HOOG GERECHTSHOF.

(Voor den Hoofdreger en Regters Denijssen en Fitzpatrick.)

DINGSDAG, 30 AUGUSTUS.

Regter Denijssen zeide, dat er onder de mazztraatsaken, welke gedurende de week voor hem waren gebracht, eene was, die eene overtreding van de Ordinantie op den handel in wijn en spiritus raakte. Zeker Martin werd beschuldigd, zonder licentie wijn te hebben verkocht aan zekeren Jantje Zwartbooi. Jantje verklaarde, dat hij te hebben gekocht, doch werd tgegensproken door andere getuigen en de magistrat wees de zaak terug van de hand. Doch op denzelfden dag trad de magistrat in eene andere zaak, waarin Martin werd beschuldigd, brandwijn te hebben verkocht aan zekeren Adelf Daniels. Daniels ontkeerde den brandwijn te hebben gekocht en werd geruggesteld door andere getuigen; maar Jantje Zwartbooi zwoer, ghehoord te hebben van den koop van den brandwijn, en hoe wel de magistrat den kerel geen geloof wilde schenken in de eerste zaak, deed hij zulke toed in deze en veroordeelde Martin, op grond van Jantjes hooren zeggen, tot eene boete van £10. Het vonnis moest vernietigd worden.

CARSON EN ANDREWS vs. MARIS EN ANDREWS. Het Hof werd bijna den geheelen dag bezig gehouden met deze zaak. Carson en twee anderen traden op de verweerder als predikant, onderlingen en diaconen, den Ned. Gereformeerden Kerkraad te Bredasdorp uitmaakend. De klage hield in, dat de eischers jaren geleden eren hadden ge-loocht onder toezicht van den kerkraad met de bepaling, dat de eigenaars van elk erf 25 parden of ossen en 50 schapen zou mogen houden op de gronden; welke dancore zoude gereserveerd worden; maar dat de kerkraad, nittetgenstaande die bepaling, voortging met erfa van den alsoo gereserveerden grond te verkoopen. De eischers verzoekten nu, dat den kerkraad zou verboden worden met den verkoop van erfa voort te gaan, waartoe hij o. a. in den laatsten tijd weder 500 gorden had laten openen. De verdediging hield in 1. de algemeene ontkenning. 2. Dat de kerkraad zich bij den verkoop der erfa het regt voorbehield, de regulatien betreffende waterleidingen, het regt van graszen en te wijzigen. 3. Dat de plaats "Langfontein, thans het dorp Bredasdorp, den kerkraad onder servituum of bepaling was afgetaan. De Maris werd bevestigd onderzraagd omtrent de documenten onder de zorg des kerkraads berustende, de koopconditien enz. Ook de heeren R. Ruijck, Chas. Barry, M. J. Swart en D. H. W. Matthijs werden als getuigen voor de verdediging ghehoord. Het Hof deed uitspraak met de kosten ten gunste van verweerder, zonder huure advocaten op te roepen. In deze zaak traden op voor de eischers op advo-

De Bethulle Erfgaatschappy.

Het Comité publiceerde het volgende:—Het doel der Maatschappij is om den grootsten hinderpaal op te heffen die den handel tusschen de Kaapkolonie en den Vrystaat en omliggende gewesten ten Noorden der Oranjerivier belemmert, en tevens aan de aandeelhouders eene veilige en voordeliggeliddegebruik te verzekeren, van die graven en verontwaardigheids, die aan banken en dergelyke instellingen verbonden syn. De veiligheid der brug voor geldbezittingen blijkt uit het volgende, door den Hoofdspecteur der Kolonie, den heer M. Robinson, te kennen gegeven.

"Daar, waer men plan heeft de brug te bouwen, is de rivier in hare geheele lengte doormidden in eene rotsbank, die een bestendig en door wind en zand van de rivier aan beide zyden syn laag, zoodat zelfs by den grootsten vloed, het water aan beide zyden over de laaggelegene gronden zynen loop aanhouden. Het bed der rivier is by eenen grooten afstand waterpas, en de stroom der rivier is by den hoogsten vloed bevoeden te syn 7 mylen per uur. De banken aan deze zyde (Kaapkolonie) syn hoog genoeg om zoodanige overstroming te voorkomen, dat de uadering der brug zonde belemmerd syn."

