VEERTIENDE JAARLYKSCH VERSLAG.

De Directeuren der Kaapsche Handelsbank, de Aandeelhouders ontmoetende by het einde van een jaar, gedurende hetwelk geene merkbare verbetering heeft plaats gehad in den stand van den handel en den landbouw der Kolonie, wouen zich geregtvaardigd te noeggen, dat terwyl deze inrichting even als die meeste andere inrichtingen van denzelfden aard, den invloed van de algemeene gedracht heeft getoond dezelve voortdurend een groot en verbluyend deel van het publieke vertrouwen en depublieke ondersteuning geniet.

2. De gros profyt van het jaar bedragt in de som van £14,048 7s. 10d., waaryan afgetrokken moet worden £5,030 interest aan klanten betaald, alsook arbeidskosten, directeurs salarissen, als by de laatste algemeene vergadering is toegestaan, en Gouvernementsregten, in alles uitmakende de som van £7,729 11s. 1d., er zal dus, als de nette profyt op het jaar, overblyf van de som van £6,318 16s. 9d., waaruit uwe directeuren voorvalen een dividend bedrag van 6 percent op de £27,000 a.s.d. Aandeelhouders zal worden betaald, hetgeen de som van £1,630 zal vereischen; en dat van de balans van £1,998 16s. 9d. genomen en by het Reservfonds zal gevoegd worden, volgens de voorziening door de Trustakte gemaakt, e s neem van £200, waarnaar £1,898 16s. 9d. overbleft daerop het krediet van het Dividende beschermfonds gesteld te worden.

3. De Aandeelhouders zullen zich herinneren dat in het Verslag van verleden jar cene lyst werd gegeven van Wissels in Insolvente Boedels ingeleverd, in het ghele £199 12s. 3d bedragende; en daar het niet waarschynlyk is dat ieteen op dit papier zal ontvanger worden, stellen uwe Directeuren voor dat deza som van £199 12s. 3d terstond op het debet van Winst en Verlies wordt gedreven.

4. In het Verslag van verleden jar traden uwe Directeuren zoo volledig in de byzonderheden van de kwade en twyfelachtige schulden die door de Bank waren aangegaan gedurende verleden jar, dat zv nu alleen omtrent d' t Verdag moeten wesen en melden, dat, terwyl in het geval van een enkelken debiteur, C. P. BRINK, het verlies gelyk bleek is iets groter te zyn dan het te d'r tyde werd geschat; da meening toe gegeven is geblyk en welzyk juist te zyn.

5. Overeenkomstig het Verslag van verleden jar, zoals is goedgekeurd door de Aandeelhouders, was eene som van £15,000 van het Reserve Fonds afgemogen om kwade en twyfelachtige schulden weg te ruinen, en uwe Directeuren stellen voor dat eene verdere som van £5,000 nu van het Dividende Beschermfonds worde afgemogen tot hetzelde doelwende werde aangewand.

6. Uwe Directeuren hebben niet verzind, gedurende het verloopen jar het nut in het oog te houden van zooy speditie en zon ver als de omstandigheden wilden veroorloven, het bedrag te reducteren dat op hypotheken van Vanggoed uitgelegd was op een tyd toen dae waarde der Vaste Goederen aanzienlyk hooger was dan die sedert dien tyd is geworden. Het dijt hun genoeg dat zy in staat zyn te rapporteren dat hunne pogingen te dien einde niet zonder goedslag uitdag zyn geweest, daer enige Verbanden, waaronder dat van T. T. HEATLEY, goedgekeurd zyn; en enige, waaronder dat van A. P. VAN HERKEDEN, ten volle zyn betaald.

7. Voornoemlyk ten gevolge van de sekwe-iratis van den boedel van C. MARAIS, schijnt het bedrag van vervallen en opbetaalde Wi-sels groter in de rekeningen van het tegenwoordige dan in dien van het vorige jaar, maar dat groter bedrag zal slechts tydelijk blyken te zyn, daar de schulden van den Heer MARAIS ten volle gedekt zal worden door Securiteiten, die men bezig is te gelde te maken.

8. Uwe Directeuren hebben gedurende het verloopen jar den Interest betaalbaar door de Bank op vasto Deposito verder gereduceerd, daer het belang van het Kapitaal, waartoe Belegging in dien vorm wordt geschat, tegen vroegere Interest, groter is dan hetgeen uwe Directeuren met voordeel kunnen gebruiken.

