







The R. M. St. Saxon, left Table Bay with the fortnightly mails for Europe yesterday afternoon, taking several passengers and a cargo of colonial produce valued at about £30,000.

CRIMINAL SESSION.—On Monday Thomas Dravto, the lad charged with the robbery at Mr R M Ross's, was found guilty of receiving property knowing it to have been stolen, and was sentenced to 12 months' hard labor. On Tuesday Mrs Murphy, charged with the murder of her daughter, was acquitted. This concluded the business of the sessions.

SIGNS OF THE TIMES.—The breakwater is now doing its destined work, and the large cargo-boats are consequently fast disappearing. A couple of them are now upon the beach undergoing the process of being converted into cutters with a view to their future employment in the northern coasting trade, and several more of their sister craft have at previous dates undergone this same transmutation. The indication is, however, in a point of view satisfactory, in so far as that the northern coast trade proves profitable, and that the farmers dwelling in that very beautiful and productive district are inclined to discard the antiquated bullock team, and to trust their produce to the care of the several active skippers now plying upon the coast.

"THE COLONADE."—Greenmarket-square, which is the literal, and was of old the business centre of the town especially, with the farmers and traders, had just had an addition made to the appearance of its buildings, which is of a very handsome character. This is due to the enterprise of Mr. H. H. Ley, the proprietor of a block of buildings at the lower corner of the square and Shortmarket-street. Mr. Ley has beautified and enhanced materially, we should think, the value of his property by dividing the side looking on the square into a row of convenient shops with a colonnade. The appearance is striking and novel for Cape Town; and Mr Ley has given the property the name of "The Colonnade."

HOEDJES BAY, JULY 14, 1870.—I have lived in this part of the country for about 32 years, but cannot recollect of our having experienced such a weather, at least, such rain, as we have had now.

We had previously very heavy rain and strong gusts of wind from the N.W., but from Saturday night the 9th until Sunday about 12 o'clock the wind and rain were at their high accompanied with heavy thunder and lightning, causing damage to buildings &c, such as destroying gables &c.

About 9 o'clock on Sunday morning the water came rushing down the mountain, bringing down rocks and bushes, in fact, nothing could stand before it. Luckily the water separated and took different channels, each about 20 feet broad by 10 feet deep close to each other. It came on straight to the house occupied by F G Du Bois and family, and it would have been swept away but by dint of great labour they succeeded in turning its course not before the house was half full of water, but it destroyed the garden, and left as a memento a great mass of sand.

In the afternoon three skeletons were washed out in the Hoedjes Bay road, a medical man who was present saw the skulls, and he said the skulls were of white men, (Hollanders, by the mark on a bone button also found there, the bones were collected and buried again.

Now everything looks beautiful, with a prospect of as fine a harvest as ever was seen before in this part of the country.—Corre pondent.

MURDER.—A most deliberate murder, says the Port Elizabeth Telegraph, was committed last evening, Thursday, July 14, at a house in Strand-street. The building it seems is tenanted, and the front door is secured; but one of the windows being broken, a number of "loafers" and other unfortunate wretches, white and coloured, of both sexes, are in the habit of getting through and making it their sleeping place. A white man, named O'Haran, was one of the occupants of this den last night, and during a quarrel he was stabbed by another man, said to be a Mantatee, in the right side. It is a fearful gash—3 inches long—and must have penetrated so far into the chest as to have caused almost immediate death. The man who inflicted the wound has bolted. Another coloured man who was on the premises, has been apprehended, but it is said he had nothing to do with the affair. A coloured woman, who is to be examined this morning by the Acting Magistrate, says that the murdered man gave no provocation whatever. That he was sleeping with her when the murderer (a Mantatee or Natal Kafir) came in, and that the latter stabbed O'Haran because she awoke him to protect her from the Kafir who said he wanted to have her.

TRAFFIC.—A passenger by the cart from Grahamstown to Port Elizabeth last week tells us, P. E. Telegraph, that he passed ninety-six wagons on the down trip, and one hundred and fifty-seven on the return. This looks well for karweyers. Probably they will have forth find employment in the conveyance of diamond hunters.

A HOAX.—There is no truth, says the P. E. Telegraph, in the statement published in the Grahamstown Advertiser, that a traveller from up-country to Port Elizabeth who passed through Grahamstown recently, brought with him diamonds valued at £30,000. The "tumbler full of diamonds" were probably crystals.

DURING the month of June the Resident Magistrate of Port Elizabeth granted permits for the removal to the interior of 6,500 lbs of gunpowder, 3,864 lbs of lead, 227,500 caps, and 107 guns.—P. E. Telegraph.

MR. JOHN VOGLT, a respectable Dutch farmer, residing at "Graaf Water," Alexandria, died on Friday last from the effects of an accident in having his thumb jammed in the wheels of a thrashing machine.—Id.
