vallen van Nassau bestondt. Hare lading bestond uit vele zware kanonnen, een groot aantal kisten ammunitie, kisten met kleedstof, schoenen, stukken leder en droogvoren. Een nieuwe boot, die tot Madeira lag, zou op 3 September de "Laurel" ontmoeten en van het laatste schip voorraden kanonnen, carveren, nemer. De naam van deze boot is "Zemper", maar dijal veranderd worden. Kapitein Samuels heeft met zich 8 officieren van de Alabam en 100 man genomen, die segt mens aan boord van hetzelfde vaartuig met hem streden. Een Noordelijke oorlogsschip is de "Laurel" dadelijk achterna gegaan, daan de Noordelijke Regering Samuels krygsgewangen heeft verklaard.

De "Florida" heeft op 22 Aug. 8 N. R. en op 27 W. L. het Amerikaansche schip "Southern Rights", van Richmon, dat met vier geladen was, aangehouden en geplunderd. De "Southern Rights" kwam op 12 Oct., te Falmouth aan.

UIT ALGIERS wordt gemeld, dat de opstand zich steeds verder onder de inlandsche stammen uitbreidt. Het is al ry een oproeping tot een heilige oorlog volgen. Een officieel rapport van generaal Poivre, beschrijft een gevecht, dat op 2den van 3den September pleide had tussen zynne troepen en eenen talyke magt Arabische opstandelingen. Het verlies der laatsten was 400 gedooden en 400 gewonden; dat der Fransen wordt op 80 gedooden en 27 gewonden begroot. De inlandsche ruïnes, die als hulpjopen by de Fransen dienden, werden hulle bongenoten, en liepen tot de Arabische over. De Fransen bleven achter meester van het slagveld.

De Hertog van Magenta heeft berigt gezonden, dat er nieuwe troepen voor Algers noodig waren.

DE KRIEGER IN KHINSAHN VAN RUSSLAND hulpen nooit eer naar Frankryk hun weg door Nieuwenen. Zy zullen dorpssteden op 18 Oct. verlaten, en dan avond te Münchens landen kommen; op den 19 blyven sy te Lyon, op den 20 te Marselles, en gaan van daar naar hunne badplaats. De Hertog van Bellune, maarschalk van het paleis, sal hen op de grenzen ontvangen en staten, dat ingenieners en langs den weg ten haarsen beschikking worden gesteld. Keizer Napoleon, zegt men, dat Caesar later persoonlijk opwacht. Aan den besoek, dat deze Keizer Eugenie te Swebies gebragt heeft, is beantwoord.

DE POLITIEK IN RUSSLAND.—Een groot eigenaar van vastgoed in de stad Orel moest, door middel van het politie kantoor in die stad 42,000 roebels ontvangen. Toen hy om dat geld aansoepte, dede zeide men hem, dat de som niet kon worden uittrekken, of hy moest het kantoor 5000 roebels kosten geven. Hy weigde, en gaf dadelijk de zaak te St. Petersburg aan. Het geld werd hem toen uitbetaald. Maar op den avond van dezelfden dag werd sy terwyl hy vredzaam in syne kamer was te rooken, borg aan de schel getrokken. Toen de moord de deur pendde, werd sy dadelijk gekneukt, en vier geknuschte mannen drongen de kamer binnen. De eigenaar vroeg hem wat zy begeerden, en sy zeiden dat hy hem 42,000 roebels moest terugstaan. Met de grootste koehheid ging hy van zynne godheit, opende de deur, greep een revolver, die bovenop lag, en schoot twee van de roovers dood, terwyl de anderen het hassenpden kozen. Toen zond hy om de politie, en by het aftenen der maskers herkende men in de lyken—het hoofd! der politiemagt en syn sekretaria.

JAPAN.—Met de Overland mail is het belangryke nieuw van nieuwe vyandelijken in Japan aangekomen. De aanleiding des oorlogs is de poging om tegang in de inlandsche zee te kriegen door de straat van Shimoneoak. Eene grote magt van 16 Engelse, 2 Franse en 4 Hollandsche oorlogsschepen zal deze onderneeming aanvaarden, maar men bewyfelt of sy tegen de geduchte versterkingen, die de Japanse gesmeed hebben, opgewassen zyn. De vryliden zullen op den 25 Aug. vertrekken, maar de vyanden konden soude waarschijnlyk niet beginnen voor het begin van September.

