THE ZUID-AFRIKAAN.

Cape Town, September 10, 1857.

WHEN we heard of the starving Caffers and of relief-committees formed on the frontier to snatch the poor deluded victims of prester Paul from the jaws of famine, we applauded the humane intentions of the frontier colonists, but we asked at the same time, when you have fed them, what are you going to do next? When you have gorged the famished wolf, will he fawn upon you, lick the hand that fed him, and allow you to put your foot upon his neck?

APPOINTMENTS.—Mr. R. J. Crozier, as Assistant Magistrate of Stellenbosch, under the Act No. 9, 1857. Mr. J. Theissen, to issue process in civil cases before the periodical court at Somerset West.

POSTAL ALTERATION.—From the 1st October next the mails between Darling Bridge and Tulbagh will be discontinued, and the mails between Cape Town and Tulbagh will be conveyed via the Paarl and New Kloof, and dispatched from Cape Town by the Paarl Omnibus on Tuesdays and Fridays.

INTESTATE ESTATE.—A meeting of the paternal and maternal relations of the minors G. H. & C. J. van Rooijen, will be held at the Magistrate's Office, George, on the 21st October next.

THE MUNICIPAL MEETING.—At the meeting of ward-masters held on Friday last, the proposal of the commissioners to grant a sum of £100 in aid of the Rifle Corps fund, was refused, chiefly upon the ground that it would be an unwarrantable proceeding to make such a grant when the funds of the Municipality were limited, the streets out of repair, and so many general improvements required.

THEFT OF THE CALVINIA MAIL BAG.—It will be recollected that the Calvinia mail bag was, a short time ago, stolen from the public offices. Two boys lately visiting one of the old quarries at the Foot of Table Mountain discovered the remains of the missing mail. Some letters were unopened and others torn up. All the registered letters had been plundered of their contents.

THE U. S. ST. FAIR.—This vessel, bound to China, having on board the American Ambassador and suite, put into Table Bay on the 7th instant. She is of 3750 tons burden, carries 41 guns, and is the largest steamer that has yet put into this harbour.

DISTRIBUTION OF KAIFERS.—Last week some 35 of the Kaifer convicts were distributed amongst several applicants by the Resident Magistrate. Like those previously distributed, they had recommended themselves for this favor by their general good conduct. Whether that good conduct however arises from an innate virtue, or is a mere feint, seems problematical, as we hear that several of the previous lot have taken French leave.

LATEST ENGLISH NEWS.—The steamer Thebes, from Kingston on the 31st July, put into Simon's Bay on Monday night. She is bound to India with troops. The accounts brought by her are unimportant. The Parliamentary oath bill had been rejected by a majority in the House of Lords. The accounts from India which had reached England by the overland route represent Delhi as still in possession of the rebels. Sir Colin Campbell had accepted the post of Commander-in-Chief of the troops in India, and had already left by the overland route.

their need; that they will make obedient and faithful servants to their benefactors; and that the desire for war with the colony will be cherished by them no longer? Do they imagine that the famine in Kafirland has deprived the Kafir chiefs of all power over their people? that the desire of the chiefs to regain their lost authority in their native land has died away, and that they will never seek another opportunity of again uniting their followers in an attempt to drive the white man into the sea? It is, in short, imagined that we have seen the last of the Kafir war? If the German locations should succeed—a sufficient number of troops be spared a few years longer for frontier service—if a well-directed stream of emigration can be poured into the Eastern Province and British Kaffraria, it may be so. But under the most favorable circumstances, the native character must be dealt with with great caution, if we would avert the evil consequences which will otherwise inevitably result from the location of large masses of natives in the border districts, the scene of their former depredations and of their daily conflicts with the colonists. Some system of effective supervision over the hordes of savages that have been received into the colony should be at once organized by the Government. It should not lose sight of the fact, that they have entered the colony for various reasons. In short, a native department should be created, for the purpose of taking over the management of the natives, Kafirs as well as Kafirs, that are located within the colony. It is preposterous to expect that an executive in Cape Town can devote time to native supervision. And yet at the present moment there is no subject that demands a higher degree of attention of a superintending authority of the spot than the efficient guardianship, control and instruction of the native tribes living within the colony.