9. De Directeuren die nu volgens den rooster aftreden zyn de Heeren N. W. MATEN, WILLIAM PORTER, en J. S. PRINCE, en daar ze allen voor herkiezing benoemd zyn en daar geene andere Kandidaten voorgesteld, zal de gewone ballotage slechts formeel zyn.

10. Het Dividende van 6 percent, zynde £22.5d per aandeel, zal betaalbaar zyn open na den 15den deszer.

Mutueele Levens Assurantie MAATSCHAPPY.

Verslag van de Directeuren van de Mutueele Levens Assurantie Maatschappy van de Kaap de Goede Hoop, op de Jaarlyksche Algemeene Vergadering van Leden, gehouden in de Zaal van het Genootschap, op Maandag, 6 July, 1868.

De Directeuren zyn in staat aan de Leden op deze, de 25ste Jaarlyksche Algemeene Vergadering, een in alle opzichten voldoende Verslag voorttelegen.

Niettegenstaande de wedyvering met buitenlandse kontoren en de druk des handels over de geheele kolonie, is het vooruitzigt van het Genootschap, gedurende eene reeks van jaren niet gestoord.

Eene vergelyking der Rekeningen van verleden jar, met die thans ter tafel gelegd toont aan dat wy dit jar £1850 meer aan Premium hebben gemaakt, terwyl de vermeerde in de sommen ontvangen voor renten op beleeningen £2178 bedragt. Om kort te gaan, overtreft het gehele inkomen van dit jar dat van het voorleden by £3910. An den anderen kant bedragen de vorderingen, gelyk uit de Balans Rekening zal blyken, £2004 meer. De reden hiervan is gelykelyk te vinden in de koorts die voordelen zomer in de Kaapstad geheerscht heeft, en onder anderen, vier van onze leden heeft weggerukt, aan wier vertegenwoordigeris de som van £3014 12s. 1d. is uitbetaald. Twee derzelver waren Gencees-heeren, die weggenaaid werden, terwyl zy hunne professie onder de zieke armen uitvoefden.

Men zal zich herinneren dat op de laaste Jaarlyksche Byeenkomst het Collegie de gepastheid aan de hand gegeven werd, om de Commissie aan Buiten Agenten toegestaan, te vermeerde. De Directeuren hebben de zaak sedert dien tyd rypelyk overwogen, maar zyn niet in staat enige vermeerde aanbevelen op het salariss thans getrokken (2 per cent.)

Dit het derde jar zynde siets de verdeling van Winsten, is de tyd nu aangekomen, waarop eenne andere verdeling moet worden verklaard. Tot dat einde is het gewone onderzoek na de aangelegenheden van het Genootschap, bewerkstelligd door deszelver Actuary. De uitslag is, dat na behoorlyke voorziening te maken voor alle tosvalligheden, de Directeuren in staat zyn een Bonus te verklaren van 2 per cent, per jaar, of 7s per cent, voor de drie jaren. Gelyk tot hier toe de gewoonte geweest is, zullen prospective byvoegingen tegen gemelde koers toegestaan worden op alle Polissen, welke Vorderingen mogten

worden voor de volgende drie-jarlyksche verdeling, mits goodanige Polissen vijf jaren bestaan hebben:

Ten einde enig denkbeeld te geven hoe de Winsten op een Polis oplopen en de voordeelen aantoonen te worden getrekken van te verassureeren in een Kantoor, waar al de Winsten aan de Houders van Polissen behoren, kan geneld worden dat een Polis van £500 genomen in het eerste jaar van het bestaan van dit Genootschap, nu £901 Os. 4d. bedraagt, terwyl het bedrag van premien op hetzelve te worden betaald, blyft als in den sanvang.

En terughik van de Genootschaps transaksies gedurende de laatste drie jaren, toont dat er ammerenlyk voortgang is gemaakt. In 1865 bedroeg het getal Polissen van kracht, 1880; de som verassureerd £1,212,651; en de geheele inkomst £44,016. Op den 31 Mei jl. was het getal bestaande Polisen 2225, £1,432,966 verzekerende (Winsten) en de Jarlyksche Inkomst verneerde tot £48,958.