De duurzaamheid der brug op die plaats gheboord is door deze natuurlijke eigenschappen verzekerd. Het Comité heeft de hieraan ghehoorte statistiek van het vervoer op dit punt des wegs brennen verzameld, om aan hen, die aandeelhouders mogten willen worden, verder aan te toonen, dat de onderneming, afgezonden van het algemeen nut voor het publiek aan beide zyden der rivier, en de onbetrekenbare verlevendiging, die het den handel zal geven, tevens is eene voordeliggeliddegebruik. Het plan is om de brug onder toezigt van den Hoofdspecteur van publieke werken, den heer M. Robinson, te bouwen, die zich daartoe heeft bereid verklaard en door wien de kosten op £26,000 worden geschat. Uit datgene wat in de laatste zitting van het Parlement is voorgevallen, meent het Comité te mogen aannemen, dat eene Gouvernements toelage van £8000 aan de onderneming zal ghehooren worden. Bethulle is gekozen als de meest geschikte plek, omdat het op brns zylken afstand ligt van Colerberg; het uiterst Westelyk punt, en van Alford, de Oostelyk punt des grooten wegs naar de binnelandse rivier gepasseerd zynde, in syne geheele lengte zoudde belemmeren. De Hoofdspecteur van dies weg bevestigde, zegt in Rapport aan het Gouvernement in 1863, afdeeling 21.

"Te Bredasdorp zynde had ik gelegenheid, den weg naar Bethulle te onderzoeken, den rugteuweg naar Bloemfontein. De plek is zeer geschikt voor eene brug over de Oranjerivier, en schyn de meest reguit en beste weg te syn van Bloemfontein naar Fort Elizabeth." Het Comité besloot in dit prospectus enkele statistieken opgeven aan het publiek voor te leggen, en heeft derhalve niet zoo volledig als het gewenscht zou hebben aangewezen, dat de weg, die over Bethulle gaat, de meest centrale weg is voor transportryders en alle anderen naar den Vrystaat, de Diamantvelden en Transvaal gaande, en nadat de Oranjerivier gepasseerd is, niet wordt belemmerd door de Caledonrivier of enige andere rivier van betekeenis. De weg gaat bovendien over de uitgestrekte steenkolieven van den Stormberg, terlyl onlangs aangekonden is in de nabijheid van Bethulle, en in de onmiddelyke nabijheid der aan te leggen brug. De Diamantvelden. De Secretaris van den Oost Londenchen Afdeeling heeft om te zamen vandenlyk gevraagd, ten einde de Diamantvelden te gaan bezoeken. De heer Ingram, van King Williams Town, heeft een brief ontvange van een vriend, waarin deze meddele, dat hy, een paar dagen na syne aankomst, niet minder dan drie en zestig diamanten had gezien, wagnende van 1 tot 8 karat elk, die in één dag was opgegraven. Gemeende Berigten.

ROTTERDAM, 17 JULY.—Per telegraaf is reeds gemeld dat de Koning van Pruisen uit Ems te Berlyn aangekomen, en dorel op syne reis als in de hoofdstad, den 17 October, ontvange van de Koning van Ems een Z. M. aldair by het afscheid gezegd hebben: "God is my getuige dat ik geen oorlog wil; maar als ik er to te gedwongen word, dan zal ik tot op den laatsten man Duitschlands eer beschermen."

Keizer Napoleon heeft de volgende proclamatie uitgevaardigd aan het Fransche leger:—"Er zou plechtig oogenblikken in het leven van vaderland, wanneer het nationale gevoel op een gelykzamen en eene ziele, die met de vaderlandse heilichheit uit, alle behoeven behoeft, en allen het bestier van de lotgevallen des lands in handen nemt. Een dazer beslissende tye is aangebroken voor Frankryk. Pruisen, jgens welk land wy zoudde gedurende, als sedert den oorlog van 1866, den mee t verzenigden geest hebben aan den dag geleid, heeft zich niet geestoort aan eene goede verdediging om te toezien. Voortredende op het pad van geweld, heeft dit land overal verdundschap en Europa ontzaglyke wapening noodig gemaakt, om in eene legerplaats verward, waerby niets dan de eene overwinning eene oorlog tegen Duitschland, welke onafankthlyk wy eerbiedigen. Last ons wenschen, dat de volkeren, die de groots Duitse natie uitmaken, vrslyk over hun lot mogen beschikken. Voor onze vnselen verlangen het tot stand brengen van eene toestand van zaken, waarvoor ons vrslyk gewaarborgd en onze toekomst verzekerd zal worden. Wy wenschen een duurzamen vrede te veroveren, en gegreep op de ware belangen der volken, en eene eede te maken aan dezen vrslykheidige toestand, waerby alle volkeren hunne belangen gelykzamen, waerby wy weder ontploogen legeneren heb, die ons hebben nitgedragd, is dezelfde, die de beschavende denkbeelden onder groote omwenteling door zeebelfde hebben ontdegt. Zy vertegenwoordigt dezelfde beginselen en brenst dezelfde toezien. "Franschen, ik plaats my als het hoofd van den dapperen leger, dat wordt bezield door liefde van vaderland, en het vaderland. Het kent syne eide waarde, daar het heeft gezien, hoe de overwinning syne waarde heeft gevraagd in de vier waldeliden. Ik zal myn soot mededonen, en in waarlyk van syne jeugd. Hy weet, welke de pligten zyn, die sy aan hem oplegt, en hy is er trotsch op, dat hy syne aandel mag nemen aan de graven van hen, die voor hun land streden. Moge God onze pogingen zegenen. Een groot volk, dat eene regtzvuldigde zaak verdedigt, is onoverwinnelyk."

