IN NOUSTE uitgave waagden wy enige opmerkingen die niet op gissingen, maar op wel gestaafde daadzaakken waren gegrond en aantoonbaar. Wijnsindelaar in deze kolonie tot beginne gelyc niet de vriend van den wijnbouwer, maar eer het tegendeel heeft getoond. De Fransche segt: *chacun pour soi, et Dieu pour agnus*, hetgeen in plat Hollandisch zoveel betekent als: zorg voor jezelf, en laat de rest aan onzen lieven Heer over. Handelaars laten *je l'ordre algemeen* dat bestaat! Idem; en wy gelooft dat weinigen bedenken, of de staats-afsluiting, die het eerste gedielte voorstelt, niet den begin van de herursting, in het laatste gedielte uitgedrukt, moet wegnehmen. Maatbaar dit ook zr. d. te h. wijnhandelaar den Kaapstaat wijn in verhuischting heeft gebracht, door het beginsel volgen om slechts voor de hoeveelheid eisachtig voor de hoeveelheid te betalen, is genoeg om een producetur te regtvaardigen op zyne beurt voor zichzelven te zorgen. De takkiek van den wijnbouwer blykt gelyc alles wat dat zegel draagt tot eigen ondergaang te voeren, zoalz. te verwachten was van een zelfbedrag dat economische afwyking van de leeuw insluit: niemand veracht syn eigen waar! Maar daar een oude rouw meer dan een gat heeft, zoo is ook de wijnhandelaar zeker, als de Londense machthebbers bestredt er een in de Kolonie te vinden, waar goedkoopheid byna de enige aanbeveling is, maar er dus goede wyn slechtse schrale koopers vindt, en waar alledaaglijk, het ophoud van het pakhuys, dat onspoeleblyk van de staten, by den emmig verkocht kan worden. Ofschouw geld alles bedreigt wat het sraakst, wordt het self niet bedreven door de handen waardoor het gaat. In plaats van *tbl-tafel* onder middelklassen te voorzien, zyn de kooplui terverden om hunne pakhuizen tot reservoires te maken voor het besproejen der kantons in stad en land, en behalen een makkelijke overwinning over de matigheidsgenootschappen in de Kolonie. Intussen hebben de veeteigenaarders der Kaapse aristocratie veel meite om zich met een gesonden en smakelyken tafelwyn voor dagelyks gebruik te voorzien, en daar zy op den lange duur door byna elken wynhandelaar worden teleurgesteld, moeten zy de zweefugt nemen tot Londense Ports en Sherries—niet omdat ay goudsyn, maar omdat ingevoerde wijn voor *fatsoendyl* doorgaan. Nu zouden wel willen weten hoe lang het Engelsch broswel zyne fatsoendelykehoude zou oppouden, als een vereeniging van wijnbouwers, z. ols. py. in diens harts hoofdkartel voorstellen, een pakhuys in een centraal gedeelte der Kaapstad openende, en steeds een uitgebreide hoeveelheid Kaapse wyn, groot genoeg om hotels en byzondere personen te voorzien, in hoeveelheden die van den of meer leggers tot een half aam afgeworden, in voorraden had. De sortering verbetaert elk artikel van verbruik, en geest een bepaalde waarde aan elke hoeveelheid. Eene soort, die steeds van vervalsching door verunning met ene mindere soort, zuiver word gehouden, krygt naam, soodat eene bepaalde hoeveelheid een bepaalde prys vertegenwoordigt, even als een souverein voor twintig shillings wordt aangenomen. Eindelyk wordt het merk der pakking een waarborg voor de hoeveelheid van den inhoud. De merken van enige onzer woltellers zyn voor koopers op de Londense markt eene aanbeveling, en in sulke zaken ontdekt een ervaren oog spoedig de namakse. Waarom zou het zo, ook niet gaan met de merken van een wijnhandelaar, z. ols. als met die van een tabakskoper? Laat eene maatschappij van wijnbouwers met de wijnkoopers der Kaapstad op di's oorsprong lid wye voor het debet in Engeland wederkeren, en wa staa er voor in, dat de laaste de kalanten der maatschappij zullen worden, daar sy anders hun pakhuizen maar kunnen sluiten.