The following is the letter above alluded to:—The position of the Eastern districts at this moment is such as to cause considerable anxiety to every reflecting mind. All confidence in the Cape Parliament is gone. There is not the slightest glimmering of hope from that quarter; nor do the internal arrangements, as regards the natives on our border, hold out the most flattering hopes for the future. But a few months have passed since the Kafirs by their unmitigated menaces threatened to make war on the colony; homes were deserted; families driven into strange and inhospitable parts to seek shelter from their savage foes, while various kinds of stock were sacrificed, valued at many thousands of pounds. It was also thought necessary to place Her Majesty's troops in positions to repel the threatened invasion. Meantime the Kafirs were laughing at the aid of the isands, exchanging their hides in King William's Town for beads and buttons, in order to appear in their gayest costume when the time came for the wholesale slaughter of the colonists. During this period their hatred and contempt for the white man were displayed in a thousand forms, and witness to the true feeling of the whole nation. As a natural consequence, famine overtook them, they became too weak for intended onslaught, and their murderous designs for a time are placed in abeyance. King William's Town, as an advanced outpost, is of course the first to notice the "manger" Kafirs and their starving wives and children. In fact, with the splendid provisions of the hospital and its out-houses and the kind benevolence of Dr. Fitzgerald, their providential misfortunes could not be so unendurable. Hides and horns had ceased to flow into the Kaffrarian capital, which gave evident tokens that the work of destruction was complete, and then commenced the sympathies that are to restore the Kafirs to their native fastness. This is kind—it is christianlike; it is worthy the people of a christian nation. It is just possible that the philanthropists who are working with such praiseworthy zeal, are rather overstepping the bounds of discretion. It is not the other day that it was held to be the duty of intervention on the part of officials to give only a limited number of Kafirs passes into the colony. It was said that these people come as spies, and so gain information that may be useful to them when they shall be pleased to make war upon the colony; but now, forthwith, it would appear that all fear is passed upon the sight of a few lean natives from the bush, and all Kafirland may, without fear, be absorbed in the frontier population. Is not this carrying philanthropy a little too far? Is it not for the sake of our own safety to the world, and with a view to the safety of our own country, adding to our political reputation, for rather seeking favour from the deluded, bigoted, and noisy spongers of Exeter Hall, than the sound reasons of reflecting men? Upwards of twenty thousand natives have been within a very short period sent into the colony to seek employment, and are still pouring in large numbers, big strapping fellows, with their wives and numerous progeny, all to be fed upon the unfortunates, who are not allowed, as among other civilized communities, to seek servants as they may be in need of, but are compelled, if one requires a man, to take his wife and children—in fact, locate and maintain the whole family—hence it is Graham's Town at this time swarming with naked Kafirs, or with only the partial covering of an old blanket, which to many of them appears rather an encumbrance than otherwise, whilst the women and children would drag the old tatters back to back, and present to them the last pictures of old times. How far such things may go, and be tolerated by the refined taste of the aristocracy of Graham's Town, time will tell—but the wretched evil of the present system of what is termed Kafir relief may perchance go much further. In the rural districts, all chances must be encountered to procure labour, and of course, all expenses paid, because through that pattern of legislation a Cape Government has neglected the sacred duty to provide for the support of Europeans, so necessary in an exposed and dangerous frontier as this of the Cape colony; but the recklessness of sending Kafirs into the colony and the reckless manner in which they are hired, would long since have engaged the attention of a paternal government, had it not been too far off to take observation. Wherever there is a Kafir family, it is the lurking place for their friends and relations, once let them regain their native freshness, and I for one tremble for the consequences. We remember the onslaught on the military villages—with that in our recollection, let us be cautious. The marauding savage of Kafirland is the same in this colony; nor can the relief fund change their character. It may be said government officials are responsible—so were the officials of India; but what is their responsibility worth when some hundreds, or it may be thousands, of slaughtered victims proclaim the want of foresight and judgment on the part of these responsible gentlemen? Let us, I say, be prudent—make the Kafirs plough and sow and plant in their own country—let a wise system of government be established in Kafirland, that may ensure its future peace—but the present mode of action that is outnumbering the white man by ten to one through the importation of Kafirs, under the plea of seeking employment, may ultimately be fraught with consequences that it is awful to contemplate. It may be well to inquire, as it is supposed there are several thousand guns, besides pistols and revolvers, stolen from their slaughtered victims, amongst the Kafirs, how many have been purchased by government officials or the relief committees, or whether any more has been made to relieve them of these instruments of destruction. COSMOPOLITE.

BRITISH KAFFRARIA.—The mails from this quarter, says the Anglo African of the 3rd—managed to get in on Tuesday in good time, notwithstanding the continuous rain that had fallen for several days past. A Government notice contains the stipulations respecting the German immigrants into Kafirland lately contracted for. Each adult is to cost £12 lbs. and is to be allowed to purchase land in Kaffraria on certain terms, but the bounty money and expenses of settlement are to be repaid by instalments extending over eight years.

