## Suid Afrikaan.

Cape Town, February 16, 1865.

Those who have kept memoranda of every occasional turn out of our Volunteer Corps during a period fast approaching to a decennium, may be better able than we, who have done no such thing, to say whether they have deserved the censure administered to them rather freely by the military authorities. That they have been shabbily treated in respect of the arms and ammunition issued for their use, has been publicly stated, and will probably remain uncontradicted, which amounts to an admission. Whether the Volunteers have or have not deserved the imputation of remissness is one question; whether they have received those inducements to greater activity to which they were fairly entitled, is another. If, after having been subjected to the process of what is vulgarly called *blowing up*, they had seen fit to resign in a body, it is our opinion that they would have done the right thing, and that nobdy could have blamed them for it. When a body of young men, who can live without doing military duty, place themselves of their own accord on a level with those to whom a soldier's life is the means of earning a livelihood, we cannot help thinking that they are entitled to some consideration on the part of Government. If, instead of a treatment showing that their voluntary services were duly appreciated, they had condemned arms and ammunition served out to them, they must be of a meekness that but ill accords with martial aspirations, to pocket the affront. As regards the utility of volunteer corps, we think it very problematical. Soldiers, to be of use, must be soldiers in good earnest, and though it may sound like a paradox, we are prepared to maintain at any time, that the true volunteer is he who is willing to serve under officers and non-commissioned officers of the army, and to submit of his own accord to military subordination as the only way of becoming efficient. The term *volunteer* expresses a willingness to serve, and to serve not merely under the orders of officers of our own choosing, but of those whom the high military authorities see fit to place over us. The man who cannot reconcile himself to that sacrifice, may be a volunteer in the common acceptance of the word, but withdraws from his country without which he can be but of very limited use. On the other hand we confess that this cannot fairly be expected from the majority of young people. Personal liberty is dear to every one, and nobdy likes to have his movements circumscribed without absolute necessity. We are of opinion that militia is in many respects preferable to volunteers; and would see no hardship in making a limited term of service in the militia compulsory, even with the understanding that in time of war, such militia shall be liable to be called out to defend the frontier. But if we were asked whether we would advocate such a course in a colony, we would say no without a moment's hesitation. Colonists do not share all the privileges of subjects in the mother country, and consequently it would not be fair to impose on them all the duties and burthens belonging to such subjects. If British subjects, or those of any other country, forfeit some of their privileges by becoming colonists, and the British Government finds it expedient to keep such colonists in a state of dependence, how can it escape from the moral obligation of providing for their defence? If then the British or any other empire says: "we cannot afford to defend our colonies, it would not pay," our answer must be: then you have no business to keep colonies at all. It is the opinion of many, and ours among the number, that the kind of volunteerism, which has hitherto existed at the Cape, has done more harm than good to those who have engaged in it, because in many instances it has led to familiar intercourse with companions, whose social position would otherwise have been a barrier to that familiarity with all its pernicious consequences. The amalgamation of classes at a certain time of life vulgarizes the tone of society. Young people are too apt to borrow from each other what they ought to avoid. This is no reflection on one class more than on another: for the tradesman's son is as often corrupted by the gentleman's son as the latter by the former. The middle class is the strength of the nation, but to be so it must remain a distinct class. It cannot be ennobled by mixing with the class above it, and this certainly loses much of its prestige by amalgamating with the class below it.

**CANTERS' LICENCES.**—Parties to whom licences are granted on the 3rd Wednesday in March next, may, if they choose, pay the amount of the licence in quarterly instalments bearing interest, provided they shall give sufficient security to be approved of by the Treasurer General in Cape Town, and the Magistrates in the country districts.

**REPRESENTATION OF THE CAPE DIVISION.**—At the nomination of candidates for the vacant seat in the Assembly, yesterday, the only candidate proposed was Mr. C. J. Manuel. He was proposed by Mr. R. D. Jones, with a few complimentary remarks. Mr. Eustace seconded C. J. Hill, who presided, declared the candidate duly elected, after which Mr. Manuel briefly remarked, that not having changed his political views, he did not deem it necessary to recapitulate them. His present election convinced him that the electors approved of his former conduct, and he would continue to give his votes consistently and to the best of his ability. The colony had lately gone through severe trials, but he hoped that with economy and proper management its resources would be brought out, and it would be able to recover its former position.

**ARRIVAL OF THE "CAMBRIAN."**—The H. M. St. Cambrian arrived yesterday. The news brought by her is not very interesting. Parliament was to have met on the 7th or 9th instant. The Home Government had approved of the principle which governed the proceedings of the Canadian Conference, and accepted the new Constitution. No decision had yet been given by the Privy Council in the Colenso case. A report had been current that the Princess Mary of Cambridge had married Lord Hood; but the Times contradicted the report "on authority." Murders and suicides appear to be very prolific, and a couple of railway accidents had occurred.

Spain had abandoned her intentions to recover San Domingo, but had picked a quarrel with Peru, whose guano islands she had seized.

From America the intelligence this time is adverse to the Confederates, who besides the loss of Savannah, captured by Sherman, have sustained very serious reverses, amongst others Hood's repulse in Nashville, by General Thomas.

A powerful Federal squadron was attempting to close Wilmington, the last of the Confederate ports.

The money market was becoming easier. The Bank of England rate of discount was 5% to 6%.

