

doubts of his ever recovering his sight. The Chinese mob set fire to the house, and did all they could to burn the inmates out of it. They were driven to such extremities that they were forced to throw the children from the upper windows, and the ladies were obliged to follow at the risk of their lives. One of them is within a month of her confinement. The outrage was caused by the literary class, who spread a report to the effect that the missionaries boiled up children to use them for medicine. The silly, impotent authorities knew of the difficulty fully a week beforehand, and instead of taking steps to prevent a breach of the peace, encouraged it by their indifference, if not actually by their connivance.

THE SPANISH REVOLUTION AND THE SHIPPING INTERESTS.—The following is reference to the probable effect of the Spanish revolution upon the shipping interest is from the freight circular of Messrs. Rucker, Offie & Co.:—The success of the revolutionary movement in Spain will afford the more enlightened men of that country an opportunity of freeing her commerce from many of the restrictions which have for so long crippled her trade. The abolition of the Spanish Navigation Laws, so as to give the flags of every country the same privileges as national ships, and the alteration of the villainous quarantine regulations will, we trust, be among the first fruits of the change of Government. We may not realize these hopes very rapidly, as the destruction of the Bourbon dynasty may be followed by difficulties in reconciling the various parties who have combined for the overthrow of the existing system, and some time may elapse before the future constitution is settled, but whether it take a monarchical or a republican form, it is to be hoped that the Spanish people will inaugurate the new order of Government by adopting the system of free trade, which has worked so well in our own country.
