On Wednesday last, the launch of the screw steamer "Compass" belonging to the Union Steam Navigation Company, of Southampton, and intended as a mail ship between that port and the Cape of Good Hope, took place at Deptford. The "Compass" is a remarkably fine vessel of her class, and has been built from the lines designed by her builder, Mr. C. Lunney. The following are her exact dimensions: Length between perpendiculars, 230 ft.; ditto over all, 253 ft.; breadth extreme, 39 ft. 1 in.; depth of hold, 19 ft. 6 in.; burden in tons, old measurement, 1019 18.94ths.—*Case & Natal News.*

The prospectus has been issued of the London and South African Bank, with a capital of £1,000,000, in 250 shares. The list of directors comprises members of some of the leading houses connected with the Cape. The head office is to be in London, and the branches will be in Cape Town, Graham's Town, Port Elizabeth, and the colony of Natal. It is stated that another company is about to issue a prospectus for a bank, the proposed capital of which will be £500,000. There may be good room for one, but in the conflict of two perhaps neither may succeed. If both should be found to possess elements of strength, an immediate amalgamation would seem the rational course. To-night's Express says:—The shares of the newly-announced London and South African Bank are quoted at 1 to 1 premium, the project having been received with much favour. An apparently well-considered project was announced yesterday afternoon under the title of the London and South African Bank. In an undertaking of this kind it is essential to success that the support of the merchants engaged in the trade should be secured. This condition has, in the present instance, been fulfilled in a remarkable degree, nearly all the principal Cape houses being represented at the board, where the mercantile element predominates in a marked manner. Few of our colonies have achieved more rapid progress of late years than the Cape. Of the profitable character of the field for banking there presented, proof is afforded in the prosperity of the five existing local banks, the latest dividends of which varied from 13 to 22 per cent. per annum, whilst the shares in every instance are at very high premiums. The cry from the colony for more banking accommodation has been often repeated, but a response from home has hitherto been prevented by apprehensions of the effect of the maximum legal rate of interest at 5 per cent. By a recent unanimous decision of the Supreme Court of the colony, this point has been definitively solved in a sense in accordance with the principles of free trade. Owing to the respectability of the auspices under which the undertaking is brought forward, it is certain that the capital—which in the first instance has been fixed at the very moderate sum of £400,000, will be subscribed. Mr. John Barry, one of the directors, goes out by to-day's mail, with authority to associate with himself, as a local board, three or four of the highest mercantile names in the colony, and to allot the fourth (£100,000) of the capital, which has been judiciously reserved for local subscriptions.