Deze getallen moeten de Leden het volste vertrouwen in den Instigting doen stellen, terwyl zy hen die niet verassureerd zyn, den sterkeste spoedslag aanbieden zy by een Kantoor te voegen, hetwelk der moest welslagende onzer Koloniale Instigtingen is. Men stelt voor een gelyk bedrag als dat voorleden jar gestemd sau de Directeuren en Auditoreen voor hunne diensten toekennen.

De Byeenkomst zal moeten overgaan tot de herkiezing van de heeren BRAND, MURKIN en MANUEL, als Directeuren, die de enige genomineerde Leden zyn; alsmede Auditoreen te benoemen in de plaats van de heeren HERMAN en HOPMEYR, die weder herkiebaar zyn.

THE WEATHER.

DURING the hurry and bustle of an unusually active Parliamentary session, it will no doubt appear somewhat strange that we should have fixed upon the weather as a subject for a leading article. There is no lack of subjects on the table at the present time, yet the weather certainly excites the greatest interest and commands the greatest attention just now. The long continued drought which threatened to consign a large portion of our arable lands to sterility for the next twelve months, has happily broken up. We have lately had abundant rains, which, as far as we can learn, have extended over the principal crop-growing districts of the Western Province, and although they have come rather late in the season, for speeding the plough, they will operate a most beneficial effect upon the crops that were already in the ground, and enable the farmer to bring for, late crops, vastly increased tracts of land under cultivation. The weather, which since the commencement of the month, or rather during the last fortnight was unusually cold and boisterous, now seems to contemplate a change for mildness and geniality, in which case the drooping spirits of the farmers will be again re-assured, and we expect to hear of them putting their hand to the plough with a determination and energy, that while it will expel them from the imputation of indolence which is but too freely imputed to them by those who know nothing of the difficulties and drawbacks that the farmer has to contend against, and in some way or other to surmount, it will at the same time, bear more substantial fruits in the unexpected increase of his products for the year.

If there is one class of men that we are naturally disposed to sympathise with more than another, it is certainly our Farmers. It is not enough that blights, droughts, and bad seasons are to be mainly contended against, but, as if they the farmers were not the very heart that circulates the vivifying principle through the whole body politic, they are looked upon by a large portion of our citizens as mere idlers, and cumberers of the ground; and not only that, but even our Legislature occasionally lends a helping hand to their ruination and downfall. What could have been more mischievous, for instance, than the tampering with the tenure on which most farmers held their Estates? And what have been the fruits of this sciolistic legislation? Why, capital has been withdrawn from Agriculture—The farmer has been ruined,—and the capitalists has not by any means proportionately benefited. We believe that both, and the country of course generally, had abundant reason to regret their having listened to the Syren-songs of the enthusiastic advocates of the disturbance of an existing time—honored contract between the capitalist and the employer of his capital. A succession of good seasons combined with a practical appreciation on the part of capitalists of the false position into which they were improvidently hurried by the Parliamentarian doings in what is usually called the "usury question" Bill may do much to restore us to our former prosperity, but it will require a decade of years before "much progress can be reported." Let us then be thankful for the late rains, and let no energy on our part be dampened by the "old recollections of former years." It is of no use impugning and complaining. Up, then Patrons universally, as far as it is within your power and "speed the plough" under the assurance that Heaven helps those that help themselves.

MR. LIESCHING AND RAILWAYS.

The Worcester Courant contains another letter from Mr. Liesching on the subject of the extension of Railways, especially the connection of Wellington and Worcester. Mr. L. seems to think that there are people to be found in the colony who are opposed to Railways *per se*, and subscribe to the doctrines propounded by "Achter-O" in the same journal. We confess we have never met with any such, and we do not believe anybody else has, but we have met with thousands who in the honesty and simplicity of their hearts, would rather submit to a tollsime mode of locomotion, than to be marched from the Railway Station, to a certain other station that shall be nevertheless, simply because they have pledged themselves for an easy means of transit, which they could afford to pay for after the journey was over. Mr. L. will do good service to the public, if he can show that the farmers of the Worcester valley are able and willing to pay for the extension of the Railway to that which might be made a very rich and productive inland district, but he must not expect to get Pikeberg, Clanwilliam and Simon's Town to come down with the sub-guarantees for the completion of that work. We agree with Mr. L., that if a railway could grow between Wellington and Worcester, it would be of incalculable advantage to the little town and neighbourhood, although we have our doubts as to its benefiting the former, in a corresponding degree; but as railways don't spring up like grass in this country, and as we are obviously notable, without ripening our industries to indulge in the luxury of a rail, if constructed at our own expense, we had better in the first instance, of the extreme extravagance of investing our last dollar in the purchase of a velvet purse.

