DON'T YOU WISH YOU MAY GET IT?

UNITED STATES. THE NEW AMERICAN MINISTER.—Mr. John Lothrop Motley, the new Minister of the United States in England, comes to a country which he knows and where he is well known. He is no stranger to Europe, like many of the home-born political men of the United States, who first found their way to an official capacity. Mr. Motley received part of his education at German university; he lived in Europe during the time which he spent in composing the work by which he is best known among us, "The Rise of the Dutch Republic." He has, moreover, only lately returned to America after having filled for six years the post of Minister at Vienna. With this country he is so far connected that his chief work was published here, and that some time since he accepted the honorary degree of D.C.L. from the University of Oxford. Yet it would probably not be in the power of General Grant to find a Minister more thoroughly American. Mr. Motley is a zealous member of the Republican party, with all its opinions, sympathies and prejudices. He may be called a cultivated Radical. Though education and a refined taste may prevent him from identifying himself with the more extreme section of his party, his political views are not very different from theirs. Mr. Motley's feelings towards England are no doubt those of most Americans. A man in whom the historical sentiment is strong, and a large part of whose life has been spent in investigating the past, can hardly fail to be in some sort well-disposed to the old country. This tendency is naturally strengthened by a knowledge of English society, and the remembrance of many cordial friendships. Mr. Motley's reputation as a distinguished man of letters, no less than his diplomatic position, will insure him a hearty welcome in this country; nor is there any type of Minister whom we would receive more gladly than the historian and the scholar. Mr. Motley, however, would be the first to admit that in him we must recognize one who has decided opinions on the matters in dispute between us and the Americans. Whatever may be his social or his historical propensities, he is, as far as actual politics are concerned, a thorough representative of the Northern Republicans.

TURKEY. THE SULTAN AND HIS OPERA.—There is a rather amusing account being told of the manner in which the Intendant of the Italian Opera at Constantinople has recently fallen into disgrace. It appears that the Sultan, unlike most sovereigns, does not waste much time on the opera amusement, but goes there once a year, when he expects to hear a selection of short tunes, just to keep him amused. This year the Intendant began with "Una voce poco fa." "That is dull," says the Sultan, "I have heard it before." Another song follows, and with the same result. At last the Intendant orders the concluding chorus of "Ernani." The Intendant alters, however, the last verse of Charles V. to suit the occasion, and accordingly the Sultan, who abominates all flattery, hears the whole Italian chorus ring out with "Long live Abdul Aziz! Abdul Aziz long live!" The next morning the Intendant is dismissed.