DE BISCHOP VAN LINCOLN OVER DR. COLENO.—By geleefdheid synner dijnerysche visitatie heeft synne lordship zich dus toe de toespraak aan synne geestelijkerheid over de Colenso wederlegging uitgedaan.—Hy kon de schandeënheid of heiderheid van sommige van Colenso's beschouwingen, of de opegheld synner overwinning niet ontkennen, maar synne lordship was bevonden mitivaties te syr, dat voor oplezing vatbaar ware, en geen bewaar was ons ontsentzing ten yde' op onoplosbare ware. De aanspraak op de authenticiteit van den Pantaleon was gedaan met een Britisch toets, dat op so onzekerken basis stond, en in de toepassing zooneen van den indienststaan smaak afding van hem die het gebruikt, dat naauwelijks twee critici er mede tot hetzelfde besluit waren gekomen, terwyl de theoriën, die als een substantieel voor het geloof van alle ouwen werden aangeboden, zo onwaarschijnlyk waren, dat er weinig vrees bestond, dat sy door vele aangenomenen, of zelfs lang door de sprekwoerdelyke liggetrouwigerheid der twyzichden zouden worden geringesteund. Tot hiertoe was slechts de geloofsaarheid van het Oude Testament in twyfel getrokken, maar Dr. Colenso had erkend, dat dezelfde geest van onderzoek op de geschriften van het nieuw verboed moesten worden opgesteld. Het was dan van belang op te merken dat de autoriteit op geloofsaarheid van het Oude en Nieuwe Testament digt ihengeweven waren; en dat Christus en syn Apostelen het zegel van het Godde lije getuigenis op de feiten hadden gedrukt welke de rationalistische wylehantie wierp.

EEN VERRIJDERS PARADE.—De "Standard" gaf onlangs een brief uit, die de volgende storie bevatte:—"Als men het gerucht gehoord mag, is Z.K.H. de grootvorst door de kooryl prinses Dagmar geheel betoverd. Op sekere afond stond hy naast zyne geliefde voor het open venster, en na en coul naar het met diamanten bezette star gewe te hebben opgeslagen, liet de tyrsige, schoone Czarowitch zyne groote oogen op, 'de god moet spreken synne verloofde valen,'—Dagmar, aansicht by 'dat zynne oogen,' die gy hebt, inderdaer het zynne geen oogen!'—'Genne oogen!'—zeide de leidende prinses, niet een blit, die hem in het hart drong, 'wat zynne dan, als het geen oogen?'—'Tot den hemel!' zeide de minskie prins, 'het zynne starren. Niets daarboven kan schoone of schitterende zyn!'—*Ibid.*

THE WEATHER.—The weather for some time back has been very sultry, but yesterday fine showers of rain fell, which have cooled the atmosphere and revived the face of the country.—*F. B. Advocate.*

RE DAVIDSON THE RUNAWAY.—As we expected the story of the capture of Davidson at St. Helena has vanished "like the baseless fabric of a vision, leaving not a wreck behind." Davidson, however, has been heard of, and his wife, too; both were seen in London on the 4th October. A private letter has been received from a shopkeeper in London, who has a son here in Fort Beaufort, with whom Davidson was intimate, which leaves little doubt as to the fact of the runaway's safe arrival at home. The shopkeeper was not acquainted with Davidson, and knew nothing of his acts here, but felt interested in a person who knew and could give him an account of his son here in Africa. Here is an extract from the "left," which answers Davidson's description pretty well:—

"A man came to my shop yesterday (4th Oct.) I bought a coat. He said he came from a warm climate, and it turned out he knew you, and his wife also. He was a short man, and she a stout woman, losing her nose; he called her Sarah."—*Ibid.*

HAIL STORM.—On Friday week there was a tremendous storm of hail and rain in the Kat valley. In the Mancanganana the hail stones were of enormous size, and killed many sheep besides wounding cattle seriously. The crops and fruit trees have in some places been completely destroyed.—*Ibid.*

LOCUSTS.—Those who have not seen the swarms of young locusts would hardly credit the immense broods of "voetgangers" or "voetgangers" which infest certain parts of the country. Around Adelaide, and towards Bedford, and even on the commonage here large patches of country are literally covered by the young ones. What appears at a little distance off to be red ground, or, turns out a nearer approach to be young locusts. They settle on a spot, and never leave it until they have cleared off everything eatable, when they trek to another place.—*Ibid.*