Constantia d. et in Europa een prys, dien wy kolonisten niet kunnen betalen—een prys, dien hy soowel aan zyn naam, hoedanigheid als aan de omstandigheid dat hy niet in grote hoeveelheden verkregen kan worden, verschuldigd is; Andera Kaapche wijn behoeven niet duur te zyn; maar toch, naer de proeven op tentoonstellingen van landbouw te oordelen, zouden zy naar hunne hoedanigheid, ouderdom en de plaat van ay gegroei syn verschillen. Naarmate de byzondere geur van elken wyn nauwkeurig werd opgemerk, zouden de wyndrinkers uit smaak verkyren, wat men een verfynd gehemelte noemt, betegen men niet makkelijk kan bedriegen. Voor ieder, die zyn wyn niet drukt als een esel syn water inzweigt, moet het sangaen dat om sich door zyne aantingen te overtuigen, dat hy werkelijk datgene drukt waar hy voor betaalt. Wy zullen nooit een huistensporige verfyning in lekkerkery voorstaan, maar dan den anderen kant bewerken wy dat het voorval in artikelen van welede, sools en andere synheden van de feesttafel is, dat een dijn waardering van voorstellykheid doorgaen gepaard gaat met een verfyn smaak; en dat wie sich eene tweede kwaliteit voor eene eerste laat, in de hand stoppen, de onerelikheid aannemdig en wesenlike voortstellykheid in minachting helpt brengt.

DE GEYLOK VAN DE INDEMNITEIT ARTS.—Do "Ada Letitia," is van Algebhai naar Amerika met een lading van 233.323 lb. tahak teruggekeerd. De heer COOMANSON.

"Gids voor den Wynbouwers" soals onlangs gedaan was voor de tabakspaleniers door het uitgeven van een werkje over de tabakskultuur.

De heer P. Marais, wijnkooper van de Kaapstad, vond het dalkbeeld om den wyn te verbeteren en een groot wijnontstelling te houden al gelukkig. Vooral moesten er prijsen voor groote kwaliteiten worden uitgeschreven, want of een boer al een legier of een godsdienst wijn maakte, baatte dat wynbouw over het algemeen winig. Hy gaf vervolgens enige weken, hoe de beoordeelaars zich tegen bedrog konnen wapenen, en dan naam van Kaapsteden Wyn zou men niet bevoelen te veranderen, als werklyk het plan goed uitgevoerd.

Na nog enige ongerelateerde discussie zelde de voorzitter, dat men tot bepaalde voorraden moet komen? Zijn eigen idee was, dat al die ets gedacht werd het beter niet zijn de competitie voor allen open te stellen. Hy had het voor het best om niet de subiectie voort te gaan, te zien wat Stellenbosch en andere planten souden doen, en dan de bepaling van de groote taakontseling van 1865 tot later te doen overstaan. Een commissie kon dan dusdik worten benoemd om de beide plannen te bespreken tot verderf verboeding in den wynbouw.

De vergadering schreef het achter te last te vinden om nog op andere districten te wachten, en vond het niet regt dat ny, die niet tot de fondsen hadden bygedragen, niet de prijsen zouden mededelingen.

De voorzitter stelde, om niet het natteleven gepraat een einde te maken, een middagje weg voor op voorstel van den Heer W. Haupt, gescreend door den Heer T. Ross, werd daarna het volgende besluit aangenomen:

"Dat naek het govoris van de vergadering het woschylk: 'Ic om in de maand — een tentoonstelling van Parische wynen te houden en prijzen daartoe uit te loven, daar er tot nog toe geen andere districten enige ondersching tot dit doel is gegeven, en in tyd tot kort is om voor den volgenden perstyd uitvergadering van sy medewerkers willen; en dat ene commissie words benoemd om het bengemenee comittee te voeren."

Verder wed besloten ten minste twee markten in een jaar te houden, de sechtingen waaronder oedingen gya aan het Parische Landbouwkundig Genootschap.

Wel-Ed. Heer W. H. Aurot, Paarl.

Mijn Waarde Aurot! — Het spijt my zeer dat ik op het onverwachst bel-Ed word ons, sook als ik vroeger vooroenden was, de bykomst van het genootschap van landbouw op mogen bytewonen.