DARING ROBBERIES.

On Sunday last, the shambles belonging to Messrs. Combrink and Ross were forcibly entered by thieves, who made their way over the wall from behind. Having gained admittance, they must have got to the front shop and office, in which papers from the various files were scattered abroad. A large iron safe about 700 lbs. weight which was bricked in under one of the desks, was dragged out and taken into one of the back stores, where it was to be sold open. From appearances, it seemed as if the upper sheet of iron on the lid had first been knocked off, after which a crowbar was forced under the lid, wrenching the locks completely off. Unfortunately, money to the amount of £200 had been left in the safe on Saturday night, all of which was taken together with a number of cheques. The money consisted of £100 in gold, £50 in silver and copper, and £50 in Standard Bank notes, of the following numbers—331, 3102, 3779, 1731, 1629, 1931, 2815, 273, 2498, 1584. The following cheques were also taken—E. Marais, for £3 21s. 6d.; Smidt, £13 18s. 8d.; Sir W. Hodges, £5 18s. 6d.; Maxell, £5 5s 11d.; Bresler, £1; R. Davidson, £5 10s. 3d.

A Malay man has been arrested in Cape Town on suspicion and two other men have also been arrested at St. Helena on Tuesday. They were brought up yesterday morning by rail, and were taken before the magistrate but were remanded till this day at 10 o'clock.

On Sunday night last, the "City Arms Inn," kept by Mr. Jeary, was forcibly entered by thieves, and a large quantity of wine, beer, and porter carried away. An entrance was effected through one of the front windows, fit by breaking down the Venetian shutters, then smashing one of the glass panes near the middle of the window which enabled the fellow to put his hand inside and remove the latch after which the window was raised and a free entrance to the bar made. As yet no trace of the offenders has been found.

MONDAY night, the Royal Engineer's Department was broken into by burglars and a quantity of tools from the workshops taken away. The thieves made an entrance over the back wall from Harrington-street, and thence into the premises, by breaking down one of the doors. Information was immediately given to the police, who were put on the alert. At about 10 o'clock yesterday morning, two men were noticed in the rear of the shambles, having in their possession a bag of tools. Information was at once given to a constable, who duty sent him to the men and apprehended and brought to the station, where they were identified as those stolen from the department. The men, whose names are George Parker and Terence McCausle, were immediately taken into custody upon the charge of store-breaking and to their ruination and downfall. PARLIAMENTARY.

Legislative Council.

The Legislative Council on Monday granted addresses asking for returns relative to the storing of gunpowder, and to the cost, &c., of the Table Bay Breakwater. Returns of Crown land sold and leased were also granted. The S.A. Association Bill passed through committee and was read a third time and passed. The Joint-stock Companies Wind-up Bill occupied the greater part of the afternoon in committee.

Tuesday, July 7.—On the motion of Mr. Vigny, returns were granted, showing the amount of road rate received and the manner in which they had been expended by the various Divisional Councils. The Joint-stock Companies Bill was further considered in committee.

House of Assembly.

The House of Assembly on Monday passed the second reading of Mr. Smith's Removal of Castle Hill by 29 votes to 16. The Postal Rates Amendment Bill passed the House without amendment. The Customs' Act Amendment Bill was read a second time; and the House went into committee on the subject of Main Roads. Contributions when a long discussion took place with respect to whether the contribution payable by the division of Robertson to Worcester, in respect to which Mr. Moodie moved that the vote should be reduced to £100. The motion was carried on a division by 20 to 17.

On Tuesday, the House adjourned immediately after assembling, until this afternoon, in consequence of the demise of Lady Brand.

DIVISIONAL COUNCIL MELMERSBURY.

The usual monthly meeting of this council was held in the Court-room, Malmesbury, on the 20th June, 1858.

Present: E. S. Ford, C. J. chairman, Messrs. Crozier, Duckitt, Visser, Bresler, Louw and Eaton.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

Two applications were received for the lease of the Groote Vley Outspan, one from J. J. de Bruyn, Kennedy, and one from Jacob Gryffenberg.

Groote Vley Outspan.

A memorial was received from certain inhabitants praying that the Council would not lease the above outspan.