THE GRAHAM'S TOWN REPLY.—Upon this head the P. E. Telegraph contains the following article, which has fallen. The actors have retired from the political stage, never again to appear before the public. Messrs. Goddoulton, Wood, and Cook refused to present the Council. To face their Western brethren in this way, they dare not venture. It is said that they have been signified to the electors of the Eastern Province at a period when it was too late to supply the places in the Council which these three gentlemen had up to the latest moment allowed to be understood they were willing to fill. The last act of the drama is worthy of all which have preceded it. The public conduct of these gentlemen throughout has been characterized by a want of honourable straightforwardness, and their last act has been attempted by what is ordinarily called a "dodge." It places His Excellency and the Eastern Province in a "fix." We doubt

not that the Governor will know how to estimate such conduct, as will the constituencies with which those gentlemen have so trifled. We are glad to have done with such legislators at any price. The Eastern Province will be a great gainer by this determination of the "three brothers" to retire into private life. Things will now, we trust, go ahead. More obstructives will not again be tolerated, but the Eastern districts will be represented by men of the age. We do not complain of Messrs. Goddoulton, Wood, and Cook, for declining the honours that some of their friends would have thrust upon them. How could they? How could they, with any show of consistency, have consented to sit in a Cape Town Parliament after having solemnly said "with tears" declared that a sense of duty led them to resign their seats? No things had taken place to their sentiments, their views to-day are what they were when they resigned. We congratulate them on the wisdom of their course in refusing to go back to the Council. But it is possible to be a member of a Council by the mode of doing it. And it is this that the country and the Governor have to complain of in this instance. So long ago as July last, Messrs. Goddoulton, Cook, and Wood, that the requisitions were in course of preparation asking them again to enter the Council. The published requisition to Mr. Cook bears date July 31, that to Mr. Wood bears date Aug. 3d, and that to Mr. Goddoulton a few days later. It was known moreover by these gentlemen that the public generally regarded the fact of their friends to get up these requisitions as a virtual avowal of their willingness to be returned. But it comes out on the 29th August, two days only before the time allowed by His Excellency for returning the requisitions, that the three honourable gentlemen have all along been playing with the public, and have no intention of going again to Council. Such conduct is worthy only of some thimble-rigger of the turf. Had any new light entered the minds of these gentlemen so that their views had been thereby modified, the case would have been different. But on the 24th of August, their views they state are what they were on the day of requisitioning, and that they had remained the same during the intermediate period. And yet they quietly put the requisitions into their pockets until they think it is too late to invite other gentlemen to stand, and then they return a negative to their constituents. What in this case will His Excellency do? Will he extend the time for sending in requisitions, or will he allow the Eastern Province to be represented by four members in Council, in the place of seven, until the next ordinary election? The conduct of the three members in allowing themselves to be invited, and in not returning the requisitions of "no," until it was too late to procure other gentlemen to supply their place, would be a fair reason for His Excellency to allow longer time. There are gentlemen who would have been nominated, and who would go to the Council if returned, but who had no desire to displace old members. It is a pity that they had not been called to stand, without regard to all the Graham's Town members. The Eastern Province, in studying the feelings of their old representatives, have, as the facts show, committed a serious error, how or much that error may have leaned to virtue's side. W. exonerates Mr. Waine. Early in August that gentleman stated public circumstances of a personal nature had arisen since the requisitioning which would render it impossible for him to attend parliament during the ensuing session. On this ground he declined to accede to the prayer of the requisition; stating at the same time, that had it not been for these circumstances "he would in all probability have been prepared to defer to the opinions of an influential body of his fellow citizens as to those who signed the requisition." We are glad to find that Mr. Fleming has acceded to the wish of the requisition sent to him, and will, if returned, go again to the Council. Mr. Metler says some time ago finally decided not to go again. At present therefore there are only three gentlemen having received requisitions willing to stand for the Eastern Province. J. Wessels, Esq., of Capetown, the Advertiser states, has received a requisition from Burgersdorp, inviting him to stand for one of the vacant seats in Council, but not being a resident in the Eastern province he is unqualified according to the Constitution Ordinance to sit. We bid farewell to the Grahamstown ex-members in their public capacity wishing them all joy in their retirement. They will, we trust, find more time to stir up their fellow townsmen to seek those great practical improvements which the colony so much needs, and will henceforth occupy their minds less with political agitation and constitution mongering. It will favour their energy to open the Kowie, and construct Mr. Goddoulton's proposed line of railway through Grahamstown to the mountains of the moon.