De tegenwoordige toestand der wynbouwers aan de Kaap is zeker heel benoedigd. Iets moet er in de zaak gedaan worden, om dat zeer spoedig, ten behoeve der bytewonen. De erwaring heeft bewezen dat de onvrije der voortgebrachte wynen een grote hinderpal geweest is voor den verkop van Kaapsche wyn in Europa, en tenzy men sich in de berichting van dezenhove alliet op verbetering toegelt, vrees ik dat men weinig goede voorraden kan.

Wanneer de bouwer slecht Wyn maakt, dan verantwoordelyk by zich doorgaans, en mischien beregt, dat hy hem onverwachting in, daar hy van den wynhouder in de Kaapstad evenwel krygt voor syn goden al voor syn dekente Wyn. Deze toestand van zaken is echter verkeerd, daer ik in myn ogen gemed overtuigt bin dat zoo de Kaapsche wynbouwers zich wilden toestaan op de berichting van goede wynen, ny desepte gelyk op de Europeesche markt soulen kunnen verkopen. Ik bin hiervan meer overtuigd, dan ik grond heb te geloven dat, niettegenstaande de jongte verandering van h't tarief door de Engelsche regering, in opsig tot di's invloed van Franse wynen in Engeland, het Britsch publiek evenwel niet meer gered is om wynen van dat land te noem. Maar zooneen Kaapsche wynmaatschappij wert opprigt, die syn verbond om de bistro wynen te leveren tegen by vergelyk matige prisen, zoudt het geheele aanzien der zaak veranderd kunnen worden tot voordeel van alle partoey, en ik geloof dat wanneer zulk eenne maatschappij wert op touw gezet, de landbouwende bevolking der Kaap wldt voelde voordelen voordelen soude inzogt. De voorraden voor de oprichting van sulke eenne maatschappij die in Engeland door geschichte agenten moet verteren worden, kunnen later besproken worden; maar ik ion denkt-te en gehantschap op het krachtigste aanspreken dat men vrou tydig een dergelyken stap in de zaak neem, met het dsl om den toestand van den Kaapschen wynbouwer te verbeteren, en aan andere landen te toonen wat onder h'hoeklyke aanspoeding gedaan kan worden. Zulk eenne uitkomst sou zantoon welk eenne koenijer men tot hier toe in Engeland heeft gepleegd, in opsig tot onze koloniale wynen, vooral daar er vele gevallen syn voorkeuren waardiaas kioskiend en anders in Engeland wonende kolonisten de kno-ij-ry hebben ontdekt dat met artikel gepleegd word. Maar nooit eerder overgeleidt werden aan den Kaapschen bouwer, die dan de verterende worter eerder alne opgerigten maatschappij met takt in Europa — de behoorlyke kwaliteit van syn leveren, zie ik geen reden om aan die eindelyke wederlaag der onderneeming en de spoede vertering in den toestand van de wyndistricten der kolonie te twyfelen. Ik wilde verder aannemer dat sulke eenne maatschappij des noeds taktaasten in honderd behoeft te hebben, en ben overtuigt dat wanneer die maatschappij op ene behoorlyk gewaardigde school begonnen word door invloedryke mannes in dat kolonie, er geen zwierigheid sou bestaan om zulke eenne goed aantale deelhouders in Engeland te bekomen, ten enkele sulke nuttigen en noedsakeynen maatregel, te ondersteunen, op dit keurpunt onzer koloniale angelegenheden in het algemeen, inzonderheid daer het beoogde doel behooren sou, waarby nog kom dat in den behoeften van ander landen sou voorzieen door hun suiveren wynen te leveren. Myne vrienden in awe buurt met wie ik dikwyls over de zaak gesproken heb, staan overtuigd van het belang dat ik in dese te stel en hebben ongetwijfeld om die reden hun verlangen te krenen gegeven my op den byskenont tegenvoerding te zien. Niét in stadt hieraan te voldoen, heb ik het raadzaam gemaakt u deze wenige regelen te schrijven al sechtyt byvoegende, dat ik ten allen tyde gegeven zal syn met hen mede te werken en hunne innigheid dese belangryke zaak van myn best vermoeden te bevordeeren.

