The House of Assembly was occupied on Wednesday, first with the Crown Lands Road Rates Bill, the only important amendment made in which was that as lessees were to be subjected to road rates they might also be eligible as members of Divisional Councils if their lease rent amounted to £30 per annum.

On Thursday, the principal discussion which extended over two hours was on a motion by Mr Thompson, that all voters should be required to take out stamped tickets of registration, for which a sum of six shillings should be charged.

The Assembly was on Friday afternoon chiefly occupied with Mr Porter's Election Law Amendment Bill. Strenuous opposition to it was made by some of the Government officers and a minority of the House; but it was proceeded with in committee notwithstanding.

SOUTH LEBUEN, FEBRUARY 17, 1870.—A correspondent to the Friend writes:—“Since I wrote you, we have had quite a flood of water. All the small streams were impassable. Even the Caledon River and the Cornet Spruit were quite full.

Since my last report another farm has changed hands, viz., Van Idelkings' Valley, belonging to a Mr. Muller, lately of Reddersburg. It was sold to Mr. de Wet, from Swellendam, for £800 cash, in Colonial money. This farm is situated near Vredefort. It was originally sold at public auction for £180 in bluebacks.

Mr. Carl Kohl, the real water finder came here again to-day. He speaks very highly on this part of the country, and says it would have an abundance of water if the mountains were only opened. Several parties have already availed themselves of Mr. Kohl's services, and some were very successful. This is Mr. K's second visit.

The good people of the Conquered territory are now very busy raising subscriptions for the building of a place of worship, either at Wepener or at some other suitable site where the majority may decide to have it. The Rev. Mr. Roux, of Smithfield, kindly consented to come and hold divine service for us as often as possible, and as soon as any fitting place can be had. A Minister, Laadros, and Post-office are much needed here.

We have heard a rumour that the escaped convict Smith, got out of Smithfield jail, and who stole some £70 from the Municipality there, is at last captured, at Sequoia's Kraal, by the Police; and was sent from thence to Mr. Bowker's camp.

All the farmers here are much delighted to hear that the Aliwal Convention is confirmed, and that Mr. H. J. Has is appointed a magistrate in Beaufortland. We think he is “the right man in the right place.” May he only prove to be what he has always been—a friend of the Boers; and let him but supply us with plenty of servants.

General Intelligence.

(From the European Mail.)

NEED WRIGHT, “THE CONVERTED BURGLAR.”—On January 18, about 220 guests of Ned Wright, “the converted burglar,” were treated to soup in the New Club, Lambeth, which was erewhile a “pony gaff,” and which now, under the regenerate name of Gospel Hall is used as a sort of chapel and school-room in one. The company assembled was a somewhat remarkable one, as will be understood when it is said that “none but male thieves who have been convicted” were allowed to enter. Invitations to the number of 195 had been issued; and in addition, to these, as at the late Lady Palmerston's parties there was a rush of unbidden guests who were allowed to remain. In the result the guests of the evening were roughly analysed thus: There were 188 men and boys who had altogether served in prison 142 years 4 months and 2 weeks; and there were 7 men who had between them served 67 years and 4 months; or a total of 195 guests who had undergone nearly 210 years of imprisonment. One of them had been convicted no less than 16 times, and had served 7 years; against another 13 convictions, and 10 years' imprisonment were on record; and the degree of criminality gradually dwindled down, from these extreme cases until at the other end of the scale stood a boy of tender years who had been sent to prison for 14 days for stealing four turkeys when he was hungry. It was painful to see such a juvenile already enrolled in the ranks of professional criminals. There was plenty of noise and horreplay in the hall before the visitors entered, but none, or very little afterwards. Ned Wright received a round of cheers, mingled with some good-humoured chaff, which he put a stop to by telling them, “You're going to have a clinking clump of bread each, and if you make your jaws ache now, they'll be no use when you get the tummy (bread).” The bread, on being passed round, was snatched and devoured with the avidity of extreme hunger, and the recipients obeyed orders, and sat patiently in their seats till they were served in their regular turn. The hot soup was probably a still greater temptation. The waiters were few, and the basin circulated too slowly for the eager appetites of the guests, but as a rule, they put a curb on their impatience, and abstained from making a rush. One burly fellow, who was inclined to be demonstrative, looked thoroughly ashamed when Mr. Wright, pointing to him, cried, “If our friend in the white jacket were to do that in Wandsworth, they'd know what to do with him, eh?” To which appeal came a general cry of “Three days' bread and water, sir.”