It was resolved that the memorialists be informed that the principal object of the Council in leasing the Outspan is to protect it from the vagabonds of cattle reported to be continually trespassing on it, of which frequent complaints have been brought to the notice of this Council. The secretary was also instructed to furnish the members with a copy of the conditions under which the Outspan will be let.

On the motion of Mr. Eaton seconded by Mr. Visser and carried unanimously, it was resolved that the Outspan be leased to Jeremiah Kennedy, under the conditions of Government Notice 405

of 1859, amended by Government notice 155 of 1868 for a period of 33 years subject to the approval of His Excellency the Governor.

Road over Jonker's Hoek.

A letter was read from Dr. Biccard, Jr., requesting that the road over Jonker's Hoek might be repaired, and offering to contribute £2 10s. towards the work, provided, the council give not less than £15.

Resolved that a sum not exceeding £25 including Dr. Biccard's contribution, be expended in effecting the necessary repairs, and that the work be entrusted to Messrs. Van Aarde and Lombard of Grasburg.

Riebeek's Kasteel Road.

A letter was read from certain inhabitants of Riebeek's Kasteel requesting that the road leading round the mountain to Malmesbury might be repaired.

Resolved that the Road party be moved from the Mamre road and sent to the road in question as well as the other branch roads in this division, and that a new piece of road be constructed on this side of Rainiers Pass.

Mamre and Darling Road.

On the motion of Mr. Duckitt it was resolved that a sum not exceeding £5 be expended in the repair of the road between Mamre and Darling.

Pauli Road.

On the motion of Mr. Bieler, it was resolved that a sum not exceeding £1 10s 0 be expended in repairing the Pauli Road near the Bot River Vley.

Leave of absence to Mr. Gird.

On the motion of Mr. Eaton, it was resolved to grant leave of absence to Mr. Gird (one of the members), during the present session of Parliament.

Accounts.

Accounts amounting to £93 0 2 having been approved, of the Council adjourned.

THE EMIGRANTS TO MONTEVIDEO.

Very poor accounts continue to be received from the emigrants who left this for South America. Mr. James Hayward who left this place in the "Sunny South," writes as follows to a friend here:-

Montevideo, February, 1868.

"On the 6th of this month I went up town intending to go to Buenos Ayres by steamer that evening; but I found several streets barricaded; and to a constable, duty on the spot, and the men were also taken and brought to the station, where they were identified as those stolen from the department. The men, whose names are George Parker and Terence McCausle, were immediately taken into custody upon the charge of store-breaking and were brought up yesterday, and committed for trial.

On Sunday morning last, a thief very easily walked into the kitchen of a gentleman residing out Padernon way and took off the fire, which contained a joint of meat for the dinner, upon which he made off. The surprise of the cook upon returning to the kitchen, which he had only left a few minutes ago, was great.

Some fellow with any amount of cheek, on Monday evening very easily walked into the house of Mr. E. White and helped himself to a great cov., a cap, white hat, and a pair of boots. These things had been left on a stand in the passage.

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Tuesday, July 7.—On the motion of Mr. Vigny, returns were granted, showing the amount of road rate received and the manner in which they had been expended by the various Divisional Councils. The Joint-stock Companies Bill was further considered in committee.

House of Assembly.

The House of Assembly on Monday passed the second reading of Mr. Smith's Removal of Castle Hill by 29 votes to 16. The Postal Rates Amendment Bill passed the House without amendment. The Customs' Act Amendment Bill was read a second time; and the House went into committee on the subject of Main Roads. Contributions when a long discussion took place with respect to whether the contribution payable by the division of Robertson to Worcester, in respect to which Mr. Moodie moved that the vote should be reduced to £100. The motion was carried on a division by 20 to 17.

On Tuesday, the House adjourned immediately after assembling, until this afternoon, in consequence of the demise of Lady Brand.

DIVISIONAL COUNCIL MELMERSBURY.

The usual monthly meeting of this council was held in the Court-room, Malmesbury, on the 20th June, 1858.

Present: E. S. Ford, C. J. chairman, Messrs. Crozier, Duckitt, Visser, Bresler, Louw and Eaton.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

Two applications were received for the lease of the Groote Vley Outspan, one from J. J. de Bruyn, Kennedy, and one from Jacob Gryffenberg.

Groote Vley Outspan.

A memorial was received from certain inhabitants praying that the Council would not lease the above outspan.