HEEREN VISTEWERKEN.—De Millwall Iron-works Company heeft juist een geslagen yster schild oer drie Kanonnen ter verdediging van Kroonstadt gemaakt. Zie hier enige bysnyd-rheden van de samenstelling: — Het is 43 voet 6 duim lang en 10 voet hooch; en is gemaakt van geslagen yster staven, 12 duim by 12 duim. Dese houdens balken op van 14 tot 14 duim. De grondplaat waarop het geheld rust is 43 voet 6 duim lang, 2 voet breed en 34 duim dik. Het geheele hiel van het schild bedraagt 140 ton. Daar in sterkte, een duim yter g'lyk staan men een voet metwoelk is dit schid, even sterk als een muur van 15 voet dik. Het sal als proefhengen op een bolwerk van de buitenhavens te Kroonstadt geplaatst worden, maar al dat het de verwachting van Generaal Todesch beantwoordt, in plaats van den van hier boven gesteld worden, en dor klampt klinkingen in den gronmetwerk wordes bevestigd.

Cape Town, December 19, 1864.

In our last issue we ventured to make some remarks, which were not based on conjectures, but on well authenticated facts, showing that the wine merchant in this colony has not hitherto proved himself the friend of the winegrower, but rather the contrary. The Frenchman says: *cela pour soi, et Dieu pour nous tous*, which, being translated in the vulgar tongue, would mean let every one look out for himself, and may God prosper us all. It is usual for dealers in general to be guided by that precious maxim; and we believe that few stop to consider, whether the pure selfishness, that dictates the former part of it, ought not to forestall the blessing invoked in the latter. However this be, the fact that the wine-merchant has brought down the character of Cape wine, by the principle of paying only for the quantity, irrespective of quality, is sufficient to justify the producer to look out for himself in turn. The policy of the wine-grower, like everything of that stamp, has turned out to be suicidal, as might be expected from an infatuation that amounts to a practical deviation from the precept involved in the homely proverb: nobody cries stinking fish! But as an old mouse has more than one hole, so the wine merchant, should the London market fail him, is sure to find ours in the colony, where cheapness is almost the sole recommendation, where a glass of generous wine may find an occasional purchaser, and where every kind of stuff, even the very refuse of the store and the drippings of the casks, can be turned to account by the bucket. Though money corrupts everything it touches, it is not itself corrupted by the hands through which it passes. The merchants, instead of supplying the table of the middle classes of England, are content to make their stores the reservoirs for irrigating the canteens in town and in the country, and obtain an easy victory over temperance societies throughout the colony. Meanwhile the representatives of gentility in Cape Town experience great difficulty in supplying them-selves with a wholesome and palatable wine for daily use, and being in the long run disappointed almost by every wine merchant in turn, are obliged to have recourse to London made Ports and Sherries—not because they are good, but because imported wines are accounted respectable. Now we should like to know how long the homebrewed stuff would maintain its respectability if an association of wine growers, such as we suggested in our last, were to open the table of the middle classes of England, and so forth.

FIRE IN VAN DE LEUR-STREET.—The house of G. Kilian was discovered on fire on Thursday morning last at 1:30. It was discovered by the police, who with some neighbours speedily extinguished it. The fire commenced in a corner of the shop where lucifer matches were kept. Not much damage was done. The stock is insured in the Commercial Company for £300. The building belongs to Mr. Townsend wh. is now Natd.

THE TWIN SCREW-STEAMER "FAIR EAST" arrived in Table Bay on Wednesday, thirty-six days from Hong Kong. She was off L'Agulhas on Tuesday week, and would have been in on Thursday, but had no coal. She has on board 1500 tons new tea, and is expected to make the voyage home in thirty days. She makes in 300 tons coal here and one passenger, Lieut. Grant, 85th Regt. Capt. Jones reports the total destruction of the American paddle-steamer *Kew Kiang*, Capt. Taylor, which was in Table Bay in March last. It appears that the *Kew Kiang* had a race with the steamer *Moyune*, Capt. Briggs, up the River Hankow to try the speed of these vessels in the passage up. The ship burned down to the water's edge and sank. She was a large steamer of 1065 tons, and traded up the Hwang River. It will be remembered that the *Kew Kiang* was the American steamer which entered Table Bay on last good Friday, just as the *Alabama* was going out.