Holland as well in spite of the guarantee to which England is a party. Besides this, France in possession of Antwerp would be a great danger and menace to us.

From these exciting events it is quite time to turn to our quiet and peace affairs. The difficulty with respect to the Irish Land Bill between the House of Lords and the House of Commons is likely to be very easily got over. The Education Bill has passed the Commons, and will no doubt pass the Lords without much trouble. Its chief opponents have been the extreme non-conformists, who have refused all compromise and thought to great deal more of obtaining a triumph over the Church of England than of the education of the people. A small energetic and extreme knot of the Ultra Liberals have stoutly insisted that all State Education should be strictly secular, but this is not the feeling of the great mass of the public, and however desirous they might be to conciliate this section of their friends, the Government was obliged to take a more extended view of the case. They offered a fair compromise, the local boards will have power to decide the question of religious education according to the views of each locality, but the government by the conscience clause trusts that all parties will have fair play, but these great offences in the eyes of the ultra-Radicals, they refused to interfere with the existing system by which the schools of the various denominations receive state aid. Hitherto it is solely to the efforts of the religious bodies that we are indebted altogether for the Education of the lower classes. This voluntarism is a most powerful motive force and no government could have ignored it, much less have suppressed, or even refused to have sided it. But the ultra-Radicals seemed to think that because Mr. Gladstone had disestablished the Irish Church, he was like themselves a sworn foe to all religious bodies and religious influence.

The chief event of the fortnight socially has been the annual volunteer gathering at Wimbledon, which has been a magnificent success. Thanks to the splendid weather, in which respect our great festival has been proverbially unlucky. The shooting also shows a decided advance on previous years not only as regards the crack shots but also on the general average. The winner of the Queen's prize was Private Humphries, 6th Surrey, 66 points closely pressed by three others who all made 65. Of the other matches the House of Lords beat the House of Commons by 10 Harrow was the best of the Public Schools. The English twenty beat the Irish and Scotch twenty with ease. The scores being England 1076, Scotland 1041, and Ireland 1032.

A preliminary meeting of the legal community has been held for the purpose of establishing a Law University. The sale of pictures, water-colour drawings, and objects of art, the property of Charles Dickens, on Saturday last, was one of the most remarkable events of the kind which have occurred at the famous mart of Christie, Manson, and Woods, King-street, St James's. The amounts realised for almost every article which came under the hammer were perfectly fabulous, but it was evident that many of the purchases made were for or as souvenirs, and had scarcely any reference to the intrinsic value of the articles sold.

The outbreak of hostilities has had a serious effect upon the colonial wool sales. The foreign buyers have at once left and prices fell from 1d. to 1/4d. per lb. Since then they have slightly rallied, as the reduction brought up the Yorkshire manufacturer, and the sorts adapted for English purposes have recovered and even trade a slight advance, but in those suited to the foreign market, there is no improvement, and it is determined to close the sales, leaving about 50,000 bales over for the next season.

The Bank of England has raised the rate of discount to 4 per cent. Of course the outbreak of hostilities has had a most adverse effect. We do a large trade with Germany, which it has quite stopped, but this effect will be temporary and if the war continues, the rising industries of Germany and France, now formidable rivals, will either be destroyed or thrown back a generation. We have still to lament the effects of an unparalleled drought, corn crops are few, but hay and roots deplorably bad and fodder very scarce.

In the money market there has been quite a panic, caused by the war, abruptly destroying a state speculation and inflated prices, which, without it would have resulted sooner or later.