It was resolved that the memorialists be informed that the principal object of the Council in leasing the Outspan is to protect it from the vagabonds of cattle reported to be continually trespassing on it, of which frequent complaints have been brought to the notice of this Council. The secretary was also instructed to furnish the members with a copy of the conditions under which the Outspan will be let.

On the motion of Mr. Eaton seconded by Mr. Visser and carried unanimously, it was resolved that the Outspan be leased to Jeremiah Kennedy, under the conditions of Government Notice 405

of 1859, amended by Government notice 155 of 1868 for a period of 33 years subject to the approval of His Excellency the Governor.

enemy we came down and enquired what it was. Oh! only a few Blancos being shot in the Cavilda. Life is very cheap here. Is not this a very beautiful country to live in? In the plaza in front of the Cavilda there is a marble fountain, and two days after the murder of the General a quantity of arsenic was put in and poisoned two troops. Forty officers and men died. General Flores' brother being one of them. One of the banks here has stopped payment, and I lose nearly £7 by it, as I have a lot of their notes. It is nearly all paper money here. I lost 7d. on each of the sovereigns I brought with me, and they are now selling for 21s. 6d. each. This is a horrid place to live in. I bitterly regret coming here. I do not know who one who came with me does not repeat it. The funeral of General Flores was on March 20th; it was very grand, and very numerously attended. He is buried in this Cathedral. A great number of priests took part in the service. Another outbreak took place. Trade is very, very dull. The Italians are coming here in thousands, and they work very low—4s. per day. They live and sleep ten or twelve in one room, like pigs. They work on Sundays here much the same as any other day. I have heard much of the politeness of the Spaniards, but I have seen but little of it yet; there are a very dirty set from the highest to the lowest."

Wetgevende Vergadering.

MAANDAG, 6 JULY.—Na enige kennisgeving van motie, onder anderen door den Heer Wehmeier van schriften van verdere correspondentie tussen President Brad en den Gouverneur, vooraf met betrekking tot zakers zware beschuldigingen door Messen teve te Vrystaatshoofd ingebracht, kwam het Huis na de Ordenen van den Dag, de eerste waarvan was de tweede lezing van den door den Heer Smith voorgestelde wet tot het herstelven van het voorverloren gesloten van. Ny was thans gelukkiger dan met de laste door hem voorgedragen wet, en na de taalrechte hulp bekomen te hebben van zyn collega, den Heer Schermbucker, werd, in woorl van den tegenvind van den Kolonialen Secretaria, de tweede lezing met 25 tegen 16 stemmen aangenomen.

Gedurende de discussie werd een bill van den Wetgevenden Raad ontvangen over de interkoloniale institutie-wet, welke bill voor het eerst gesloten werd, terwijl de tweede lezing op 8 July werd bevolgd.

—*Met toe-wijzing van het post-tarief werd zonder verdragering in committee-general aangenomen voor de derde maal gesloten en gepasseerd.*

De Koloniale Secretaria stelde de tweede lezing voor van de wet tot verbetering van de wet op de inkopen en deptien. De voornamelede beloofing van deze wet behoort te zijn dat goederen overgeheveld worden op kantoorstaande zonder inkomende regeling te bestaan. De lezing werd aangenomen en de behandeling in committee-general op Vrijdag gesteld.

DE WEGEN.

Het Huis ging toen in committee-general over de rapport der Commissie van verleden jaar over de Wagen, op motie van den Heer Moodie, die voorstellen, ingevolge eenne aanbeveling van de Commissie voorvoordi, om de contributie van den afde-

lingers van Robertson aan dien van Worcester, tot onderhouding van den Rainskoop weg, van £200 tot £100 te verminderen. Enz. Enz. Enz. kerken was in één jaar meer schade liepen dan de contrarie van een aantal jaren zou vergoeden. Maynard, en Knobel en de heeren Lindenbergh en Lissching, die blykbaar allen daerlijk lieten uitkijken hoeveel oock geschenken waren die in het midden van de aankondiging van de officiële opening, door blykent het oock geschilderd op plechtige wyze.

De stat zelve schijnt niets m'rkwaardigs te hebben opgeteld. De heer Hollies, die als oudheidkundige de expeditie mede had gehad, ten behoeve van het Britsche museum en niets van enige betrekking had, dat de heer Rowan eenne zaantje uitgestoken hadden, dat blykent het oock geschilderd op plechtige wyze.

Volgens geruchtes, te Paris onlangs door den Afdeeling Raad van Stellenbosch, zeide hy:
