









W were just preparing to offer a few remarks on that most absurd production, the Pope's encyclical letter, when the opening address of the President of the Free State to the assembled Volksraad came to hand.

Without the least hesitation we flung aside the ravings of the crazy Pontiff, and set down to the perusal of a piece of composition which, by its modest and unassuming tone, reminded us of the despatches of Michiel de Ruyter to the "Highmightness" of his time.

It is in fact an official report taking a resolution of the Volksraad of the month of May last for its starting point. That resolution was to submit unconditionally to the decision of the Governor of the Cape Colony the question about the boundary line between the Free State and the Eastern Province.

Worcester.—His Excellency the Governor has confirmed the resolution adopted by the Divisional Council to reduce the mileage from 4 pence to two pence per mile, going and returning, irrespective of distance.

FRANKFURT.—Mr. P. Schierhoudt has been elected as member of the Divisional Council for district No. 5.

WILLOWMOORE, FEB. 18, 1865.—This place is going steadily forward and increasing in number of inhabitants. We have, after much importuning, succeeded in getting a weekly post, and a new post office has been established at Willowmoore, about 14 miles from this, in the division of George, but on the main road to this village.

ROBBERY.—During the night of Tuesday last, a cart and wagon outspanned below the cemetery was robbed of goods to the amount of about £15. This is the second or third time, within a short period that carts and wagons have been robbed. It is, in fact, a frequent occurrence and is likely to continue so unless it happens that some of the thieves are caught and punished.

THEFT.—During the night of the 9th instant the Municipal Pound Kral of this place was broken that day, and stolen. Two horses are also missing. A considerable portion of the mill was broken and the footprint of a Hottentot was clearly visible in and about the kral. By an advertisement in our front page it will be seen that a liberal reward is offered by the Poundmaster to any person who shall give such information as will lead to the discovery of the thief.

FOUND DROWNED.—On Monday last a man named David Wright, formerly connected with the theatre of this town, was found drowned in the Zwartkops River, on the 30th ultimo, deceased left this town to do some work for Mr. Berry, of Fishwater Flats, and lived with another man in a hut near the river. On the 23rd inst. he was missed by his companion and search was made for him in the neighbourhood and also in Port Elizabeth, but without avail.

JOINT STOCK COMPANIES.—The Government have given notice that legal proceedings will be instituted against those joint stock companies which shall fail to take out the licences required by law, before the 7th March proximo.

MAIL FOR ENGLAND.—The mail for England by the Eastern Province, will be closed at the General Post Office at 1 o'clock p.m. this day.

MATTLAND ROAD TOLL.—His Excellency the Governor has assented to the removal, from and after the 1st proximo, of the toll-bar from the fourth to the third mile-stone on the Matland Road.

NEW TOLL.—The Paarl Divisional Council has given notice of its intentions to establish a toll on the Paarl side of Bains Kloof, at a point about midway between the course of the Witte River and the old Tunnel.

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FEARFUL ACCIDENT.—Tulbagh, Feb. 21, 1865.—A fearful accident occurred before Newlook. About 1 o'clock this afternoon a report was heard similar to a thunder clap, so that the doors of some houses were blown in, and a woman was blown up into the air. Mr. Bennet's powder magazine before Newlook. Three human beings lost their lives, two men and a woman. Three of them have already been recognized, one belonging to Bondani, one to a man in the employ of Mr. Grant, and another to a person in the employ of Walmer by name. Any persons who have missed horses likely would do well to call at Mr. Tee's stable, where the remaining three horses are placed for identification. Robberies of gardens of Walmer and of the farms further removed from the town are very frequent just now.—Ibid.

RAIN.—During the early part of the week very heavy rains fell in the inland portion of British Kaffraria. From Maitland we learn by the local papers, that rain fell in such quantities that the streams and rivers were flooded. The parched earth must have absorbed the surplus water of the Buffalo long ere it reached East London, as there were no signs of a freshet here. Along the sea coast, only a few light showers fell during Tuesday night. This rain, though coming rather late in the season, will yet do a vast deal of good, as even the veld showed signs of the protracted drought. Some crops were totally destroyed; but others may revive now that rain has fallen.—Ibid.

THE WEAVER IN STANDING CROPS.—It is perfectly true that some of the standing crops of maize are attacked and being partly destroyed by the weevil. A farmer of this district informs us that on plucking some ears of maize which were getting ripe, he found the grain completely destroyed, nothing but the mere shell remaining, and myriads of weavils in each ear. We believe the maize crops in some districts of the Cape Colony were destroyed in a similar manner about two years ago. We are happy to add that this scourge is by no means general, but it has only visited a few farms as yet. Its cause is a mystery which baffles all enquiries, but it is generally attributed to atmospheric influences.—Ibid.

