OUR LONDON CORRESPONDENT'S LETTER.

Parliament having been in recess, as is usual at Whitsuntide, there is really little of interest in political matters to relate; for the fact is the public is heartily tired of the Irish Church question and its interminable debates.

IRRIGATION ON A GRAND SCALE.

For the last ten days, we have had almost incessant rains, accompanied by severe westerly and northwesterly gales.

MARKET PRYZEN.

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Although there is undoubtedly great animosity against England amongst a very large majority of the American people, I am glad to say that prudent counsels have prevailed with General Grant and his Ministers, and that the influence of the respectable and trading classes have overruled the bellicose opinions of political agitators and rowdies.

There is a large party who at any cost would support the outrageous demands of Mr. Sumner, who would insist upon an abject apology for the Queen's Proclamation of neutrality, although the American government have invariably acted upon when it suited their purpose, in enforcing the blockade and seizing our ships when trying to break it and from first to last obtained from this country far more supplies than the South erners. Indeed there is a great deal of truth in complaint of Ex-President Davis, that if it had not been for this the Southerners would never have been conquered.

Besides this humble apology Mr. Sumner would have us pay damages to the amount of several millions for the ships destroyed by the Alabama and her escorts, half the cost of the war for the aid we gave to the rebels and thus enabled them to prolong the war and to crown all to cede Canada and British America. It is needless to say that these demands would have been peremptorily rejected. The British Americans have promptly asserted that they will stick to England to the last if she is true to herself and them. In offering to refer all questions in dispute to arbitration, we made great concessions and having the Convention of their own Ambassador the United States must make the next overture. It is satisfactory to know that their new minister, the well-known historian Mr. Motley will not prefer Mr. Sumner's terms. The American government have decided not to re-open the question, but to let it go on, I suppose finding it useful to keep the soil open for their own political objects. I need not say that this is a very dangerous state of things, but it is to be hoped that in proportion to their present animosity a more friendly reaction will soon set in, especially as they find that this country is not to be bullied and that nothing short of actual hostilities will divert her from her present conciliatory attitude.

THE ALABAMA CLAIMS.

From what purports to be an official American source, we learn the exact amount claimed by the various owners of the ships destroyed by the Alabama and other vessels acting for the Southern Confederation. Though these damages are currently termed 'Alabama claims,' it is hardly necessary to remark that the deprivations of the famous '290' form only a portion of the injuries for which redress is sought. The total amount is assessed at rather more than 13,000,000 dollars, or about 22,670,000. The Alabama destroyed seventy ships, on behalf of which 5,271,000 dollars are demanded. Thirty-six vessels and charges of 3,000,000 dollars are set down to the account of the Florida. The Georgia destroyed only nine ships, for which about 326,000 dollars are claimed. The bill against the Sassaunah is 4,404,000 dollars, for thirty-six ships. The tenders of the Alabama and Florida are charged with 22,000 dollars; but many vessels captured by these tenders, and freed by the other ships, have not yet been assessed.

There is little alteration in monetary or commercial affairs. On the 13th inst. the Bank of England raised the rate of discount to 4 1/2 per cent. in consequence of the excessive speculation in foreign and especially in American Government Bonds, thus coming just at the time of the announcement of the sumner award demand and their enthusiastic reception in America created quite a panic for a couple of days, but it soon subsided. With this exception the state of things is still very dull. There is no speculation and the public will only invest in well accredited securities. Consols are firm and colonial government bonds in a desirable request.