OVERCHARGE BY AN UNDERTAKER.—At the Resident Magistrate's Court at Fort Beaufort, on Thursday last, a civil case was tried which excited considerable interest. Nancy Andrews (widow of Thomas Andrews, lately killed at the Koop) appeared by Mr. Giddy, and complained that Henry Isaac Jones (who was defended by Mr. Knight) had made an exorbitant overcharge for conveying the body of her late husband from Fort Beaufort to Eland's Post. £25 was the sum charged by defendant, and paid to him by Mr. O'Gara, acting under a general power from the friends of deceased to defray the necessary charges for conveying the corpse to Eland's Post, and plaintiff prayed that defendant might be compelled to refund £18 14s., tendering £20 6s. as adequate compensation for the services performed. Defendant pleaded the general issue. Amongst the witnesses for the defence was Mr. T. York, undertaker, who proved that his charge for making a coffin only, was £10—that on two occasions he had performed services similar to those of defendant,—that for conveying the body of W. Glass to Graham's Town and making a coffin, he had received £35—and that for conveying the body of the murdered man

BURGERS v. THE SYNOD.—This case is to come on in the Supreme Court on Thursday next. In answer to the plaintiff's declaration the Moderator has filed an objection that he is not competent to represent either the Synod or the Synodical Commission without special authority so to do. How this objection can be sustained, is not very clear. The Moderator is president of the Synod as *ex officio* President of the Synodical Commission. The latter represents the Synod in all matters during the time the Synod does not sit, and its resolutions and decisions have the force of law immediately, they are taken or pronounced. The action as brought against the Synod itself, which has adjudged the plaintiff through its delegates.

EMIGRATION TO AMERICA.—During the past week ploughs have been stuck up throughout the city by a Mr. Wehran, inviting parties willing to emigrate to America, to apply to him at his office in Church-square, for full information, and promising to provide assisted passages to those inclined to go. It is suspected that it is a covert enticement of recruits for the Federal army.

WHOLESALE DESTRUCTION OF SHIPPING.

By the "Edith Smith" which arrived at Port Elizabeth on the 24th instant, information was received that a cyclone had passed over Calcutta on the 5th October and caused immense destruction of life and property. Only ten vessels out of more than 200 moored in the Hoogly were destroyed. Three vessels with cooies for Mauritius went to the bottom. The destruction of property on land was also great. The number of lives lost is not exactly known.

RICE, FLOUR AND SUGAR.—In consequence of the destruction caused by the cyclone at Calcutta, the price of rice in the Mauritius market has been materially enhanced. As a natural result other breadstuffs have also risen, Cape and Australian flour being quoted at from 5 dms. to 5 dms. 24c. per 100 lbs. with an upward tendency. In the English market sugar had declined £10 per ton, which has caused a proportionate fall in the Mauritius market.

THE "ANGLIAN."—This steamer arrived on Thursday evening, but the accounts brought by her have been anticipated by the "Kaffraia."

THE WEATHER.—The weather for some time back has been very sultry, but yesterday fine showers of rain fell, which have cooled the atmosphere and revived the face of the country.—*F. B. Advocate.*

SMITHFIELD.—From this town we learn "that the inhabitants, after battling successfully for several days, have at length succumbed to the countless legions of locusts (voetgangers) that have been during the last week besieging the town and that the whole of the gardens are now being rapidly laid waste." Our correspondent states that "these terrible insects have even invaded dwelling houses, offices, &c., where they destroy curtains, clothing, and papers, and that all the farmers who arrive in town report that the whole country is alive with them—army after army marching on without interval or interruption, the sheep having been just shorn."—*Ibid.*

DEATH BY DROWNING.—A sad accident occurred at the Fish River drift on Sunday last, near Barend Lombard's. It appears that on Sunday morning Mr. Cobus Stapelberg, was in Cradock; after church he proceeded on his way home and arrived at the drift a little before sunset. He saw that the river was full, but, being a good swimmer, and near home, he tried to cross. When in the water, his horse became unmanageable, and at last flung him. On the following morning the young man's body was found entangled in the branches of a tree, with a mark on the forehead as from the kick of a horse. It is very probable that he was disabled the instant he fell on the animal's back into the water, as he was seen to disappear almost at once by the persons who were on the other side of the river.—*Ibid.*