ATTEMPTED ESCAPE FROM PRISON.—On Monday afternoon about 3 p.m. three Hottentots confined in the goal, managed to climb over the prison walls, and run off. Before they had got a hundred yards, however, the alarm was given, and the Magistrate who happened to be in the Prince's Grove, ordered the prisoners at work to drop their spades and pick up the runaway. Being mostly Kaffirs, they obeyed with much pleating and in the course of a few minutes the runaway Hottentots were recaptured.—E. P. Herald.

LOCUSTS.—Immense swarms of locusts passed through the Blinkwater Port on Wednesday afternoon, coming from the direction of the Kat River. The swarms were hours on the wing, and took the direction of the Kroome.—Ibid.

COLEBERG.—We are informed on the best authority that His Excellency the Lieut. Governor will personally attend the Show, to be held here next month. Our informant also says that, nothing unforeseen occurring, the members of the Upper and Lower Houses of the Colonial Parliament will, on the above-mentioned occasion, honour the Agricultural and Horticultural Society of this place with their presence.—Coleberg Advertiser.

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HOUSEBREAKING.—Another case of house-breaking has been reported during the week. On Thursday night last, a burglar effected an entrance into the premises of Mr. John Baker, Queen-street. He obtained admittance by forcing open a small back window with a screw driver. Once in the shop he rigged himself out in a fine suit of clothes, and walked off with a piece of black silk and some other articles. He left behind him the screw-driver and a rough tweed coat which, it appears, Mr. Jacobson was also found upon the premises. A brand has been reported at the magistrate's office; but the police have not yet succeeded in apprehending the perpetrator.—P. E. Telegraph.

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DEATH BY LIGHTNING.—One evening last week a shepherd was killed on the Hottentot's River by lightning. He was driving the sheep to the kral of one Marais, a squatter, when he was struck. The skin over his eyes appeared bruised and the skin on his thighs and his clothes in front were scorched.—Ibid.

CHARGE OF CULPABLE INDOLENCY.—On Thursday G. F. Enslin was committed for trial on a charge of culpable indolency in having a day or two before the surrender of his estate fraudulently assigned to H. de Beer a promissory note for £100, thereby preferring him above his other creditors. The prisoner when asked what he had to say to the charge replied that he would reserve his defence. Bail was taken.—Ibid.

HOUSEBREAKING AND ASSAULT.—On Sunday night last a Kaffir entered the house of Mr. Finoham in Dry River. The noise he made awoke Mr. Finoham who tried to apprehend him, but he escaped from him and managed to get hold of a stick and struck Mr. Finoham, and also Mrs. Finoham, who by this time came to her husband's assistance, several blows with it. The Kaffer then ran away followed by a charge of loopers from Mr. Finoham's gun. Unfortunately the shot missed its object, at least the Kaffer left no trace behind him to show that he had been shot. Both Mr. and Mrs. Finoham got some severe bruises on the arms and legs. The Kaffer has not been traced.—Ibid.

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Original Correspondence. THE CENSUS. District Census Office, Feb. 8th 1865. Dear Sir,—I must ask you to allow me to say a few words upon the Census subject, with a hope that they may claim the attention of such of your readers as have ever public journals may be at variance upon other points, I believe the Census will be of great benefit to the public at large. It will be the six appointed days, I would therefore urge upon the farmer the importance of giving every assistance in his power to those engaged in the work.

I would suggest to each stockholder a few days previous to the 6th of March to take a true and correct account of all his horned Cattle, Sheep, Horses, Pigs, &c. so that the fieldnotes may be made as early as possible in taking such account, or it will be impossible to produce an accurate record, and carry out the intentions of Government. It must be remembered that this Census will cost a considerable sum of money position of the colony, as regards its people, produce, and general resources is not arrived at.

I apprehend that eventually many advantages will accrue from the Census both as regards private enterprise, and the public weal; the former cannot be pursued with any probability that it will be successful without some given data to work upon, and the latter will be in a great measure furnished if properly carried out. I am frequently in conversation with people upon this subject, and I find almost all agreed upon the importance of some system of education, which is the rising generation will be gained by the census. This has been a year in which the harvest is very variable. I have seen on one farm a good average harvest, and on the adjoining one an exceedingly deficient one. The former was obtained by dint of very great labour in applying manure, and the result is in wheat and rye twenty muids yield for one in other cases where the cultivator would not or could not apply water, the yield is miserably deficient, and in some instances little more than seed again. Irrigation is one of the many improvements required to place the farmer in a better position, and it would now be a good opportunity in the taking of the census to observe when the land was irrigated. There is a column for remarks and it would not be the least interesting part of the information required to insert in it when a corn land is not a type of the quantity of grain which it will produce that was sent last year, indeed it is a question if there will be any surplus over some consumption.