**THE RAILWAY TO GRAAFF REINET.**—Mr. Headford returned to town on Tuesday last. We hear that he is quite satisfied, from his inspection of the line from Commando Kraal to Graaff-Reinet, that the work can be accomplished within the estimated cost. Several gentlemen in Graaff-Reinet have undertaken to present statistics of traffic which are to be laid before the forthcoming parliament. The surveying party are now in the neighbourhood of Waterford, and as it has been found that the Sunday's River Poort is quite practicable, all difficulty as to the proposed route may be said to have been overcome as the rest of the line passes over a level country. It was originally intended to have had the survey completed by the opening of parliament, but owing to the late heavy rains and the swollen state of the Sunday's River, it is feared that this will be impossible. We are assured however that no unnecessary delay will take place, and that this will be the case we have sufficient guarantee in the energy and promptitude already displayed in this matter by Mr. Headford.—*E. P. Herald.*

**SUICIDE.**—A Stander, a farmer residing at the Gwyng (George), committed suicide by hanging himself with a riem to a beam in his own house, on Monday night, the 23rd ultimo. The poor fellow had been in a desponding state for some time, and it was only by constant watching that he was prevented from perpetrating the act sooner.—*Ibid.*

From Fort Beaufort a correspondent writes us, under date the 4th inst., as follows: "The late murderer here is now supposed to have been a case of suicide. The man's money, pipe, tobacco &c., were in his pockets, and the dirk also gone judges from the position of the body, that it is a case of suicide. The man was found kneeling, his head being tied with a strap (which he always wore round his waist) to a branch about four and a half feet from the ground, his hands loosely in his neck tied behind his back. The man, it is said, had been drinking very hard of Calpe wine brandy.

There is every prospect of a abundant crop of stock during the coming winter.—The locusts still continue here and there to raze out some poor farmer who has been toil for the last six months to keep them off just too, as he has been congratulating himself that he has escaped. The birds, organically are in considerable number, harassing and destroying the locusts in all directions, so much so that in some instances the locusts have made a moonlight flight of it, in search of food to escape their enemies. I only know of one plan by which the country can be saved from general bankruptcy, and that is for the Government to join the Bloemfontein Bank, obtain money on debentures, secured on Government lands, realisable in ten years, with interest; place the money so obtained in the Bloemfontein Bank, issue an equal amount of bank-notes here, make by law a legal tender in the State, and then lend money on first mortgage, and discount good bills. Something must be done to procure money—we can't pay our debts with houses, furniture, merchandise, farms and stock—the cry is money! Why conceal our monetary difficulties? Why sulk over the question of the coming crisis? It will be more manly, more honorable, to look our coming danger in the face and meet it half way.

In this district many Basutos of known intelligence are now travelling with passes to collect money and search for lost horses. How many spies have the Government in Basutoland?

Basutoland.—Extract of a letter from Bantuland, dated 25th Jan. 1865.—"I am glad to say that everything is very quiet in our parts, and I am confident that if the Free State Government does not pull their reins too tight, we shall have peace. What is most to be regretted is, that the F. S. Government could not follow the good and wise advice of His Excellency about the native gauchos. The natives feel this loss very much, and many will suffer hunger, and you know what the natives are when pressed by famine. If the natives had been allowed to harvest their crops, I think that would have consolidated the peace of the country; and after all, the Free State has been placed in possession of a very valuable district by the decision of the Governor, and it would be but right that they should have some regard for his advice, with which the native chiefs are well acquainted."

**HORSE-FLESH IN BRAZIL.**—A letter from Berlin says—"Englishmen visiting Berlin and taking refreshment in any of the ordinary restaurants that abound in this city are extremely liable to make a discovery whch may would easily be agreeable. If, for instance, they ask for beef, they stand a great chance of obtaining a dish of horse-flesh. The case actually occurred in the winter a week or two back. The consumption of horse-flesh is increasing every year in Berlin. It has been twice as great in the year just elapsed as in the previous. The official returns show that from Oct. 1, 1863, to Oct. 1, 1864, there were 152 horses killed in the eight horse-slaughter houses in Berlin. The meat is sold at prices varying from 1/- to 2/- silver groschen (1/- to 3/-) per lb., when is only half the usual price of beef here. Most of it is disposed of to the keepers of public dining-rooms, cafes, gourdes, and beer-houses, and is consumed by the public under the impression that it is beef, which it much resembles in taste."

**A NEW FIRE EXTINGUISHER.**—An apothecary at Nantes has just discovered of the greatest accident that ammonia will put out fires. He happened to have 7 litres of Benzine in his cellar, and his boy, in going down with a candle, had set fire to it. Assistance was speedily at hand, and paid after pail of water was thrown into the cellar without producing any effect, when the apothecary himself, if took up a pail which was standing neglected in a corner, and emptied the contents into the cellar. To his astonishment the flames were quenched as if by magic, and upon examination he found that the pail, which belonged to his laboratory, had contained a quantity of liquid ammonia. The result is easy to explain on scientific principles; for ammonia, which consists of 82 parts of nitrogen and 18 of hydrogen, is easily decomposed by heat; and the nitrogen thus set free in the mist of a conflagration must infallibly put out the flames. A large supply of liquid ammonia properly administered would be the promptest extinguisher ever imagined.—*Galignani.*