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THE LOCUSTS.—The locusts have been literally running to and fro in the streets, and running upon the walls and climbing upon the houses of Bloemfontein during the past week, and have destroyed, or partially destroyed, nearly all the gardens, and eaten every blade of grass within the town. Some of the owners of gardens had a hand to hand fight with them for two or three days, but at last the locusts effected a breach and carried every thing before them. Others of the townspeople took it more philosophically and thought resistance useless, and from the first made no stand but quietly submitted to them, and allowed them to luxuriate on the choicest of vegetables and 'green things.' We believe that they have now departed in search of pastures new, but we hear of more on the road. We heartily wish they would take to themselves wings and fly away for ever.—*Ibid.*

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THE BAROLONGS.—One of the principal sons of the Chief Moroko with several followers came into town on Tuesday last, and it was at first reported that one of the Barolong posts, or outstations had been attacked, and the cattle carried off by Basutos, but fortunately this report, like many others now being industriously circulated, proved false. It now appears that the only object that Moroko had in sending in, was to inquire whether the Barolongs might rely upon the assistance of this State in case of need, should such a case occur, before the proposed treaty should be signed, and secondly to get permission to purchase guns in this town. It would seem that Moroko has been threatened with a hostile attack, and that he has called his men together to take his advice before signing the treaty of alliance with this State.—*Ibid.*

OVERCHARGE BY AN UNDERTAKER.

At the Resident Magistrate's Court at Fort Beaufort, on Thursday last, a civil case was tried which excited considerable interest.

Nancy Andrews (widow of Thomas Andrews, lately killed at the Koop) appeared by Mr. Giddy, and complained that Henry Isaac Jones (who was defended by Mr. Knight) had made an exorbitant overcharge for conveying the body of her late husband from Fort Beaufort to Eland's Post. £25 was the sum charged by defendant, and paid to him by Mr. O'Gara, acting under a general power from the friends of deceased to defray the necessary charges for conveying the corpse to Eland's Post, and plaintiff prayed that defendant might be compelled to refund £18 14s., tendering £20 6s. as adequate compensation for the services performed.

Defendant pleaded the general issue.

Amongst the witnesses for the defence was Mr. T. York, undertaker, who proved that his charge for making a coffin only, was £10—that on two occasions he had performed services similar to those of defendant,—that for conveying the body of W. Glass to Graham's Town and making a coffin, he had received £35—and that for conveying the body of the murdered man

Blackbeard to Fort White, his charge was £20. The Magistrate in giving judgment, commented severely on the extortions which appeared to be practised by undertakers generally; and in the present instance in particular he considered the charge exceeded all reason. Taking into account the services rendered, and the expenses, time, and labour of plaintiff and his men, as given in evidence, and allowing a fair profit, he therefore gave judgment for plaintiff for £11, defendant to pay costs. When judgment was pronounced, defendant expressed in hearing of the court his dissatisfaction at the decision and his determination not to refund, upon which the Magistrate threatened to commit him to goal for contempt.—*E. P. Herald.*

CRADOCK.—On Wednesday evening Sergt Main & a party of the Mounted Police returned from an expedition after stray Kafirs. He seems to have been very successful, having captured between 90 and 100 natives of both sexes, men, women, and children. These we will, will all have been contracted as soon as possible. Since the introduction of the new system of contracting servants, in which the authority to attest contracts is placed solely in the hands of the Magistrate, there is no doubt that these gentlemen will be very hard worked indeed. If the duty is conscientiously performed, and a right understanding arrived at between the masters and servants previous to the contracts being signed, the Magistrates will have enough, if not more than enough, upon their hands in attesting contracts alone; but they will be spared, to a great extent at least, the infliction of having their time taken up with paltry cases,—all arising from loosely-worded contracts. The farmers who reside at some distance from the district towns complain loudly of the inconvenience to which they will be subjected by the new act, and it is not pleasant to bring a Kafir some forty or fifty miles to be contracted, and then find that he takes up with the Magistrate, will have to be removed to another town, and to pay for the acquisition of Rome and Venetia. This is something which justifies the distrust of the Magistrates in favour of the new system. There is reason on both sides.
