young grass down to the very banks of the Kei river. Scarce a green blade is to be seen for miles, and farmers are at a loss to know what to do with their lands. "To get down to the sea," says our correspondent, "is almost useless, as the quantities of stock already being depastured on the coast makes it next to impossible for more to go down with advantage. I am totally eaten out by the locusts and don't know where to go for grass for my lambs." The locusts are wending their way hitherwards from the north, and are said to be within a very few miles of town, on the East side. The strip of country between Port Elizabeth and Hangman's Bush, we are told, is awfully infested with them. Westwards the winged army has taken up its quarters between Breakfast Vley and Grahamstown, while a rather extensive foraging expedition was seen on Thursday making its way up the West bank of the Keikamma.

THE ZULUS.—A correspondent from Wakkerstroom under date 26th May states: "It is no idle rumour but a positive fact, that the Zulus claim the half of the Utrecht district together with the Pongola bush, they are expected to arrive daily, and probably judge the present disorderly state of the country, a fitting opportunity to assert their claims."

POT TO THE GOLD FIELDS.—The Postmaster General F. Jeppes Esq., has received a letter from the Revd. John McKenzie stationed at Shoshong, in which the Revd. gentleman treats of the postal communication between the Gold-fields and Potchefstroom via Secheli and Marico, and adds, that difficulty will be experienced by him in dispatching the post from Machen to the Gold-fields, and the return post to Secheli. Measures, however, have been taken here some months since, to keep open the communication with Secheli.

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SAINTLY STATE OF PORT LOUIS.—A correspondent writing from the Mauritius, at which Island he arrived recently by one of the Overland steamers, says with respect to the sanitary condition of Port Louis:—"Of all the towns I ever was in, I never saw such a dirty place as Port Louis. The stench is something awful, and no wonder the fever rages amongst the population. The inhabitants all look like walking skeletons from the effects of the fever. Every one you meet has craps round his hat, while at every corner you turn you stumble against coolies conveying coffins. Coming from the gardens at Pamplemousse, we had to pass a grave yard, the very aspect of which made me quite sick. The graves were studded like drills in a potato field, and above ground were to be seen a dozen coffins waiting to be interred."—*Natal Mercury.*

O'FARRELL'S STATEMENT AFTER HIS COMMittal.

Sydney, March, 19.

O'Farrell made the following statement since his committal.

He stated he intended to have shot at the Prince a second time as he lay on the ground and then to have shot himself, but was prevented by the movement of Sir William Manning. Moreover, that he had a written instrument received from the directors of the Fenian movement at home, directing the execution of the Prince, and that each of ten persons entered into a solemn engagement to shoot him, in the event of the lot falling to him.

Lots were drawn by a boy in presence of the ten men. It fell to his (O'Farrell's) lot to execute the Prince. This took place about two months. He said he regretted that it had fallen to his lot to kill the Prince, but killing was not regarded in the light of assassination, but in the same way as they regarded the execution of the three Irishmen at Manchester.

O'Farrell added that the general design of the Fenian organisation was to strike terror into the English people (or aristocracy), believing that to be the most effectual mode of bringing about the independence of Ireland.

The prisoner went on to state that he intended to have shot the Prince on the occasion of the public landing, and a good opportunity of doing so presented itself. He had procured a gun for that purpose, and hired a room which commanded a view of the procession. He was deterred from carrying out his intention on that occasion, as there was a probability of the shot taking effect on the Earl of Belmore, who was sitting beside his Royal Highness. He afterwards proposed to carry out his deadly purpose at the Citizen's Ball.

One of the ten men previously referred to, wished to accompany him for the purpose of setting fire to the Pavilion by means of inflammable substances which he had in his possession, but that he (O'Farrell) was unwilling to sacrifice so many lives when his engagement required the death of but one. Subsequently he intended to have accomplished his design at the Facy Dress Ball, but for some cause was led to postpone it to a more favourable opportunity.

O'FARRELL'S DEFENCE.—Mr. B.C. Aspinall, accompanied by Mr. Pavey, has left for Sydney, they having been retained for the defence of O'Farrell, the would-be assassin of Prince Alfred. The funds have been subscribed by the prisoner's relatives who reside in Melbourne, and the services of Mr. Daley, of Sydney, and a local solicitor have been engaged, as there would be no time to get up the defence in Sydney. Several witnesses are impaled Mr. Aspinall to Synder, some of whom have known O'Farrell for many years, while others—such as Mr. P. W. Ish, of Bilarat—have had recent business transactions with him. The defence which will be set up is, of course, insanity. We understand that Mr. Aspinall is to get £200 and all his expenses paid for defending O'Farrell.

O'FARRELL'S ACCOMPLICES.—An officer of the Galatea, who is under date the 15th March, to a gentleman in Balaia, makes the following statement:—"It is supposed that the assassin is one of thirty, and of course a Fenian. At present your city gets the credit of organising these ruffians; but it is hard to say, as what the authorities know about the matter is kept secret. The story goes that ten are here, ten at Melbourne and the other ten gone to England. Both the pistols the fellow had were purchased here—the one fired from being a Springfield Colt. He bought them the day before. The pistol he had been in the habit of practising with, he did not use on this occasion."—*Launceston Examiner.*