The supper over, Ned Wright walked on to the platform, and made a forcible address, tending to their reformation. After the extraordinary gathering there was the usual gospel meeting, to which many—perhaps half—of the guests were induced to remain, by an intimation that certain benevolent plans for starting men on an honest way of life would be subsequently discussed. These plans, as explained to us by Mr. Wright, were promising as any that could be devised. A proprietor of barrows, such as are used by costermongers, has 20 of those vehicles which are disengaged. The project of Mr. Wright is to fit 30 men for these 30 barrows, and to give them each a shilling to begin business. Many a thriving salesman has risen from as small a capital to independence. The speaker certainly carried with him the attention of the audience. Faces that were careless and mocking at first gradually deepened into seriousness, and any attempt at ridicule or noise was immediately suppressed. The proceedings lasted about two hours; during the whole of it at least we did not hear one blasphemous or indecent expression from the assembled throng.

FRANCE ON THE COAST OF CHINA.—Under date Hong Kong, Dec. 7, we are informed that the ship “Crofton,” has been abandoned in a sinking condition near Macao, having been attacked by pirates, who murdered all the Europeans on board except the captain and six men, whom they made prisoners. The Portuguese war vessel “Canoe” inflicted severe retribution upon those concerned in this piratical outrage, and burnt all the villages adjacent to the scene of the murder. Some particulars are furnished in a private letter from Hong Kong of this horrible atrocity. The writer says:—“The ‘Crofton,’ it appears, was in a sinking state, having sprung a

leak not far from Macao, and the mate with a boat's crew came in to Hong Kong for assistance. The ship was subsequently taken by pirates, who carried the captain and remainder of the crew to the island of Montamba, close by Macao, near the Tafea, where they beheaded the prisoners and burnt the bodies on the beach. Distinct traces of the tragedy were discovered, with many of the ‘Crofton's’ papers. Several prisoners have been taken and two or three villages burnt. The ‘Crofton’ herself has not been found—she has probably sunk.

JAPAN.—THE ALLEGED ATTEMPT TO ASSASSINATE SIR H. PARKES.—The Japan Herald gives a translation of an anonymous letter addressed to the Rev. J. Goble, missionary at Yokohama, in conveying intelligence of a plot to assassinate the British Minister, and although it does not positively guarantee the authenticity of the information, seems disposed to regard the letter as genuine:—“Although with fear, I have a request to make by letter. Then for some time past, it is reported, many of the Tokugawa ronins have banded together, and are agreed to assassinate the chief officers of the new Government. Already, near Kyoto or Osaka, one has been assassinated, and this was surely the work of the aforesaid ronins. Now these ronins have in their possession the photographic likenesses of the people they are to kill. It is said also that among the likenesses there is one of high foreign officer, a person called Parkes. It is also said by some that the reason of this is that, from the time of old, he has given aid in money loans and in other matters, and last year, sailing to the western provinces, he assisted the Daimios of those provinces in accomplishing the ruin of the Tokugawa dynasty. Therefore, whilst I wish to give him warning of the foregoing conspiracy, not knowing of what country or where he lives, I cannot help sending you this letter, and beg of you without delay to make this known. In haste, 10th month 6th day, city of Tokio. Ah,—I beg of you do not let any other person than this man (Sir H. P.)—certainly not any Japanese officer—see this letter. I adjure you. Tsunemoto.”
