to make a dash, and unfortunately charged at the bayonet's point, sacrificing valuable lives that might have been spared and the shelling been continued. Brigadier Stopford fell leading on the 6th, shot through the heart, and pierced by many wounds; while Lieutenants Utterson and Warren of the 20th were killed by his side; Captain Wood, dauntlessly wounded; about fifty men were killed or wounded. The enemy were without artillery, but defended themselves stoutly with their matchlocks, and driven to fight they were charged down upon by the 3rd Cavalry and fearfully mangled. Here Colonel Malet fell, shot through the heart by a wounded Arab, whom he had just ordered to be spared. Here the troops bivouacked for the night on the bare ground and under the open sky. Captain Jones was now deputed into the town with a flag of truce in a small steamer carrying the summons of surrender, and the terms offered the garrison. The non-combatants and women had permission to withdraw. By the Governor's order all descriptions of arms were to be deposited in the hands of the British, and the declaration of war of the Governor General and letter of terms, proposed, were transmitted by the messenger. Meanwhile General Stalker intimated to the Admiral his intention of advancing with all his troops on Bushire the following morning (10th December) and the fleet was immediately disposed in order of battle—first dismantling the enemy's newly erected earthworks, and then moving with a view of breaching the south wall of the town. The tide was favourable, an explosion was every one to expect, that every ship was laid aground at high water, and day break found them already to open on the fort! A second flag of truce begging for twenty four hours further delay now made its appearance. The request was at once refused; and at eight the signal to engage was hoisted, and a storm of shot and shells at once poured in. The redoubt south of this town, where the enemy had assembled in force to resist our troops, was the chief object of attention, and notwithstanding the enormous distance, it was speedily cleared—the defenders retiring within the walls. As this work commanded the walls, much importance was attached to it by both parties, and General Stalker was advancing upon it when it was abandoned just as his line was being formed. Though their small guns were useless, the courage and perseverance with which the larger ones were worked surpassed all expectation, and the Semiramis, Perseus, Victoria, and Falkland were repeatedly struck both in hull and rigging; strange to tell, not a man was hurt. By noon the batteries were all ready, and the troops were preparing for the assault, when the flag was struck down in token of submission. The Governor and his staff immediately came out and surrendered themselves, the garrison, from one thousand five hundred to two thousand in number laid down their arms, and at four o'clock the British flag was hoisted over the town, the troops appointed to garrison it having marched in at sunset. A large proportion of the Persian army had fled as we approached, and the remainder were determined to escape. About three thousand in all were said to have perished. Sixty five guns, many of them brass, most of them in good condition, and some of them of large
